

RECENT NEWS.

The Vicar took his spring medicine of a visit for eleven days to the English Lakes on April 30th. The weather was rather bad, but he had one or two good climbs. A good deal of snow was still upon the higher mountains.

The last "Popular Evening" of the season was held on April 23rd, when the Entertainment was given by the Sunday School, under the arrangement of Mr. E. J. Bishop. The address on "David and Goliath" was given by Mr. P. Freke; and both he and Mr. Bishop were suitably thanked by the Vicar. Present, 191.

The season terminated with the largest attendance of the year, some 500, more or less, managing to cram themselves into the Institute on the occasion of the Band of Hope Entertainment. The first part consisted of living pictures, and the second part of an operetta, in which the children acquitted themselves most creditably. In accordance with the express wish of Miss

Luckhurst, no votes of thanks were given, but she, and all those who worked so hard and gave up so much time, as well as the actual performers, deserve very great praise for their successful work, and thoroughly earned the thanks of the whole parish.

The Sunday School Cricket Club has recommenced, and has opened the season well by gaining two successes. The first match was played at Clapham Common on May 5th. Score:—All Saints', 57; Crescent United, 46. The chief honours rested with S. R. Smith, 19 runs, and P. Freke, 12 runs; S. Rockell took five wickets for 21 runs.

On May 12th, they played against Starkie United at Raynes Park. Scores:—All Saints', 64; Starkie United, 26. E. Bishop made 42 not out, H. G. Elkington took six wickets for 10 runs, and J. Stevens three wickets for two runs.

In connection with the war in South Africa, we again had special services of intercession of Sunday, April 29, with suitable hymns. The Vicar preached in the morning from I Corinthians xv., 25, on the certainty that the Lord Jesus is reigning now, amid all the changes and chances of this life; and in the evening from James v., 16, upon the greatness of the force of prayer in the affairs of this life, when rightly used; at 8.30 p.m. he preached again, to men only, from Luke x., 42, upon the words "One thing is needful"; there was also a good attendance at the Holy Communion at 4.5 in the afternoon.

RELIEF OF MAFEKING.

The news reached London on Friday, May 18th, that Mafeking had been relieved. It came through Boer sources, and was not officially confirmed until the following Monday; but caused intense satisfaction here and throughout our country and colonies. The story of Mafeking is so interesting, and is likely to stand out so permanently in history, that we give, in hopes that it may be useful to our readers, some notes of the Vicar's sermon on the subject on the morn-

ing of Sunday, May 20th. Taking from the Gospel for this day his text (John xvi., 32) he spoke to the following effect:-The relief of Mafeking (although not yet confirmed) is to-day in the thoughts of every one of us The greatest interest is felt in its heroic defenders throughout the civilised world; and the greatest admiration is expressed for them and their gallant chief. The one point which attracts us all is their indomitable pluck. This is conspicuous owing to the following circumstances: they were few against many; their foe was brave, wily, treacherous and relentless; they had few and simple weapons and defences to oppose to the best modern weapons; they suffered from short allowance of food, and from the ravages of disease in their confined quarters; the siege was prolonged beyond all their or our expectations; they were alone, cut off by enormous distances from our forces; they were unselfish, each caring for all, the weak, the young, the helpless natives, were all fed and provided for; they were cheerful, hopeful, and enduring, and never lost faith that at last we should come to their rescue.

It is such a combination of points, the having all of them together, that makes their courage so admirable! so astonishing! It is quite true that in enduring the siege they were best serving their own interests and injuring those of the enemy; they were moved with loyalty to their own country and friends; they were pursuing the path of glory; and they had not expected or volunteered for their long privations; but all this still leaves their display of courage as quite the most remarkable scene in this terrible war.

To us, to our colonies, and to the civilised world, it has been indeed a display—Mafeking is the stage, the world the theatre, in which this drama by heroes has been acted; while we at our ease have watched and listened and waited. For our race the interest has been supreme, for it is British pluck on which we have gazed. And now, it seems, the play is done; Mafeking is relieved, and the reward is won.

When we try to follow out the story of the courage of Jesus, our great Leader and Captain, I cannot doubt that, if our hearts be true and we be not bent upon sin, we shall fall down before Him with the outburst of deepened conviction and worship "My Lord! and my God!" and that in giving Him the tribute and crown of our love and devotion and lives, we shall esteem it as nothing at all when weighed with His infinite, His adorable, courage, endurance, and love.

ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF ALMS.

