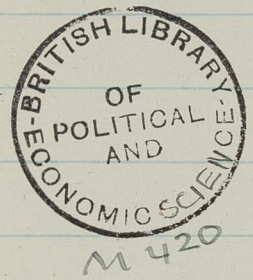

The **Convalescent Homes** are an untold boon to the poor, as on recovery from sickness, or when suffering from general ill-health, they get a time of quiet with fresh air and good food. Very many of the poor have been sent to different Homes, but they are especially indebted to the kindness of the Misses Parbury, who have received a great many from this Parish. Their Home used to be at Ware but it has now been moved to Felixstowe, where the patients get not only the advantage of change but of sea-air.

In the summer the Dock Strike brought an exceptional factor to bear on the question of relief. This is not the place either to describe the Strike or discuss its policy and result. I can only speak of it as it affected the work in the Parish. At the first idea that relief would be given, we had the whole parish on our hands. The Vestry was crowded. Many who had nothing to do with the Strike, whose work was in no ways affected, but who never did any work if they could help it, at once applied. They were told that no relief could be given in connection with the Strike, that the Strikes Committee had large sums at their disposal, and that they must apply to them. This at once disposed of a very large number, and, as far as my experience goes, relief or payment of some kind must have been made, for there was no great or general distress in the Parish. There were individual cases of great hardship, men who could not push their way amid the crowd of applicants; men who did not belong to the Union and so could get no relief; men whose work was affected by the Strike because the goods could not be landed. We tried to make out these cases as far as possible and give relief. Further, we had Breakfasts for the children

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so that they should not suffer, but, though tickets were freely given to those who applied and were in the parish, the number of children was not great, the first week, 88; the second, 88; the third, 66. Besides these Breakfasts in St. James' Schools, others were given in the Board Schools by the kindness of some of the Managers; but even then the number was not large.

Some of the changes brought about by the Strike are undoubtedly good, and ought to improve the position of the men, and since the Strike ended work has been plentiful and more money has been earned, but the result of good work and high wages has been a very great increase of drunkenness, more than there has been for a very long time past. The rules also laid down by the Union are often very arbitrary, and make it difficult for the steady men who do not care to be hampered by these rules to carry on their work, and they tend also to drive away much of the shipping from the ports. There is a general unsettled feeling which makes it evident that we are not done with the labour question, and if the winter should prove to be severe, or the present stress of work cease, there may be much suffering and want.

The appeal written by Hon. Florence Dodson was very successful in its pleading, and brought in enough money, not only to furnish the House in London Street, but also to clear the debt on the General Fund of the Parish of £58 10s. 9d. This year it leaves us with a balance of £19 0s. 9½d., but the expenses are very heavy, and we must still ask our friends to give us their kindly aid. The parish is becoming year by year poorer, and therefore we are more and more dependent on outside help. As in last year's Report, a summary is given of the total expenditure and of the sources of income.

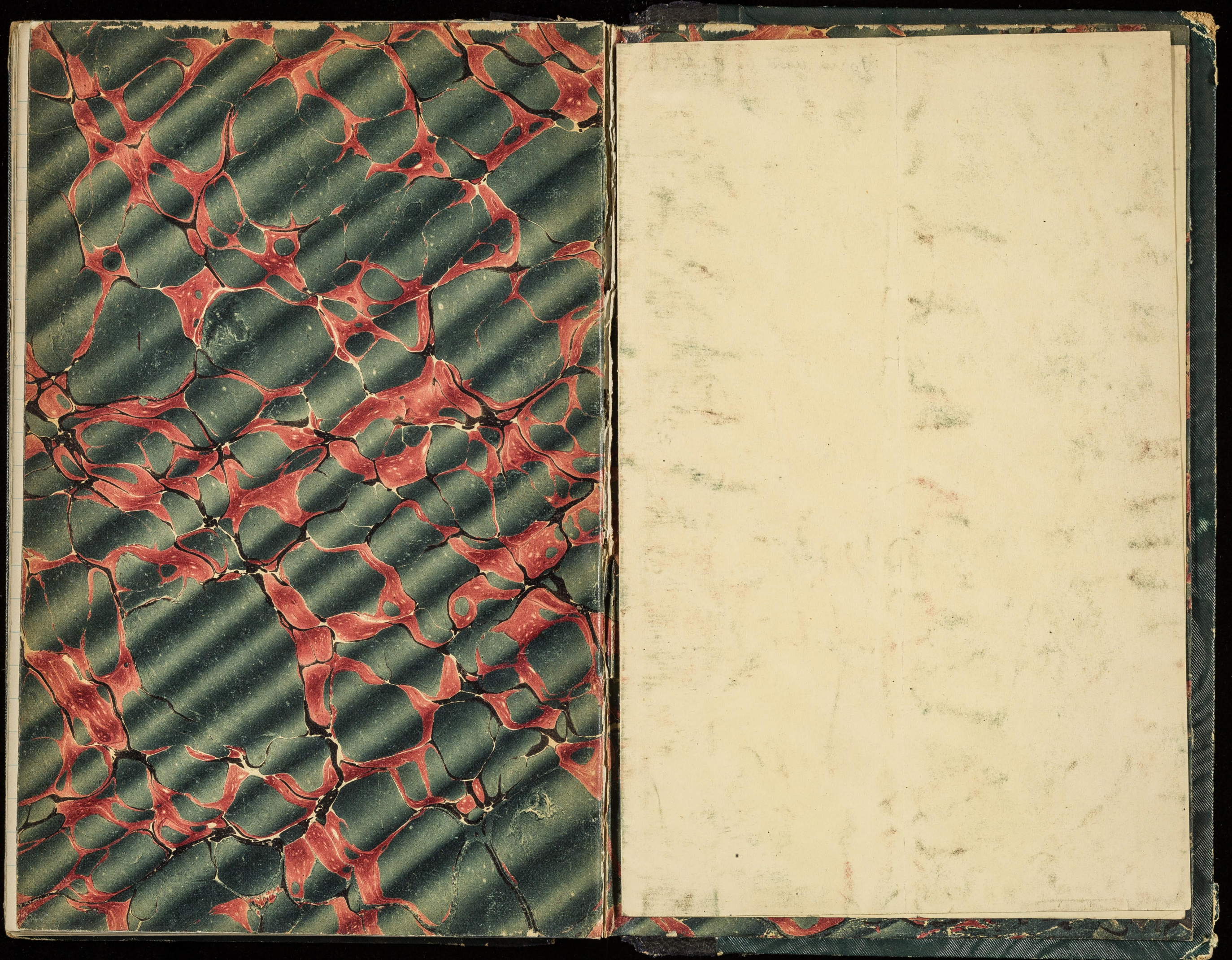
