is pleasant in fact the climate is as perfect as possible, the only drawback being the short days as it is dark at five. Talking about the sun, we are only about 20 miles from the centre line of the eclipse, which crosses the M. G. Ry near the Mughalnagar end, so we shall all probably troop off to see the show on the 22nd Jan^y.

The following quaint epistle was received this morning. An ekka is a one horse shay and a khalarie is a porter.

There to be carried cash to somewhere else ekka is allowed from your office. The system is to close the money in a box and place it on carriage when the cash is to be sent to some place. As the cash from Parwana is sent to Rafigunj sometimes Rs 2000/- sometimes Rs 1500/- and so on, no arrangement of carriage on account of the little sum can be made not; in consequence of the same Ekka is allowed so that the cash might reach safely and the work be done speedily. Here at Dakhnai also some days before ekka was always allowed the cash to be carried. But now the Head clerk who has been transferred to Dakhnai from

your office instead of allowing
ekka orders the cash to be sent
on the head of Khalari, in purse,
to Jokhia and Ratiganj. The
Resident Engineer does not un-
derstand the Hindi discourse. I
inform the master to "Sahib" through
the head clerk the method of sending
cash as prevails to Dehrí &c : but
what the Head clerk says him, he
gets angry with me. When your
honor had been to Parwaya I was
ready to submit the fact to your
honor: but the Resident Engineer
and the Head clerk prohibited me
not to do so, and assured me to
allow the ekka as was before. I
remained silent then. After
your departure two times or three
ekka was allowed for the cash to
be conveyed to Jokhia & Ratiganj.

now it is again stopped. The cash
is sent on the head of Khelari.
Thus the cash to be sent on the
head of Khelari to such long
distance as 15, 16 miles can not
be exempted from the dread of
any occurrence: because the
neighbour is dangerous. Theft and
dakoty is always done here.

Therefore I beg to pray that as
from your office and Sehanabad
ekka is allowed to be conveyed
the cash the same orders may
kindly be communicated to Par-
wana. Because I know too well
that in your office & Sehanabad
ekka is allowed the cash to be
carried: but rather I myself
had lived to Sehanabad three
months. I always obtained
ekka there the cash to be conveyed.

Dehri also gets ekka and also
other office.

Under these circumstances I
hope that your honor will pass
the order the ekka to be allowed
the cash to be carried from
Dakhnai Parwaya to Dakhni
Rafiganj.
