I am very sorry indeed that owing to tremendous pressure of work which lasted until a week ago, I have not been able before now to write to you in regard to the proposals you made me when we met at the House of Commons. I have thought over the proposals, but am afraid that I do not see my way to collaborate in the enquiries you have in mind. The pressure in the political world is so great just now, and I find so much to do in connection with it, that I am afraid I could not give the necessary time or thought to the investigation, even if, as you kindly suggested, you ~~took~~ took on yourself the lion's share. These are very strenuous days for anyone in political life, particularly for a woman when we have so few women Members of Parliament.
