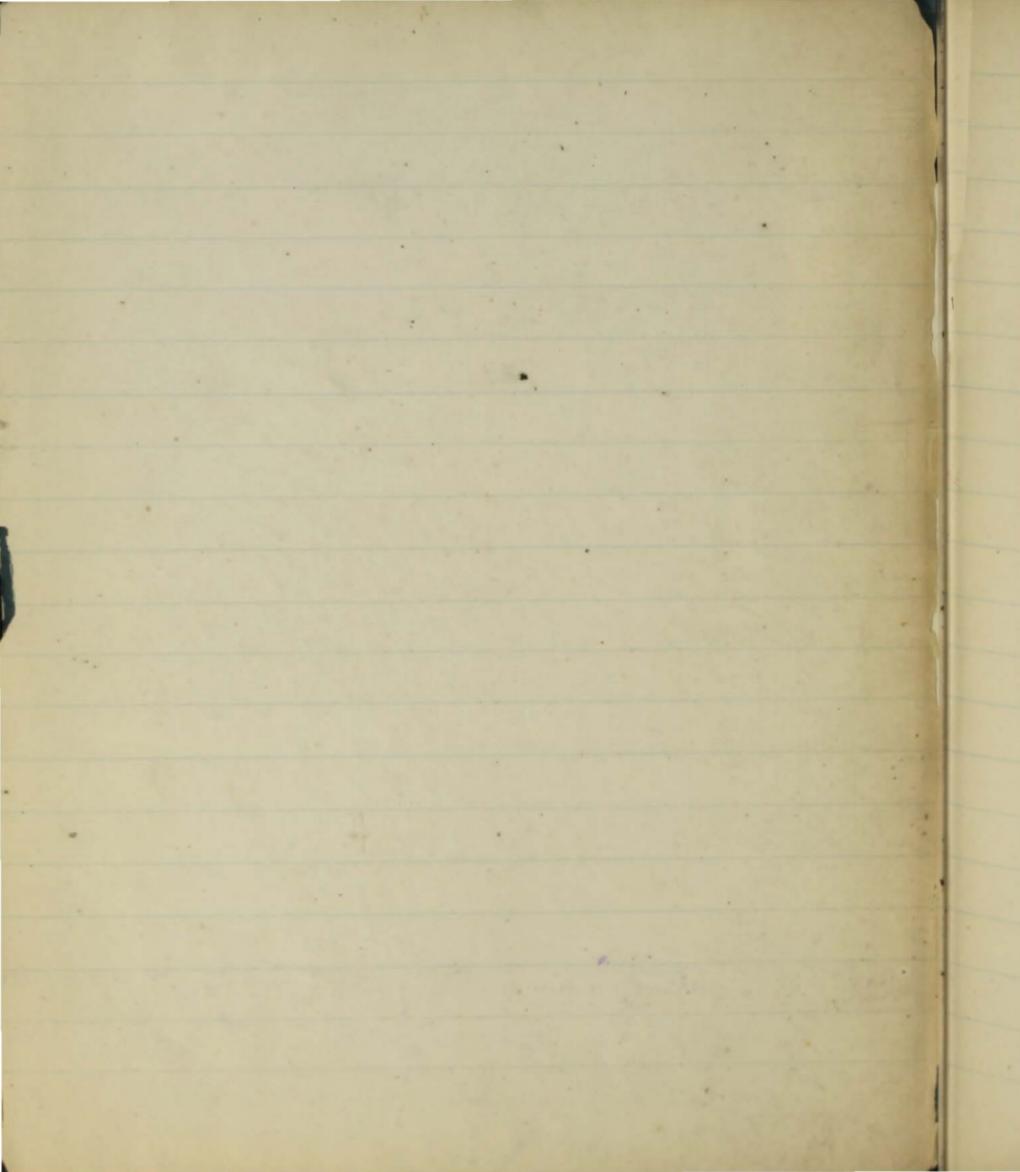

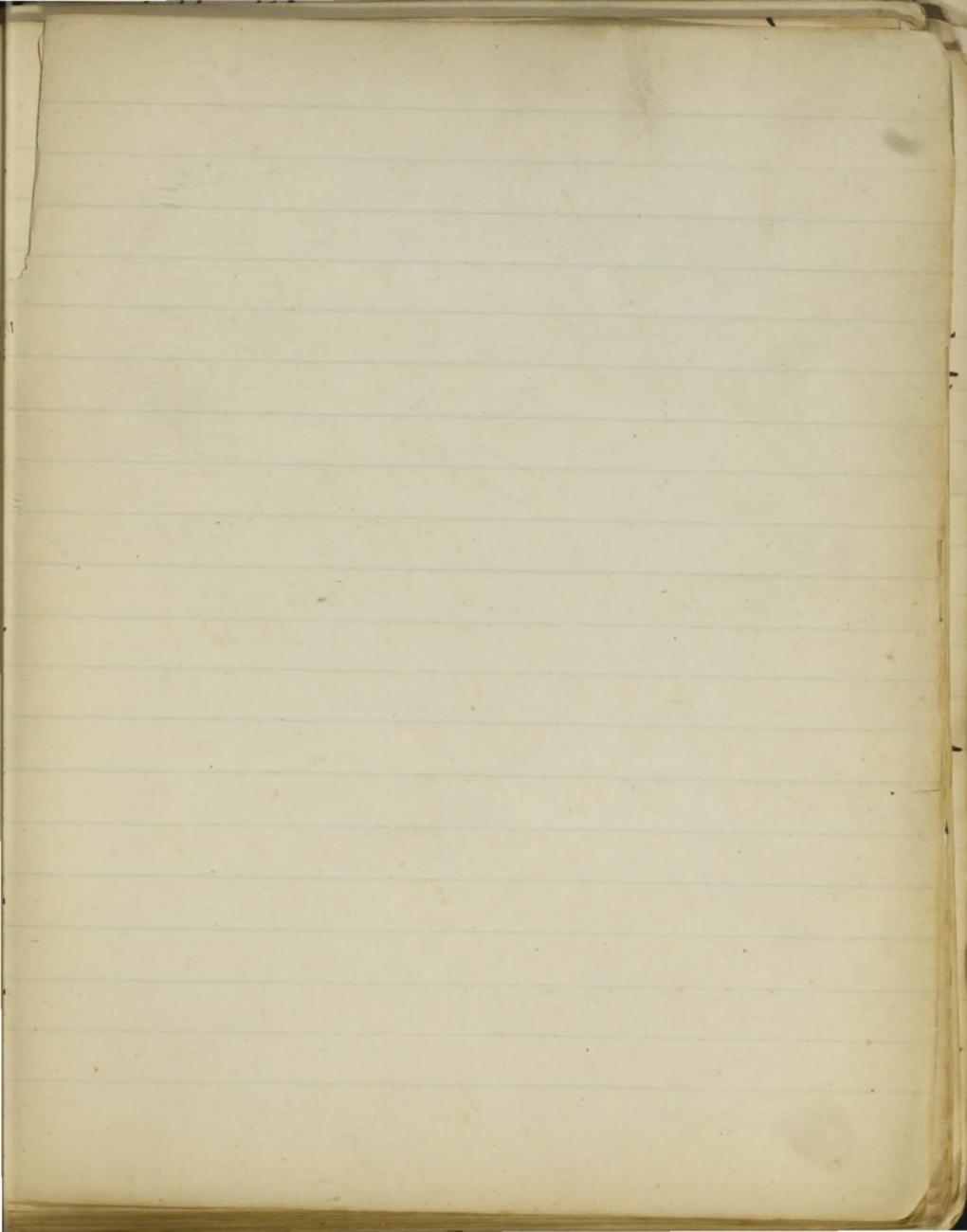

## The New Life.

The first general meeting of persons interested in this movement was held at Mr. Pease's rooms, 17, Grosvenor Street, Regents' Park, on Wednesday the 24<sup>th</sup> of October, 1883.

There were present Miss Ford, Miss Isabella Ford, Miss Haddon, Mrs. Hinton, Mrs. Robins and Miss Robins; Maurice Adams, H. H. Champion, General A. Chubb, H. Havelock Ellis, R. P. B. Frost, J. L. Foxes, Edward R. Pease, Tank Padmore, Hamilton Fullen, and Mr. Robins.

The proceedings were begun by the reading of Mr. Thomas Dardens paper - "The New Life" - read by him at a former assemblage, and, after it, of the draft of a proposed Constitution (Sketch No. 2).

A general discussion followed on the question as to what was possible of achievement in the way of founding a communistic society whose members should lead the new higher life foreshadowed in the

This record fills me with compunction that my own conceit of superior command should have withheld me from attending a meeting which arrived at so temperate a conclusion. —

paper just read. The idea of founding a community abroad was generally discredited; and it was generally recognized that it would not be possible to establish here in England any independent community. What could be done perhaps would be for a number of persons in sympathy with the main idea to unite for the purpose of common living as far as possible on a communistic basis, realizing among themselves the higher life, and making it a primary care to provide a worthy education for the young. The members would pursue their present calling in the world, but they would always aim to make the community as far as practicable self-contained and self-supporting, combining perhaps to carry on some common business or businesses.

It was eventually agreed to further discuss the matter at another meeting, which was fixed for a fortnight hence (Wednesday 7 Nov). Mr. Lodnon