The difficulties of wisely giving alms are very great, and call for a Christian's prayer, insight, and common sense. Alms often foster idleness, lies, and hypocrisy; and discourage industry, thrift, and good management, and create jealousies; however carefully they are distributed.


In administering alms from the offertory, the Vicar gives to a few aged people a small weekly allowance of food; sometimes he gives to the sick a single gift, or helps convalescents to get change of air; and at Christmas he distributes a considerable sum in coals and flannel. These alms he almost always gives, after consulting the District Visitors concerned, and through their hands. But he takes the sole final responsibility for these alms upon his own shoulders, and, notwithstanding all his pains, he no doubt often makes mistakes.

The District Visitors, on the other hand, also gives alms out of the District Visitors' Fund (an account of which, as of the offertory, is to be found in our annual parish reports). For these alms they use their own sole discretion, never consulting the Vicar

about them. This plan cultivates in them a sense of their own serious responsibility in this difficult matter. The Vicar only suggests (with no controlling voice) which districts do not require to share in this fund, and advises beginners in the work, and occasionally consults with the Treasurer as to the several proportions in which the District Visitors (according to the poverty of their districts) should draw upon the fund. He also undertakes that the Treasurer shall not be out of pocket at the end of any year, by supplying any deficiency from funds under his own control.

But he thinks that as the District Visitors' Fund is, and, in his opinion, should be, used at the sole personal discretion of the District Visitors, it ought to be supported by the donations of its friends, and ought not as a rule to come upon public funds, such as the offertory, for its support. The District Visitors' Fund is badly off at present, old subscribers have removed or died; and new subscriptions would be welcomed, which may be sent to the Treasurer, Mrs. Dawson, "Zinal," Palace Road, Streatham Hill.

The Vicar begs the honest and industrious poor also to help the District Visitors and himself in their difficult task, by doing all they can to promote a healthy public opinion on the subject among their neighbours, and by bringing up their children to see plainly how disgraceful a thing is deceit in this matter, how grievous a wrong it inflicts on the honest, and how very seriously its existence diminishes the flow of gifts which would otherwise freely pass from the richer of GoD's children to their poorer neighbours in times of accident, illness, old age, and bereavement. There can be no doubt that many genuine cases of need go unhelped, not through any lack of kindness of the richer, but simply through the difficulties created by the meanness and hypocrisy of the professed but sham needy; while these gain so little, so very little, for the sale of their character and conscience and self-respect, in the shilling or two for which they sell them!



My DEAR FRIENDS,

For the eighteenth time I have the pleasure of presenting you with my Annual Report. It compares favourably in almost every respect with previous ones. Notwithstanding the migration of many old friends to other neighbourhoods, almost all the Societies show a balance to the good, while the roll of Communicants is as high as any in the last few years, and the number of those who have been baptised and confirmed exceed any previous record.

The sum total of voluntary gifts is necessarily less, owing to the fact that there has been no special work commenced or completed as has been the case in almost every year since I have been privileged to minister amongst you. Indeed, with the exception of the Tower, I am thankful to say there are no building operations in front of us.

CHURCH WORK.

Sacra-ments and Services. has slightly increased, a proof, I trust, of the growing steadfastness of many of you in the grace of true religion. The clergy, however, have sometimes to note with sadness the falling away of some who used to be most regular in their attendance at the Altar. Some who used to come to our Communicants' Services seldom, if ever, come now. Holidays or some other special circumstances have caused them to break through the good habit, and the Festival of Easter alone seems to rouse them to a sense of their privileges. The same may in a measure be said of our congregations on Sunday. There is a want of regularity amongst strong and healthy people. Bad weather is, I fear, often welcomed as an excuse for non-attendance at Church. During the last year we have suffered much from wet Sundays, and these have told their tale. The congregations have been thinner than I have ever known them, and the strange fact about it all is that those who live but a short distance from the Church stay away, while those, who live a long way off, come. To my mind, what I have stated, points to a want of earnestness in religious matters, to a growing disregard of the Apostle's precept, applicable surely, I might say especially, to public worship on the Lord's Day-" not forgetting the assembling of ourselves together."

I feel it my duty in no complaining spirit, but in all Christian love to touch upon these facts, and to leave the consideration of them to those to whom they may apply.

As regards our Services generally I believe they are acceptable to the great body of worshippers. The musical portion of them if not elaborate, is well rendered, hearty and reverent, owing in no small measure to the untiring industry of our Organist of eighteen years' standing, and to those members of the Choir who so kindly and constantly give their help in leading the praises of God.

For further details as to the comparative results of our ministerial work, I would refer you to the Tabular Statement on page 4, by which you will be able to perceive an exact account of our whole situation and judge for yourselves.

