GENERAL & FINANCIAL REPORT,
1925.

THERE has been so much discussion lately in the public press and between medical institutions respecting the best way of maintaining hospitals without their being taken over by Government, that we feel it may be helpful before giving details of our hospital in 1925, to recall to the minds of our friends and supporters that *we began* work 37 years ago on the lines now being recommended as *possibly* of advantage if adopted by Hospitals. The basis of our constitution was, and still is, that all the classes of people who benefit by the work of the institution should join in maintaining it, viz., the patients treated, the nurses trained for a few months to become better maternity nurses than they could be after the *one* month's training *then* considered sufficient by some maternity hospitals, and, lastly, the public who benefit by the improved training given to nurses and to midwifery students. Let it also be remembered that before opening an in-patient department for the Clapham Maternity Mission, the founders had got permission for the students to attend the numerous cases of child-birth at the Lambeth Workhouse Infirmary. The Clapham students were mainly women training as doctors at the Royal Free and Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospitals, neither of which had at that time maternity departments for either in- or out-patients. After a short time the Board of Guardians at Lambeth required us to withdraw the students, because of a clause in the Unions Act forbidding the taking of students in Poor Law Infirmarys on the ground that the poorest classes of patients should not be used as material for the training of doctors.

Could anything show more plainly *why* the public ought to support voluntary Hospitals, since all unusual cases are necessarily sent *there* for treatment, where they can also serve for the instruction of doctors in training

for the benefit of the public. Another plan now being recommended we had also adopted when we began an in-patient department, viz., that separate single rooms should be given to patients who wished to be confined in hospital without the presence of the students, and were willing to pay a moderate sum for a private ward and good nursing, and to be attended by their own doctors as in Cottage Hospitals. With these arrangements *we* have worked for nearly forty years, and hitherto year by year have been able to report the receipts as equal to the expenses.

I will merely add that for 1925 the work has been the charge of 688 mothers, and as many babies as in-patients, being 79 more cases than in the previous year. 453 maternity out-patients requiring 6,448 visits in their own homes. 4,944 out-patients at the Dispensary for the General Diseases of Women and Children, of which 1,294 were new cases, and the medical visits to the homes of out-patients numbering 1,465.

There has also been the Infant Welfare and Ante-natal work two afternoons each week, both at the Hospital and St. John's House, Battersea.

The number of nurses and midwives trained has been rather fewer, but there have been more young medical women, viz., 18, taking post-graduate work.

The cost of the whole of this work was £5,150 12s. 9d., of which over two-thirds was derived from the payments of patients and nurses, and less than one-third from subscriptions and donations, even including the generous gifts from King Edward's Hospital Fund, the Saturday and Sunday Funds, and Queen Alexandra Day Fund. Nevertheless, the year closed without any debts of any kind.

We wish also to call attention to the work of the Tuberculin Dispensary carried on on Dr. Camac Wilkinson's methods, which enables sufferers from tuberculosis in certain stages to be treated without throwing up their daily work, the patients are not charged anything for the treatment, but their donations covered the expenses in 1925.

During the current year 1926 we are faced with certain changes which may affect our plans and finances considerably.

1. The Central Midwives' Board is requiring *a year's* training from all candidates who are not already trained nurses instead of the six months' which has been necessary hitherto, and six months instead of four for trained nurses.

2. The Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund is endeavouring with the co-operation of most of the Hospital Committees to establish a system by which all nurses can work for an old-age pension even though they move from one Hospital to another—this will involve yearly contributions from *the income of the Hospitals* as well as from the nurses individually.

Thus we must once more ask our friends and subscribers to help us by finding a few more people to interest themselves in the finances and work of this Hospital, and send us yearly subscriptions.

For all details of receipts and expenditure see printed figures.

We cannot conclude this Report without an expression of earnest condolence on the death of a most valued member of our Committee, once its Chairman, viz., Dr. Helen Webb, who died a short time after the New Year, 1926, began.

MEDICAL REPORT FOR 1925

ADMISSIONS into Hospital were 733, actual confinements 688. Of these 404 were primiparæ, 83 being over 30 years of age; 110 were single women.

There were 3 cases of heart disease in the mother; one case of puerperal insanity, and one case of marked mental instability, who recovered completely; 1 case of phlegmasia alba dolens; 1 case of septicæmia, who recovered; 1 case of acute bronchitis; 1 of influenza (premature); 5 cases of markedly contracted pelvis; 1 case with pyæmic abscesses (transferred after some weeks to South London Hospital, where she eventually recovered); 4 cases of primary post-partum hæmorrhage.