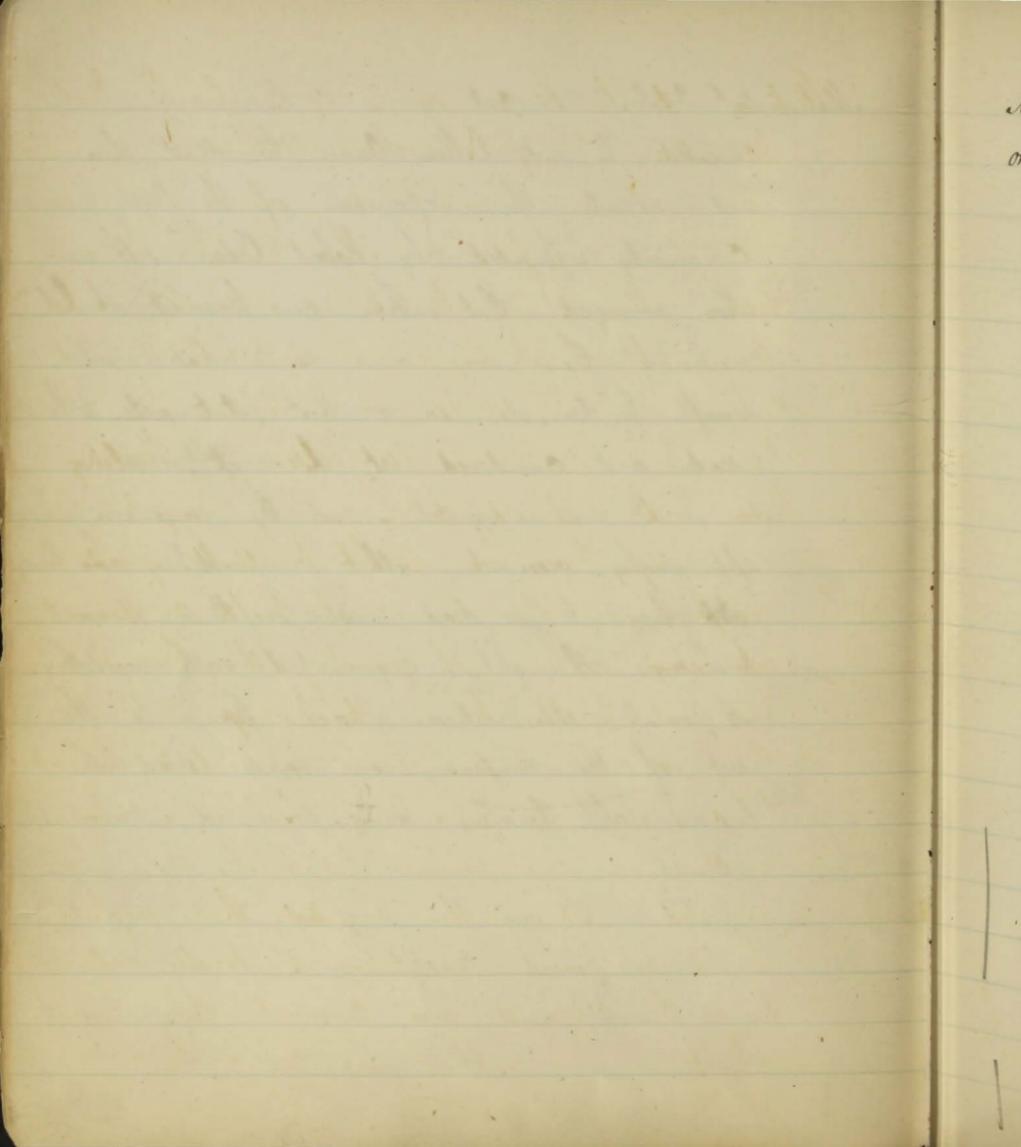

consented to ask Miss Owen to attend then and narrate the experience of the "New Harmony" community founded by Robert Owen. It was also arranged that those now present should embody their own views as to what should hereafter be done, etc., in short statements to be read and considered at the next meeting.

It was suggested - and the suggestion was approvingly received - that undoubtly ~~the~~ first step to be done was for those present to become thoroughly acquainted with each other. A general introduction of each person to the rest of the company was made, and the business of the meeting being concluded, conversation followed.



Meeting at Mr. Please's rooms, 17 Bonaburgh Street,  
on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> of November, 1883.

Miss Swan was unable to attend. The proceedings were begun by the reading of a draft constitution representing the views of several of those present who had met together <sup>during the interval</sup> between the last meetings.

A question was then raised as to the mode of conducting the proceedings. The appointment of a chairman was proposed; and Mr. Please was appointed. It was then suggested that resolutions should be passed constituting a Society and, as far as those present were concerned, designating its objects. Some objection was taken to the course.

as being an undesirable formality, not in harmony with the free spirit of our the undertaking; but meeting with general approval, it was followed.

After some discussion as to the form of the first resolution should take; whether it was not advisable to express in it the distinctive aim of the Society, that whereby it became differentiated from other projects of reform (that is that it was an effort to carry out the true social ideal in practice), the following resolution was proposed and agreed to:

"That an association be formed whose  
"ultimate aim shall be the reconstruction of  
"Society in accordance with the highest moral  
"possibilities."

It was proposed to follow this by a second resolution stating the special way in which the end was to be effected by the Society. As, however, some difference of opinion prevailed it was considered

desirable to appoint a Committee to draw up and submit proposals to the next meeting. A Committee of four (with the Secretary pro tem.) - consisting of Messrs Champion Ellis, Jeph and Podmore - was appointed accordingly (or failing Mr Champion, Mr. Lewis who kindly withdraws in favour of Mr Champion)

It was found that Friday was the day of the week on which it would be most convenient for the majority often present to meet; and the next meeting was fixed for Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov., provided the Committee were able to agree upon proposals by that time, or, if not, Friday 30<sup>th</sup> Nov.

