

South Islington Mothers' and Babies' Welfare Centre.

The Committee has much pleasure in presenting the Nineteenth Annual Report, which is for the year ending 31st March, 1934.

Like the rest of the nation, we have had this year to make great efforts and some sacrifices to balance our budget, and this has absorbed a great deal of our attention. We have, therefore, no fresh developments or pioneer work to record, but the Centre has continued its steady, expert watchfulness over the health and development of 1,800 children, who have been in regular attendance, and of 200 mothers, who have come to the Centre for care and advice before their babies were born.

We ask our friends to read the account of the past year's work in the hope that it will inspire them to give us their continued and, if possible, increased support.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK OF THE CENTRE AND THE TWO BRANCHES.

Centre.

- (I) A doctor attends at the Centre once a week to see expectant and ailing mothers. A Knitting Class is held at the same time, and the Superintendent gives a short talk to the mothers on baby clothes, and on all matters concerning the health of a normal mother and her baby.
- (2) The Centre doctors hold six consultations weekly, to which mothers bring their babies from birth to school age. The children are weighed at each visit, and see the doctor periodically. The mothers can see and buy the model clothes advised, and buy at cost price simple medicines ordered by the doctor. They can also obtain a cup of tea and a biscuit for a penny.
- (3) Dental Clinics are held once a week. The mothers are urged to bring their children, and they themselves can have their teeth stopped or extracted under gas or with novocaine, and obtain dentures when necessary, paying for them week by week to the extent of their ability, the balance being provided from the Samaritan Fund, Hospital Sunday Fund, and other sources.
- (4) The Staff, consisting of the Superintendent, four Health Visitors, and Secretary, is fully employed on the work of the Centre and Branches. The Superintendent is always at the Centre interviewing mothers, planning the work, and superintending the record keeping; the rest of the staff visit the mothers to see that the doctor's advice is being carried out, and to advise them about any special difficulty with regard to the health and management of their children. The care of a newly-born baby is a matter of anxiety to young mothers, and many of them much appreciate

the help of an experienced visitor. The importance of regular attendance at the Centre is emphasized. In the afternoons the Health Visitors help at the consultations.

- (5) One member of the Staff is always available in the early morning, to arrange for test feeds in cases where breast milk is failing, and to do minor dressings ordered by the doctor.
- (6) Mothers with young babies are sent to the Convalescent Cottage owned by the Centre, which is situated near St. Albans. They go for a fortnight's convalescence, and pay according to their means. While enjoying the good food, pure air, and rest, they learn much from the Matron as to how they may train their babies in good ways, and thus reap the benefit of their visit after their return home. We are also privileged to send seven children between the ages of three and five years to Miss Fleetwood's home at the seaside, where they stay for a month and benefit to an amazing extent by the regular régime, good food, and excellent care.

Branches.

(7) In addition to the work at Clephane Road, the Centre has two Branches. A great feature of our work is that we have Branches within easy reach of all our mothers.

One branch is at "The Rose", 15, Popham Road, which is in one of the poorest parts of the district. Three consultations for children, and one for expectant and ailing mothers are held here each week.

The other branch is held at 100, Canonbury Road, in a district which contains several new blocks of municipal flats, and here two children's consultations are held each week.

From both branches the mothers and children attend at Clephane Road for dental treatment.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

The intimate knowledge which the Committee and Staff of the Centre acquire of the families in regular attendance, has enabled them to assist in the administration of help which has been offered from various sources to alleviate the hard lot of the families of unemployed men.

We have been enabled to help the Unemployed in the following ways:

- (I) Free Dinners for Expectant Mothers were made possible by a Grant in July by the Mayor of Islington, Councillor Leonard Maclane, of £21 from the Mayor's Fund for the Unemployed. These dinners are of great value in counteracting under-nourishment.
- (2) A grant of clothing to seven very poor families recommended by the Centre, was made from the same Fund.
- (3) Convalescence for the wives and young babies of unemployed men was given at our Convalescent Cottage through a grant from the

same Fund of £7 7s., and a free nomination was given us by the Women's Holiday Fund for one mother and baby.

(4) In addition to this, the present Mayor, Alderman Bertie Holden, allowed the Centre to nominate fifty families to receive dinners from the Mayor's Christmas Dinner Fund.

Many friends expressed a wish to perpetuate the memory of the work of our late Treasurer, Mrs. Nissim. Mrs. Ezra, our present Treasurer, therefore kindly made herself responsible for collecting the "Mrs. Nissim Memorial Samaritan Fund". This Fund was so well supported that it amounted to £422 8s. od. It will enable us for many years to help poor mothers, so that they can get dentures and other necessities which would otherwise be entirely out of their reach.

During the year a Committee has been formed, under the title of The Islington Committee for the Welfare of Mother and Child, consisting of the Medical Officer of Health, local Doctors, practising Midwives, and representatives of the Hospitals and Welfare Centres working in Islington. The Committee is to meet quarterly and it is much hoped that benefit will result to the mothers of Islington, especially at the time of childbirth.

