

Mar 1881. & April 1881. Wife applied in April 1881 for admission of her son  
Richard to Small pox hospital. Husband was then in London hospital  
& she was herself unable to work through sickness. The girl Mary  
supported the family by sewing machine which brought in £. per  
week. Dec 1881. medical attendance on child Mary. Nov 1883. Man admitted  
to S.A. April 1884. man admitted to S.A. July 1884. Man admitted to B.H.  
Woman also applied for relief for son Richard. Dec 1884 man admitted

to Bromley house. Dec 1884 woman applied for medical attendance. Jan 1885 man wants medical attendance. Feb 1885 man admitted to B.H. April 1885 man wants medical attendance, was sent to S.A. Sept 1885 man wants medical attendance. June 1885 man admitted to workhouse, Nov 1885 ditto. May 1886 man applied to be admitted, paid wife got med. relief from Dr. Barnardo. June 1886 daughter applied for med. relief for her mother. July 1886 man applied for med. relief for himself & wife & admission for himself. August 1886 woman applied for med. attendance for herself & grandchild Mary Hammond. Her son Richard was then earning 9/- a week at Frost's rope works. July 1887 man applied for admission to S.A. said wife had died last June, he had been staying with his married daughters since his wife's death. He was admitted to B.H. & stopped till Feb 11<sup>th</sup> 1888. Then went to S.A., came back to B.H. March 2<sup>nd</sup> 1888 left to June 1888, came back 26<sup>th</sup> June 1888, went Aug 20<sup>th</sup> 1888 to S.A. came back to B.H. Sept 11<sup>th</sup> 1888 & left April 1889. Went to his daughter's till the 10<sup>th</sup> when he was re-admitted, but left 13<sup>th</sup> May 1889 only to come back on the 16<sup>th</sup>. He states that his son Richard is now a casual labourer & lives at his sister's.

A letter from John Lam (lock & safe engineer) states that this man in Jan 1882 was a driller in his employ at 16/- a week. & another one in 1879 says that the man is on short time & only gets 12/- a week. There is no doubt that sickness is the cause of this man's poverty. R.O. states in 1881 that he suffered from chronic bronchitis, & cannot walk to and from his work. He also suggests that the wife may

sometimes drink, but both her & the girl Mary are continually ailing. Richard seems to be the mainstay of the family & he only gets 7/- a week.

Frederick Hammond <sup>who</sup> ~~had~~ <sup>29</sup> married Mary Burridge applied on Nov 1883 for med. attendance. Said he was born 1864, was a earner & earned 18/- a week. He had one child Mary Oliva. Have him note for Mr. Chambers asking for letters to London Hospital. Aug 1884 woman applied for admittance of husband to S.A. he had done no work for 3 weeks, but he only stopped in S.A. 3 days. Nov 1884 their daughter Mary Oliva was born. Feb 1885 woman applied for admittance of husband to S.A. as he had met with an accident. She earned 5/- a week at houses finishing. Admitted on the 2nd left 20<sup>th</sup> Feb 1885. Dec 19<sup>th</sup> 1885 man was admitted to S.A. with catarrh, wife was pregnant & unable to work, was living with his mother. Burridge told R.O. that Hammond had joined the teetotallers, but that he formerly drank & was sometimes unkind to his family. Hammond lived at 12 Sage St. & his mother (an old clothes dealer) lived next door. He had no father. [I.d]

Denis Crowley <sup>b/1880</sup> 58 a shoe maker married Ann <sup>b/</sup> ~~and~~ <sup>neekqually</sup> Bridget Burridge's sister aged 56, a houses finisher, applied for some relief, but does not seem to have got it. He had been assisted by Mansion House Fund. R.O. visited his house, & from the look of his work, he must have left it to ~~be~~ apply. He thought he had as much right as anyone, having lived in the parish many years.

Woman in the mean time applies for medical attendance for Cornelius, states that John & Johanna are in the parish schools. John had been in the S.A. & had had medical relief several times

In 1886 there is the same old tale, one or another requiring medical relief, man of course can do no regular work. & 1887 is just the same. In Jan 1888 the man goes into the S.A. for four months. John is still in parish schools at North Hyde, Cornelius is sent to Leyton schools; Johanna to Walthamstow, & Annie is with her grandmothers. The woman is left alone at Queen Catherine's Court. & yet this misguided woman, not relishing her solitude, is confined in Feb 1888 with Bridget & applies for outdoor relief & obtains it together with medical attendance. In April the man comes out, but wants medical attendance, his wife does bottle washing. In June 1888 there is a glorious re-union, & they all go into the country to work. In Oct, the man and children return into B.H. & he & Cornelius pass on to the S.A. John comes out, meets with an accident which puts him in London Hospital. Jan. to April 1889 is varied by medical attendance on wife with pleased leg, & husband & Bridget.

