Dear Mrs Ramelson,

It was nice to hear from you again, though I am sorry to learn of your family problems. I am glad you have been able to get things a little more organised, and hope your mother is at any rate not suffering any pain.

We shall be pleased to see the pamphlets, as I now have someone else who would rather like to look through them.

I hope you will not be intimidated by this rather large parcel. As you say, "The Englishwoman's Review" for January, 1884 has an article on Anne Knight. That for July, 1908 has a long obituary article on Mrs Peter Taylor, which is all we can produce on her, apart from a Suffrage speech she made in 1866, and that she was a steady contributor to the constitutional movement.

I am afraid the material on Lydia Becker is rather scrappy. As far as I know, a proper life has never been written. "The Englishwoman's Review" of October, 1890 gives some information, as does the last number of "The Women's Suffrage Journal". And there is a short account in German in DIE FRAUEN DES 19 JAHRHUNDERTS.

We have the PROCEEDINGS of the National Association for the Promotion of Social Science for 1866, but, so little was the subject deemed important, that Barbara Bodichon's paper on the Enfranchisement of Women was not printed, but only referred to briefly in the Summary as having been read. However, fortunately it was separately printed as a pamphlet, a copy of which I send you. I also sent ROMOLA.

Alas, I can find nothing about Mrs Frank Morrison.

I shall look forward to seeing you in the summer.
