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## REPORT

for the Year ended December 31st, 1930.

THE meetings of the Executive Committee have been well attended throughout the year, when routine business has been dealt with and reports received from the Editorial, Finance, Clothing and Babies' Homes Committees.

At the quarterly meetings, broad matters of principle have been considered and the following subjects discussed: "How can the Association of Maternity and Child Welfare Centres promote Maternity and Child Welfare work in Rural Areas?" and "Is it the function of the Association to undertake the sale of articles, and if so, in what direction and to what extent?"

The ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING was held at the Friends House, Euston Road, on July 1st. The subject for debate was "Education in Mothercraft," and papers were read by Dr. Ethel Cassie, Mrs. Lister, Miss Morson and Miss Wilson.

A CONFERENCE OF WORKERS IN INFANT WELFARE CENTRES was held on July 2nd, when a very large gathering met to discuss "The place of the Voluntary Worker in the Organisation of a Centre." Papers were read by Miss Morson, Mrs. Somerville, Mrs. Turnbull and Mrs. Hill, which, together with those read at the Annual Council Meeting, are fully reported in the Report of the Proceedings of the National Conference on Maternity and Child Welfare, 1930.\*

Owing to the voluntary liquidation of the National League for Health, Maternity and Child Welfare at the end of 1928, and the reorganisation of the work of the Association which was then found necessary, a Sub-Committee was appointed in 1929 to formulate proposals for re-drafting the constitution. The new Constitution, as approved by the Executive Committee, was passed by the General Council at the Annual Meeting in July, 1930. It is published in full as an Appendix to this Report (see pages 15-17).

A slight alteration was made in the title, which is now the ASSOCIATION OF MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRES.

Twenty-eight Centres were affiliated during the year and included one in Rhodesia and several military centres at home and in India. The benefits of affiliation are many, not the least being the 25 per cent. discount allowed on most of the Association's publications and the free delivery of the journal *Mother and Child* (the new name for *National Health*), which is sent to all annual subscribers of 10s. and over.

### Finance.

In common with most voluntary societies, the Association is constantly faced with the necessity for raising money, and this hand-to-mouth existence greatly hampers the work. The risk of embarking on fresh enterprises or extending existing services, which would involve additional financial commitments, is too great to be undertaken. An imperative need, if the work is to progress, is the formation of a strong Finance Committee, composed of people with sufficient leisure to study the needs of the Association and to devise means of putting it on a sound financial footing. Windfalls have been conspicuous by their absence this year, but the Association acknowledges most gratefully the subscriptions and donations which have been received, the grant of £100 from the National Council for Maternity and Child Welfare, and those special efforts which have been made for the Homes Appeal Fund, including the performance by the Lend-a-Hand Club, which resulted in the sum of £119, the Concert organised by Miss L. Cooper at the Brent Bridge Hotel, £30, the Bargain Sale of superior second-hand clothing which produced £125, Mrs. Newland Fletcher's Book Tea and Whist Drive £8, and Crawley Down Infant Welfare Centre's £6 10s. 0d. (half proceeds of a bazaar).

There is no sign of a real diminution in the demand for the Association's publications, although the sales are rather less than in 1929. The total

number sold was 317,341, as compared with 384,050 the previous year. The tenth revised edition of *To Mothers and Fathers* published during the year created something of a record, even for a "best-seller," for a fifth of the edition of 60,000 copies was disposed of in less than a month. A total of 50,730 copies were sold and large quantities were ordered by the following Local Authorities:—Liverpool (10,000), Bethnal Green (2,500), Hammersmith, Burnley and Croydon (2,000 each), Manchester (1,500), Aberdare, Aberystwyth, Buckinghamshire, Batley, Glasgow Royal Maternity Hospital, Hornsey, Kent, Torquay and Oldbury (1,000 each), Bath, Brighouse, Chesterfield, Coventry, Ellesmere Port, Glossop, Huntingdonshire, Leek, Leicester, Maidstone, Purley, St. John's (Newfoundland), Trowbridge, and Smethwick (500 each).

