# SECTION B.

# ANNUAL REPORT, 1930.

In presenting the 26th Annual Report of the Women Public Health Officers' Association I have felt the great difficulty of doing so concisely owing to the extensive range of its activities.

# President and Vice-Presidents.

I think I am voicing the feelings of the members of the Association when I say that they desire to express their warm appreciation of the support given to the Association by our President The Lady Cynthia Colville, and by all our Vice-Presidents.

# Office Arrangements.

The Association has been obliged to make a slight difference in the office arrangements, as the lease of the four rooms at 92, Victoria Street, expired on December 25th last. The address having become a landmark we felt it would be unwise to change it. There were a good many difficulties to face, but it has been finally decided to retain for our own use three out of the four rooms, of which one and sometimes two were previously sub-let.

Miss Gray has been with us now for more than seven years. The Association is fortunate in having such a loyal and hard working officer—ready at all times to identify herself with its ever increasing activities.

Miss Acott has served the Association for five years, Miss Sumpter for three years and Miss Eva Marvin a year and nine months. All three have received their entire training from Miss Gray.

# Annual General Meeting.

This was held at the Royal Sanitary Institute on February 21st, 1930. It was gratifying to see that the chair was occupied as on previous occasions, by Dr. Seekings Friel.

There was a full attendance of members both from London and the provinces.

The Honorary Secretary, Miss M. Campbell, presented the report, the balance sheet being presented by the Honorary Treasurer, Miss M. E. Davies (now Mrs. Elvet Lewis).

The President, Vice-Presidents, Officers and members of the

Executive Committee for 1930 were elected.

The voting was conducted by the recently introduced method

of card voting which proved very satisfactory in practice.

In addition to alterations to the rules necessitated by the adoption of Standing Orders for General and Executive Committee meetings, Resolutions on the following matters were all passed unanimously.

(B) Policy in relation to the Local Government Act, 1929.

(C) Combined Duties (Health Visiting, School Nursing, Tuberculosis Visiting).

(D) Regulations for the Qualification of School Nurses.

(E) Report of Departmental Committee on the Training and Employment of Midwives.

(F) Improvement and Standardisation of conditions of Service.

A resolution proposing the affiliation of the Association to the National Federation of Professional Workers was passed unanimously.

This has been carried out and Miss Sayle is the representative of the Association on the General Purposes Committee.

The following urgency resolution from the Northumberland and Durham Centre was proposed:

"That an Annual Congress for Health Visitors be promoted by the Association, the first Congress to be held in 1930."

After a great deal of discussion the matter was referred to the Executive Committee. It proved too big an undertaking to arrange at such short notice, the Association having already a full programme for 1930. It has now been finally decided to hold a Conference at Harrogate on Saturday April 4th 1931.

The Executive Committee met II times during the year.

The average attendance at these meetings was 19.5 and the usual duration of the meetings three hours.

The June meeting was this year held at Derby. Six members travelled to Derby from London on Friday evening, and were joined by members from Birmingham, Lancashire, Durham and Yorkshire, all of whom received a very warm welcome from their colleagues of the East Midlands Centre. This Centre is the youngest offspring of the Association.

It is interesting to note that at this meeting, London members

were for the first time in a minority.

This meeting was also of historic interest in that it received the Certificate of Registry, entitling the Association to be known by its new name the "Women Public Health Officers' Association."

# Growth of the Association.

During the year the membership of the Association has grown from 765 to 937—an increase of 172. There have been very few resignations. The Association now has seven Centres:—Birmingham, Lancashire, London, Northumberland and Durham, South Wales, Yorkshire, and this year the East Midlands Centre.

# Appointments' Branch.

Registrar: - Miss H. M. Gray.

This was licensed by the London County Council on 19th Sept-

ember, 1930.

The number of candidates registered to the end of the year was 22, and the number of vacancies notified by Local Authorities was 12, of which 9 were temporary and 3 were permanent. The number of vacancies filled was 6, all of them temporary.

There is difficulty in filling vacancies outside London, as all

candidates want appointments in or near London.

The salaries offered for two temporary and two permanent appointments have been raised as the result of the appointments branch, and 13 new members were obtained.

# Winter School.

The Tenth Winter School was held at Bedford College from Monday, December 29th, to Friday, January 9th, inclusive.

The number of Students attending the course was 145, 144 of these being whole-time students, and one for one week only. Four other students who had enrolled were unable to come on account of illness. The number of Local Authorities sending students to the course was 95, the largest numbers being sent by Durham and Kent County Councils, each of these sending seven.