"1. That the association be called "The Fellowship of the New Life."

"2. That the members of the association recognise that the Competitive System has broken down, and that Society must be reconstructed in accordance with the highest moral principles."

It was also agreed to submit the ensuing recommendations for consideration at the next meeting:

"That there shall be regular fortnightly meetings of the Fellowship (on Fridays)."

"That there be no fixed subscription, but that collection be made when funds are needed."

"That at each meeting the subject for discussion at the following meeting be announced."

As the resolution referred rather to the material or economic aims of the <sup>Society</sup> Fellowship and not to its primary spiritual aim it was agreed that the resolution should stand as No. 3, and that another resolution setting forth the spiritual basis of the Fellowship should be passed which should stand as No. 2.

The following resolution was proposed & seconded for this purpose:-

"That the <sup>Society</sup> Fellowship consist of those alone who are willing to devote themselves to the best of their abilities to the amelioration of the condition of all men, and who will work together for mutual benefit and help toward the eradication of selfishness and the introduction of the New Life."

As an amendment it was proposed and seconded:-

"That we should recognize as the only and

was agreed by the majority that the name should be "The  
Fellowship of the New Life".

It was also arranged that there should be no  
fixed subscription, but that a collection should be made

"sufficient ground of the possibility of any social reconstruction the presence and prevalence of the spirit of brotherly love, of justice & of equality."

The following further amendment was proposed and seconded:-

"That with a view to the promotion of the ultimate aim of the <sup>Society</sup> Fellowship, its members come to sustain in each other the Ideal life, which they desire to see existing among men, and to which they themselves are enthusiastically devoted, for which they are prepared to make any personal sacrifice."

Considerable discussion ensued, and it was ultimately agreed to appoint the three <sup>signers</sup> (John Bland, John Gibson & J. Phipps) signers of the resolutions, as a Committee to draw up a resolution embodying their several views. Meantime a pro forma vote on the resolutions was taken.

Committee meeting at Dr Burns-Gibson's residence, 5 Granville Park, Harlesden, on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> November, 1883.

Mr Keddell did not arrive until Mr Jupp was leaving; the Committee did not in fact meet together therefore.

Dr Burns-Gibson explained to Mr Keddell that he in company with several others (some of whom were Adams, Putter and the Secretary), including Mr Jupp, were not quite satisfied with the results of former meetings. They felt that the resolutions hitherto passed and proposed did not go far enough and did not express the original intentions of the initiators of the movement. They therefore proposed at the next meeting to ~~propose~~<sup>put forward</sup> a series of fresh resolutions as a basis of the Fellowship which they would stand by. These might be recommended by the Committee as the result of their discussion.

Mr Keddell said he concurred in the new proposals with slight modification; but he thought that the Committee should perform their appointed task & select a resolution to be presented to the next meeting. Dr Burns-Gibson said he thought they might present the new proposals in place of the resolution. However, it was agreed that the Committee should discharge their duty by presenting the first of the 3 resolutions.

