The fee includes travel tickets (available for 33 days), second class throughout, Newhaven/Dieppe route, reservation of seats and conveyance across Paris on the outward journey, accommodation in Geneva and gratuities to servants. Accommodation will consist of bed, continental breakfast, luncheon and dinner, and will commence with breakfast on arrival at Geneva, July 27, and end after breakfast on Saturday, August 2.

First class travel throughout can be arranged for a supplementary charge. Small extra charges will be

made for the optional excursions during the week.

Hand luggage only should be taken on the journey. Heavy luggage can be registered at Victoria. Special labels will be provided. Members of the party will be responsible for their own luggage and for any gratuities to porters.

The Geneva School of International Studies

Teachers who are able to stay in Geneva for a second week are advised to join the Geneva School of International Studies. Professor Piaget, Professor of Psychology in the University of Geneva, will deliver a course of lectures (in French) on 'From the Individual to the Universal,' a study in genetic psychology. Professor J. Dover Wilson will lecture in English on 'The English Educational System.'

The School brings together a group of students, teachers and research workers from many countries, and a reduced fee of 25 Swiss Francs for the week's course is offered to Teachers who have attended the Geneva Institute of International Relations in the preceding week. Inexpensive accommodation can be arranged through the School.
