Regent Hall, Oxford Street.

Visited this Hall on week evening. It was decorated with festoons & flags, which had been used for a sale in the previous week. The galleries were closed, & the meeting, (one for S.A. soldiers only) was being held in the central part of Hall. The meeting had just commenced (about 8.15) and 30-40 people were present. Others came in at intervals before I left. They were mostly working men & women, many of the latter were domestic servants and there were two or three unmistakably tramps. (Nearly 60 people were present.) ~~present~~. The meeting was led by an officer (Adjutant) & his wife, the former leading the singing with a concertina. The people sang lustily, but it sounded hollow in the large hall. When I came out, I got into conversation with a Salvationist, who turned out to be a former Hall keeper, who had been there many years. He has recently given up the post, & was working as an insurance agent & evidently met many of his clients in the vestibule of the Hall. He said that they used to get the place crowded; not only on Sunday but on weekdays the meetings were also large. The novelty has worn off & now the galleries are only opened on Sunday or on special occasions. This number at the week night meetings would only exceed 100 about twice a week, but on

Sunday evening, the body of the place was fairly filled. They hold an open air meeting in Hyde Park, & others in the poor streets north of Oxford Street. He spoke very highly of Ensign Miller who was the officer there when we were doing the district, but who could not see us through illness.

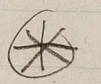



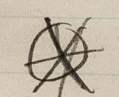

The progress of cycles north of Kings Road & west of Sloane's may be noted - & South of Kings Road northward from there.

This district is the most interesting & characteristic in Chelsea. Large parts both rich & poor remain as they were or almost as they were some centuries ago when Chelsea was a village a mile or more from London. The old church & Chapel walls are redolent of Queen Anne & the Georges - & the Courts & alleys have a unique character. Elsewhere the Courts are often old village bits superficial but nowhere so markedly as here - & it is with surprise one sees no pig in Jones Cottages.

All these courts are poor & have fallen into evil hands - front gardens now in filthy disorder. The fourth district lies south of Kings Road (west of Beaumont St) as far as Lott's Rd. - The newest & poorest & least pleasing part - Poorly without picturesque or romance - most is built on site of Cremorne Gardens & therefore quite modern but all through the tendency is downward purple becoming blue with tinge of black - spirit purple or sea blue - most of all in the older parts Gray Sq. the worst spot - Why Santa so low apparent to say the houses though filthy & dilapidated are well built on the Cremorne site there are badly built houses doomed to fall after a few generations of tenants. Altogether a depressing district affording refuge probably to many on their way from demolished Slums. But in the poorer parts most life is seen. Children swarm in the poor Courts - many of school age - seem robust but usually dirty - well nourished & fairly well clad - confirm the impression that there is no excessive poverty - no dark blue - but large proportion of rough low people who indulge in drinking & brawling.

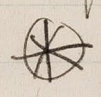

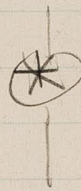

Sunday, Nov-24th 1861.

I visited St. Anselm's for the evening service at 7 o'clock. It was a fine night; - the cold but clean and brisk.

Distinctly one enters St. Anselm's one is aware that it's attitude is high. On the altar two candles are burning; before it being no less than seven of the censers or lamps which are seldom seen in English churches unless on very advanced times; a processional cross is standing by the choir stalls; there are no pews but rows of wooden ~~chair~~ chairs; there is no pulpit, nothing to interfere with the full view of the altar; the northern aisle is fitted with a second altar for smaller devotional services, and on the walls hang two pictures of religious subjects. Though rather cold in effect with its gray stone pillars and its white undecorated walls St. Anselm's is distinctly a striking church, and with a little added age will probably be exceedingly beautiful. Its interior architecture is much more Norman than Gothic.

all the arches being rounded. There is no sactur⁽²⁾ ~~thin~~,
the whole of the sactur end being stone work.