Record-keeping documents as usual headed the list, 185,600 being sold, while books and pamphlets reached a total of 67,631.

The Editorial Committee has been busily engaged on the new pamphlet *To Husbands and Fathers*, which is now in the hands of the printers and will very shortly be in circulation. *Mothercraft* is being completely revised before a sixth edition is published. Some of the present chapters are to be deleted and others added, in order that it may continue to be an up-to-date handbook for educated mothers, social workers, health visitors and nurses engaged in public health work, at the moderate cost of 4s. 6d. per copy. *The Mother's Cookery Book* has also been revised and new recipes added.



Each year a steady increase in the number of **Competitions.** Centres entering for most of the competitions and a higher standard of work submitted is noted with satisfaction, as an indication that education in mothercraft is claiming the attention it ought to have in every maternity and child welfare scheme. Two records have been created this year. For the first time since the National Mothercraft Competitions were started in 1913, the same Centre has won the Challenge Shield for this event and also the Rhondda Mothercraft Challenge Shield for mothers attending English Infant Welfare Centres. To Longmoor Military Centre this honour is due. It is the first time also that a Military Centre has carried off any award. The display of competition entries was well attended at the Cosway Street Schools on June 28th, when Miss Downing, Home-Page Editor of the *News-Chronicle*, which provided the original shield in 1913, presented the certificates. It was most satisfactory to note that there were a considerable number of entries in the class for patching, mending or darning a garment, which had had to be omitted for some years owing to paucity of entries. The Rhondda Mothercraft Challenge Shields were more hotly contested than ever, both among schoolgirls and mothers. The one for elementary schoolgirls was gained by Doris Agar (the eldest of six children all living in one room with her father and mother in the utmost poverty) for the Denmark Street School, Middlesbrough. The Shield for mothers attending Irish Centres was won by Mrs. Cullen for the St. Joseph's Baby Club, Milltown, while the Shield for secondary schoolgirls was gained for the second year in succession for the Salt Schools, Shipley, this time by Renée Garbutt's paper.

**Tired Mothers' Holiday Fund.** This Fund fortunately started the year with a balance in hand of £110. Applications were received from 26 mothers, 25 of whom were enabled to get much-needed holidays. The information which accompanies these applications, made through the Superintendent of the Infant Welfare Centre, who is responsible for making all arrangements with regard to the holiday, throws a very clear light on the hard conditions under which so many mothers in this country live and rear their families. A grant up to £3 is only made where the mother can arrange to be away for a fortnight and can either go alone, or take one child with her.

**Maternity and Child Welfare Section of the Museum of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.** The Association has actively collaborated with the National Council for Maternity and Child Welfare in collecting statistics and other material for this section, and submitted a chart showing methods of co-operation between an infant welfare centre and outside agencies. This idea was ably carried out in black and red by an anonymous friend of the Association, as was also a map, showing the distribution of Infant Welfare Centres, Ante-natal Centres, Day Nurseries and Nursery Schools in England and Wales.

Plans and designs of new Maternity Homes and Infant Welfare Centres were collected and mounted in book form on black paper. Photographs and plans of Nursery Training Schools, Convalescent Homes, Toddlers' Playgrounds, &c., were generously contributed from various sources and complete sets of records as used by many Local Authorities and Voluntary Societies formed part of the collection.

The food section, for which very clever models are being made, will be ready in the near future and will, no doubt, add greatly to the usefulness and charm of this important section of the museum.

The Association has taken an active part in the **Babies' Clubs.** formation of a Federation of Babies' Clubs and in educating public opinion to the need for establishing infant welfare centres, where membership is by subscription, for the benefit of those members of the community untouched by the existing services. Progress is slow, but the clubs report a sustained interest in the work and a small increase in the numbers attending. In order to help any pioneers in this field the Federation has drawn up a memorandum containing many useful suggestions which it is hoped will be a real help and may protect the unwary from pitfalls which lie in wait for them.