The thanks of the Association are due to these members for all the help which they gave. It would have been impossible to carry through all the arrangements without their help.

The general organisation of the School was carried through with even greater smoothness than in previous years, and fewer emergencies arose. Apart from altering the time of one of the lectures, the programme was carried through exactly as arranged.

The attendances, both at lectures and observation visits, were excellent, only 24 attendances at lectures were missed by all the 145 students, i.e. only an average of a little over one person being absent from each lecture.

All the arrangements at Bedford College were excellent, and the thanks of the Association are due to all the members of the College Staff for all that they did to ensure the comfort of the students.

The Association desires to express its thanks to the Principal and Council of Bedford College for the hospitality extended to the Winter School.

# Correspondence Course.

The number of students taking the third Correspondence Course varied from 31 to 22; of these, 10 are known to have entered for the examination for the Health Visitors' Certificate, 8 of whom passed. In all, 25 Health Visitors have now obtained the new Certificate after taking either in whole or in part, one of the Correspondence Courses arranged by the Association. Apart from the question of examination successes, many letters expressing warm appreciation of the course, and of the personal help given by the tutors, have been received from students.

The Association is indebted to Professor Winifred Cullis for valuable advice and to each of the tutors who served on the Tutorial committee for their generous help, both in answering individual questions and in realising the difficulties under which all students work.

#### The Woman Health Officer.

Miss M. Brown has been our honorary Editor since April 1926. In July, 1926, the News Sheet blossomed into the "Woman Health Officer," since when it has increased in value and interest year by year. The Association is deeply indebted to Miss Brown for placing her time and talents so generously at its service, and in giving us a means of communication with each other and with the outside world, of which we may be justly proud.

# The Library.

Miss Le Geyt acted as honorary librarian for the first part of the year. Miss Morrell succeeded her on November 5th, 1930. A number of new books have been added to the library, including those recommended for preparation for the new Health Visitors' examination, and others of more general interest, bequeathed to us by the late Mrs. Florence Greenwood, one of the earliest chairmen of the Association.

# Sunlight Training.

The Royal Northern Hospital, Holloway, has arranged a special course of training in light treatment for members of the Association. The course consists either of two sessions per week for six weeks, or of two weeks' full time instruction, the fee being £1 is. 22 members have availed themselves of this course since it began.

# German Tour.

It will be remembered that in 1929 a party of 37 members of the medical profession and other Health Workers from Germany visited London to see something of our methods of Public Health administration. As a consequence, one of the outstanding events of 1930 was the visit to Germany of 52 members of the Association.

The remarkable success of the tour was without doubt owing to the magnificent organisation of Miss Sayle. When we remember a large party of 52 persons had to be personally conducted through the greater portion of Germany, and to compress into 17 days a review of what are practically the best and most efficient methods of hospital work and health services in general, we may imagine to ourselves how perfect and complete the organisation must have been.

What remains in our minds especially was the whole hearted hospitality and the genial kindness of all with whom we came in contact.

The enjoyment of the party was very much enhanced by the presence of Miss King, who generously devoted her time to the assistance of those who had no previous knowledge of the German language.

The whole tour passed so rapidly that on returning, our minds retained a moving panorama of nights on the sea, great cities and centres of industry, ancient castles and forests, hospitals, open-air homes, institution for cripples, schools, housing and town planning, a dash down the Rhine, receptions, and finally, of the great iron works at Essen.

We offer to Miss Sayle our heartiest thanks for generously giving us so much of her valuable time, both on the tour and the previous months of preparation.

The previous policy of the Association in scrutinising all advertisements for women Public Health Officers has been continued throughout the year. It has been necessary to send letters of protest against salaries of less than £200 per annum offered in 46 cases during the year. In 18 of these cases, the salary was subsequently raised.

Letters have also been addressed to Local Authorities advertising appointments where an age limit was stated. There have been 23 of these cases during the year and one Local Authority has agreed, as a result of this, not to state any age limit in future advertisements.

There have been many revisions of salary during the year and the advertisements shew a marked improvement between the salaries offered now and those offered before April, 1928, when the new Regulations for the training of Health Visitors became operative. Whereas in 1927 it was necessary to send letters of protest in 113 cases, and this resulted in increases being granted in two cases, in 1930 it was only necessary to protest in 46 cases and in more than one-third of these the salary was increased.

