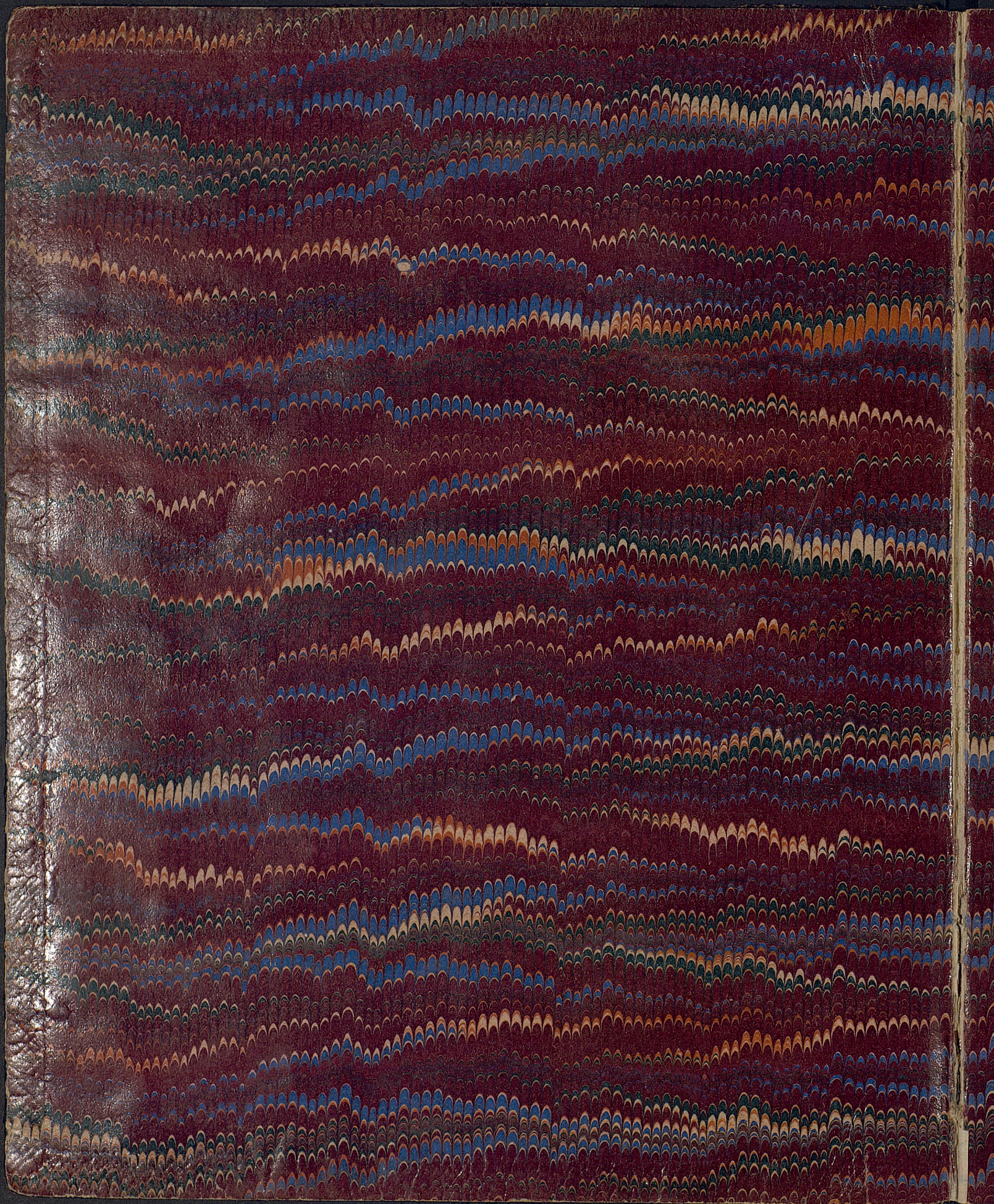