**Library.** Members of the Association and others have made much greater use of the library belonging to the National Council for Maternity and Child Welfare during the past year than before, and there is evidence that the demand for literature on every aspect of maternity and child welfare by all classes of the community is largely increasing. The scope and usefulness of the library has been greatly extended since it was decided to co-operate with the National Central Library as an "outlier" library. By this means it is possible for books to be borrowed for subscribers which do not form part of the library of the National Council for Maternity and Child Welfare. An annual subscription of 5s. or more to the National Council, or to any of its constituent bodies, entitles the subscriber to use the lending and reference library and books may be exchanged by post on payment of postage both ways.

**Employment Bureau.** The Infant Welfare Workers' Employment Bureau has had a good year. There has been a large increase in the number of applicants. Nine hundred and four were registered during the year, whereas in 1929 only 698 came on the books. The correspondence also shows an increase; 5,561 letters were received, being 1,451 more than in the previous year, and upwards of two thousand more letters were despatched. The interviews reached a total of 1,969, nearly 300 more than in 1929, so that it can be said that the work has steadily increased in spite of the drop in vacancies registered. Of these there were 692 notified and 290 filled by candidates supplied by the Bureau.



### Volunteers and Staff.

For the greater part of the year Miss Audrey Vernet has continued to act as Hon. Librarian and Assistant Hon. Secretary, and in many other ways has given generously of her time. It is regretted that she will in future be less often in London, but the Association is glad to know that she retains her interest in the work and will help whenever possible. Miss K. Grandage has made a welcome return to the office, after a long absence, and in addition to organising a most successful Bargain Sale, has assisted with some important work, classifying and arranging the results of questionnaires which have been issued at various times. Miss Bull has been an indefatigable worker in every department as the need arose, while Miss H. Halford has continued to give one day a week to the work of the general office. To these the Association offers grateful thanks for valuable and disinterested service. The Association is fortunate in retaining the services of the staff, many of whom have worked loyally and well for a long period of years. Miss Halford has found time to pay several visits to Geneva on international affairs and to address meetings at Headstone, Hertford, Goudhurst, Banstead, the Norfolk Federation of Women's Institutes, Sandwich, Lancaster Road Father's Council and Ashford. Miss Richards has visited Centres in different parts of the country and in London and has given eighteen addresses to mothers. A small fee is charged to the local committees for these services, when possible, which is added to the funds of the Association.

37,548 letters and parcels were despatched by the staff during the year, not including those of the Infant Welfare Workers' Employment Bureau, which sent out a further 8,164.

The importance of convalescence as a preventive measure is being realised much more by the staffs of Infant Welfare Centres and Hospitals, with the result that a demand greater than

can possibly be met is made on the twenty-two cots available in the two Homes for which the Association is responsible. This year has been no exception and the waiting list for infants and toddlers has been distressingly long. The efforts to find a third Home to replace the Marjorie Lumley Home have not yet met with success. The financial side of the work is a constant source of anxiety. The only certain income is the grant paid by the Authorities of the Counties in which the Homes are situated and the fees from those responsible for sending the children. The Wendy Society reserved three cots at £50 each per annum, and certain Local Authorities did so too, and these are transferable between the Homes. The interest from the endowment made by the "Eve" Girls' Salon has been most useful in helping cases where funds were difficult to obtain.

The income and expenditure accounts of the two Homes are this year drawn up in the form required by the King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, from which welcome grants have been received.

The Association continues to assist in the administration of the Creagh Nursery Training School. By the courtesy of Mrs. Creagh, the generous founder, the number of beds allotted to the Association was increased from 8 to 10, and these have been constantly occupied during the year. The School has established an excellent reputation for the training of nursery nurses. Nineteen trainees are in residence at a time and there is a constant demand for their services on completion of their training. A prospectus will be forwarded on application to the Principal at Addison House, 38 Holland Villas Road, Kensington, W.11.

The Babies' Hotel and Nursery Training School was started by the Association's predecessor, the National League for Health, Maternity and Child Welfare, out of a large sum of money entrusted to it in 1918 by the American Red Cross. It has, for some years, been administered by a joint Committee of the Association of Maternity and Child Welfare Centres and of the National Society of Day Nurseries. After 12 years of arduous work it is becoming widely known as one of the most successful Nursery Training Schools. Its aims and objects are to provide a home and skilled care for babies of the professional classes and to provide a practical training for girls who wish to become nursery nurses. In the autumn of 1930 a sun balcony was erected for the use of delicate babies, where from four to six can enjoy the south sun protected from cold winds.