#### Action on Behalf of Members.

In addition to the routine vigilance work, requests have been received from members working in the service of 30 Local Authoriaties for some kind of action to be taken. Twenty-four of these cases related to increases of salary and in 11 of these the Association was successful. In one of these cases, the staff had made several applications for an increase without success, but as a result of a deputation from the Association, the salaries were increased by £25 on the minimum salary and £100 on the maximum salary.

Two of these cases are still under consideration; four applications were not successful and in the remaining six cases no information

has yet been received as to the result.

The remaining cases related to special points connected with conditions of service. One member had been asked by her Council to resign her appointment, and as a result of an interview with the Council sne was allowed to retire on a pension instead. Another member asked for help in connection with her compensation, which was due when her appointment ceased as a result of the transfer of duties under the Local Government Act. The Association's Honorary Legal Adviser gave valuable advice in connection with this. Another member asked for the help of the Association in securing travelling expenses in connection with an interview to which she had been called. A letter was sent to the Local Authority and the claim for expenses was successful. An effort was made to obtain an additional grant for two members for extra duties under the Local Government Act, but this was not successful.

Now that the sanction of the Ministry of Health to each individual appointment is no longer necessary, a new development of the Association's work has been to watch advertisements to see that the qualifications stated comply with the regulations of the Ministry of Health. Letters have been sent to the Ministry of Health in two cases where the qualifications were not in accordance with the regulations, and letters have been addressed to two other Local Authorities relating to other points stated in their

advertisements which did not appear satisfactory.

### Routine Office Work.

# REPORTS OF SUB-COMMITTEES.

# Annual Dinner Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss D. Walding. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

Five meetings of the Annual Dinner Committee have been held

during the year.

This Committee is charged with the duty of making all the arrangements in connection with the annual dinner and has made recommendations to the Executive Committee with regard to the guests to be invited, the toast list, the appointment of stewards and other details.

# Appointments' Branch Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Mrs. Kent Parsons. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

This Sub-Committee was appointed by the Executive Committee on May 7th, 1930, the terms of reference being

"That a special Sub-Committee be appointed to consider the arrangements for an Information and Appointments' Bureau.'

The Committee held two meetings. The question of forming an Appointments' Branch to assist members in securing suitable appointments was fully considered and recommendations were made to the Executive Committee to the effect that such a branch of the Association's work should be started. The conditions under which it should be established were also considered in detail and recommendations were made to the Executive Committee.

The Appointments' Branch began its work in September and a report of this during the last three months of the year has been included in the Honorary Secretary's Report.

### Conference Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss H. S. Cooper Hodgson, M.B.E. (first meeting) Miss A. Sayle, M.B.E.

Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

The Conference Sub-Committee was appointed by the Executive Committee on September 5th, 1930, as a result of the urgency resolution moved at the Annual Meeting on February 21st, 1930, which was referred to the Executive Committee.

The Committee consisted of the Officers together with representatives of each of the Centres and Groups in proportion to their membership, each Centre being asked to appoint its own representatives. The experiment of holding meetings on Saturday afternoons was tried in order to make it possible for members of the provincial Centres and Groups to be present. The first meeting was held on Saturday, November 1st, and was very well attended. A further meeting was held on Saturday, November 29th, and the number of representatives present was also good.

These were the only two meetings held during 1930, but the work of the Committee will continue until the preparations for the Conference, to be held at Harrogate on Saturday, April 4th, 1931, are complete.

# Co-operation Sub-Committee.

This Committee is comprised of 14 members, who meet once in each month and its purpose is to deal with the correspondence from outside organisations and to make recommendations to the Executive Committee as to the most suitable means of co-operation with these many varied bodies.

This Committee, which acts as an expert advisory committee to the Executive Committee of the Association, met once, on 18th July, 1930, and approved the syllabus and the time-table for the Fourth Correspondence Course.

#### Editorial Sub-Committee.

The Editorial Committee has held its usual pleasant monthly meetings on the second Wednesday in each month, with Miss Sayle in the Chair. Notes have been prepared for 'Maternity and Child Welfare,'' 'Mother and Child' and the 'Woman Health Officer.''

During the year, there has been a competition for a new Cover Design for the "Woman Health Officer," and a prize of £2 2s. od., offered. The Executive Committee has recently selected a design subject to slight alteration.

A correspondence column in which members are able to discuss matters of special interest to themselves has been inaugurated in the "Woman Health Officer," and is proving popular.

