I am in receipt of yours of the 4th. inst. drawing my attention to the treatment meted out to a number of women who were arrested for brawling. I quite agree with you that it is a mistake to treat them as ordinary prisoners, and you will, no doubt, have noticed that on the day that they were sentenced a member of our Party called the attention of the Home Secretary to the matter, and re-

-ceived a reply which made it perfectly evident that Mr. Gladstone was to take no action. I am bound to say that whilst II have not a particle of sympathy with the methods of these women, and whilst I am of opinion that the effect of their work has been to delay the aims they have in view, I cannot understand the folly of the Home Office in regarding them as being anything but political prisoners, and, therefore, entitled to treatment in the first division.
