Dear Miss Mackay,

I understand Miss Roper has now sent you the final application to be allowed to send notices of the above meeting to the members. As there still is a little uncertainty about the details, they say

1. Miss Roper states definitely (Miss Palliser & she) that she fully intends to prevent any presentation of the case for militant tactics, at the meeting (she declares she would rather give it up entirely than that this should happen)
2. The Industrial element is, seen in the papers, to be represented chiefly by heads of labour ^{trades} & other such organisations. The original idea of bringing large numbers of Lancashire working women up is interposed with by the present cotton strike.
3. The High Schools have been approached, other L.C.C. Schools are receiving a letter revised by Miss Fawcett, who is offering them heads a free ticket each.
Hoping the London Society will be able to grant Miss Roper's request in the ^{best} _{most} ^{convenient} _{possible} way.
