

T the request of several Public and Secondary Schools, the League of Nations Union is this year arranging a Second Junior Summer School to enable pupils from their upper forms to visit Geneva. The Union is willing to make arrangements for small parties of boys or girls, accompanied by at least one master or mistress, to

attend from other approved Schools; but early application should be made as the total numbers will be strictly limited.

THE JUNIOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Sir Eric Drummond, Secretary-General of the League of Nations, hopes to receive the School which will meet in the League of Nations Council Chamber, and there will be opportunities to examine at first hand the work of the League of Nations Secretariat and International Labour Office. Among the Lecturers will be Professor William Rappard, Rector of the University of Geneva and for many years Secretary of the League Committee responsible for the supervision of Mandated Territories in Africa, the Pacific and the Near East; Don Salvador de Madariaga, Professor of Spanish Studies at the University of Oxford, who formerly directed the work of the League's Disarmament Section; Mr. K. Zilliacus, of the League of Nations Information Section; Dr. Ayusawa, of Japan, who will lecture on the protection of labour conditions in the Far East; Professor A. E. Zimmern and Mr. Frederick Whelen of the League of Nations Union.

Geneva is not only rapidly becoming a kind of political capital for the world, it is also the centre of a world-wide administration, and no other place could be so profitable for a School holiday abroad.

GENEVA AS A HOLIDAY CENTRE

The old city of Geneva is rich in historical associations; it also makes an admirable centre for the lake and mountains. There will be an organised excursion by motor to Chamonix and Mont Blanc, another by boat along the Lake to Chillon, and one afternoon will be spent on Mont Salève. There are opportunities for boating, bathing and tennis.

ACCOMMODATION

Parties will be accommodated in carefully selected private pensions. Rooms have two or three beds and most have hot and cold water.

TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS AND FEES

The Union proposes to secure the following facilities and the master or mistress in charge of each party should state when applying which arrangement the party wishes to follow. If Section A (the group return ticket) is chosen, the application should say whether morning or evening departure is preferred, and whether the party wishes to return with the conducted group leaving Geneva on August 14.

A.—THE GROUP RETURN TICKET

Only available for parties of twelve or more from the same school (under 18 years).

Parties holding a group return ticket will leave London (Victoria Station), on Wednesday, August 6, at 7 p.m. For the convenience of those who prefer the day service a group will also be organised to leave London on the same day at 9 a.m. On the return journey the group will arrive in London on Friday, August 15, at about 7 p.m.

FEE:

Grade A Pension 10 guineas. Grade B Pension $9\frac{1}{2}$ guineas.

Includes 2nd class travel London to Geneva and back, reservation of seats, conveyance across Paris, and seven days' accommodation in Geneva beginning with dinner on Thursday, August 7. One adult with each group of twelve or more can be accepted at this fee.

[Those requiring information about parties numbering less than twelve are requested to write for particulars of the special arrangements that can be made.]

HOLIDAY EXTENSIONS

Each group of twelve or more persons may make private arrangements for a holiday extension provided that the return journey to England is started from Geneva or some intermediate station en route, and that the total availability of the ticket (15 days from August 6) is not exceeded. The League of Nations Union cannot

undertake to make arrangements for such extensions and the only conducted return journey will be the one leaving Geneva on August 14.

EXTRA CHARGES

Personal Expenses: The fees do not include meals on the journey or excursions. A sum of \pounds_1 10s. to \pounds_2 would cover these meals, all the organised excursions, tramcar and motor-boat fares, and similar incidental expenses.

Afternoon tea is not included in the meals provided at continental hotels and a charge is made for baths.

The Junior School begins with dinner on August 7, and it is expected that all parties, whether enrolling under Sections A or B, will be in Geneva in time for this meal. Parties electing to leave London by the morning service on Wednesday, August 6, arrive in Geneva about 8 a.m. on Thursday, August 7. Breakfast and lunch on this date will therefore be a personal charge though arrangements can be made for meals at the pensions.

APPLICATIONS

Application on behalf of School groups should be sent to the Secretary, League of Nations Union, 15 Grosvenor Crescent, London, S.W.1. The application should be made as early as possible, and should include the names and ages of the students and the name of the master or mistress who will accompany the group. A deposit of 10s. should be sent with the application on behalf of each member of the group. Boys and girls under sixteen years of age cannot be admitted unless specially recommended by their Headmaster or Headmistress.

Information about passports, luggage, lecture programme, excursions and other details will be available nearer to the date of departure.