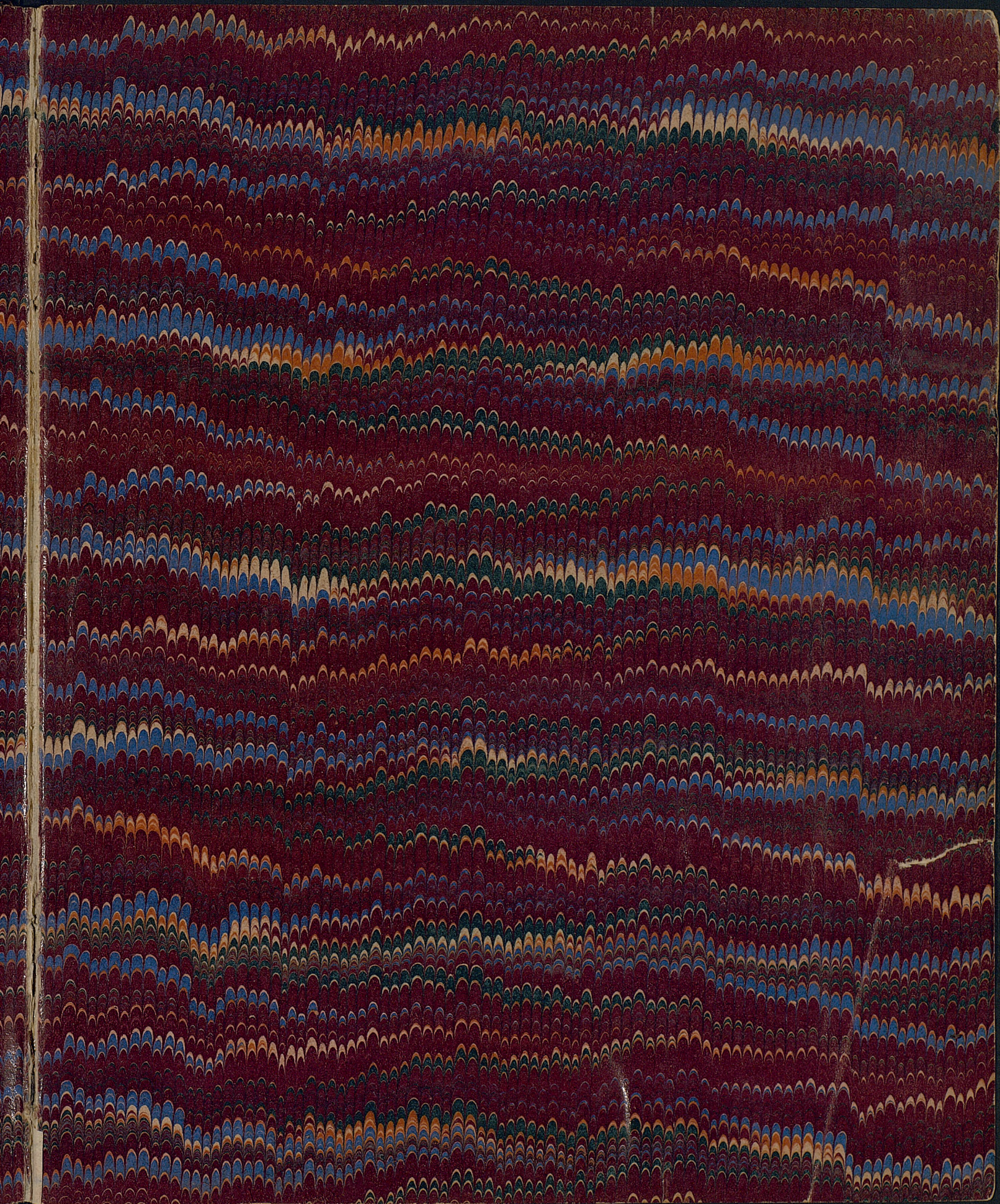

