This Report on the Jute Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in sorting jute, spinning yarn and weaving fabrics, other than narrow fabrics, of jute and man-made fibres in the Jute Industry.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 415 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census. The definition of this industry however is unchanged from the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 in which it was reported (Part 79).

There were no establishments in this industry in Northern Ireland in 1963 and 1968.

METHOD OF CLASSIFICATION

The classification of returns to this industry followed the standard procedure as outlined in the notes on page (i). In classifying returns to the subdivisions of the industry shown in Table 4, spinners of jute who did not also weave were allocated to the sub-division 'Spinners': establishments which both spun yarn and wove it into materials (other than carpets, matting, etc) were classified to the sub-division 'Spinners/Weavers'; and weavers (other than of carpets, matting, etc) who purchased their yarn were classified to the subdivision 'Weavers'. The sub-division 'Remainder of the industry' covers establishments engaged in manufacturing jute carpets, matting, etc and in pulling, dyeing or carding jute or in producing jute tow.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
