## THE FANCY ARTICLES TRADE

Note.-For information regarding the scope of the Census, instructions given to firms for making returns, and definitions of the terms used in this report, reference should be made to the Introductory Notes on pages v to xviii.

## Introductory

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in working in materials such as ivory, celluloid, casein and erinoid, etc., and in the manufacture of buttons, picture frames, tobacco pipes, jewellery cases and other fancy articles. The production of buttons and studs of metal is dealt with in the report on the Needle, Pin, etc. Trades (Part II) ; fancy goods of leather and artificial leather are included in the report on the Leather Goods Trade (Part I) and fancy goods of paper and cardboard in the report on the Manufactured Stationery Trade (Part III).

For purposes of comparison the figures published for this trade in the Final Report on the 1924 Census have been adjusted to include certain returns in which the main output consisted of buttons of horn, casein, etc. In the 1924 report these returns wereassigned to the trade dealing with metal buttons.

The following table shows the main results of the Censuses of 1930 and 1924 in respect of firms in Great Britain that employed an average of more than ten persons :-

Deficiencies in 1930 aggregates.-The aggregate number of persons employed in 1930 by firms that stated that they employed not more than ten persons on the average was 3,807 , the corresponding figure for 1924 being 2,695 . In addition, 92 firms to which schedules were sent at the 1930 Census and 270 at that of 1924 furnished no information; these firms either had small businesses
or had ceased productive operations before the end of the censal year. The total number of persons employed by all firms in this trade in 1924 was about 19,700 of whom some 3,500 , or 18 per cent., were employed by the small firms. The corresponding totals for 1930 may be estimated at 17,900 and 4,100 , the proportion of the small firms in the total rising to 23 per cent.

The value of the gross output of the small firms in 1924 was $£ 812,000$, and particulars of the items included in this figure are given below :-

It will be noted that the small firms were mainly concerned in the making of picture frames and mouldings therefor, their output of these goods in $1924(£ 450,000)$ being about 40 per cent. of the total amount recorded by firms in Great Britain on schedules for this trade.

Northern Ireland.-No production of the goods covered by this trade was recorded for Northern Ireland in 1930. In 1924, the gross output of all firms in the trade was $£ 14,000$ and was in respect of picture frames only; the net output was $£ 7,000$, the number of persons employed 43, and the net output per person employed $£ 150$.

Volume of production in 1930 and 1924.-The absence of quantitative particulars for the main part of the output of the goods to which this report relates renders it impracticable to attempt any precise and detailed comparison of the volume of production in 1930 and 1924, but such information as is available indicates that the output of principal products valued in 1924 at $£ 5,149,000$ would represent, at 1930 prices, a sum of about $£ 4,300,000$, and that the volume of production in 1930 was 7 or 8 per cent. less than in 1924.

Production, exports and imports.-The following table shows, in relation to production, the quantities, where available, of the principal products of this trade exported from the United Kingdom in 1930 and 1924, together with the quantities imported and retained. As regards the 1930 figures of production, the deficiencies referred to on page 277 of this report should be borne in mind ; the figures for 1924 include the output of the small firms. With regard to the items for which values only are given, the figures for production are ex factory, for exports f.o.b. and for imports c.i.f.

The excess in both years in the number of tobacco pipes exported over the quantity shown as manufactured is probably due to the inclusion in the export totals of clay tobacco pipes and of imported bowls fitted with mouthpieces in this country for export.

Work done for the trade.-The total amount recorded as received for work done for the trade in 1930 was $£ 31,000$, the corresponding total for 1924 being $£ 34,000$. The principal kinds of work included in these totals were as follows :-
