in its place - I wanted to show  
what our ~~days~~ difficulties were  
and yet emphasise the encouraging  
hopeful features.

~~Thank you~~ you are not I trust  
overtired with your walk  
yesterday. I saw Mr Walter  
McEwen after we had disbanded  
he watched the Procession from

a window in St. James' Street & said  
it was undoubtedly the finest one  
there had been yet.

The crowd was certainly more  
sympathetic & I heard no requests  
for us to "go 'ome & mind the biley".

I left the Albert Hall at 9.15 & went in  
a motor bus up to Piccadilly. When  
we got to Sloane St. the procession  
was still winding its way along  
Knightsbridge ~~to~~<sup>and</sup> carriages with  
banners. - Our motor was turned  
down Sloane St. the crowd were  
so dense. The bandmen begged me  
to give them some of the little red  
white & green flap just for a moment  
than because we suppose this will  
be the last procession now before  
you ~~lose~~<sup>get</sup> the vote. -