There were 8 sets of twins; 12 cases of still-birth, of these 3 were macerated, two occurred in breech cases, one in a markedly contracted pelvis; 1 had spina bifida.

8 babies born alive died within 15 days; 5 of these were premature (all under 5 lbs.), lived from 1 to 6 days; 1 died on 6th day from collapsed lung; 1 an anencephalic monster, lived two days; and 1 had imperforate anus (lived eight days).

2 babies had ophthalmia recovered completely. 5 cases of mammary abscess. 21 operations by forceps extraction were required. The reason given for their use was in 7 cases signs of foetal distress (all the babies alive); in 2 cases maternal heart disease; 1 case for prolapse of cord, child alive; 1 for eclampsia; 1 for pre-eclamptic signs; 3 for uterine inertia; 2 were in old primiparæ; 1 for mother's condition.

In 9 cases manual removal of placenta was required and done; 9 primary explorations for retained membranes; 2 cases required a secondary exploration on 6th and 15th day respectively, and both patients did well.

In 2 cases the mother died. One a primipara of 26, suddenly, on the 14th day, succumbed after some minutes of urgent dyspnœa, and death was proved to be due to pulmonary embolism. The second, also a primipara, after a severe eclamptic fit had a difficult axis-traction forceps operation, which she survived only 11 hours. The child was also dead.

1 case of pyæmia was transferred to the South London Hospital after several weeks, and ultimately did well there.

BATTERSEA DISTRICT MATERNITY.

409 CONFINEMENTS were attended during 1925 from St. Johns' House, completing our 33rd Year of Battersea District work in addition to 53 Clapham out-patients. 11 of the children were still-born, of these two were macerated and six were premature cases.

Nine deaths occurred among the infants, 4 from prematurity; 1 from pneumonia on 11th day; 1 from congenital heart disease; 1 from spina bifida; 1 from malignant jaundice; and 1 from convulsions on 8th day, with signs of congenital syphilis.

In 74 cases the mother was a primipara, and a stitch was required in 25 cases. All did well.

The only case of maternal mortality was a multipara, who had acute lobar pneumonia, followed by premature labour, and death on the 7th day. All the other patients did well.

Forceps were used on six occasions only, 3 in primiparæ for foetal distress, all did well; 1 for brow presentation, child born alive; two in unreduced occipito-posterior positions, one born alive, one still-born.

Explorations required on 10 occasions for membranes, once for adherent placenta; for placenta for post-partum hæmorrhage once. One case of premature twins.

Presentations 345 times by the Vertex, of these 9 remained unreduced. Four persistent occipito-posterior positions. 9 breech presentations, of which 7 were born alive, the 2 still-born ones being both premature. 1 face presentation in a primipara. 1 shoulder presentation premature and born naturally by spontaneous evolution. 1 brow presentation (forceps). 3 cord presentation.

Fever of 100.6 or over on more than one reading occurred 17 times, 7 times from associated illness and 10 times, from no apparent cause, of transient duration only.

The Out-patient Attendances at the Battersea Dispensary were 4,944, of these 1,294 were new patients. Medical visits in the year totalled 1,465 in the patients own homes.

The ante-natal work goes on regularly, but here the patients also come to the General Dispensary if they wish for advice or ante-natal treatment.

Our Clapham Ante-Natal Treatment is summed up in the following verse, by a Student:—

“ In later months of pregnancy, dispense with eggs and meat;
Then drink hot water freely, take fruit—all you can eat.
Hot baths are very useful, their value is untold.
These rules, with daily exercise, are worth their weight in gold.”

TUBERCULIN DISPENSARY.

WE re-opened our Tuberculin Dispensary in 1924, as there was a real demand for it again. It was started by us in April, 1911, and worked on well through the war, and was only discontinued in 1923, but had to be revived.

The method of treatment is still our best help in all cases of afebrile tuberculosis. It is wonderful how very often old patients turn up again to report themselves. We are open at 37, Jeffreys Road, Clapham Road, at 9 a.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays, and medical people are welcome to come and watch and learn, as we have, as far as I know, no other method of treatment that will so effectively help the patients, while allowing them to continue at work.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Management.

THIS Hospital was opened in 1889 for the accommodation of maternity patients of the poorer classes who desire to be attended by doctors of their own sex.