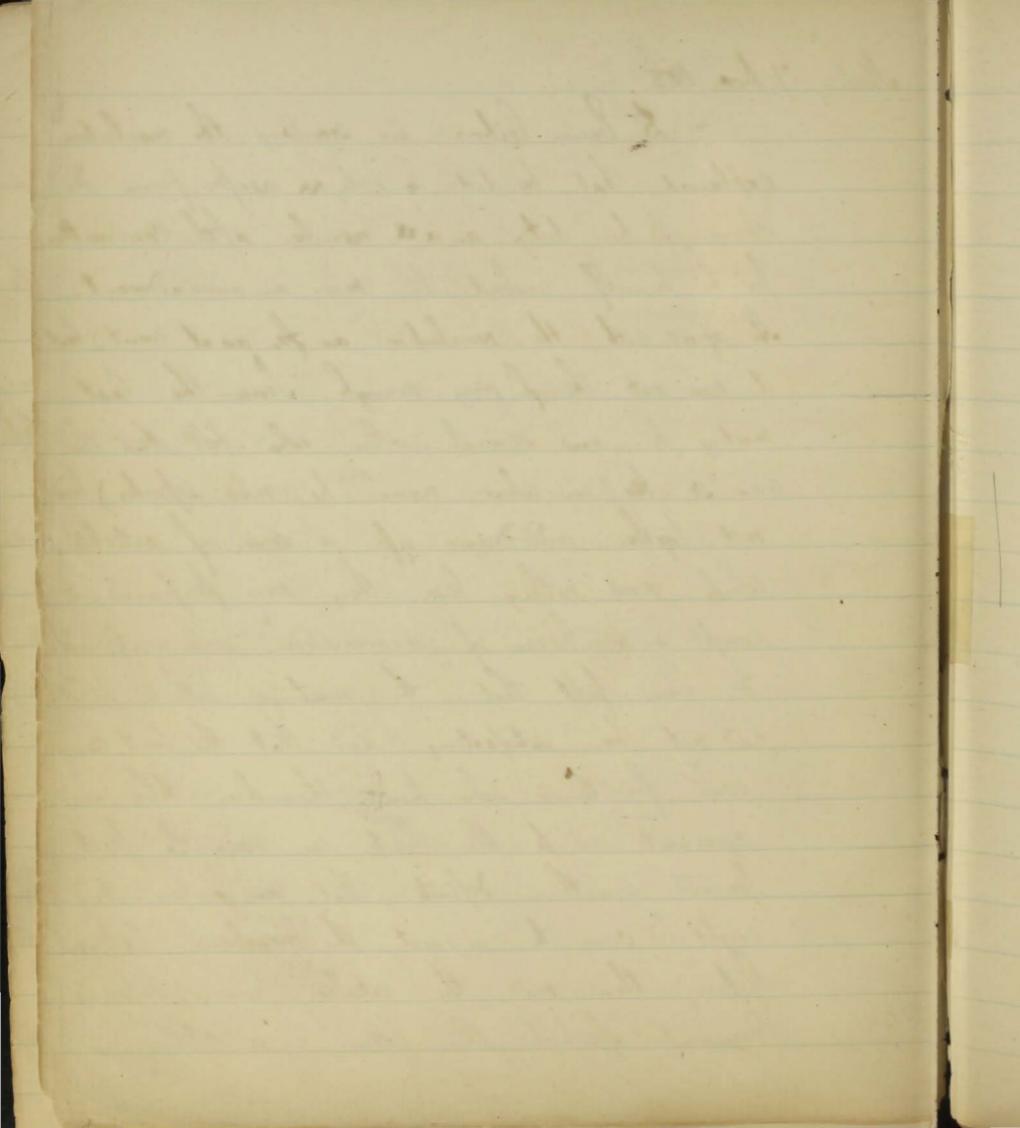

Dr Barn. Gilson in seconding the resolution, explained that he did so only as ~~as~~ pro forma discharge of his duty as a member of the Committee; for he himself wished to move an amendment. He agreed with the resolution as far as it went, but it was not thorough going enough. Since the last meeting he and several other who felt that there was so ~~far~~ (<sup>also</sup> in whose names he now spoke) had met together and drawn up a series of articles which, and nothing less, they were prepared to accept as a basis of association, and work after to. They felt that the meetings hitherto held had not been satisfactory, and that the best course was for those who knew themselves to be in agreement as to the object in view to put forward something definite, that an understanding might be come to amongst the members. Dr Barn. Gilson then read the articles from a sealed document of which the following is a copy:



## Fellowship of the New Life.

Object:

The cultivation of a perfect character in each soul.

Principle:

The subordination of material things to spiritual things.

Fellowship:

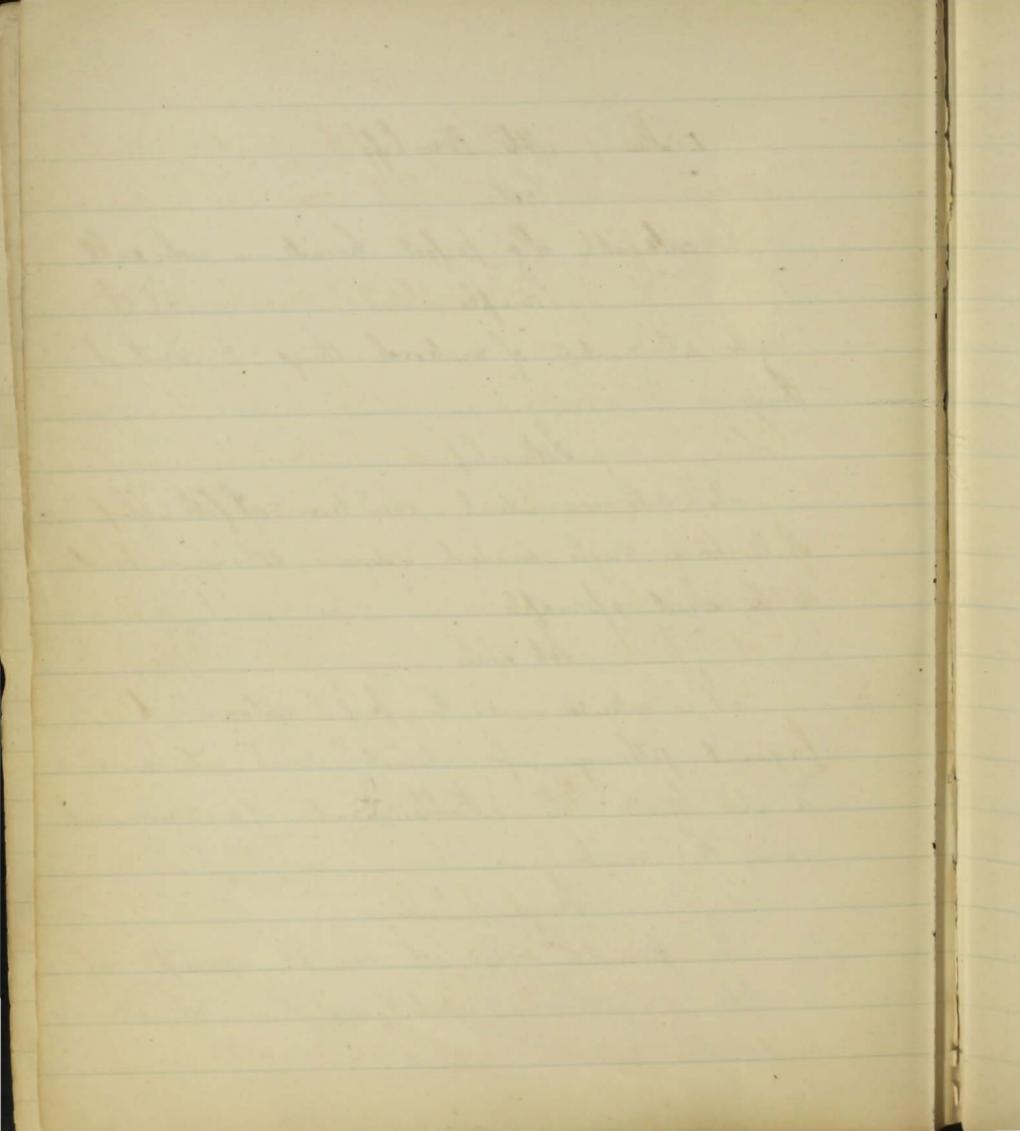
The sole essential condition of fellowship shall be a single minded, sincere, strenuous devotion to the object of principle.

