I always like to help if I can a "struggling woman Journalist" such as you describe yourself. But I find it difficult to give you my views on "Are Women Lazy?", because I do hate these wild generalisations about the sexes. Of course some women and some men are lazy, some women and some men industrious, and I don't believe that Mr. Wells or anybody else has the material for judging how the proportions balance each other.

But I think a good comment on the general charge of female laziness is the time-table I enclose being the actual working day of a working woman, which I suppose described herself in the Census papers as "unoccupied".
