We regret to record the deaths of Sir Raymond Unwin (Honorary Member) and Mrs. Oliver Strachey (Associate).

On Sunday night, September 8th, Miss Jean Darling was killed Honorary on A.R.P. duty with her tenants. This was the culmination of a career which was marked throughout by a cheerful devotion to the personal interests of all for whom she felt herself responsible. Occupying with distinction two important posts as Housing Manager, first at Norwich and then at Chelsea, Miss Darling always found time to give service in every possible way to the Society. She accepted the post of Honorary Treasurer at the foundation of the Society of Women Housing Estate Managers, and it was mainly due to her skill and patience that the financial difficulties of the young Society were overcome; no less valuable was her steady good sense in Committee. The complete selflessness of her attitude in all the important work she undertook endeared her to all with whom she worked. The Council, deeply regretting their irreparable loss, record their gratitude for her work and example.

The Council also deeply regret the loss to the profession of Miss J. and two distinguished managers, Miss Joan and Miss Ruth Sunderland. Miss R. Sunderland Miss Joan was especially in the confidence of Miss Octavia Hill and after the founder's death she was a rock on which the first association of managers was raised. Her wisdom, understanding and vitality have been of untold help to many and housing on Octavia Hill lines owes her a debt which could not be adequately

told. Both sisters were trained by Miss Hill and the many members of S.W.H.M. who were taught by them will remember the tradition of high ideals and unsparing attention to detail which they inherited from her.

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The Society congralutates Miss Violet Markham, C.H., on her re-appointment as Deputy-Chairman of the Unemployment Assistance Board for a further period of three years. The Society continues to be indebted to its Honorary Members for their interest in the work of the Society and the donations they have made to the Society's funds. Thanks are again due to Mr. Parker Morris for his helpful advice in legal questions.

War-time Office Arrangements

Honorary Members

The outbreak of war necessitated a complete re-organisation of arrangements for carrying on the work of the Society. In October 1939 the office moved temporarily to a room in 7, Norham Road, Oxford, kindly offered to the Society by Dr. Miller, who has been granted leave of absence for the duration of war in order to undertake special work, but is maintaining her connection with the Society by acting as Honorary Consultant. The work of the office is being carried on by Miss Mead (Acting Secretary) and Miss Foy (Acting Assistant Secretary). Since April 1940 the London office has been open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. each Wednesday.

Annual General Meeting

The Third Annual General Meeting of the Society of Women Housing Managers (Incorporated) was held at Walston House, London, S.W.1, on 18th November, 1939, there being 15 fellows, 76 members and 2 associates present. Students of the Society were also present at a meeting at which Miss Baynes opened a discussion on "New Appointments under Emergency Conditions" and Miss Thompson a discussion on "Rent Problems in the Emergency".

Annual Provincial Conference

The Annual Provincial Conference was held at Chancellor's Hall, Birmingham, on 6th and 7th April, 1940, over 80 fellows, members, associates and students being present. In the morning of 6th April members visited the St. Martin's Flats of the Birmingham City Council, the party being conducted by the Chairman of the Housing Committee (Councillor Wright) and the Estates Manager (Mr. Wallace Smith.) A visit was also paid to property belonging to the Birmingham Copec House Improvement Society, Ltd. In addition to members, about 60 visitors attended an afternoon meeting, at which Miss Thompson spoke on "Housing Problems in the Emergency". At a meeting held in the morning of 7th April, after reports had been given on various aspects of the Society's activities. Miss Fenter opened a discussion on "Social Work and the Housing Manager ".

Two meetings of London members were held in December and London February to discuss managers' wartime problems. At the first, some Regional Group managers gave an account of their extra wartime services; those who had arranged to live on their estates thought the effort of value; several members were Air Raid Wardens for their estates. Useful work had also been done in arranging small classes for children and tenants' meetings. Managers' help in the national effort included the collection of War Savings and the exercise of economy in maintenance work. Members agreed that it would be good policy to keep up repair standards while labour and materials were still available, and then to postpone work which was not urgent until the post war slump. The obstacles to good management in black-out and sandbagging and the difficulties raised by the continued occupation of worn-out houses were discussed, and some types of black-out staircase lighting described. The difficulty of payments by soldiers' wives and evacuated families had been met on some estates by remissions of rent and storage of furniture. The procedure now required for possession in serious cases of arrears was a general difficulty, the supplementary notice E.P.2 having to be served on the actual tenant. Managers were advised to serve this notice of application for leave to proceed before the Court proceedings. At the second meeting further experience had been gained in Court cases, and managers had secured orders for possession. Discussion then took place on maintenance work, a manager asking if the large proportion of her time taken up by the supervision of a maintenance staff would be regarded as Octavia Hill work. Other managers thought the control of repairs was an essential feature and that the contacts thus gained were as valuable as those achieved in collecting. Members were made aware of the differences in custom in different parts of England, internal redecoration being in some places the responsibility of the landlord and in some that of the tenant. The attendance at both meetings was large and such opportunities of discussion were evidently much needed by members.

The Scholarship Fund Committee decided to devote the interest Octavia Hill on their investments towards a scholarship. This amounted to Scholarship. £12. 10. 5 per annum. The Society of Women Housing Managers offered to contribute £12. 10. 0 per annum on condition that the money was used as income and not as capital. The Committee were, therefore, in a position, in June 1940, to offer a scholarship of £25. This was awarded to Miss Amy Lisney.