Intercourse:

It is intended, in the first instance, to hold frequent gatherings for intimate social intercourse as a step toward the establishment of a community among the members.

Design:

The promotion by both example and precept of the following methods as contributing toward the attainment of the end:

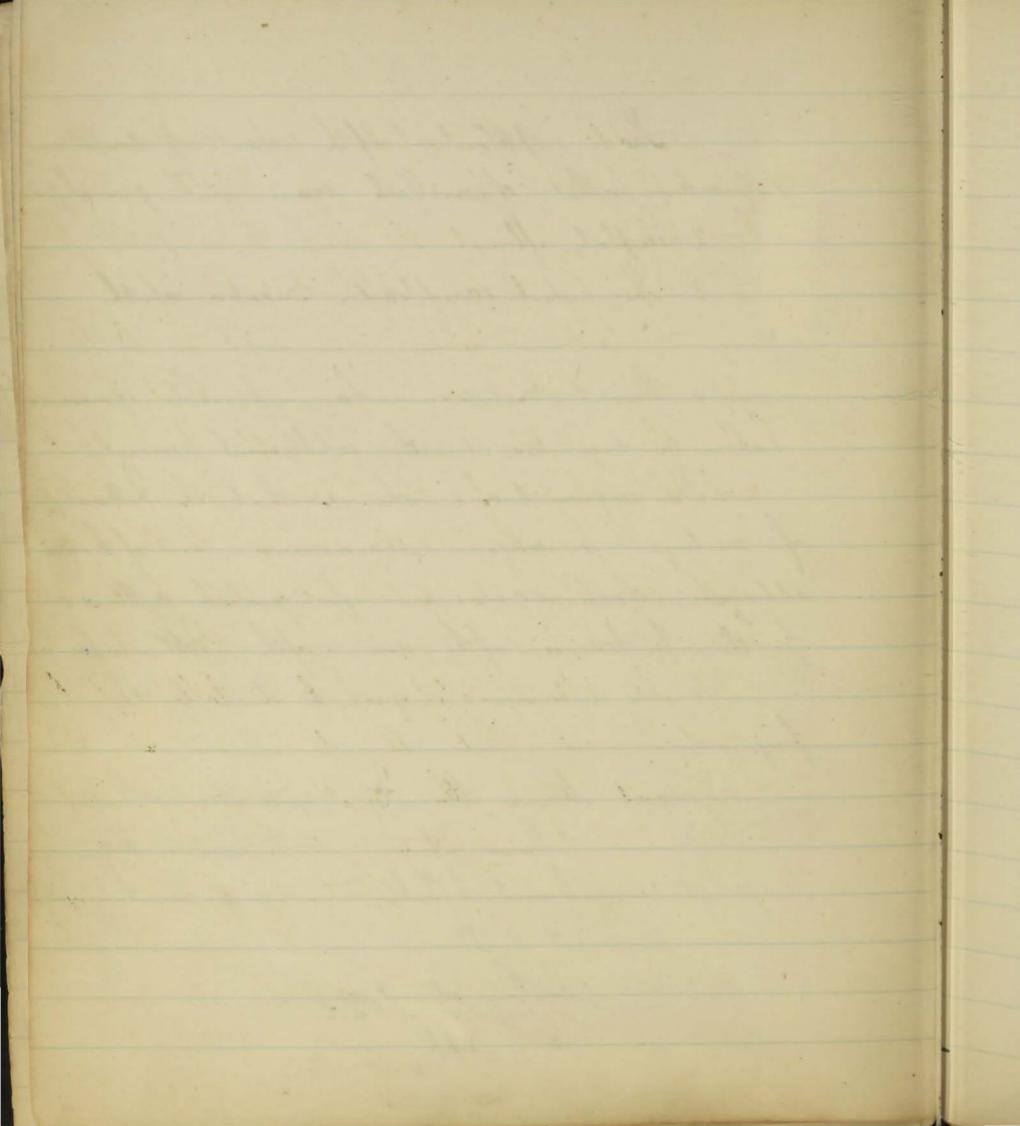


1. The supplanting of the spirit of competition  
self seeking by that of unselfish regard for the general good.
2. Simplicity of living.
3. The highest completed education of the young.
4. The introduction, as far as possible, of manual labor in connection with intellectual pursuits.