We should like to thank very heartily our Editor, Miss Brown, for her inspiring editorials and the great amount of time she devotes to our magazine; our business manager, Miss Whitty, for looking after the advertisements, and Miss Neall for kindly writing the notes inserted in "Mother and Child."

# Educational Tour Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Mrs. Kent Parsons, Hon. Secretary: [Miss A. Sayle.

The Committee met three times in 1930. After considering the advisability of visiting Switzerland (with a party organised by the Public Health Training School in Berlin), Austria and Hungary, Norway and Sweden, and Holland, it was decided at the second meeting that Holland should be the country visited, and at the third meeting of the Committee, detailed information as to the organisation in Holland of public health work generally, and as to particular hospitals and institutions specially worth visiting was received.

The Sub-Committee is particularly indebted to Dame Janet Campbell, Dr. Jitta, Chief Medical Officer to the Netherlands Government, Dr. Seekings Friel, Sir Arthur Newsholme, and Miss Agnes Dick for their good offices.

### Finance Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss M. Blanchard. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

Six meetings of this Sub-Committee have been held during the year under the Chairmanship of Miss Blanchard—five ordinary meetings and one special.

The financial position of the Association has been considered at these meetings and recommendations have been made to the Exec-

utive Committee on financial matters when necessary.

A large part of the Committee's time has been devoted to the consideration of office accommodation, as the Association's agreement expired on December 25th, 1930. Inquiries were made as to alternative office accommodation, but after consideration of all the circumstances it was decided to retain the present offices.

Recommendations were made by the Committee that the members of the staff should be insured against Employers' Liability and also that the contents of the office should be insured against fire and burglary. These insurances have been effected.

# German Tour Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss A. Sayle. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

The work of this Committee which began in October, 1929, was concluded during the early part of 1930, five meetings of the Committee being held during the year under the Chairmanship of Miss Sayle.

This Sub-Committee made all the necessary arrangements for the tour to Germany which took place from May 23rd to June 9th. An account of the tour itself is included in the earlier part of the report.

# Local Government Act Policy Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss Sayle. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

This Sub-Committee was appointed by the Executive Committee on April 4th to consider what action should be taken with regard to the resolution on this matter passed at the Annual Meeting on February 21st, 1930.

The Committee held two meetings and discussed this resolution and other matters relating to the Local Government Act.

The Committee recommended that a Memorandum should be prepared on the points in the resolution passed at the Annual

Meeting.

Another matter which was considered was the question of additional payment being made to Health Visitors for the extra duties which they were required to perform under the Local Government Act, e.g. visiting under the Children's Act. The Committee recommended that a questionnaire should be drawn up and sent to members outside London asking for information as to the amount of additional work involved:

(a) Visiting under the Children's Act.

(b) Supervision of Midwives and Nursing Homes.

(c) Any other duties which had been added since the Local Government Act came into operation on April 1st, 1930.

In response to this questionnaire 109 replies were received, but the information contained in them was so varied that it was very difficult to tabulate. After consideration of this information, the Committee came to the conclusion that it was too early to form an accurate idea of the amount of extra work involved by the additional duties under the Local Government Act, and that the general policy to be adopted by the Association with regard to this matter should be deferred for six months, action being taken in individual cases in the meantime where this is considered desirable.

# Propaganda Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Mrs. J. Kent Parsons. Honorary Secretary: Miss M. Scott.

The Propaganda Committee has met ten times and has had an

active and successful year's work.

Meetings have been held at Derby, Guildford, Maidstone, Manchester and Nottingham. At the last named place, it was found possible to form a new centre which would be called the East Midlands Centre and which would include members from Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire and Rutland.

A tour of the South Coast was arranged and carried out by Miss Sayle and Miss Gray. The towns visited were Winchester, Bournemouth, Portsmouth, Worthing, Hove, Brighton, Hastings and Eastbourne.

Lists were made out of all the staffs in London and Greater London where there were no members, and personal letters were sent by members of the Committee to Health Visitors known to them on these staffs.

Miss Sayle spoke to 37 students of the National Health Society with a view to their joining the Association, and many of them have

joined as Student Associates.

It was recommended by the Committee that an Information and Appointment Bureau should be formed. This has been started and has proved a great success and has resulted in some new members.

