This Report on the Ordnance and Small Arms Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing guns, machine guns, mortars, rifles, pistols, revolvers, torpedoes, shell cases and components, bomb cases and components, cases and components for small arms ammunition, sporting guns, air rifles, etc; swords, bayonets, etc; and tracked armoured fighting vehicles. Establishments making live military ammunition which also make cases for it are included. Armoured cars and troop carriers are excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 342 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census.

The industry corresponds to the Ordnance and Small Arms Industry (Part 51) in the Reports on the last detailed Census of Production for 1963, except that establishments making live military ammunition which also make the empty cases for it were formerly included in the Explosives and Fireworks Industry (Part 30).

Throughout this Report, the figures given for 1963 have been reclassified, as far as possible, according to the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) so that data for 1963 and 1968 are on the same industrial basis. However the reclassification of small firms, which provided limited information only, has been arbitrary.

#### METHOD OF CLASSIFICATION

Returns showing sales of live ammunition as their major output were classified to this industry only if the establishment concerned also manufactured the ammunition cases: otherwise they were classified to Explosives, Fireworks and Matches (Part 39).

In classifying other returns within the mechanical engineering group of industries the value of unspecified work done (other than structural and installation work), including repair work was not taken into account unless it amounted to 80 per cent. or more of the total output of the return, in which case the return was classified to General Mechanical Engineering (Part 66). The amount charged for erecting and installing machinery and plant (other than air conditioning, heating and ventilating plant) was treated as part of the selling value of these items in determining the industrial classification of the returns. The standard classification procedure as outlined in the notes on page (i) was further modified where a return would have been classified to one of the mechanical engineering group of industries (viz Parts 50 to 66), but where the sales of the principal products of the industry concerned (including parts) accounted for less than 20 per cent. of the total output: in such cases the return was classified to the residual sub-division of the General Mechanical Engineering Industry (Part 66).

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv)