The Sun Babies' Nursery has co-operated with us in a very helpful way since October, by taking two of our Student Pupils each morning to give them practical training with babies. This, together with the work at the Centre and lectures of our Superintendent, gives our Student Pupils of fourteen and fifteen years old a valuable training which fits them to take up any kind of Nursery work.

In October, as an experimental measure of economy, we asked the Doctors of one of our Canonbury Consultations and of our Rose Branch Ante-Natal Consultations to consent to our reducing these from two hours to one hour, while the number of mothers and children attending made this possible. They kindly agreed to this, but the numbers at the Canonbury Consultations have now increased so much that we have been obliged, since the end of the year, to restore the two-hour sessions there.

We have had four Lantern Lectures during the year at the Centre and Rose Branch, provided by the National Clean Milk Association and by the United Dairies.

Through the generosity of a friend, we have had a series of Cookery Demonstrations to help the mothers with their housekeeping and cooking. Varied and economical dishes are demonstrated each time and recipes are distributed. This experiment has proved very popular.

COMMITTEE AND STAFF.

It is with great sorrow that we have to record the death this April of Miss Maude Ismay, who had been a member of our Committee and a devoted worker at the Centre for the last eight years. For the last three years she had undertaken the Treasurership of Clephane Cottage, which involved a monthly visit to the Cottage and much work at home. She endeared herself to her colleagues and to many of the mothers, and will be greatly missed.

We received with great regret the resignation of our Dentist, Mr. Leonard Attkins. Mr. Attkins advised us on the organisation and equipment of our Dental Department when it was started in 1921 and has given unstinted work ever since. He never hesitated to see the mothers at the Royal Northern Hospital or at his house when necessary, and inspired them with much confidence.

We have been fortunate in securing as his successor Miss Davy, who has had much experience of similar work, and we are glad that we still have the services of Mrs O'Dwyer Kennedy, who has been our Anæsthetist since 1922.

Our friends will be interested to hear that Dr. Helen Mackay, who has been on the Staff since 1924, has been appointed as the first woman Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, in recognition of her research work on children's diets. We offer her our hearty congratulations on this well-deserved honour.

We are happy to report that we have had no changes in our Medical and Nursing Staff. Miss Batty, our Superintendent, has now had a full year's work in charge of the Centre, and we feel the benefit of her excellent powers of organisation and her sympathy with the mothers. We still have with us many of the same Voluntary Workers who have given us regular help for many years, and have been glad to welcome a number of new recruits. A special word of thanks is due to Mr. Broad for all the expert help he gives us by keeping our accounts, and to Miss Parker who keeps our records with such care and accuracy.

CONVALESCENCE.

Seventy-four mothers and babies went to Clephane Cottage for a fortnight's convalescence this year, and eight mothers and babies went away through the Women's Holiday Fund. It is satisfactory that these mothers are able to have such a rest and change during the time they are nursing their babies.

At the beginning and end of the season a few mothers who are quite unable to make other arrangements for the ex-baby are allowed to go to Flamstead with two children.

In a number of cases we have been able to send the mother and baby to Flamstead, while the toddler between three and five years old is away at Miss Fleetwood's Home at the seaside. These toddlers usually return much better, both in health and training, and the mother is refreshed and able to cope with the family.

Sixty-seven children went to Miss Fleetwood's Home for four weeks, or, in some cases, for six weeks. A rosy-cheeked youngster was lately seen at the Centre on her return, and the mother said: "She now eats all the things she used to refuse, and has learnt to dress herself." This was one among many tributes paid by the mothers to Miss Fleetwood's skill and to the special gift she has for the training and care of children.

FINANCE.

Last year we were in the unhappy position of spending £250 more than our income. We therefore made every possible economy, large and small, and we have also made numerous calls on the good-will of all our friends in our special efforts to collect more money.

Our activities have been seriously hampered during the last two years by the fact that, although certain cinema corporations have very kindly continued to give us a grant from their Sunday takings, the amount has been reduced by £200 since 1932. In consequence of this the Conjoint Committee of the four Islington Centres appealed to the Borough Council for extra help, and they were good enough to respond to the appeal by making a special grant for one year of £600 to the four Centres, of which our share was £120.

This special grant, together with our other efforts, has enabled us to cover our expenses and to reduce our debt from over £1,600 to £1,500, of which £671 7s. 7d. is in the form of an overdraft at our bank and the rest is in temporary loans without interest kindly made by friends of the Centre.

We tender our very warm thanks to the Islington Borough Council and to our other friends, and hope that they will enable us to continue our efforts until our debt has been overcome, and our finances are once more in a sound condition.

Our largest voluntary contribution has again come through the kindness of the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society, who allowed us to participate in their "Help Yourself" scheme. This brought us in £455. This money was obtained by the hard work of all those who sold Annuals for us, chief among whom were Mr. Hawkins and his friends. To the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society and to all our helpers we offer our grateful thanks. Unfortunately there was a serious drop of £100 in our receipts from this source, and we very much hope that some new friends will volunteer for this arduous but helpful work, and so enable us again to increase our total receipts.

The Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society again kindly allowed us to sell seats and to benefit from one of their excellent performances. From "Eight Bells" we realised the sum of £20 2s. od.

Another dramatic performance for which we were very kindly allowed to sell seats for our own benefit was the "No Trumpers", and from this we had help to the extent of f_{25} . Our warm thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. John Cohen and to the other performers.

Not content with all these efforts, we approached the National Sunday League, and they were kind enough to allow us to have the use of the Palladium on Sunday, 3rd December. We then asked our warm friend, Mrs. H. V. Esmond (Eva Moore), who consented to be Hostess for the performance and was indefatigable in our aid. She gathered a brilliant company of artistes, we again appealed to our faithful supporters, and the result was a gain to the Centre of no less than £216 18s. 11d. We

should like to express sincere gratitude to the National Sunday League, to Mrs. Esmond, and to all the artistes who combined to make the matinee such a success.

We have one more special effort to record with gratitude—the gift of a beautiful evening coat from Mr. Reville Terry, which enabled us to realise the sum of £33 12s. od. The money from this gift was specially allocated to defray the cost of substituting electric light for oil lamps at our Convalescent Cottage for Mothers and Babies at Flamstead.

The above list does not exhaust all the help we have received, but it does serve to show how nobly our friends have rallied to our help in our special efforts to convert our deficit into a balance.

We also wish to thank other institutions and individuals who have co-operated with us and helped our work, especially

- The Gaumont British Picture Corporation and The Provincial Cinematograph Corporation for their kindness in nominating us to receive grants from their Sunday Performances.
- Lady Waley Cohen for the two delightful Garden Parties she gave at her house for our two Branches.
- Miss Fleetwood for the splendid and arduous work she has done for our toddlers at her Cottage Home. Mrs. Farquharson and Mrs. Johnson for contributing to the fund which enabled the children, however poor, to go to the Home.
- Dr. Jurin Totton and Dr. Colin Philip for the professional services they gave respectively to the two Convalescent Homes.
- Miss Dyne for the help she kindly gave us as House Property Manager of our Flat at the Rose.
- The Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Officials for their cooperation and assistance.
- The Islington Branch of the Invalid Kitchens' Association. They supplied excellent dinners at a very low cost for our Nursing and Expectant Mothers.
- The Almeric Paget Massage Corps, who gave artificial sunlight and massage treatment to all the mothers and children recommended to them by our doctors.
- The Women's Holiday Fund, the Invalid Children's Aid Association, The North London Nursing Association, the Islington Branch of the Charity Organisation Society for their co-operation.
- Our Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Fuller, Wise, Fisher & Co., who so kindly audit the accounts of all our activities.

DOCTORS' REPORTS

MOTHERS' CONSULTATIONS.

We are able to report another year of successful work in the Mothers' Consultations.

The mothers themselves continue to encourage us in our work by their appreciation. We could not continue to be efficient without their co-operation in attending regularly and punctually; it is very rare for a mother not to keep the appointment given to her.

A large number of cases have been seen and many abnormalities—major and minor—have been diagnosed and dealt with in the appropriate manner, and in this way much preventive work has been done.

Altogether we can look back on the year's work with satisfaction, and hope for the continuance of a valuable contribution towards the reduction of maternal mortality and morbidity.

We have also been able to relieve many disabilities occurring in women after confinement in the post-natal branch of the Clinic. This is a most important factor in restoring the patients to normal health, and it is one which is often neglected.

The mothers speak very highly of the benefit received from a rest at Clephane Cottage and return full of praise for the kindness experienced there. It is a great boon to have a Home of this kind of our very own.

We owe a debt of gratitude to the Nursing Staff for the generous and loyal way in which they have helped us throughout the year.

CHILDREN'S CONSULTATIONS.

The work of the Clinics has gone on smoothly and happily, and results have been encouraging.

Nowadays, topics of health are discussed widely by wireless, press, and cinema, and there is no doubt that many mothers take a more critical interest than before in their children's development. They point out possible defects to us, and watch carefully for peculiarities in growth and movement. On psychological points, too, the parents have increased their knowledge. One mother asked how her boy could "exercise his Ego"—a difficult question to answer with a family of four living in two cramped rooms of a house whose other occupants resented any noise.

There are still many children coming from bad, crowded, expensive accommodation with little air and light and often no place for outdoor sleep or play. Babies living in basements do not long keep up with others of their age in appearance and general progress.

It is still common to find overclothing of babies and children. Another garment is added every time a child catches cold, and none are shed all the winter. The result is a minimum of skin ventilation for the catarrhal child, who really needs it most.

In spite of drawbacks, however, it is satisfactory to look back and see that the work of the Centres has been of real use and had great appreciation among the mothers.