Probably as stated in the text the service - in spite
of the indications of rather advanced views in the
church - is high but not extreme. Last night
there was ordinary services, only differentiated from other
churches by the beauty of the music which was
excellently given by a large choir. The service, including
a sermon of about 20 minutes from (I think) Rev
Siclair; and lasted just an hour and a quarter.

The congregation consisted of (at the most) 80
females, of whom a few were children, but the vast
majority young women; and 12 males of whom 10
were heads of from 16 to 20; of the latter, four
made the collection. The people were entirely working
or lower middle class of the most respectable type,
just such a congregation as you find in any church
which gets a gathering of that class at all.

I was at the back of the Church, and owing ⁽³⁾ partly
to the pitch of his voice, partly to bad articulation, and
partly to bad acoustic properties in the church I could
scarcely hear a word of Mr Sinclair's sermon, but
from what little I did catch it was certainly not
worth hearing. After the service Mr Sinclair in his
carrook came down to the door to shake hands with
as many as possible as they left.

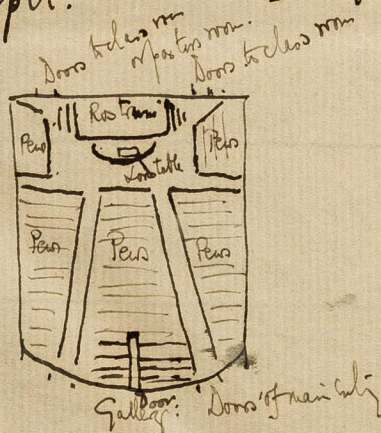
The inside of the Tabernacle is large & roomy with curved iron girders supporting a domed roof: the glass is of a cheap fairly colored, green, pink, blue & white kind let into the narrow windows in diamonds. There are plenty of windows & enough tho' not too much light comes through them - (It was a fairly bright morning): this is their shape  continued all along both E & W walls. If you can imagine the place stripped of its pews, it wd. remind ^{me} of a ~~converted~~ railway

railway restaurant or waiting room. (6)

The pews are of polished yellow pine with a small rack at the end of each for umbrellas.

There are no stools or ledges on which to kneel nor cushions on the seat: in the evening there was a mat on the seat.

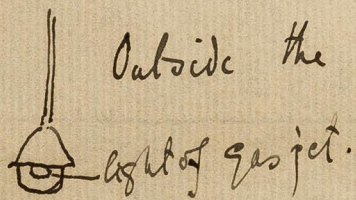

Part 3, Chap. 2: "West London": Paragraph suggested for insertion on Steinway Hall, Lower Seymour Street (presumably in S. Thomas' Parish).

During the greater part of the year Steinway Hall is crowded on Sunday mornings by members of the Ethical Religion Society and others who wish to hear the eloquent orations of Dr. Washington Sullivan. Membership of the Society is open to all yearly seat-holders, and those who attend are mainly thoughtful members of the well-to-do middle class, presumably believers, with Emerson, in the "new Church founded on Moral Science, the church of men to come". Hymns and solos are sung, and sung well, and readings are given from some writer who has dealt with, and, it may be, is the subject of the address that is to follow, but the great and sufficient attraction is the address itself. The lecturer, formerly a member of the Roman Catholic Church, has great command of language and a remarkable power of stimulating exposition. "Religion is Morality, recognized as a Divine command. Morality is the foundation" is the quotation from Kant that is placed at the head of the sessional cards, and it is in the spirit of this pronouncement that the teaching is given. The subjects chosen cover a wide field, the great intellectual problems of life and destiny, and the study of great lives, great poems and the great religious systems of the world taking their place by the side of others that are more purely ethical and practical in their bearing.

Mem. Material added to the box: Sessional card; list of lectures published; three lectures by Dr. Sullivan on "Retribution", "Hell", and "Christ and Krishna"; a letter from the Hon. Treasurer of the Society and also a leaflet, since sent me by a Member, giving "Principles" and "Aims".