Its existence also affords to women medical students and candidates for the C.M.B. examinations the opportunity of training in obstetrics under *women, who are doctors, not midwives only.*

Nursing.

The nursing of the patients is in the care of a Matron, who is a fully-trained Nurse and experienced Midwife, and under her, women are instructed in Monthly Nursing.

CONDITIONS FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

In-patients.

Patients are admitted to this Hospital without "letters" on the payment of a charge proportionate to their means and always under cost.

Private patients are received in separate rooms at 3 guineas per week, and pay a medical fee.

Free Cases.

A certain proportion of "free cases" and "reduced payment" cases are received when recommended through the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Funds.

The patients received are of two classes:—

1. Married women are admitted from any part of London or the Country.

Rescue Cases.

2. Unmarried patients. These are received in cases of first confinement only, either from Rescue Homes or from the homes of *near relatives*, resident in the district, who make themselves responsible to receive mother and child back after 14 days.

MATERNITY NURSING.

1.—Women, between 21 and 50 years of age, are trained as Maternity Nurses. Candidates are requested to note the distinction between Maternity Nursing and Midwifery.

FEES FOR TRAINING AS NURSE.

Four months	£12 12 0

These fees include board and lodging, but not personal laundry. They are paid on entrance and are not returnable.

2.—A deposit of £1 1s. must be paid by each Nurse on entering her name for training, which shall be forfeited should she not proceed with her engagement. The guinea is in addition to the fee quoted above.

3.—The Nurses must wear washing dresses, caps and aprons of the Hospital uniform, and must pay special attention to cleanliness both in person and clothing.

4.—Each Nurse shall be allowed to see as many cases of labour as is practicable.

5.—Each Nurse is expected to do four weeks' night duty in the course of a four months' training.

6.—Nurses must attend all the lectures by the Matron, and they are also permitted to attend the lectures on Midwifery for the Students given by the Visiting Physicians.

7.—Each Nurse is examined after four months in the Hospital. The certificate given will depend not merely upon the examination, but also upon the manner in which the Nurse has performed her duties during her time of training.

8.—The application for any definite vacancy must be accompanied by a deposit guinea and two references of character and a medical certificate as to general health. The guinea is returned if these are not satisfactory.

9.—No wine, beer or spirits are allowed to be brought into the Hospital, or used by either Nurses or Patients. Smoking is not allowed inside the hospital buildings.

10.—Candidates desiring a vacancy should, when possible, call for a personal interview with the Matron at the Hospital, or with Dr. McCall, at 165, Clapham Road, any day at 2 p.m.

MIDWIFERY.

There is a School of Midwifery attached to this Hospital as well as a School of Monthly Nursing.

Candidates are requested to note carefully the difference between a Maternity NURSE and a Midwife. The former has been taught to nurse "lying-in cases" under a doctor, whereas a Midwife, on the other hand, has been trained to work without a doctor in normal cases, to differentiate between normal and abnormal cases, and to recognise the symptoms in a puerperal woman which require the immediate calling-in of a Doctor.

Those who intend to practise as Midwives in England must, after twelve months' training, or, if they are trained nurses, after six months' training, present themselves for the Examinations of the Central Midwives' Board as appointed by Act of Parliament, 1902. After passing this examination they are placed on the Government Register as Certificated Midwives under Government supervision. These Examinations are held every four months.

For the Examinations of the Central Midwives' Board candidates must send in their Schedules beforehand to that Institution, accompanied with One Guinea for the Examination Fee, and certificates of birth or baptism, and in the case of married women of marriage also. Candidates from abroad should note this, and bring certificates with them.

An Examination is also held by the Clapham Maternity Hospital's Examiners of a three-fold character—written, viva voce and clinical—and a certificate awarded. Students are strongly advised to take this Examination in addition to the C.M.B., as affording valuable evidence of their standard of training. Examination fee, £1 1s.

Dr. McCall's class of Practical Operative Midwifery for medical students or missionaries, etc., going abroad, is given at intervals throughout the year. It is of great value, also to medical women and others desirous of knowing their midwifery well. Terms, £3 6s.

The Fees for MIDWIFERY are as follows:

(Inclusive of board-residence, training, and lectures, but not of personal laundry nor examinations).

