If you look through the Books you will understand my remark about the Book-keeper not having sufficient time for her As Auditor I am disappointed that after all the work. trouble I have had to put your Society's Accounts in to order that the work is not yet up to my standard. At the same time as I have told Miss Camerson what I think, may I suggest that it might be discouraging to her if the Committee enlarge upon the matter.

With regard to my fee, it surprises me that your Committee are so unaware of how generous I have been. The facts

are that your first Audit was a great loss of my valuable time,
the second Audit, owing to three different Book-keepers being
employed, interviews, instructions, opening new Ledger &c, my
fee should have been 14guis instead of 4½, & in this year's Audit

forget of what very small sums their Accounts are composed.....
a 1/- sub has the same amount of checking as a £100 sub!
You will see that I cannot reduce my fee should I be re-appointed.