Part 3, Chap. 2: "West London": Notes of a visit to the Christian Science Church, Bryanston Street, presumably in the parish of S. Mary. Sunday morning, Dec. 29, 01, and on Wednesday evening, Jan 1, 02.

This church is the only one in London, but it flourishes, and is ready too large for the building occupied. This building was formerly the Synagogue of the Spanish and Portugese Congregation, and holds perhaps 200 people in the principal room. On the morning of my visit this room was full, the general impression being given of a middle class congregation, including a considerable number of quite well-to-do people. There may have been a few working-class folk, but there were no poor. A quiet and devotional atmosphere made itself felt; the great majority of the people seemed to be connected with the church, and a feature that impressed me a good deal both on this visit and on that paid on the following Wednesday was the number of good and happy faces around me. There was a fair proportion of men, perhaps 25 or 30 per cent.

For instrumentation, they had a piano, and the man seated at this played a quiet voluntary just before proceedings began.

There is no pulpit, but two ~~axxxdxxx~~ reading desks at either end of a raised platform were evidently to be occupied. Flowers and shrubs filled the intervening space, and at 11.30 a lady and gentleman walked in and took their seats on the two chairs on the platform. The ~~xxxx~~ latter was I afterwards discovered the "First Reader" of the Church and has been appointed from head-quarters at Boston. He is a Canadian, and ^{originally} either a barrister or solicitor by profession. The lady is the "second reader", and has been appointed by the congregation in London. Both are "healers". Both looked and behaved like quiet, thoughtful and sympathetic people. There was no sign of bounce, gush or noise. Neither was there any sign of originality, for the whole of the service is ~~prescribed~~ arranged, and may be described therefore as being perhaps the most liturgical in London. It

opened with a hymn. A reading from the Bible followed, and then the Lord's Prayer was given "with its spiritual interpretation". The Second Reader led clause by clause, the people joining in, but the distinctive feature of the proceedings was found in the interpolation, also clause by a clause, of the "spiritual interpretation". This was read by the First Reader, presumably from Mrs. Eddy's writings, and formed a not uninteresting paraphrase, largely metaphysical in character, and, as far as it was ethical, wholesome. Before the Lord's Prayer, there was an interval for silent prayer. Another hymn and then, I think, came the Lesson which consisted ~~consisted~~ of six separate selections from the Bible, a few verses taken here and there forming each selection and all being read by the Second Reader. Each was followed by selections from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", read by the First Reader. This book is, of course, the great work of the Foundress, and is a vade mecum of the Scientists. I could not make much out of the selections read. A collection came in somewhere, and a hymn concluded the proceedings. At six o'clock on the same day, exactly the same order of service was to be repeated, and at all the churches of the sect throughout Christian Science-dom the same proceedings are followed.

I went on the following Wednesday evening, and was told that it would be well to come early, in order to secure a seat. It was the first day of the New Year, and doubtless many had social engagements, but, although not crowded, the hall was again full. (The Friday evening meetings have had to be started, because of the crush on Wednesdays). The First Reader officiated alone, and opened ~~with a hymn~~ by giving out a hymn. A reading followed, and then there was a five minutes' address, to wish us all a happy new year, and to explain the object of these ~~meetings~~ meetings, which was to spread the knowledge of Christian Science and to give opportunities for testimony. It was claimed that Christian Science was able to secure not only happiness --- a present heaven, but healing, and after a very

