SIR,—I have the honour to submit to the attention of the Government the report of my administration of the Department of Public Education for the past year.

### ENROLMENT.

2. There were 1,447 Schools and Institutions in actual operation during the financial year ended 30th June last; of these 178 were new Schools; 148 (including 59 private farm schools for which no renewal of application for aid and inspection had been received up to 30th June) were removed from the list.

3. The annual enrolment of scholars was 93,415; the highest quarterly enrolment was 70,140; the daily attendance was 49,987.

4. The distribution of scholars in the various classes of schools was as follows on 30th June :—

9. The subject of extending the operations of the Laboratory in at least one of the Colleges, so as to give facilities for the practical study of Metallurgy in all its branches, has been brought by me before the University and the public on fitting occasions at the Degree Day; and the demand for practical assayists and analysts would probably secure a fair attendance of students; but the appliances of a School of Mines are necessarily expensive, and I fear that the Estimates for Elementary Education this year will be so large as to preclude any special vote for such an object.

#### PRIVATE FARM SCHOOLS.

10. As might be expected, these schools are not kept continuously; the senior pupils are often removed to superior schools in the towns, and the exodus of many farmers to other localities in the neighbouring States, or the "trekking" in consequence of drought lead to the discontinuance of the services of a teacher.

11. The Circuit-school system has been introduced as a supplementary agency, and has been fairly successful; and on 30th June 19 schools were in operation, attended by 446 scholars. On 31st December, 1889, the number of Circuit-schools had risen to 29, and the attendance was 685.

12. The total number of scholars attending Private Farm Schools and Circuit-schools at the close of the year was 2,944; and the number of indigent boarders, for whom capitation allowances of £6 each per annum were issued, was 129.

13. The extent to which the agricultural and pastoral population avails itself of the schools established specially for the instruction of farmers' children will appear from the following statement compiled on 31st December:—

#### TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES.

14. Middle-class Teachers' Certificates were issued after the Annual Examination to 16 candidates: 5 with Honours, and 11 of Competency.

15. The Annual Examination of Candidates for the Third-class Teacher's Certificate was held in September; there were 255 Candidates; 33 obtained Certificates with Honours; 120 of Competency; and Provisional Certificates were issued to 45.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOLS CERTIFICATE.

16. The Examination of Candidates who have passed the Preliminary Standard VI. is held half-yearly; at the final Examination in June '30 obtained the Public Schools Certificate; in December, 88 obtained the Certificate. Full reports of the Examinations were at the time published in the *Government Gazette*.

#### SUPPLY OF TEACHERS.

18. The constant removal of Colonial teachers to the neighbouring States, and the increasing number of schools in the Colony have rendered it necessary to introduce many teachers from Europe to fill vacancies.

19. The following qualified teachers have been assisted with half passage money from this Department during the year:—

Two Teachers, Miss Funke and Miss Janssen, are on their way from Holland to take charge of the Dutch classes in the Girls' Public Schools at Wellington and at Stellenbosch.

20. A few teachers who had arrived here to recruit their health resolved to remain, and they have readily found employment in the schools.

#### ART SCHOOLS.

21. The School in Cape Town, under the direction of the Fine Arts Association, New-street, is held in commodious class-rooms, fairly equipped. The morning classes are for general students; in the afternoon, twice a week, the Art classes for teachers meet; and the classes for artizans meet three evenings weekly. The respective attendances are:—

22. The accommodation for the School at Port Elizabeth, in the Drill Hall, is reported to be unsatisfactory. The number of students taught by the Art Master is as follows, and the teaching is highly appreciated:—

24. Arrangements have been made with the Science and Art Department, South Kensington, to receive and value the work of the Students of the Colonial Art Schools; the long delay in getting the annual report of the results and the meagre numerical values assigned to the candidates' works, without comment, destroy the emulation which was expected to be aroused by this Examination.

#### ART TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES.

25. The time has now come for establishing a professional Examination of Candidates who wish to obtain a Certificate of Qualification as teachers of drawing.

#### ART TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE—THIRD-CLASS.

26. The holder of this Certificate will be qualified to give instruction in Drawing in Elementary Schools.

The subjects of Examination will be:—

1. Free-hand Drawing from flat examples.
2. Model Drawing.
3. Linear Perspective.
4. Black-board Drawing.

The exercises in Black-board Drawing are intended to test the readiness and skill of candidates in illustrating familiar objects for class-teaching.

#### COST OF EDUCATION.

31. The average cost of each scholar in daily attendance for the year (exclusive of the general expenses of administration and inspection) was £4 0s. 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ d., of which amount the Government paid £1 14s. 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ d., the local managers and parents paying £2 6s. 3d. in salaries, fees, and maintenance. It is to be noted that the cost of Boarding Schools and of Trade Classes is included.

#### TRUSTS.

32. The Civil Servants' Bursary was given to Rodence McNaughton, who passed with Honours in the Matriculation Examination of the University in June; the value of the Bursary was £8 13s. 9d.