At Christmas the Rev. P. Leith Tomkins severed his official connection with us, and is now in a more responsible sphere of work at Lewisham. His place is taken by the Rev. T. Pownall Owen, who is already known to some of you, and will, I am sure, be cordially welcomed by you all. My old and valued colleague, the Rev. S. G. J. Allnutt, has entered upon the sixth year of his ministry here as Senior Assistant Curate.

As I indicated in my last Report this has not proved attractive as a place of worship, and I accordingly think it advisable to abandon it as such, and to keep the principal room for the use of the members of the Working Men's Slate Club, for Bible Classes, and other occasional meetings. In lieu of the Services here, we propose to hold at stated times Services in the Parochial Hall. The Rev. S. G. J. Allnutt conducted a most successful series of Lantern Services during Advent, which were largely attended, and I have great hopes that such, periodically given, may prove a greater lever towards Church-going on the part of our poorer brethren than any other means we may adopt.

The Building, as stated last year, is useful for other things. The upper rooms, not only afford living accommodation for the Assistant Nurse and her aged mother, but form an admirable centre for the Parish Nurse to keep all articles that are required for the sick room. As regards financial matters I am sorry to say that the deficit of last year has not yet been replaced by a balance to the good, and I am the unfortunate Treasurer.

PASTORAL WORK.

In the earlier months of last year there was less call for relief than usual, but the immense amount of sickness during the latter months caused a heavy drain upon our resources.

Fortunately we have been able to meet it, and close with a balance to the good. In view, however, of the ravages of influenza, I am afraid that by the time you get this Report this will probably be exhausted. During the year £3 9s. 4d. was spent in wine and brandy; 989 relief tickets given; 337 pints of beef tea distributed; and £10 18s. 6d. expended in sending convalescent cases to Bath, Droitwich, and the sea side.

Besides gifts in clothes £82 16s. 6d. was sent in cash. Of this sum £43 10s. 9d. was spent in helping 98 families (a few terrible cases of illness I relieved with substantial gifts of money), and the balance transferred to the credit of the District Visiting Society.

There has been a great deal of illness in the parish, and several trying cases of cancer and consumption involving an unusual amount of attention and care. Consequently Nurse Marion and her Assistant, Miss Warsley (who, I am glad to say, has proved herself a very able and useful ally), have made between three and four thousand visits during the past year. It is a wonder to me how the parish existed so long without a resident Nurse. She is not only a helper of the poor, but in many indirect ways she assists the clergy in their ministrations, and I cannot ask you to support an institution which, I honestly believe, is more beneficial in every way. Owing to the successful Sale of Work conducted by the Ladies' Working Party, I am happy to say that the funds shew a large balance to the good, and if the subscriptions amount to as much as those of last year, we shall have enough to carry us along for some months to come.

These have been well attended, and are almost selfsupporting. I must express my regret, and I am sure that of all the members that we shall soon lose the help of Mrs. Leith Tomkins, who has taken so much interest in this and other works in the parish. Her loss will be a real one, and while lamenting her departure I can only wish her God speed in the good work which she is sure to undertake in some other neighbourhood.

Maternity Thirty-six married women have during the past year availed themselves of the benefits of this Society.

Eight hundred and sixty-nine garments have been sold, Society. and 143 women employed during the past twelve months. I am sorry to see that the subscriptions have fallen off, upon which alone the Society has to depend for paying its workers. The demands amongst poor women for earning a little in this way are very great, but the Society is obliged to "cut its coat according to its cloth," and has accordingly been forced to refuse many applicants for work, whom otherwise it would have been only too glad to have employed.

The Hall is in a flourishing condition. We have been fortunate in letting it very well, and the few, who have kindly kept up their subscriptions, have enabled the Treasurer to show a balance to the good. I am sorry to say we are losing as Treasurer, the valuable help of Mr. G. J. Green, who has shown his interest in the Hall for some years past, and done a considerable amount of detail work in connection with it. Major-General Gifford has kindly promised to take his place, and I trust, that under his management, matters will be carried on as happily and satisfactorily as heretofore.

The deposits collected by the District Visitors amounted to £461 10s. 9d., and the bonus paid on such £43 11s. 2d. The Balance Sheet on page 26 will show you the various details. There is a slight deficit. May I ask for increased subscription for a Society which helps the poor in the best way, viz., by making them help themselves?

Blanket Fund.

One hundred and sixty-nine blankets have been lent to 92 families.