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES.

Sir,—I have just received the enclosed letter from Mrs. Sidney Webb. As she generously allows me to make any use of it I like, may I beg the favour of its insertion in *The Times*?

Those who have been working for many years for women's suffrage naturally regard with extreme satisfaction the adherence to the movement of two of the ablest women who have hitherto opposed it, Mrs. Creighton and Mrs. Sidney Webb. Mrs. Creighton's change of view was chronicled in your columns about a week ago.

Dear Mrs. Fawcett,—You once asked me to let you know if I ceased to object to the grant of the electoral franchise to women. The time has come when I feel obliged to do so.

My objection was based principally on my disbelief in the validity of any "abstract rights," whether to votes, or to property, or even to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." I prefer to regard life as a series of obligations—obligations of the individual to the community and of the community to the individual. I could not see that women, as women, were under any particular obligation to take part in the conduct of government.

I have been told that the more spiritually minded Eastern readily acquiesces in the material management of his native country by what he regards as the Anglo-Saxon "man of affairs." In the same way I thought that women might well be content to leave the "rough and tumble" of party politics to their mankind, with the object of concentrating all their own energies on what seemed to me their peculiar social obligations—the rearing of children, the advancement of learning, and the handing on from generation to generation of an appreciation of the spiritual life.

Such a division of labour between men and women is, however, only practicable if there is among both sections alike a continuous feeling of consent to what is being done by Government as their common agent. This consciousness of consent can hardly avoid being upset if the work of government comes actively to overlap the particular obligations of an excluded class. If our Indian administrators were to interfere with the religious obligations of Hindus or Mahomedans, British rule in India would, I suppose, come to an end. It seems to me that something analogous to this is happening in the Europe of to-day with regard to the particular obligations of women. The rearing of children, the advancement of learning, and the promotion of the spiritual life—which I regard as the particular obligations of women—are, it is clear, more and more becoming the main preoccupations of the community as a whole. The Legislatures of this century are, in one country after another, increasingly devoting themselves to these subjects. Whilst I rejoice in much of this new development of politics, I think it adequately accounts for the increasing restiveness of women. They are, in my opinion, rapidly losing their consciousness of consent in the work of government, and are even feeling a positive obligation to take part in directing this new activity. This is, in my view, not a claim to rights or an abandonment of women's particular obligations, but a desire more effectually to fulfil their functions by sharing the control of State action in those directions.

The episodes of the last few weeks complete the demonstration that it is undesirable that this sense of obligation should manifest itself in unconstitutional forms. We may grant that persistent interruption of public business is lowering to the dignity of public life. But it is cruel to put a fellow-citizen of strong convictions in the dilemma of political ineffectiveness or unmannerly breaches of the peace. If the consciousness of non-consent is sufficiently strong, we can hardly blame the public-spirited women who by their exclusion from constitutional methods of asserting their views are driven to the latter alternative, at the cost of personal suffering and masculine ridicule. To call such behaviour vulgar is an undistinguished, and I may say an illiterate, use of language. The way out of this unpleasant dilemma, it seems to me, is to permit this growing consciousness among women—that their particular social obligations compel them to claim a share in the conduct of political affairs—to find a constitutional channel.

This reasoning involves, of course, the admission to the franchise of women as women, whether married or single, propertied or wage-earning.

It is, I feel, due to you that I should tell you of my change of attitude, and I thought you would perhaps be interested in my reasons.