33. The Levy Prizes were given to Percival John Griffiths and Gwendoline Gie, pupils of the Public School, Aliwal North, in accordance with the provisions of the trust; the prizes amounted to £4 10s. 3d.

#### TEACHERS' PENSION FUND.

34. Under the provisions of the Teachers' Pension and Fund Act, No. 44 of 1887, the following pensions to teachers have been approved:—

#### ABORIGINES.

35. The standard of work, as well as the school accommodation among the Aborigines are decidedly improving.

36. Unless the school-hut is properly ventilated and furnished with glazed windows, no grant is issued, and the employment of certificated teachers is encouraged by regulating the salaries as follows:—

37. Uncertificated teachers begin at £20 per annum; may be promoted to £24 per annum, and ultimately to £30 per annum. Certificated teachers begin at £24 per annum, and after satisfactory service are promoted to £30 per annum, and ultimately to £40 per annum. In exceptional cases higher grants are made.

38. The local contribution expected from the people is £10 per annum to supplement the salary; accommodation for school and teacher must also be provided.

#### SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

39. To enable the Department to lessen the debts on School Buildings the sum of £15,250 was voted last session. Substantial relief is thus given in many cases where money for school purposes had been borrowed on personal security; and this public recognition of the sacrifices made by managers for the cause of education has given confidence and encouragement generally, and the efforts now put forth for the better equipment of schools are the fruits of this liberality. It will be necessary for me to ask for a further grant for the same object, for the service of the year 1890-1, as only by the abolition or reduction of the debts on Buildings can I hope to assist

in lowering the rates of school fees and to secure the needful improvements in the accommodation for teachers and scholars.

#### VOLUNTARY SCHOOLS.

40. The application for Government aid from the Trustees and Managers of the Institutions known as the Rhenish Institute for Girls, Stellenbosch, and the branch Huguenot School for Girls, Lower Paarl, have brought forward again the subject of aid to subsidiary schools, doing the work of Undenominational Public Schools, and occupying important spheres of operation without trenching on those of the recognised Public Schools.

41. No course of action which would be injurious to those who have incurred heavy obligations for the sake of Education, and are labouring to maintain Undenominational Public Schools in their respective districts, is likely to be advocated by this Department.

42. I admit the fairness of the general principle that public money ought not to be given to schools without a due share of public control exercised both by the central Department and the local representatives of the public. Such a principle, in practice, necessarily excludes all schools carried on as private enterprises for the exclusive benefit of the Principal or the Proprietor.

43. There are, however, cases where voluntary societies, religious or educational, step in and establish and maintain schools, such as those referred to at Stellenbosch and Paarl, which are in practice public schools. If adequate public control is secured, and a distinct sphere of action is shown to be occupied, Government aid might be given, as soon as the residents of the neighbourhood have signified their wish to accept the school as the public school of the district, and have elected certain representative managers to be associated with the trustees or existing body of managers.

44. Such schools would have to conform, of course, to the usual regulations and restrictions applicable to Undenominational Public Schools.

#### EXTENSION OF THE PRIVATE FARM SCHOOL SYSTEM.

45. The State-aided Colleges and Public Schools put school-instruction within the reach of those who live in towns and villages; and the Private Farm Schools and Circuit Teachers, the most recent addition to the system, are gradually conveying elementary instruction to the rural population. The spread of these new agencies has led to the question asked by the Honourable the House of Assembly last session: How can those who have had their early instruction on the farm avail themselves of the higher instruction given in the Public Schools?

46. The choice of completing their school-career in a commercial or agricultural school, or in a laboratory of practical science should be offered to sons of farmers who have qualified themselves by a fair standard of elementary attainments for admission to such schools.

47. In connection with this scheme boarding bursaries would have to be paid to those whose circumstances require such aid.

48. This subject has been fully treated in my Special Report furnished to Parliament in reply to the Resolution adopted by the House of Assembly, July, 1889.

#### MISSION SCHOOLS.

49. The questions are (1) how to improve the instruction in the Mission Schools; and (2) how to secure the regular attendance of those who do not voluntarily frequent the schools, or whose attendance is so uncertain as to

defeat the objects of the State in providing this cheap agency for the instruction of the children of the poorer classes.

50. The name of "Mission Schools" is not appropriate as applied to the schools in towns and villages largely attended by the children of the white population; the parents are not adherents of a Missionary Congregation, and it will be convenient in future to regard these schools as supplementary to the graded system of Undenominational Public Schools, and to designate them "Fourth Class" Public Schools.

51. The rates of Government aid should be re-adjusted to meet the requirements of the standards and the number in attendance, and should be calculated on a more liberal scale.

52. The details of the changes recommended will be found in the Special Report already referred to as furnished to Parliament.

53. The ordinary Mission Schools for the children of the coloured and mixed population connected with Missionary Societies, would continue to draw Government grants under the rules now existing, and would not be affected by the proposed change.

54. I see no way of securing the regular attendance of the children in the town schools but by the employment of attendance or truant officers, who should be empowered by the municipal authorities to prevent children of school-going age from loitering or playing in the streets during certain recognised school hours.