A Public Speaking Class with a view to providing speakers for propaganda work was suggested and this has proved very

Quarterly "At Homes" have been arranged to be held at suitable centres in London to which members working near London and not included in the area of the centre, are to be invited. The "At Homes" are to take the form of a talk or lecture on some subject of interest, and are to be followed by tea and a social event. Each member is to be allowed to bring one non-member friend who is a woman Public Health Officer.

The work of this year's Committee was concluded with a very well attended meeting at Bedford College during the Winter School which was followed by a most interesting lecture by Dr. I. Feld-

man on "Some Problems of Sex Education."

The retiring Committee have recommended to its successor that a meeting be held at the Nursing Exhibition in 1931 and also that a tour of the Devonshire towns be carried out. Also that a special effort should be made to form a local centre in Kent.

# School Nurses' Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Mrs. J. Kent Parsons.

Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

The Executive Committee on April 4th considered what action could be taken to further the resolution passed at the previous Annual Meeting relating to the qualifications of School Nurses, and appointed a Committee of School Nurse members to consider this matter.

The Sub-Committee held two meetings under the Chairman-

ship of Mrs. Parsons.

The Committee recommended that as a first step an effort should be made to try and secure the support of School Nurses themselves.

A meeting of the London County Council School Nurses was held for this purpose in July, and Miss Sayle, Miss Le Geyt and Miss Gray spoke on this resolution. The resolution was carried with only one dissentient.

It was also decided to ask the various Centres of the Association to arrange meetings of School Nurses within their areas to discuss this resolution, and such meetings have been arranged by the following Centres: East Midlands, Northumberland and Durham and Yorkshire, and in each case the resolution was carried by a

large majority.

The co-operation of the Public Health Section of the College of Nursing was sought and the resolution passed at the Annual Meeting was forwarded to them for consideration. They decided to support the resolution with an amendment to the effect that all School Nurses should hold a Certificate of General Nursing Training. This amendment was considered by the School Nurses' Sub-Committee, which decided to recommend to the Executive Committee that the original resolution should be supported, and that the Minister of Health and the President of the Board of Education should be pressed to adopt a recognised standard of qualification for School Nurses, which should be the same as that for Health Visitors.

This recommendation is being embodied in the evidence which is to be given before the Departmental Committee on the qualifications, recruitment, training and promotion of Local Government

Officers.

# Standardisation of Conditions of Service Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss A. Sayle. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

The Executive Committee re-appointed this Sub-Committee on June 21st, 1930, to consider the action which should be taken in furtherance of the resolution on this subject passed at the Annual Meeting in 1930, particularly in view of the publication of the Ministry of Health summary of information received from Local Authorities as to the salaries and other conditions of service of their women Public Health Officers.

Each of the Centres was asked to appoint representatives to the Committee and the Groups were also represented. Four meetings of the Committee were held between July and the end of the

year, Miss Sayle being elected chairman.

It was decided to tabulate all the information contained in the Ministry of Health summary on the same lines as the tabulated lists of salaries, holidays, etc., which were included in the Memorandum published by the Association in 1926. For this purpose members of the Committee undertook to index all this information, and this has been done. It has been decided to publish a report on this information, but that this should not be printed until after the Association Conference at Harrogate in order that the tabulated lists may be discussed at the Conference and the discussion embodied in the Report.

In addition to the question of standardisation of conditions of service, the Executive Committee referred other matters to this Committee for consideration:

- (a) The revision of the salary scales for London and Greater London.
- (b) The formation of a scale of salaries for Assistant Superintendents outside London.
- (c) The preparation of a Memorandum of Evidence to be given before the Departmental Committee on the qualification, recruitment, training and promotion of Local Government Officers.

The views of Centres have been ascertained with regard to the scale of salaries for Assistant Superintendents and the views of Superintendent Health Visitor members of the Association with regard to the scales for Superintendent Health Visitors outside London.

The views of centres have also been asked for with regard to the various points to be included in the Memorandum of Evidence for the Departmental Committee.

There is still much work for this Committee to do and meetings are occurring periodically to complete it.

# Standing Orders' Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss A. Sayle. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

This Sub-Committee has held two meetings during the year to consider certain revisions of the Rules and Standing Orders which were needed.

One of the questions considered by the Committee was the possibility of securing a greater number of nominations for the offices of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer and also for the Group Representatives on the Executive Committee. Certain alterations of the Standing Orders have been recommended, which it is hoped will encourage nominations and these are embodied in the alterations to Rules and Standing Orders adopted at the Annual Meeting.