The organization, whether with or without the Fellowship of meetings for religious communion, and of lectures, addresses, classes, conferences for general culture & for the furtherance of the aims of the Fellowship.

Each of those articles was explained and commented upon at some length by Dr. Brown Gibson, who at the same time dwelt upon the motives & intentions of the signatories.

Dr. Brown Gibson was supported by Mr. Jupp & others. There were some general discussions of the articles, & several questions were put with the object of ascertaining their more precise significance.

The question next arose as to the relation of the signatories, as a body, to the Fellowship proper. It was agreed that no definite final step shall be taken at that meeting, but that the discussion should be adjourned until the next meeting (fixed for Friday 4<sup>th</sup> January 1854), so that those not present might have an opportunity of expressing their views.

The amendment was carried 8 votes to 4.

Mr Podmore's proposals were then put forward as an alternative resolution; it considered sensitive

That the Society asserts that the competitive system assures the happiness & comfort of the few at the expense of the suffering of the many & that Society must be reconstituted in such a manner as to secure the general welfare & happiness.

Resolution I "That the Society be called 'the Fabian Society' (as Mr. Tolman explained, in allusion to the oration policy of Fabius Cunctator), was carried by 9 votes to 2.

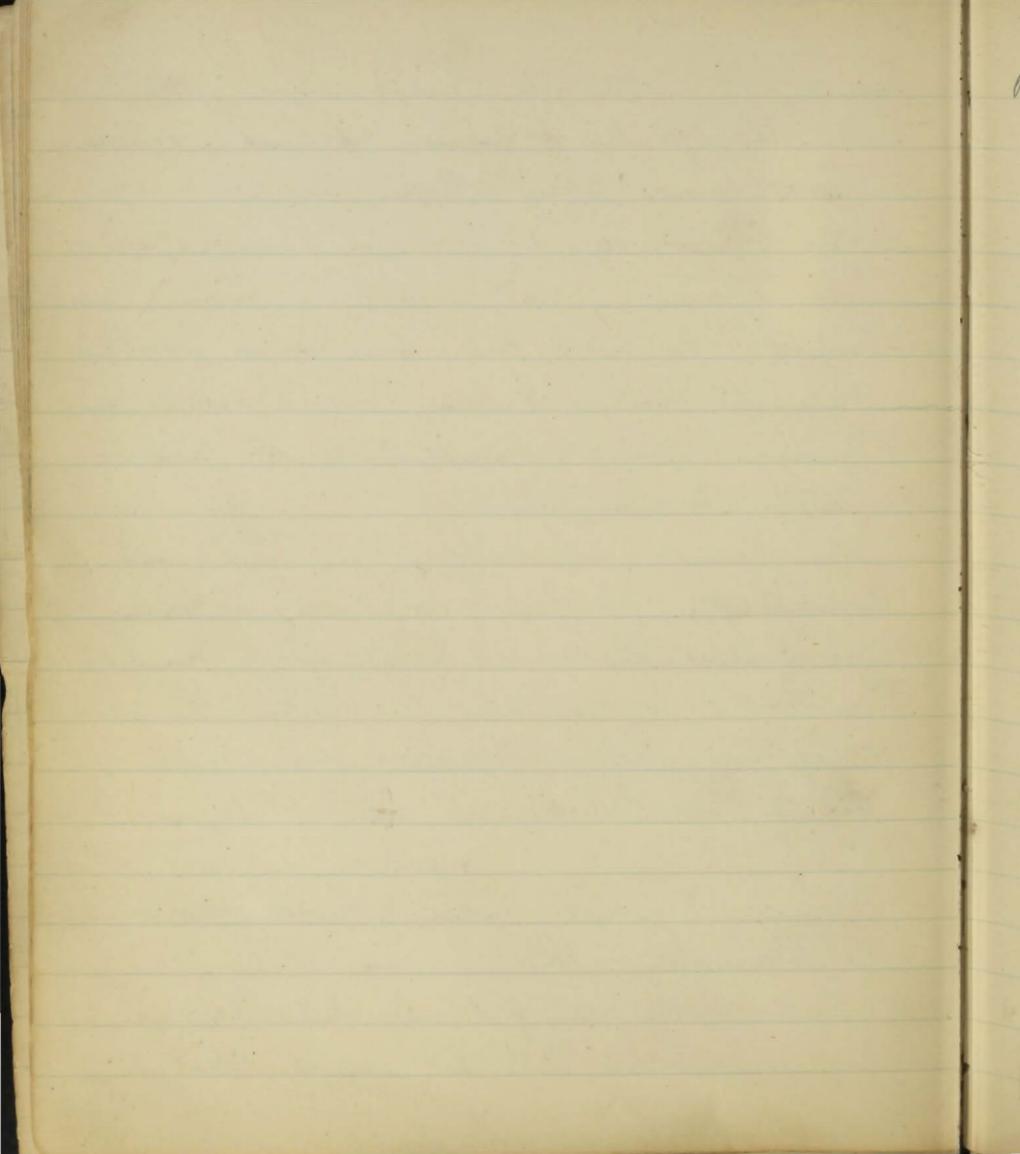
Resolution II. "That the Society shall not at present pledge its members to any more definite basis of agreement than that contained in the Resolution of the 23rd November 1883."

