THE CINEMATOGRAPH FILM PRINTING TRADE

Note.—For information regarding the scope of the Census, instructions given to firms for making returns, and definitions of the terms used in this report, reference should be made to the Introductory Notes on pages v to xviii.

Introductory

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the developing and printing of films for cinematograph purposes. As no production of this kind was recorded for Scotland, the summary table (I) and the tables showing details of power equipment (IV) and coal, coke and electricity used (V) are not appended to this report. The whole of this information is available in the tables given in the report itself.

The following table shows the main results of the Censuses of 1930 and 1924 in respect of firms in Great Britain that employed an average of more than ten persons:—

Deficiencies in 1930 aggregates.—The aggregate number of persons employed in 1930 by firms that stated that they employed not more than ten persons on the average was 62, the corresponding figure for 1924 being 31. The value of the gross output of the small firms in 1924 was £14,000, of which £13,000 represented receipts for film printing (£12,000 for printing from British-made negatives and £1,000 from imported negatives) and £1,000 was received for other work.

In addition five small firms to which schedules were sent at the 1924 Census furnished no information.

Size of firms.—In the following table the main particulars recorded at the Census of 1930 are grouped according to the average numbers of persons shown in the returns:—

Regional distribution.—Owing to the possible disclosure of information relating to individual firms, no particulars can be given for the separate areas in which this trade is carried on.

Prices and volume of output.—The average charge in 1930 and 1924 per 1,000 linear feet of positive printed, as calculated from the Census returns, was as follows:—

On the basis of the amounts charged in 1930, the value of the output in 1924 (£734,000) would be reduced to about £647,000, indicating an increase in the volume of production in 1930 of about 61 per cent.

Exports and imports.—The retained imports of exposed positive films (whether developed or not) in 1930 amounted to 35,237,000 linear feet and the exports to 25,035,000 linear feet. The corresponding figures for 1924 were 32,052,000 linear feet and 23,913,000 linear feet respectively.

Other work.—In addition to the output recorded in the production table on page 351, firms engaged in film printing recorded an output of other work valued at £14,000 in 1930 and £20,000 in 1924. This work consisted principally of developing negatives.

Wages.—The available information as to the amount of wages paid in 1930 and 1924 is given on pages 210 and 211.

Power

No prime movers or electric generators were recorded either for 1930 or for 1924. The total capacity of electric motors, all of which were driven by purchased electricity, was returned as 364 horse-power for 1930, of which motors with a capacity of 8 horse-power were shown as in reserve or idle; the corresponding capacities recorded for 1924 were 255 horse-power and 8 horse-power respectively.

Consumption of fuel

The quantity of coal used was returned as 203 tons and of coke 759 tons, the whole being used for purposes other than power. The total amount of electricity purchased was recorded as 957,000 Board of Trade units (kilowatt-hours).