Some 200 working men belong to this. The weekly payment is 6d., and several have received as their right in times of illness 10s. a week. The share-out at Christmas was larger than it has ever been before, viz., £1 3s. 9d. per member.

As I intimated last year this has done its work. The opening of the Public Library and the establishment of Children's Libraries at the two large Board Schools supply all that is needed in the way of literature. I have accordingly handed over the slight balance in hand to the Mission Room, which, amongst our institutions, was mostly in need of help, and propose to give the books to some poor parish situated in the destitute parts of the Diocese.

Work in connection with Temperance has been chiefly confined to the members of our Band of Hope. The "Improvement Classes," conducted by Mr. Way, have proved a great success, and the children seem to be interested in them. It is impossible to talk about Temperance every week, but we occasionally have a meeting for that purpose, when the advisability of Total Abstinence for Young People is urged, and the virtues of moderation and self-control inculcated. I wish we could find some kind friend enthusiastic in the "Temperance Cause" to revive the work, which, I fear, is greatly needed, not only amongst the men, but also amongst the women of our parish.

It is a great satisfaction to me to be able to report that I never knew the Schools in better order or in a greater state of efficiency. This is mainly owing to Mr. Ravenhill, to whom we owe a debt of gratitude, for the interest he has taken in the Schools as Superintendent. His labours would be greatly lessened were he always sure the Teachers would attend regularly, or if unable to be present on a given Sunday would let him know early in the previous week. In saying this I do not wish to undervalue the services of our Sunday School Teachers. When many of you are comfortably seated at your firesides they are labouring in the Word and Doctrine, and endeavouring to fulfil the Master's Commission to His Church-" Feed My Lambs." We still want more (at least eight) of these self-denying men and women, and I only wish I could get a few of the younger people I see before me on Sunday to come and help us in this way.

Miss Mickley has kindly undertaken to conduct the Young Men's Bible Class on Sunday afternoons at the Mission Room. I have great hopes that many of the lads who have been under her influence in the first-class at the Sunday School, and have outgrown that stage, will join, and that she will have a large and interesting class.

The Rev. S. G. J. Allnutt is thinking of reviving the Young Women's Bible Class at the same place on some weekday afternoon or evening. Any who have young Domestic Servants, whom they would like to join, should communicate with him.

I must congratulate the members of the Working Party on the result of the Sale of Work held in aid of the Parish Nurse Fund. The Sale realised the large sum of £87, and when we consider that this was the outcome of some £18 spent in materials, we can understand the taste that must have been displayed in the choice of patterns, &c., and the amount of work that must have been bestowed on the various articles. The Ladies' Working Party seems to thrive notwithstanding the lapse of years since it was started. The members are most united, and I take the opportunity of expressing my sense of the valuable help they have constantly rendered, not only to the Parish, but also to the Diocese, in the amount of money they have been the means of raising for various objects, both here and elsewhere.

One hundred and sixty-four garments were made during the year, and sent to the poor parishes of Camberwell and South Wimbledon.

The Branch of the League in connection with our Parish Minister is not as flourishing as it was. Children grow up and cease Children's League. to be members, and their places are not taken by others. I am afraid many of our well-to-do brethren do not grasp the objects of the League, or they would encourage their little ones to belong to it. The main intention is to teach children to be thoughtful for others. No better virtue or one more in

keeping with the example of "The Friend of Little Children" can be implanted in young hearts than that of unselfishness. This the League fosters by encouraging its members to give some of their pence to support the Cot at the Home for Destitute Children at Ottershaw, and to make useful and pretty things which are sent to brighten up the inmates of our Hospitals and Workhouses. If any parents wish to know more about the principles and methods of the League, I will refer them to the General Secretary of the Clapham Common Branch, the Rev. S. G. J. Allnutt, who will give them all information. In a district which includes so many young families there ought to be at least a hundred members, which number might be easily doubled.

SUPPORT OF THE CHURCH BOTH AT HOME AND ABROAD.

Outside Help.

Our gifts to outside objects have surpassed those of last year. I am glad to record this, as a narrow parochialism is the bane of the Church of England, and we are apt to forget that we belong, not only to one particular Parish, or even to one Diocese, but to the Church of our Lord, established throughout the world. To be mindful of this fact is an incentive to us all to realise our membership in the Body of Christ, and to reflect upon the statement of S. Paul that "If one member suffer all the members suffer with it." To relieve this suffering, whether physical or spiritual, is the privilege of all according, as God has endowed us with great or little wealth.

In keeping with these remarks it is satisfactory to report that £71 is. 7d. was sent to the Hospitals through the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, and £48 igs. 8d. to the spiritually destitute of South London, through the channels of the Rochester Diocesan Society and the South London Police Court Mission.