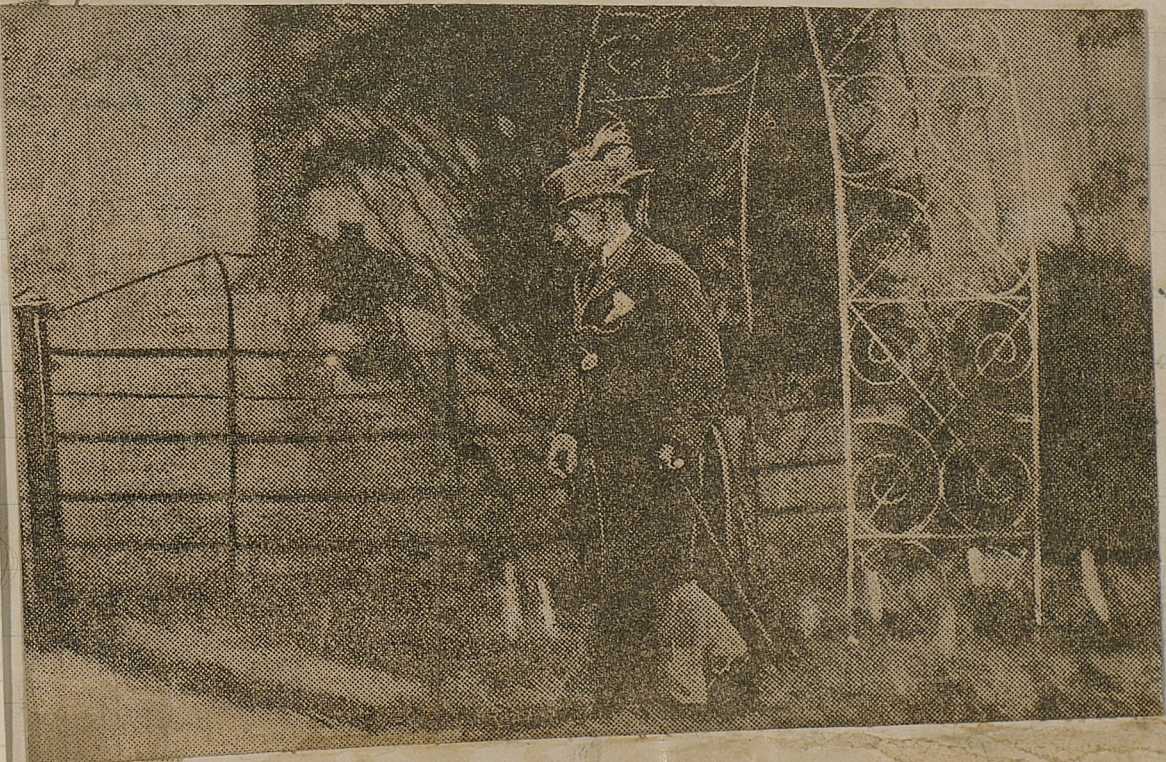

S — W — , spoke to me on Dec. 5. 1906, of the future of religion. Perhaps it was my eager hopefulness that made me trace an undertone of simplicity, reverence & even sadness in his clear metallic words.

"Our children" he said "will not give up religion as their fathers did. No! they will see that religion is not one of the many things that the world could well lose. They will, then, keep religion; but they will change it. To them it will not be the clear dogmatic, accurately formulated creed of a simpler age. It will be at its best a veiled, vague unformulated feeling that there is beyond yet within the world, above yet throughout their soul a Being with which they would be one in prayer.

"For they will keep prayer as they will keep religion. But as they will change religion so will they change prayer. When they pray it will be from the mind & heart with no form of praying. Their prayer & their faith will be alike inarticulate.

As he spoke, into my heart came a great longing bringing sadness.



"But" I stammered incoherently — "if the Infinite had  
 " become flesh & dwelt among men? If He has taken  
 " forms? If Jesus Christ is the Absolute upon earth  
 " for us to see and handle and hail and love? Is  
 " not the vital question now as ever 'What think ye

His wife could hardly let me close my phrase;

Distractedly as if reeling under a prophetic insight into the wounds of the world I answered "Shall we forbid a child to use words & signs of love because a child's words & signs are all awkward? Shall we not rather bid it ~~for~~ love as it can until the day comes when it can love as it ought?"

"True, there is an inward, formless, inarticulate, almost unconscious prayer wherein our soul is knit fast to God in a clasp of love. But though we may find we cannot begin with it. It lies not on the threshold of our spirit's life, but within its most courts which a man may reach only after much spiritual exercises, many denials, watchings and, it may be, the Crogs of suffering and disillusionment.

"So, too, the forms of thought into which we have thrown our limited views of God are but symbols of divine truths greater than our thoughts. Yet may we not therefore set them aside as worthless, for they are as rungs on which from here below

" And our children surely will learn - if only from the  
" wants & sins of mankind - that these forms, this
