GENERAL INFORMATION
Changes in the 1963 census
There were few changes resulting from amendments only minor changes in the scope of certain
industry reports compared with industry reports compared with 1958. Any such changes are explained in the introductions to
the industry reports concerned or by footnotes
to the tables. thdur trial
Industrial Classification
Establishments were classified to industries on
the basis of major activity in conformity with the second edition of the Standard Industrial
Classificat Classification (Consolidated Edition 1963 . incorporat ing Amendment 1). Each industry was
basically defined in terms of its principal products, these being of a similar nature or commonly associated in production. Normally,
an establishment was classified to an industry if its sales of the principal productsof of that
industry accounted for a greater proport ion of its total sales than did its sales of the principal products of any other industry.
ever, where the application of this rule have resulted in a change of classification betwen 1958 and 1963, the estabs ishment was
reclassif ied only if reclassified only if the sales of principal products of the newly predominant industry was
more than one third greater than the sales of principal products of the previously predominant
industry. This modification of the industry. This modification of the general
rule was introduced for 1958 to avoid disrule was introduced for 1958 to avoid dis-
cont inuities which would result from marginal changes in sales between successive censuses.
The principle of classification by major output was also normally followed in compiling the analysis by sub-divisions of an industry. In certain industries, classif ication was.
dealt with in a different way. Details of nolt with in a different way. Details of any
non-stand treatment are given in the intro-
ductions to the relevant ductions to the relevant industry reports.

## Motor vehicle manufacturing

This Report on the Motor Vehicle Manufacturing Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing and assembling passenger cars, commercial goods vehicles, buses, trolley buses, wheeled tractors, works trucks, motor-drawn
trailers and caravans and parts and accessories for such vehicles including bodies trailers and caravans and parts and accessories for such vehicles including bodies chassis and chassis frames for cars and commercial vehicles, cabs for commercia
vehicles, motor body shells, internal combustion engines, axles, brakes and clutches (other than linings), carburettors, fuel injection pumps, gear boxes heaters, hoods, propeller shafts, radiators and radiator blocks, registration plates, shock absorbers and dampers, steer ing gear, tipping gear, wheels and windscreen wipers (not electrical) and other non-electrical parts and accessories except gaskets and jointings, bumpers, fuel tanks and similar sheet metal products instruments, accessories and other electrical equipment for vehicles are excluded. The report includes three-wheel tractors, battery-electric vehicles and works trucks but other three-wheel vehicles are excluded; armoured cars and troop carriers are also included but armoured
and track laying tractors, are excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 381 in the Standard Industria Classification (Consolidated edition, 1963).

## METHOD OF CLASSIFICATION

The classification of returns to this industry followed the standard procedure except that the following special treatment was given to sales of parts of engines: principal products of this industry; otherwise they were treated as principal products of the General Mechanical Engineering Industry (Part 52). In classifying returns to the sub-divisions of the industry, shown as Table 2, a return was classified to a particular sub-division only if more than a hall of its total out put consisted of 'characteristic produc
classified to the 'Other' sub-divis ion.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (ii), (iii) and (iv).