Foreign

As regards Foreign Missions we have contributed £25, chiefly to Missionary Work at Delhi, in which we, as a Parish, are more particularly interested. But besides money

intercessory prayer is needed for those who are still "lying in darkness," and I am grieved to notice the apparent failure of what I had hoped would have been a bulwark of strength in this direction, viz., "The Missionary Guild." The members seem sadly to forget the service on the first Wednesday Evening in each month.

CONCLUSION.

I have endeavoured to keep this Report to the details of our Parish Work, and have purposely avoided referring to the troubles which have beset both Church and State during the last few months. But I cannot be unmindful of them, and as we enter upon another year let us pray that God may direct all things to a right and lasting issue. The year is pregnant with events of the greatest importance. As Citizens, therefore, let us all strive to be found loyal, dutiful, patriotic. As Churchmen let us pray to be kept humble, faithful, consistent. And if it please our Heavenly Father that we reach the close of the year in peace and prosperity, to His Name alone, we will ascribe the praise and glory.





CLAPHAM RECTORY. June 26th, 1900.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The observance of our Dedication Festival has marked the completion of another year of our Church life. Such a time is an occasion both for humble thankfulness to Almighty God for His many blessings. to us as a congregation and a Parish, and is also a reminder of the great responsibility that rests upon us as to the use of those blessings, or of our failure to use them aright. "Unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required." The chief feature of the Festival, this year, was its close, when we observed not only the octave of our own Festival, but also the beginning of the 200th year of the great Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. In the morning a most interesting and able sermon was preached by the Bishop, and sermons no less interesting and able, by Canon Gore, at the Men's Service, and in the evening. The offertories throughout the day were given to the Bi-centenary Fund of the S.P.G., and amounted to £29 4s. At the Children's Flower Service on Trinity Sunday, a great number of very beautiful pot plants were offered, and were afterwards sent to the North London Fever Hospital, The Deaconess Institution (for the Poor of Battersea), the Hostel for the Dying, and to our own Sick Poor. Our Children's Orchestra added to the brightness of this service by playing the accompaniment of the hymns, and at the closing services of the Festival, the combined Men's and Children's Orchestra accompanied the canticles, hymns and Festal Te Deum. It is a great credit to all concerned that we should be able to mark our greater Festivals by such orchestral music.

On another page will be found a communication from the Churchwardens, which will be read with interest by all members of the Parish Church congregation, whether seatholders or not. As I mentioned from the pulpit on Sunday morning last, the population of Clapham has grown considerably during the past few years, and is still growing, and the seating accommodation at the Parish Church is not now equal to the demands made upon it; the Churchwardens are most anxious, and so am I, to do all in our power to find room for those who desire to attend the Parish Church; it seems hard that there should often be many vacant seats, and yet at the same time many people wanting seats, some of whom are kept away from Church because they dread the painful possibility of being turned out of seats to which they have been shewn. This I regret to say has occasionally happened, and has been the cause of much bitterness of feeling.

I appeal, then, to the seatholders, as I appealed on Sunday, to do all in their power to help the Churchwardens—(i.) by coming to Church five minutes before the actual hour of service; (ii.) by welcoming strangers into their pews whenever there is room; (iii.) by letting the Churchwardens know, as far as possible, when they are likely to be away from Church.

The old tradition of jealous sensitiveness as to the rights of seatholders is surely as unchristian as it is unlovely; we may be deeply thankful that it is steadily giving place to a healthier, kindlier, and more Christian attitude of mind. I do most earnestly ask all who are FOURTEENTH

seatholders to take my words in good part, and to give the aid I have ventured to suggest. One great gain to be attained by the enlargement of the Church will be that by it some 120 seats will be added to the accommodation on the ground floor, all of which will be free and unappropriated.

I very much hope that the effort now being made by some of the members of St. Saviour's congregation to maintain the Church House, will be successful; there ought really to be no difficulty in raising the money required, now that Mr. Franklin has been authorised to canvass for and collect subscriptions. Asking for money is not a task that many of us enjoy, and those who are earnest enough in the cause of the Church to undertake it, ought to

be encouraged in their good work.

I wish to remind all parents interested that there is a simple Service for Children held every Sunday at St Anne's Hall, at 10.45 a.m. This service takes the place of the morning Sunday School, and is intended both to instruct the children and to train them for the Church Service. The doors open at 10.30 a.m.


MINISTERING CHILDREN'S LEAGUE.