The Committee has also made recommendations which it is hoped will place the Groups more in line with the Centres with regard to representation on the Executive Committee.

# Winter School Sub-Committee.

Chairman: Miss A. Sayle. Secretary: Miss H. M. Gray.

The Winter School Sub-Committee has met three times during the year under the Chairmanship of Miss Sayle.

The syllabus of lectures and a list of observation visits in

connection with the Tenth Winter School were drawn up by this Sub-Committee and all the other arrangements for the Winter School were also made.

A report of the Winter School itself is included in the earlier part of the report.

# REPORTS OF CENTRES.

# Birmingham.

During the past 12 months many activities, both educational and social, may be reported from the Birmingham Centre of the Women Public Health Officers' Association.

The following lectures were arranged for the Winter Session: Oct. 25th.—''The Teaching of Child Management in Infant Welfare Centres.'' Dr. Ursula Cox.

Nov. 22nd.—''The Toxæmias of Pregnancy.'' Dr. Hilda Shufflebotham.

Feb. 28th, 1931.—"Family Allowances." Miss Eleanor Rathbone M.P.

The lectures were most helpful and interesting and were well attended.

The Centre has held two very enjoyable social functions. The summer outing was held on May 31st. A visit was paid to the Roman remains at Uraconium, and a very interesting lecture was given by the curator who personally conducted the party over the ruins. On December 5th a social evening in the shape of a ''Fancy Fair'' was held at the Carnegie Institute. A special feature was a topical broadcast entertainment, and a one-act play specially written and produced by Dr. Ursula Cox. There were over 100 members and friends present. This was a very enjoyable evening and a great financial success.

Eleven new members have joined the Centre and there have been 2 resignations. The Birmingham Centre has not a large membership, possibly owing to the other associations within the Public Health Department, to which many of the staff belong. It is hoped, however, that the membership will be materially increased in the near future.

Application for permission to form an East Midlands Centre was made to Headquarters. Officers and a Committee were elected, and over tea—kindly provided by members of the Nottingham School Medical Staff—we began to make new friends.

# GENERAL MEETINGS.

General Meetings were held at Nottingham on May 10th, Derby on June 21st. This was the quarterly meeting of the General Executive Committee of the Association and was attended by: Miss Sayle, Miss Gray, and representatives of five other centres, London, Lancashire, Northumberland and Durham, Birmingham and Yorkshire. Another meeting was held at Leicester on September 6th, and to all these meetings the entire staffs of Nottingham, Derby and Leicester Counties and County Boroughs were invited.

It has not been possible to hold a meeting at Lincoln yet, but we are looking forward to meeting our Lincoln colleagues in their own city in May 1931.

A fourth meeting was held at Nottingham on November 15th.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

Two meetings of the Executive Committee were held: one on March 29th at Nottingham to decide upon a policy for future meetings.

One called on January 3rd, 1931, to discuss the contents of a letter from Headquarters re qualifications, training, recruitment and promotion of local government officers: to choose a representative to the meetings at Bedford College on January 5th and 6th, and to instruct her in the views of the centre on the questions mentioned above.

# REPRESENTATIVES TO QUARTERLY MEETINGS.

Miss Cross of Derby and Miss Palmer of Nottingham have represented us at the quarterly executive meetings with Miss Ware and Mrs. Elvet Lewis as proxies. Our thanks are due to these ladies for this kindness.

#### USE OF PREMISES.

We are indebted to the School Medical Officers of Nottingham and Derby and to the Chairman of the Leicester Health Committee and the Maternity and Child Welfare Officer of Leicester City for the use of the rooms, in which we held our meetings during the year.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

Our centre commenced with a membership of 59. Two members asked to have their names removed. One member has been

transferred to another centre, and ten new members have joined during the year. Our membership is now 66, and it is hoped to greatly augment that number by our next Annual Meeting.

To that end we look forward to arranging in the year before us more meetings of a social and educational nature, and to making the centre of very real value to women in the Public Health Services of the East Midlands.

This meeting was presided over by James Phillips, Esq., F.R.C.S., with whom was the organiser of the Yorkshire Cancer Campaign. Our only regret was that owing to the bad weather there was only a small audience. It was one of the days of intense fog.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

During the year the branch has lost five members, four having left to work in other districts, and one member has resigned. The membership at the end of the year was ninety-one.

There have been several applications for membership since the end of the year and we hope very soon to complete the hundred.

The average attendance at meetings has been forty-one.
