I will return the books as I finish with them. In my next batch of books I should like Ivy Pinchbeck's "Women Workers and the Industrial Revolution 1750 - 1850"

Do you have anything on the part taken by women, the attitude towards women or the independent role of women in the Radical Movement? The period I have in mind is roughly from Wilkes to the passing of the 1832 Reform Act.

I have read Macerby "English Radicals" and Bamford.

There is no hurry to send Pinchbeck or anything you have on the Radicals until I return some of the books I have already. I will



drop you a note when I need them.

I have found access to the Utopian Socialists in Thompson's "One Half, etc" and 'Gray's' essay on 'Human Happiness' and the interesting Constitution of the London Co-operative Society 1825 (which was never born but had a most interesting Constitution). I also have R.K.P. Pankhurst's biography of Thompson, so this aspect is fairly well represented. However, before I start on them, as it were, I would like to get as much material as possible on the even more elusive Radical aspect.