For the *6 Months required by "Trained Nurses"—

If resident at St. John's House, Battersea, and working mainly among Out-Patients **Forty-one Guineas.**

Or, if resident at 165, Clapham Road, working mainly among In-Patients in Hospital **Forty-seven Guineas.**

Or:

For the 12 Months' Course—

Taken partly in Hospital and partly at Battersea **Fifty-seven Guineas.**

Or, partly in Hospital and partly at 165, Clapham Road **Sixty-three Guineas.**

For 1 Month—

Medical Women and Certified Midwives are received for post-graduate experience. Residence in hospital **Ten Guineas.**

* NOTE.

A 7 months' course enables candidates to gain a Certificate as a Maternity Nurse as well as that of the Central Midwives' Board and the Clapham Midwifery Certificate.

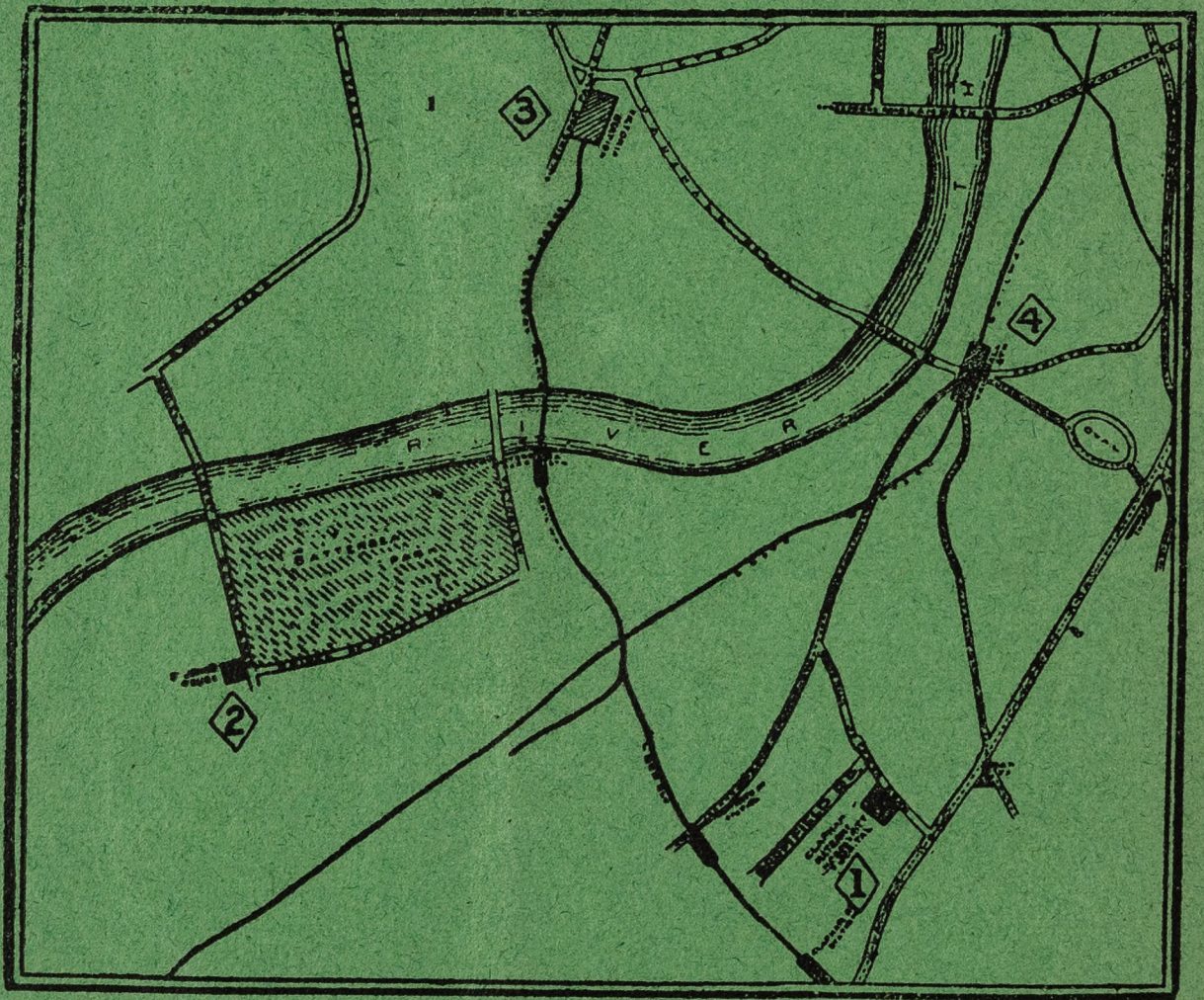