#### MANAGEMENT OF UNDENOMINATIONAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

55. When the Divisional Councils Act was under discussion last session, it was observed that much misapprehension existed as to the powers proposed to be given to the Councils of providing for the management of Undenominational Public Schools.

56. By Act 13 of 1865, Divisional and Municipal Councils have been empowered to manage these schools, on complying with the usual conditions of Government aid, but no provision has been made in that Act for meeting any deficit in the local expenditure that may be incurred in the administration. Public Schools at Cradock, Uitenhage, Knysna, Tarkastad, Catheart, and Molteno, are managed by Divisional or Municipal Councils. The Municipal Act, No. 45 of 1882, empowers Municipal Councils to erect, maintain, and manage schools, and this power carries with it the right to use municipal funds for these objects.

57. The proposal last session was to empower Divisional Councils, in cases where they assume the management of Undenominational Public Schools, to make good any deficiency out of a school fund to be created; and I had hoped that at the same time any duly ascertained and certified deficit in Public Schools generally might be met not, as at present, by calls on the supporters, but by a contribution from the school fund of the Divisional Council.

58. The changes which I recommend are given below, for reference, if this subject should arrest public attention, as it deserves to do.

59. The Council of any division is hereby empowered and authorised:—

- (1) To lease, purchase or erect, and maintain the requisite buildings for the purposes of Undenominational Public Schools and for the residences of teachers, and to manage such Undenominational Public Schools within the division as the Council shall from time to time establish; and to enter into such guarantee as may be required by the Department of Public Education in case any aid from the public Treasury in respect of such schools should be granted under any Act which may now or hereafter be in force for this purpose:

- (2) To pay the salaries of the teachers, assistant teachers, and other

officers of such schools; and to provide school furniture, books and other requisites.

60. All the expenses connected with such schools shall be paid by the Council out of a fund to be called the school-fund of the Division of ———.

61. There shall be carried to the school-fund all moneys received as fees from scholars, and all subscriptions, donations and other sums which may from time to time be paid to the Council for school purposes, and all grants received from the Department of Public Education by way of loan.

62. Any sum required to meet any deficiency in the school-fund of the division, whether for satisfying past or present liabilities, shall be provided by a school rate to be levied by the Council in the same way and under the same conditions as any other rate is levied by the Council.

63. In the case of Undenominational Public Schools under the management of local committees, or established under their own trust deeds or special Acts of Parliament, the Council is empowered to take over the management of them, subject to the consent of the existing managers, and of the Government, and to the conditions of their respective trust deeds or special Acts; and to manage and maintain and subsidise them as in the case of Undenominational Public Schools established by the Council.

64. Where Undenominational Public Schools continue to be conducted by local committees, or under their own trust deeds or special Acts of Parliament, it shall be competent for the Council of the Division to make good any annual deficiency in the revenue of such schools on the accounts of such school or schools being duly audited by an officer appointed by the Department of Public Education, and on its being certified to the satisfaction of that Department that such deficiency has been incurred *bonâ fide* in the maintenance of the school or schools; and the Council shall be empowered to liquidate such deficiency by a grant from the school-funds of the division, on the receipt of a precept from the head of the Department of Public Education setting forth the amount of the deficiency as duly certified.

#### VACATIONS.

65. It has always been difficult to arrange the holidays so as to suit the convenience of teachers and scholars in the varied climatic districts of the Colony; but on the whole, public opinion converges towards a plan of short vacations three times a year, and a reasonably long vacation in December and January.

66. I propose, therefore, to test the convenience of the following arrangements for 1890-1.

Easter Vacation from 3rd to 14th April.

Winter Vacation from 27th June to 14th July.

Michaelmas Vacation from 26th September to 7th October.

Summer Long Vacation from 19th December to 26th January, 1891.

67. Managers will be at liberty, as heretofore, to curtail the periods of vacation without reference to the Department, and may by special permission forego the Easter Vacation and add the time to the winter holidays in July, or forego the Michaelmas Vacation and add the time to the summer holidays in January.

#### TREE-PLANTING DAY.

68. One day in the year is observed as a holiday for tree-planting. In the Western Districts generally, the 20th of June (Queen's Accession), is set apart for the ceremony; but it is left to the discretion of managers and teachers to choose such other day as may be suitable: the 6th of August and the 9th of November are usually chosen according to the climate.

#### DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS.

69. The detailed reports of the exact state of all the schools, as ascertained by inspection, are printed in full, and copies are furnished to managers, at the close of each quarter.

70. From the details thus furnished of the number and qualifications of the teachers, the state of the school buildings and their equipment, and the reports on the discipline and general tone of the school, as well as on the attainments of the scholars, the Department is kept acquainted with the inner working of the whole system of education; and action is taken at once on the Inspector's recommendations as regards the withdrawal of aid from schools absolutely inefficient, and the enforcement of the conditions of aid where by inadvertence or neglect they have not been faithfully observed.

71. Inspection is now, as it ought to be, the keystone of the aided system, and with the staff of eight inspectors now employed, it is hoped that all schools, even those in the remotest parts, will be visited and examined at least once a year.