April 15<sup>th</sup> 1889. Wife & Bridget are admitted to S.A. & John to B.H. She states that husband is at home unable to work, Annie is with grandmothers. Johanna is in Walthamstow schools & Cornelius in S.A.

Man subsequently applies for 4 weeks medical attendance.

Inquiries. Peter Barry & his wife have been known to R.O. for some years. Barry is a quiet & well-behaved man, sober & respectable. He is apparently consumptive. His wife is a robust

Woman of rougher type. She struggles hard to keep her sick husband & children. Nothing is known against her character. 1839. Today the home has been visited, it is very clean tho' poorly furnished. She is living in an old house in Queen Catherine Court in which she has effected quite a transformation it being formerly exceedingly dirty.

Her complaint was asthma, which gave her an unusually long stay of 2½ years in the S.A. She again spent from 24 Feb to 18<sup>th</sup> April 1887 in the S.A. & from 15<sup>th</sup> Oct 1887 to 26<sup>th</sup> July 1888, being at B.H in the intervals, & has been there since —.

The old woman is addicted to drink. She has frequently been seen sitting at her stall in a state of intoxication.

R.D. visited the home, found it nicely furnished & in good order. They had been married 30 years, but never had any children. Sarah came out 29<sup>th</sup> June & Henry on the 23<sup>rd</sup> July. Wife had 2 weeks medical atten. July 30<sup>th</sup> & went back to S.A. 27 Dec 1888, & he followed her the 1<sup>st</sup> Jan 1889 with bronchitis. She was passed to B.I. 12<sup>th</sup> Jan 1889. Sup. of Workman's dwellings spoke favourably of both man & wife.

Sentence to find a surety for £10. or go to prison for a month. Denis went to prison, as he could not find the surety.

I counted his admissions in the Poplar Book, from 18<sup>th</sup> March 1889 to 14<sup>th</sup> May 1889. They amounted to 49 times.

The whole of the money is now expended. Did not get it.

She applied for medical relief in May 1879, said Johanna was at rope ground, & John at fruit warehouse. Jeremiah at Parish Schools. In Nov 1879 she takes him out to look after the young ones. Had medical relief five times in 1880. R.O. reports "home most filthy, an intolerable odour pervades the place from an accumulation of dirt. Notice sent to Board of Works.

26/10/80. Woman is now living in Blue Anchor Alley. I saw her today begging from door to door in Thirza St. In Nov 1880 applies for admission of herself & children. The elder ones are out of work.

In May 1881 they are admitted Job. H. and the mother, Jane & Patrick to S.A. for a month from B.H. "Home wretched in the extreme, furniture consists of a broken down old bedstead & one chair, walls and floor beastly dirty, children dirty & almost naked. The woman is a house to house beggar. 12/10/81. came in from

the country hop-picking, the money has been spent ban Jane & Patrick be admitted. Certainly Jane is sent to Hampstead & Pat. to B. H. Jeremiah is at North Hyde. Mary working at rope ground earning 7/6 per week. John is out of work. 15/1/81 Application by sister Johanna for medical attendance on sister Mary at 20 James Place. Then come four applications for medical relief. Then in March 1883 John is admitted to S.A. & stays there for about a month, & afterwards has medical relief.\* his mother was selling watercresses in the street. In Oct. 1883 mother applies for ~~ad~~ medical attendance for Mary. she has been working at a rope ground @ 8. per week. In April 1884. Jeremiah had medical relief & 6<sup>th</sup> May was admitted to S.A. & stayed till 20<sup>th</sup> June 1884. Jane admitted to school. Johanna with mother (her husband having left her) Denis at common lodging houses; this was woman's statement in June 1884.

