With reference to your letter forwarding the District magistrate's, Hooghly, letter in which he intimated to you the fact that he would come to Kamarkunder on the 16.10.14 to settle the question of the proposed removal of the present site of the Kamarkunder Station and asked you to arrange with me and Babu Hani Gopal Ghose, Govt. President of Gopalganj Panchayat Union, for our presence there to meet him, I beg to state that I could not attend the meeting, as I was away to an up country station for change. Why Babu N.G. Ghore did not write himself as to my supposed incivility, and in what way your intimacy with the late Sir, W. A. Dring K.C.I.E. affects this matter, I am at a loss to know.

Dear Sir,

I was greatly surprised to learn from your letter of the 22nd inst. that Babu Nani Gopal Ghore considers that I treated him ~~with~~ discourteously during his visit to Kamarkunder on the 16th October, as I certainly had no such intention, and was quite unaware, until I received your letter, that he was aggrieved at anything which occurred on that occasion.

I wrote to Babu N.G. Ghore, in the same terms as those of my letter No. 7965 of 11/10/14 to you, asking him to attend at my office on the 16th. He unfortunately failed to intimate his presence to me while Mr. Prentice was here, and although I enquired for him, it was not until Mr. Prentice had left that he made himself known to me, and that I was aware of his arrival. I then informed him that the matter had already been discussed, and that it had been decided that the present station site was to be retained.

I am exceedingly sorry that Babu N.G. Ghore did not let me know of his arrival, and that he was in consequence kept waiting outside my office instead of being invited to join in the discussion, which of course he would have been if I had known that he was present.

I am very much obliged to you for bringing this matter to my notice, and since you must be aware, from your intimate acquaintance with the late Sir W.A. Dring, that it is not the practice of Officers of the East Indian Railway to offer discourtesy to gentlemen of the position of Babu N.G. Ghore, I trust that you will be able to convince him that none was intended in this instance.
