In spite of your prohibition
I should certainly have written before
this to thank you for your very
kind letter if it had not been for
that inertia which I suppose most
ex-prisoners experience when the first
wild exuberance of release has
worn off.

My wife + I are now
in Switzerland where up in a
mountain village we have beautiful
fresh air in spite of the great

heat which seems to be ~~conf~~ ^{universal} at present, & each day we are getting more back to our normal selves.

We are so glad that all our comrades are ^{now} released from prison & that the cruelty of government

officials upon them have at last come to an end. We realised that just because they are not so well known as we are the

Government would do to them what

they would hesitate to do to us,

but it will ~~be~~ all over

to be made public. I think there are signs that even the House of Commons is beginning to think that forcible feeding is a horrible thing.

Thank you for sending me your poem which I like very much. It has a fine note of battle about it.
