It was a great surprise to hear that Maggie was coming out after all as I had quite given up hope - I am going to Bombay next week

to meet her, and have got rooms
for the cold weather in a boarding
house kept by one Mrs. Lord and
accordingly known as the House of
Lord's. I had engaged rooms in
this place in November as it was
much the best boarding house I could
find after a long search, and fully
expected to have to pay a vast sum
for giving them up. However I was
treated with the greatest magnanimity
then, and when I returned in December
in fear and trembling to beg for some
doghole to live in, I was welcomed
with joy and offered the best rooms
in the house (although it is packed)
at a greatly reduced rent! The
reason I have now discovered to be
that Mrs. Lord was housekeeper at
Belvedere when Jack was Private
Secretary and she has consequently

got an enormous admiration for the
name of Stanley, which a good one it
is.

Of course you heard of the tragic
death of Dring by falling out of his
carriage on the way here from Bombay.
There has been a lot of silly talk
about it but there is no doubt that it
was a pure accident. The magistrate's
enquiry is not yet finished and we
hope to get this fully established in
a few days. We got a telegram
from the Board today to say that
Highet was to be Agent, which is a
great relief as there were strong rumours
that an outsider was to be put in, the
favourite being Major Gardner, son of
Col. Gardner. Everybody is very glad
for Highet's sake, and although the
Board have said nothing about the
Chief Engineer I think I am pretty
sure of getting it. I have got on
fairly well so far as Acting C.E. Of
course it has been a great help to
have Highet to consult in case of

difficulties. The amount of work is awful and shows every prospect of becoming worse in the future, the Board having given orders for an extra expenditure of 5 million pounds in the next 3 years, about 2 million of which is Engineering department works. My only hope is that the Government of India will refuse to sanction it.

It is a mercy that Maggie was able to come out, as if they make me 'pucca' & certainly shant be able to go home next summer as I was thinking of doing.