During the nine months the Home has been open 57 infants under two years of age have been received, some of them causing grave anxiety, but eventually most of them returned to their homes well and much better equipped to fight against the difficulties of their environment. That the good results are in many cases enduring is shown in the letters received by matron from the parents long after the infants have left her care. In a surprising way she manages to keep in touch with many of them and is able to guide and help them in the after-care of the children.

Not the least valuable work of the Home is the training of educated girls to become nursery nurses. They are taught all branches of nursery management and have exceptional opportunities of studying sick and normally healthy children, which stands them in such good stead when they assume charge of a nursery. Four full-time students are always in training and, in addition, a few girls who are anxious to take a short course, in order that they may be more useful in their own homes or as voluntary workers. All readily become imbued with the spirit of service which is characteristic of the Home.

A report would be incomplete without reference to the Annual Dance arranged by the staff in the Village Hall, in aid of the funds. Old students reassemble, friends from the countryside and much further afield unite to make this delightfully democratic gathering a financial and social success.

The staff consists of Matron, Staff Nurse, Night Nurse, 4 trainees, cook-housekeeper and 1 maid, and there are 10 cots constantly filled. This would appear a comparatively large staff for the number of cots, but all the infants require individual care and it has been found impossible to do efficient work with a smaller number. The cost per head during 1930 was £2 1s. 8d. per week, which is partly met by a grant from the County Authority and by the fees (at 15s. a week) from those responsible for sending the children. The large deficit has to be met by voluntary contributions.

Mrs. John Madocks is indefatigable in her efforts to obtain new friends for the babies, in addition to her generous loan of the house, free of rent and rates, and in making the nursery the valuable link it is in the child welfare movement.

To Dr. Williams, the medical officer in charge of the home, the staff, and to Miss Chandler, a trained masseuse, who voluntarily visits the home regularly to massage the infants and give simple instruction to the students, sincere thanks are offered for the service rendered to the tiny guests, who respond so readily to the simple healthy home life provided for them.

## The Arkley Toddlers' Convalescent Home, Oakland's Lane, Arkley, near High Barnet, Herts.

The twelve cots of this Home have been filled the whole year with 107 children, but the sad thought that assails us is that in spite of this there have been a large number of disappointed little ones for whom there was no accommodation. The value of the work done here consists not only in restoring to health, but in teaching discipline and regular habits.

The generous donors and benefactors of the home, Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Symmons, are untiring in their efforts for the happiness and success which attend its working. Their weekly gifts of milk, eggs, fresh vegetables of all kinds, &c., are greatly appreciated. The staff of the Prudential Assurance Company, led by Miss Olive Smith, contribute the whole of the Pip, Squeak and Wilfred Fund, which, in addition to endowing a cot for a necessitous toddler, provides magical toys, dainty clothes and many other treats during the year.

Pound Day, an innovation this year, was a great success. Mrs. Fremantle, the wife of the Member for Hertfordshire, very kindly came to receive the gifts and the little store room was soon filled to overflowing.

Members of the Girls' Club made a most generous gift of £9 10s., the result of carol singing, and they asked that it might be spent on something that was needed for the home. A new gas cooking stove was thought to be the greatest need and has been installed.

The 3rd Barnet Girl Guides and members of the local Toc H also gave valuable help in many ways. To these and all friends of the home most grateful thanks are extended. The charm of the little guests has won for them many friends and this year a very large number of new ones have been added to the list.

The staff consists of matron, a staff nurse, cook-housekeeper and two probationers in training for nursery nurses, and all combine to maintain a high standard of work and service for the toddlers. To them and to Dr. Mercer, who gives so generously of his time and skill, the Committee is most grateful.