S. SAVIOUR'S CHURCH HOUSE.

A N important Meeting of the Subscribers to the Church House, was held on June 6th, to discuss the financial position of the Church House, and to decide whether it ought to be carried on after the end of this year. Amongst those present were the following:-Rev. W. M. Dingwall (Chairman), Dr. O. Codrington and Mr. H. Seccombe, (Churchwardens), Messrs. Mackenzie Evans, A. C. Bassett-Smith, T. T. Willcox, F. A. Keene, A. Bassett, T. Evans, T. Turner, J. Turner, T. Colley, W. Oxer, A. Nash, E. Nash, H. Franklin, W. Such, E. J. Dorrell, S. Swift, and others.

The Rector was prevented through illness from being present, but sent the following letter which was read to the meeting:

CLAPHAM RECTORY, June 6th. 1900.

DEAR DINGWALL.

It is with more than regret that I write to say I shall not be able to come to the meeting to-night, but as I know quite well what I meant to say at the meeting, I think I can put it as clearly in a letter as viva voce.

- 1.—To attempt to carry on the Church House under present conditions is, I think, indeed I am convinced, a hopeless task, and much as I should regret to give it up, my voice would be distinctly in favour
- 2.—But if, as I gathered from Mr. Franklin in a conversation I had with him on Sunday week, he would be prepared to assist Dr. Codrington by: (1)—Seeing that all promised subscriptions are punctually paid; (2)—By energetically canvassing for fresh subscriptions, large and small; and if Dr. Codrington is prepared to accept this help, and the meeting thinks there is a reasonable hope that thus the income and expenditure could be made to balance, then I would definitely give my voice in favour of the experiment being tried.

3.—But even if the income should be brought up to the point of equalling the expenditure, there will still remain the responsibility as to the existing debt.

4.-Further, I am strongly of opinion that all connected with the House should consider it a point of honour not to allow the Treasurer to be in the position-the chronic position-of having to make good even temporarily, so considerable (or indeed any) deficit out of his own

5.—If then the Subscribers and Committee will brace themselves to face the situation and determine to keep the House going, I will gladly continue my subscription of two guineas, and will give £5 or if

necessary £10 towards the liquidation of the debt, but if they feel that they cannot do this, then the sooner the House is given up the better.

6.—It must, in coming to a decision, be remembered that the House is a very convenient one for the Verger to live at, and also the Curate in Charge if an unmarried man.

I shall be interested to hear the decision arrived at. It is for the meeting and not for me to say finally what shall be done.

Yours very sincerely. CHAS. P. GREENE."

The Chairman said he quite agreed with the Rector that a crisis had now arrived when some decided action should be taken, either to place the Church House on a sound financial basis, or to close it altogether. The former was much to be desired, but the great difficulty in the past in raising the necessary funds for its maintenance, caused the few who had regularly done their utmost to hesitate. He hoped they would, however, not withdraw their support, but increase it, as from the Rector's letter there seemed some reasonable hope of success in the future. To close the Church House would mean a serious loss to him and the spiritual work of S. Saviour's.

Dr. Codrington said he was quite willing to continue to act as Treasurer, feeling that the loss to the Church would be most serious if the House were given up, and welcomed with pleasure the offer of Mr. Franklin as Collector. He would like to see all the members of the congregation taking their share of the responsibility in this work, this done, the future of the Church House would be secured.

Mr. Franklin thanked the meeting for the confidence placed in him. and stated that in the course of the year he would appeal to every member of the congregation for a Subscription, large or small, he felt sure they all valued the work being done at the Church House The liberal support given by the congregation to the Choir Fund, of which he had been Treasurer for some years past, encouraged the hope that they would not disregard his appeal in aid of the S. Saviour's Church House.

CHOIR FUND.

MR. T. TURNER, 1, Sugden Road, Clapham Common, has undertaken the office of Hon. Treasurer of "St. Saviour's Choir Fund" in succession to Mr. Franklin who has been appointed Hon. Collector to assist Dr. Codrington in raising the necessary Funds to carry on the "St. Saviour's Church House" which for some years past has caused great anxiety to those responsible for its maintenance.



The foregoing Accounts are required by law to be made up to Easter in each year—they are therefore about a year old by the time they appear in the Annual Report. This, however, is not of great consequence, as the information given in the statement for any year may be taken to represent any other year with but little variation. The income on the Church Account is derived mainly from Pew Rents, and almost wholly absorbed in salaries and other fixed and necessary expenses. The income on the Charities Account consists of the proceeds of certain bequests, the manner of its distribution is determined in each case by conditions laid down by the donor.

