The report of the Royal Commission on Trade Disputes and Trade Combinations was issued yesterday.

The Executive of the East Aberdeenshire Conservative Association yesterday resolved to recommend that the vacancy in the Parliamentary representation of the division, caused by the death of Mr James Annand, should not be contested at this time. This recommendation will come before a meeting of the Association on Saturday, when a final decision will be made.

There was called in the Court of Session yesterday the action by Margaret Nairn, M.A., and others against the University Court of St Andrews. It is a test action by lady graduates to determine their claim to exercise the vote in University Parliamentary elections on the ground that their names are on the register.

A Blue Book was issued last night containing further correspondence between Lord Elgin and Lord Selborne regarding the employment of Chinese labour on the Rand. The points dealt with refer chiefly to the flogging of the coolies and the repatriation of the Chinese.

Work was in full swing yesterday at Rosyth, where nothing is known of the reported intention to abandon the position as a naval base.

Yesterday 500 workers in Messrs Sharp's Edward Street Mill, Dundee, came out on strike in connection with the wages question. Throughout the textile trade further labour troubles are looked for.

The trials and grievances of Broughty Ferry fishermen, who have had a severe winter, are set forth in a special article to-day.
