my sister & Miss Fiddens
did. I always remain

behind to see the cart,
paid for etc & I saw
nothing to worry about
happen.

I did not see you & your sister
get home all night - I do hope

a crowd - when I reached my
house there was a meeting on
outside - Miss Shore & Mrs. Ruth
inside with Jack - the other
Miss Shore came with a taxi &
they went - at once - all kinds
of rumors were heard at home
I don't yet know how many
windows are broken - write
for Mr. Disney - the Insurance

watchman for Holdens & Jack
fetching the police (with palm oil)
my house would have been
wrecked. - I had to take
refuge at back - it seems
just now, but the worst
is as police say - my house
is marked - & I may never
have whole windows.

Don't come, but do let me
have a p.c. to say you are
safe.

You see I was right; it
was unwise to hold a meeting
- the public does not differentiate
I am deeply upset - for
you Jack had hideous hoaxes
& - we are marked - to
you keep away: I do hope you
are alright - let me have a