With regard to Pew Rents, the Churchwardens take the opportunity of stating that the charge for each sitting in any part of the ground floor is 26s. a year. In the galleries, the charge is from 21s. to 9s. a year. As a rule there are no sittings vacant in the middle aisle; when any become so, there are generally seat holders in the side aisles who wish to be transferred to the middle, and of course they have the preference. A careful record is kept by the Churchwardens of applications for sittings or for transfer to other positions, and all are attended to as opportunities offer. Applications may be made at any time personally or in writing to the Churchwardens.

REPORT.

It is a matter for congratulation that our Schools still maintain their high condition of efficiency, as will be seen from the following Reports of H.M. Inspector of Schools:—

"Boys' School.—This School is most successfully conducted, and good, sound work is done throughout."

"Girls' School.—The work is admirably done, and the influence exerted is excellent."

"Infants' School.—This School is carried on in a lively and vigorous manner. The teachers are zealous and painstaking, and the children are very happy and attentive to their work."

Another practical testimony of the excellence of the teaching is the fact that two London County Council Scholarships were gained during the year—one by George Hudson, of the Boys' School, and the other by Ada Hillier, of the Girls' School.

Notwithstanding, however, the excellence of the Schools, and their most careful management, it will be seen that at the close of the School Year there was a deficit of £73 15s. 5d.

Recent legislation has undoubtedly done something towards maintaining the existence of voluntary schools, but it is based upon the principle of helping those who help themselves. The Managers desire strongly to impress upon their fellow-parishioners the importance of supporting these Institutions, so vital to the future well-being of the Parish.

The various agencies carried on under St. Anne's House are as follows, viz.:—(a) the General Fund for the Relief of the Sick Poor; (b) the Poor Relief Committee; (c) the Provident Fund; (d) the Maternal Society; (e) the Coal Club; (f) the Girls' Club; and (g) the Penny Bank.

THE GENERAL FUND.

This fund provides help for the Poor, within the Parish Church District, in time of sickness. Patients receive help for a fortnight on the certificate of a medical man, stating the nature of the case, and the kind of nourishment suited to it. The recommendation can be renewed for a longer period if necessary. By this means valuable aid towards recovery is given, which is far more useful than help in money would be. Well cooked food of the best quality (not prepared in the one room, in which, too often, the family live and all the household work has to be done) is a boon much appreciated by the sick and convalescent.

For furthering the purposes of the General Fund, hospital letters of all kinds are urgently needed, and will be thankfully received by the Clergy, or by Miss Green, at St. Anne's House.

ST. ANNE'S RELIEF COMMITTEE.

This Committee has been formed to ensure greater thoroughness in the administration of relief in the Parish. Its object is to provide a centre, round which all those who work among the poor may gather and consult together about the many difficult problems which arise in their visiting week by week. It is the constant aim of the Committee, in every case of distress which may come before it, to go to the root of the matter, and to remove the *cause* of distress. This is a far more difficult matter than people generally think, and demands a great deal more thought and patient loving effort than the mere giving of a sack of coal or a 2s. grocery ticket. But it is the only kind of relief that really helps, and is therefore worth the trouble. Real help is that which in some way *permanently* improves the condition of the recipients. This is the aim of the St. Anne's Relief

Committee, which has embodied the same in the following three principles:—

- To help the poor in the best way; therefore to aim at so helping them as to render them independent of help for the future, rather than to lead them to depend on Charity. For this purpose to deal thoroughly with all cases which are taken up.

 To co-operate as far as possible with the Guardians of the Poor, the School Board, and with all the charitable agencies of the poichbourhood.





Chats with the Clergy,

THE REV. F. A. ORMSBY, VICAR OF CHRIST CHURCH, CLAPHAM.

WHEN I called on the Vicar of Christ Church, Clapham, at the vicarage in Union Grove, I found him in the study, which has the reputation of being the largest private room in Clapham. The



'Eight hundred. It is entirely free and open. There is a good congregation, including a large number of outsiders. I always make a point of standing at the end of the church on Sunday evening, in order to speak to any who may desire to

"Are there any special services?"

"I think not. There is a daily celebration, and on Thursdays, at nine, there is one for children. On Sundays, at eleven, the celebration is choral. There is a mission service in the church ceptionally good, thanks to the enter. The music is exmaster and organist, Mr. George Way, and a large voluntary choir of gentlemen. But all the services were here when I came. I have neither added to nor taken away from them. We have everything in the church that can be desired."

"How about the schools?"