Carried unanimously.

Resolution III. In view of Mr. Tolman's proposal, it was eventually decided to modify the Resolution of the 23rd November 1883, by inserting the words "to help on" between the words "Shall be" & the word "the reconstruction".

Resolution IV. with certain omission was agreed to unanimously : viz:

"That with the view of learning what practical measures to take in this direction the Society

- (a) hold meeting for discussion, the reading of papers, hearing of reports &c.
- (b) delegate some of its members to attend meetings held on social questions, debates at Workmen's Clubs, & in order that our members may, in the first place, report back to Society on the proceedings, & in the second place, put forward, on occasion, several, to review of the Society

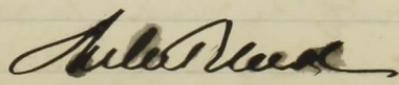

McBennet explained shortly the  
considerations which had led to the  
proposal of the Resolution, and expressed  
her conviction that the ~~the~~ formation of  
the contemplated League would furnish  
an instrument whereby the forces of  
Radicalism and Socialism might be united  
in the criticism and initiation of practical  
steps towards their common goal.

Hubert Blund formally seconded the  
motion.

Sidney Webb explained that the  
Resolution was the result of a compromise

between two schools of opinion in the Society and that it was worked so as not to commit the Society at large to political propaganda, but yet to allow those who desired to do more active work as Socialists than the Fabian Society had hitherto aimed at doing, to utilise their present connection without secession and the formation of a totally distinct organisation.

A. Stuart Glennie supported the Resolution followed by E. R. Pease.

A letter was read from Walter Crane deprecating its adoption.

Mr Varley raised the question whether the League should be confined to members of the Fabian Society, and expressed an opinion that such a League might more usefully work by enrolling directly the members of Working Men's Clubs and similar organisations.

Hubert Bland explained the views of the Executive Committee on these two points.

Graham Wallas pointed out that "Parliamentary" must be taken to include Municipal and Educational public work.

Alfred Howard supported the resolution.

Annie Bassant opened the general discussion  
 as to the best means for developing the activity of the

Society, and placed before the meeting the following suggestions on behalf of the Executive Committee.

- i. that the meetings of the Society for the discussion of papers read before them, should be arranged to alternate with meetings designed for the spreading of Socialism, ~~among~~ <sup>among</sup> the unconverted, which should be held once a month in different districts of London.
- ii. that the members of the Society should be divided into local groups, according to the districts in which they live, each local group appointing a Secretary. It was proposed that these groups should make it their care to spread Socialism in their respective districts, that they should take Halls and arrange business details for the monthly propagandist meetings of the Society, acquaint themselves with the condition of the Socialist movement in their neighbourhoods and keep the Society informed thereof, that they should so far

as possible attend local clubs, lecturing or giving literature, and should report on any promising opening then found for the spread of Socialism, and that they should cooperate with the Fabian Party League in municipal work, write to the local newspapers and otherwise permeate their respective neighbourhood.

iii. That small meetings be held at private houses, to which any person might be invited whom an enemy would be a gain to the Socialist cause. That at these meetings friendly and informal conversation on questions of Socialism should be combined with such light refreshment as might be practicable.

iv. That members should be more active in bringing friends to meetings.

J. Bradford Bright deplored the constant adhesion to Willis' Rooms as the meeting place

of the Society. He recommended more spe-  
cial attention in the work attempted, and practical  
assistance in cooperative enterprises and modelled  
communes. He suggested that the falling off  
in subscription was due to the expense of the  
Conference held in May 1886.

Mrs Cotton recommended educational work,  
and deprecates an alteration of the basis, so as  
to bring her personal position with regard  
to the work of the Society. ~~too~~

Mrs Stapleton concurred.

Mrs Brand recommended the holding of  
Classes in Practical Economy as a development  
of the Society's work.

Miss Ellis, was followed by T. Bates,  
who criticised some habits of the Executive  
and the Secretary as having a discouraging  
effect on the rest of the Society. He agreed that  
the Basis should be made a test to ~~intend~~

S. Phineas, S. A. Headlam, and S. Webb spoke on the subject of the altitude of the Enclosure as expressed in their Circular.

Mrs Hoatio asked whether any suggestion had been received, and on the request of T. Bras letter was read which has been received from Dr A. S. Kennedy, W. M. Hobman, Esq. (who suggested a fixed minimum of subscription) and subsequently one from Miss Jackson to T.
