## THE BUTTER, CHEESE, CONDENSED MILK AND MARGARINE TRADES

Note.—For information regarding the scope of the Census, instructions given to firms for making returns, and definitions of the terms used in this report, reference should be made to the Introductory Notes on pages v to xviii.

#### Introductory

This report deals with the production of butter, cheese, condensed milk and other milk products and margarine at factories and creameries. Production on farms is not covered, and goods produced by dairies chiefly engaged in the distribution of milk are also excluded (see page 113).

The following table shows the main results of the Censuses of 1930 and 1924 in respect of firms in Great Britain that employed an average of more than ten persons. Sales of whole milk and fresh pork were included in the output statements of factories and creameries in both years and have been deducted\* from the value of the gross output and from the cost of materials used. The total shown for the latter item is, therefore, understated by the amount of the profit on such sales, but the error thus arising is unimportant.

**Deficiencies in 1930 aggregates.**—The aggregate number of persons employed in 1930 by firms that stated that they employed not more than ten persons on the average was 896, the corresponding figure for 1924 being 666. In addition, 35 firms to which schedules were sent at the 1930 Census and 57 at that of 1924 furnished no information; these firms either had small businesses or had ceased productive operations before the end of the censal year.

About 49 per cent. of the total output of cheese and about 22 per cent. of that of butter made at factories and creameries in 1924 was recorded by firms that employed not more than ten persons on the average, while about 13 per cent. of the total quantity of cream sold at factories and creameries was returned by these small firms. These firms contributed only about 6 per cent. of the total output of blended butter, and their share in the aggregates recorded for condensed milk and milk powder was still smaller.

The figures for cheese shown in the above table for 1930 are not confined to products actually manufactured in this country, but include cheese purchased and blended or otherwise processed. From enquiries made of the firms concerned, it is understood that of the total of 386,600 cwts. shown above at least 176,000 cwts., or over

45 per cent., consisted of purchased cheese, mainly of overseas origin, processed in this country. The proportion of such purchased cheese that is included in the total given for 1924 is not known, but is probably quite small. Allowing for this over-statement in the 1930 total, however, the quantity of cheese manufactured by firms in Great Britain that employed more than ten persons in that year was more than double that recorded by similar firms for 1924, and was substantially greater than the aggregate output in the earlier year at all factories and creameries, including those at which not more than ten persons were employed. Details of particular varieties of cheese produced in 1930 are given in a later table.

Output of milk distributors.—Both for 1930 and 1924 returns were furnished by certain dairies that were engaged chiefly in distributing whole milk but produced small quantities of milk products. Particulars of the output of milk distributors, so far as recorded, are given below. These particulars are not included in the previous table relating to production and (except where otherwise stated) the returns made by these firms are also excluded from the other tables in this report.

Output of creameries, factories and farms.—The following statement shows, for each of the three divisions of the United Kingdom, so far as possible, the output of butter, cheese and cream at factories and creameries and on farms. The particulars of production on farms relate to the years ended 31st March, 1931 and 1925, respectively, and represent the results of surveys made for those years by the Ministry of Agriculture ("The Agricultural Market Report, 20th January, 1933"), the Board of Agriculture for Scotland (Cmd. 4496) and the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries for Northern Ireland. The figures in respect of factories and creameries relate to all firms in 1924 but for 1930 are limited to firms in Great Britain employing more than ten persons, and in Northern Ireland more than five persons, on the average.

The quantity of margarine available for consumption in 1930 was 3 per cent. less than in 1924, but for butter there was an increase of between 27 and 28 per cent., and for cheese an increase of about 11 per cent., making an allowance for the output of the small firms in 1930. Per head of the population of the United Kingdom there was available in 1930 about 184 lbs. of butter and 117 lbs. of margarine, and in 1924, 148 lbs. of butter and 123 lbs. of margarine.

Work done on commission.—The amount recorded as received for blending butter on commission in 1930 and 1924 is included under the heading "Other milk products" in the table on page 112. Owing to the possible disclosure of information relating to individual firms this amount cannot be shown separately.

Other products.—In addition to the output shown in the table of principal products on page 112, the following goods were produced in 1930 and 1924 by firms that made their returns on schedules for the Butter, Cheese, Condensed Milk and Margarine Trades. These goods are dealt with in the reports on those trades in which the principal output was recorded.
