I am so terribly busy. Otherwise

(I am in a position of a large school)

that I cannot devote as much time as I would like to the cause - yet many women are working steadily, and we hope that some Bill may be presented to our first Union Parliament. Certainly a petition signed by thousands of S.A. women went to the Convention and may have good results. One of the most energetic workers is a great friend of mine - a Miss Mollerkamp

of St-Georges St-Cape Town - If you would care to write to her - she could give you an idea of how the work is progressing. She was Sec^y I believe of our Enfranchisement League.

The terrible thing with us S.A. women - at least in Cape Colony is - that the coloured man has a vote and we have not. Regretting my inability to call & see you
