## 135 Wooden containers and baskets

This Report on the Wooden Containers and Baskets Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing wooden barrels, casks, kegs, vats, buckets, etc and such parts as staves, cask heads and bungs; wooden boxes, packing cases, crates, cigar boxes, tea chests and other similar containers; baskets, hampers, punnets, skips, trugs, etc and the preparation of canes and osiers for the manufacture thereof.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 475 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census. The definition of this industry however is unchanged from the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 in which it was reported (Part 112).

In this industry, where small establishments account for a relatively large proportion of employment and output, establishments employing fewer than twenty-five persons were asked to complete a simplified version of the full census form for 1968. For 1963 a sample of small firms was asked to complete the simplified census form, the remainder being required only to give information on employment and description of business.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).

## 136 Miscellaneous wood and cork manufactures

This Report on the Miscellaneous Wood and Cork Manufactures Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing cork mats, stoppers, insulating material, life-belts, buoys, etc; wooden goods including heels, lasts, boot trees, tool handles, picture frames, ladders, domestic woodware, rustic furniture, coffins, etc and the manufacturing and repairing of horse-drawn carts, carriages and wagons, and hand-trucks and wheelbarrows, primarily of wood and parts such as wheels and axles. General carpenters and joiners (not mainly engaged on building site) are included.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 479 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census. The definition of this industry however is unchanged from the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 in which it was reported (Part 113) except that hand-trucks and wheelbarrows primarily of wood were included in the report on the Perambulators, Hand-trucks, etc, Industry (Part 67).

In this industry, where small establishments account for a relatively large proportion of employment and output, establishments employing fewer than twenty-five persons were asked to complete a simplified version of the full census form for 1968. For 1963 a sample of small firms was asked to complete the simplified census form, the remainder being required only to give information on employment and description of business.

For 1963, but not for 1968, firms in this industry were not required to give separate details of the value of materials purchased for processing and of materials purchased for merchanting or factoring, nor were they required to distinguish between the value of goods sold without being subjected to any manufacturing process and their sales of goods of their own make.