"As I mentioned, we have no building of our own. With the consent of the patron, I have given part of the glebe as the site for the new schools, and I have in hand, or promised, some 1200L, half of which was contributed through a parishioner. Among the donors are Sir Henry Irving and Mr. Toole, who is a friend of mine. I take a great interest in matters connected with the

What is the total sum required? What is the total sum required?

'About 2500l. Plans of the new buildings have passed the Education Department, but there is a difficulty in commencing operations. The glebs cannot, it seems, be conveyed to the Diocesan Board of Education until the buildings are completed. However, I am hopeful that this obstacle may be overcome. It is indispensable that we should have accommodation of our own. At present, we have only infants and girls in the schools. Although the existing building has been the only school-house from the time the late Vicar entered upon his duties, it is not at all adapted for the purpose.

'You will have boys when the new buildings are opened?'

'Yes, the new schools will be infants' and mixed. I feel sure that we shall get them in time. One immense advantage is that we are rich in respect to teachers. They are so good that I could not possibly say too much for them.'







Report for 1898.

DEAR PARISHIONERS & FRIENDS,

In presenting to you the Report of the Parish for 1898, it is well to begin with things we are thankful for. Our Congregations are still good. Our Communicants increase, but slowly. Our Sunday Schools are in a flourishing condition. Our Day Schools prosper.

The Bradley Abbot Memorial Vestry has been completed, the contract having been carried out by Messrs. Johnson & Co., Wandsworth, from the plans of G. Blizard, Esq., Architect, of Nicholas Lane, E. C.

The debt on the heating of the Church has been completely paid off, also the heavy expenses incurred in repairing the Church roof have been discharged with the exception of replacing the Crosses blown down by the recent gales.

I will now bring before you things that require special attention and monetary assistance.

The Churchwardens' Account, though fairly satisfactory, leaves a debt which I trust the readers of this Report will speedily remove. The Sacristy and the old Vestries have been renovated at a cost of about £25 which I hope someone will send me.

Of our Church Music and Choir I cannot say too much, nor can I speak too highly of the ability, diligence, and self-denying work of Mr. G. Way, our Choirmaster and Organist. A new piano was necessary for the training of the Choir, and surely those who appreciate and value our Services will enable me to pay off the balance of £25 due on this account.

Of my Assistant Clergy, the work they do speaks for itself. I believe every house in the Parish has been visited; our children, notwithstanding the sneers of a statesman, are taught the Catholic Faith. Our Sunday Schools are increasing. Our sick are ministered to, and it is the fault of any parishioner who does not come in touch with the clergy, who are ever at the service of those entrusted to their care. I must earnestly ask for new subscribers to help me to maintain the valuable services of my present colleagues, as, up to the present time, I have received no assistance from the Additional Curates' Society. Help towards this fund is now more than ever needed, as I am negociating for a new Mission Room in the very midst of our poor.

Money, towards our new Schools, comes in but slowly; during Lent I will issue a fresh appeal. All our other organizations are in a healthy condition, and to all the many workers with me in the Parish I tender my most heartfelt thanks. May I ask you, who read this Report, and who see your names recorded as subscribers, can you not do a little more to help me? And to you who look for your names in vain, whether parishioners or members of the congregation only, is it not your duty as a matter of Thanksgiving, to give something to help on God's work in such a poor and populous Parish. To my personal friends far away, outside the Parish, I am sincerely grateful for all they have done towards the support of our many charities.

"And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of His Grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."

HE following extract from a letter from Miss Bird, dated Ngogwe, E. E. Africa, April 14th, 1900, will be read with interest. We hope to welcome Miss Bird

home in a few weeks.

"Yokana, our boy, was married last Monday. The bull was killed early in the morning for the Native feast. We turned out the two sitting rooms and put down grass, mats, and skins, making them look as comfortable as possible. The bride came about one o'clock, and we gave her a white cloth to tie round her neck, and tied a handkerchief round her head; and I put some scent on her scarf. She evidently did not understand what it was, and licked it. After this we had prayer with her, and we went to Church. Another couple was married at the same time. Yokana chose two hymns, "All hail the power," and

" Jesus, Thine all victorious love." After the service we all came up here, and sat as many people as possible in the house. Some sat in the verandah, and others in groups in the courtyards. A great many women had cooked us baskets of plantains to eat with the meat. After we had feasted, they drank tea and mubisi (a kind of native lemonade). The bride and bridegroom then went off to their home under a white umbrella. This latter is considered the correct thing at a wedding, and must be obtained or borrowed from someone, if possible.

"We had very nice services on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, with Holy Communion, to which a very nice number came. Youasain, our native Curate, preached."