During the earlier part of the year 1939-40 the Junior Organis- Junior ation was active in all its four branches of London, the Midlands, the North-East and the North-West. Among speakers at meetings of the London Group were the following: Mr. H. Harwood of the

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Organisation

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National Savings Association, who spoke with special reference to opportunities of managers for promoting saving among tenants; Mr. C. Evans of Islington, who spoke on the work of the Public Assistance Committees; Mr.F.J.Cs.Jorn, Honorary Secretary of the Garden Cities and Town Planning Association, who spoke on Town Planning; and Miss Joan Sunderland, who spoke on Miss Octavia Hill. The North-East Group heard Miss F. L. Sawers of Rotherham speak on the question of compromise appointments and later in the year Dr. Boyd of the Rotherham Public Health Department spoke on her work. Speakers at North-West Group meetings were Miss Willson of Newcastle-under-Lyne and Miss Samuel of Bebington. Members of the London Group themselves read papers and decided to start study groups on "Family Allowances" and Town Planning. Wartime conditions prevented similar activities in provincial groups. Visits were paid by members of the London Group to the Violet Melchett Infant Welfare Centre at Chelsea, to the Kitchen Planning Centre opened in New Bond Street by Unilever. Ltd., and to Welwyn Garden City. The North-West Group visited the Corporation Estates at Newcastle-under-Lyme and Bebington. Further visits had to be curtailed on account of the war situation. A successful meeting was held at the Annual Provincial Conference at Birmingham and a Broadsheet was started by certain members of the London Group.

Training

The new Training Scheme, drawn up in the summer of 1939, was adopted in January 1940. Dr. Gertrude Willoughby, Warden of the Union of Girls' Schools Settlement, Peckham, has set up and agreed to conduct the course of preparation in the social subjects (Machinery of Government, Family Income and the Social Services) for the Women Housing Managers' Certificate of the Chartered Surveyors' Institution. Miss Moffatt was appointed Students' Tutor in January 1940. War conditions make it probable that a large number of students will be urgently required in the near future to enable the Society to meet the increasing demand for trained management.

Government Departments and the B.B.C.

The Society has been glad of the opportunity of co-operating with the Ministry of Information (Intelligence Division), the Ministry of Food (Food Economy Division), the National Savings Committee and the B.B.C. (Listener Research Section).

Development of the Society's Work

Women housing managers have found their duties increased by the social problems resulting from the outbreak of war. In addition those working in reception areas have in the majority of cases had to undertake extra duties in connection with billetting, while others in neutral and evacuation areas have undertaken duties connected with the billetting of refugees from Holland and Belgium. It is encouraging that, in spite of the curtailing of new housing schemes,

new appointments of women housing managers continue to be made. There have also been some requests for members to fill vacancies created by men being called up for national service. The Council has agreed to allow members to apply for certain of these posts, on the understanding that they are regarded as temporary in the interest of the men replaced as well as that of our own standards. Each post is considered on its merits.

The total number of appointments during the year amount to Appointments 28, of which 12 were new appointments; 4 additional local authorities, 3 additional housing associations and 3 additional private owners appointed Octavia Hill managers during the year. It is of special interest to note that the appointment with the Land Setlement Association affords an extension of Octavia Hill work into rural areas.

The Society has continued to co-operate with other bodies, in- Other Societies cluding not only organisations interested in housing, but others concerned with social work and with the training, activities and professional interests of women. To be noted in this connection is Mrs. Barclay's appointment as the Society's representative on a subcommittee of the Women's Group on Problems arising from Evacuation set up by the National Council of Social Service under the chairmanship of Miss Margaret Bondfield.

In spite of wartime conditions and the inevitable curtailing of Meetings Addressed by a number of meetings, members have addressed schools, colleges, Members bodies interested in the education and training of women and women's clubs.

The South African training scheme continues to progress and Overseas students are now being trained at Port Elizabeth. Octavia Hill work has been extended to a new centre in South Africa by the appointment of Miss C. Grant, a Cape Town trainee, as Assistant Housing Manageress to the Pretoria City Council. This is the first appointment of a South African trained Octavia Hill worker to a pioneer post.

Finance

It was with great sorrow that we learnt of the death of our Treasurer who had given so willingly, year after year, her time and thought to the Society's finances, whilst being such an active and valuable member of the Society and one so ready to help in any fresh undertaking. The work represented by these accounts was all completed before her death and we are most grateful to the Auditor, Miss Watts, who has been most helpful in dealing with a situation made particularly difficult by the destruction of some of the Treasurer's papers and vouchers.

The forebodings which the Council felt as to the possible drop in income this year have not, happily, materialised yet, since subscriptions, donations and the Horace Street Grant are higher than last year. Training fees are, however, less and it is there that the Society is already feeling and probably will continue to feel the effects of the war on the intake of students. It is for this reason that the Council thought it fit to put into a reserve fund £200 of this year's balance of £318. 16. 5, with the idea that it will help us in the lean years ahead. Our balance is, of course, largely due to the drop in salaries and rent occasioned by Dr. Miller's temporary transfer to a wartime post and the change in office arrangements. Mention should be made of the way in which our Acting Secretary and Assistant have carried through the year with very little clerical help. Our thanks are again due to friends and members for generous donations and the foregoing of travelling and postal expenses.

For the first time a separate Balance Sheet and Revenue Account for the Education Fund are presented, showing a deficit of  $\pounds 19.5.5$  on the first year's working, which necessarily caused certain initial expenses not likely to be repeated another year.