## Appendix.

### ASSOCIATION OF MATERNITY & CHILD WELFARE CENTRES.

CARNEGIE HOUSE, 117 PICCADILLY, LONDON, W.1.

(A CONSTITUENT BODY OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR MATERNITY  
AND CHILD WELFARE.)

#### CONSTITUTION.

##### 1. TITLE.

The Association shall be called the Association of Maternity and Child Welfare Centres.

##### 2. AIMS AND OBJECTS.

The aims and objects of the Association shall be :—

- (a) To bring into closer relationship by means of affiliation, all organisations or institutions engaged or interested in the work of Ante, Post-natal and Child Welfare Centres and associated Institutions.
- (b) To promote the establishment of such institutions and to advise as to their organisation and administration.
- (c) To organise meetings in London and the Provinces to discuss subjects germane to the work of such institutions.
- (d) To collect literature, statistics and reports bearing on Maternity and Child Welfare and to supply such institutions, as required, with literature, charts, diagrams, &c., published by the Association itself, or by other recognised bodies.

##### 3. CONSTITUTION.

The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a General Council and an Executive Committee.

###### *The General Council.*

The General Council shall consist of one representative appointed by each of the affiliated institutions and organisations. It shall meet annually in such place and at such times as the Executive Committee may decide. It shall elect such Hon. Officers as may be deemed advisable.



*The Executive Committee.*

The Executive Committee shall consist of 28 persons, nominated and elected annually by postal ballot by the affiliated Societies, one half of the members being members of the medical profession. All elected members of the Executive Committee shall retire annually, but shall be eligible for re-election.

Every affiliated Centre shall have the right to nominate one or more members for election to the Executive Committee, who need not necessarily be representative of their own Centre. Such nominations shall be in writing and must be received at headquarters by November 15th of each year.

The Committee shall have power to co-opt additional members annually, not exceeding 24. Such co-opted members need not be representatives of affiliated institutions.

The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman, Vice-Chairmen, and Hon. Secretary, and such other honorary officers as it may deem advisable.

It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees, which Sub-Committees shall elect their own Chairmen, unless otherwise directed.

At meetings of the Executive Committee six shall form a quorum.

4. MEMBERSHIP.

Any institution eligible under Clause 2 (a), whether municipal or voluntary, such as Infant Welfare Centres, Maternity Homes, Paying Clinics, Mothers and Babies Convalescent Homes and other residential Homes for children under school age, designed to promote the welfare of mothers and children under school age, is eligible for, and may be admitted to, membership by the Executive Committee, provided that it fulfils the following conditions :—

- (a) That in the case of a voluntary institution or organisation, it is managed by a responsible committee, regularly audited accounts are kept, and it has made approved efforts to secure the co-operation of the Local Health Authority.
- (b) That regular consultations, conducted by a qualified medical practitioner, are held at least once a month.
- (c) That the primary object of the institution is the education of the mother and the promotion of a higher standard of health in mothers and children and not material relief or medical treatment.
- (d) That the institution is not run for financial gain.

Organisations may be admitted to provisional membership pending their attainment of the above conditions, but such provisional membership shall be for a time not exceeding one year, and shall not give the right to elect representatives to the General Council.

5. SUBSCRIPTION.

The Subscription of affiliated societies shall be on a sliding scale, at the rate of one half per cent. of the expenditure, with a minimum of 5s. and a maximum of £2 2s. 0d.

Provisional members shall pay half the above rates.

County Groups shall subscribe on the following scale :—

For Counties responsible for less than 5 Centres :—  
10s. 6d. per annum.

For Counties responsible for from 5—10 Centres :—  
£1 1s. 0d. per annum.

For Counties responsible for from 10—20 Centres :—  
£1 11s. 6d. per annum.

For Counties responsible for over 20 Centres :—  
£2 2s. 0d. per annum.

The minimum annual subscription of individual members shall be 5s.

6. ALTERATIONS TO CONSTITUTION.

Alterations to the above Constitution may be decided at a special meeting of the General Council called for the purpose not less than three calendar months after the proposed alterations have been submitted in writing to the Executive Committee and circulated by them to the General Council.
