## 131 Timber

This Report on the Timber Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in sawing, planing, drying, bending, creosoting, etc wood; in producing
wood flooring, sawn fencing, wood sleepers, telegraph poles, mining timber, wood flooring, sawn fencing, wood sleepers, telegraph poles, mining timber,
veneers, plywood, chipboard, etc; and in manufacturing wooden doors, windo veneers, plywood, chipboard, etc; and in manuf acturing wooden doors, window frames and other builders' woodwork, wooden poultry houses, greenhouses, summer-
houses and other portable wooden buildings. The report includes felling by saw
and millers but excludes other felling; it also includes separate woodworking establ ishments of building firms.
This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 471 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis
of classification in the 1968 Census. The definition of this industry however is unchanged from the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 in which it was reported (Part 108).
In this industry, where small establishments account for a relatively large proportion of employment and output, establishments employing fewer than twentyfive persons were asked to complete a simplified version of the full census form
for 1968 . For 1963 a sample of small firms was asked to complete the simplified census form, the remainder being required only to give information on employment and description of business

Firms in this industry were not required to give separate details of the cost of materials purchased for processing and of materials purchased for merchanting or
factoring, nor were they required to distinguish between the value of goods sold factoring, nor were they required to distinguish between the value of goods sold
without having been subjected to any manufacturing process and their sales of goods without having bee
of their own make.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