29/7/84. R.O visited the home, found it very dirty & scantily furnished, offered the house to all of them. Only Jane came in for 1 month. Jeremiah had medical relief in August & Patrick admitted in Oct 1884. Denis was about the streets "eading" a living. Nov 1884 woman reported. I do washing & chasing earn about 4. a week. Mary gives her 8. per week. Jeremiah 2. a week. In Dec 1884. Jeremiah scalded his leg & required med. attendance

In May & August 1885 woman had medical attendance, and again

in January & February 1886. In April 1886 applies for admittance for Patrick as she cannot afford to keep him, as she is too ill to work. In Oct. 1886 applies for admission for boy Patrick, as Jeremiah is out of work.

Mary has medical attendance in April 1887, she is working at rope grounds & earns 8. to 9. per week. Jeremiah is at a coal wharf. Patrick is at home. Jane at schools. In August 1887 she applies for the discharge of Jane from the schools. The 25 May 1888 Jeremiah is admitted to S.A. daughter Jane is admitted to a Servants training Home at West Kensington. Miss

Mary (Sec'y to Metropolitan Association for befriending Young Servants) sends a letter to the guardians, asking them to contribute something towards the 5. a week required to keep her.

The girl seemed to be very superior to the rest of her family & it would be a pity to let her drift back & swell the pauper class. The guardians generously consented to pay this

George Herman Lincke (Joshua's brother) aged 77 a widower lived at 21 George St. Ratcliff. He was a stevedore, but in 1877 he had a stroke of paralysis by which he lost the use of his right hand & leg. He had saved up a certain amount of money which kept him for a time, & he then went to live with his only child, a daughter Charlotte, who had married a man named Dossing & had a large family. She could not keep him any longer so he applied for admission. He was admitted to B.H. the 2nd Oct 1880 but for some unexplained reason he comes out again on the 6<sup>th</sup> same month & we hear no more of him.

Charles Lincke (Joshua's son) aged 40, a married man, lived at 30 Barolin St. Ratcliff with his wife Jane. They had 3 children John 12, Alfred 10, & Joshua 7, whom they supported the man by dock labour & the woman by washing. Her ~~husband~~, maiden name was Fooke (see page 755) & she had a sister Annie (see page 756) & also one named Harriet, who was born in 1856, & had married a railway labourer <sup>named Hostkin</sup> & gone to live at Morant St. Poplar, & also a brother James.

Mrs. M<sup>r</sup>. Lincke applied & stated that her husband Charles beat her last night, she applied for & obtained a summons this morning & the magistrate advised her to apply for admission. He refuses to maintain her. She is afraid to go home tonight as he carries a razor in his pocket & has vowed to kill her if she

goes home. He drinks heavily & was drunk when he beat her. He told her this morning to leave the house & at the same time held this razor open above her. R.O. visited man was not at home. Saw Mr. Middle, a fellow lodger who informed me that a short time ago (this evening) the woman was compelled by her husband's violence to leave the house. Admitted the woman & her 3 children to Poplar House. The next day I saw the landlady who said that the man behaved with great brutality to his wife & had threatened to kill her; but the man himself came to the office & said that his wife had also been drinking (with this landlady) & they had had a quarrel, but he was willing to receive them home again provide for them. They were therefore discharged from P.H. Next occasion they come into the books is in August 1884, when the wife applies for medical relief for the husband who had been taken suddenly ill & again in Nov 1886 she applies from 124 Whitehorse Street for medicines for her husband. On June 3<sup>rd</sup> 1887 Mr. Hill (the landlady of 124 Whitehorse St.) said that M<sup>r</sup>. Lincke had been confined with a stillborn child & was very ill. Had medical relief granted for 2 weeks. Her husband called the next day & said he would like his wife to be admitted to S.A. as he was out of work & could not properly provide for her, but the woman would not go as she did not feel well enough to be moved. The last application is in Aug 87 for med. attendance for man, living at 8 James Street.

25/3/86. R.O. states that some time ago this woman stopped him in the street to tell him her husband was treating her very badly, keeping her without food & money. She then had two black eyes, & said her husband drank heavily.

26/3/87. Today the man applies for outdoor relief, he being out of work. His family want food as they have no money. Home was visited the same day. exceedingly dirty & untidy. Children looked healthy but dirty. Was offend the House for himself & children, & outdoor relief for the wife, but was refused.

24/7/88. The man is living at the common lodging house, 196 High St. Shadwell, and application is made by the deputy for his removal.