few words the speaker gave way, apparently to any one who might like to follow. In order to test the spontaneity of the testimonies it would be necessary to attend several times, but the impression certainly given is that those who speak genuinely wish the community to know what a good thing they or their friends have found Christian Science to be. The first to rise was a man of about thirty who spoke of the experiences in a Scotch village to which Christian Science had been introduced about 18 months ago: his most specific instance was that of a drunkard to whom he had spoken and lent ~~ix~~ literature; who had reformed and whom he regarded as a striking case of "impersonal healing". An elderly lady followed telling of the cure of her husband, an old gentleman who was present and whose life had been given up by the profession. A pleasant-faced lady of perhaps 30 years of age, spoke of her own experiences, telling of the happiness it had brought her and of the light it had thrown on the Bible, which, before she knew Christian Science, she had found so difficult and so full of inconsistencies that she had given up reading it. Now, again, there is no book she reads so much or with such delight and refreshment. (She mentioned this "because some people thought that Christian Scientists gave up the Bible".) Not only had happiness come to her but greater strength: "I may mention" she said "that my ankle which had been weak nearly all my life and which I had been told would always require a bandage, is now quite strong and does not have to be bandaged at all". A man whom I think was probably one of the "healers" spoke of the cure of a child whose eyes were terribly afflicted with ulcers etc. and had been pronounced incurable. He mentioned that part of the treatment had been "impersonal", but with him as with them all when ~~the expressions~~ such expressions as "gave him treatment" were used it was impossible to know whether some psychic process --- prayer, the outpouring of virtue --- was meant simply, or this with a physical accompaniment, such as handling. In no case, I presume

are "remedies" in the ordinary sense of the word administered. There were two others who bore testimony, one a lady, youngish, who described her treatment of her sister, ~~xxxxxxxxxx~~ apparently a nervous subject and whose case had therefore no special significance, and then sat down, to rise again the next moment because she had remembered the following incident: "I should like" she said "to mention that a few days ago, I was making the tea with the rest of my family round me, when my foot slipped while I was holding the kettle, and the water came over my arm. I gave it treatment at once, and three minutes afterwards there was no sign of redness and there was no pain. In fact the water felt quite cold". She mentioned the fact that only one other member of the family circle so far has adopted Christian Science, but that all were greatly impressed by what happened, and she clearly had hopes that all would become Scientists. In some respects this little spontaneous recital was the most interesting testimony of all. The queer little remark "In fact the water seemed quite cold" of course suggests the reflexion that it perhaps was not really very hot, but as to the genuineness of the belief that owing to the "treatment", whatever that may have been, the ordinary sequence of physical cause and effect had been broken there can be no manner of ~~xxxxxx~~ doubt. The remaining speaker, who had sandwiched himself in between some of the others, had an equally firm belief in the power of Christian Science, but his testimony, and his alone, moved to laughter, for he rose to tell us how he had been disturbed in the early hours of the morning by violent pains in the stomach, and how for two hours he had "struggled with mortal mind" in warding off a sharp diarrhoeic attack; how he had been tempted by doubtings as to the efficacy of his faith; "send for the doctor" said the tempting voice, or "Why not try a little brandy". But no; he stood firm, and at a quarter past eight took his accustomed place at the breakfast table, no one knowing of the two hours of wrestling through which he

had gone.

Perhaps it is misleading to have ended this account by describing an incident that partakes of the ludicrous, for the proceedings as a whole gave a very different impression. I detected no charlatanism, and again the happiness and goodness of many of the faces impressed me. When all the testimonies were over, the Reader pointed no moral. Not a word. He just rose and gave out a closing hymn, which we sang, and then the people scattered.

If I believe that the out-door relief from the Union is small compared with other districts in London.

In regard to crime the charges are mostly common assaults, drunk & disorderly. Not a district were thieves live, I cannot remember hearing of any arrests upon such charges as forgery, burglary etc.

Formerly certain parts of the parish contained a considerable number of disorderly houses but the Chelsea Vestry have been active in putting these down.

On the whole this is rather a district in which disorderly women live than were they solicit.

I am not aware that the people are less thrifty than most. The church encourages thrift, State clubs, Build, Societ etc.

~~The people marry as~~
 & The rents for a whole house would be say from £35-60 per annum. Nearly all are not led in tenement, 3 families in each house. Most families have some sort of sitting room not containing a bed. There are no large workmen's model dwellings. But several blocks of flats led in 6 sets of 3 rooms each rent about 7/- to 9/- weekly. The flats for middle class people are new & have not taken well.

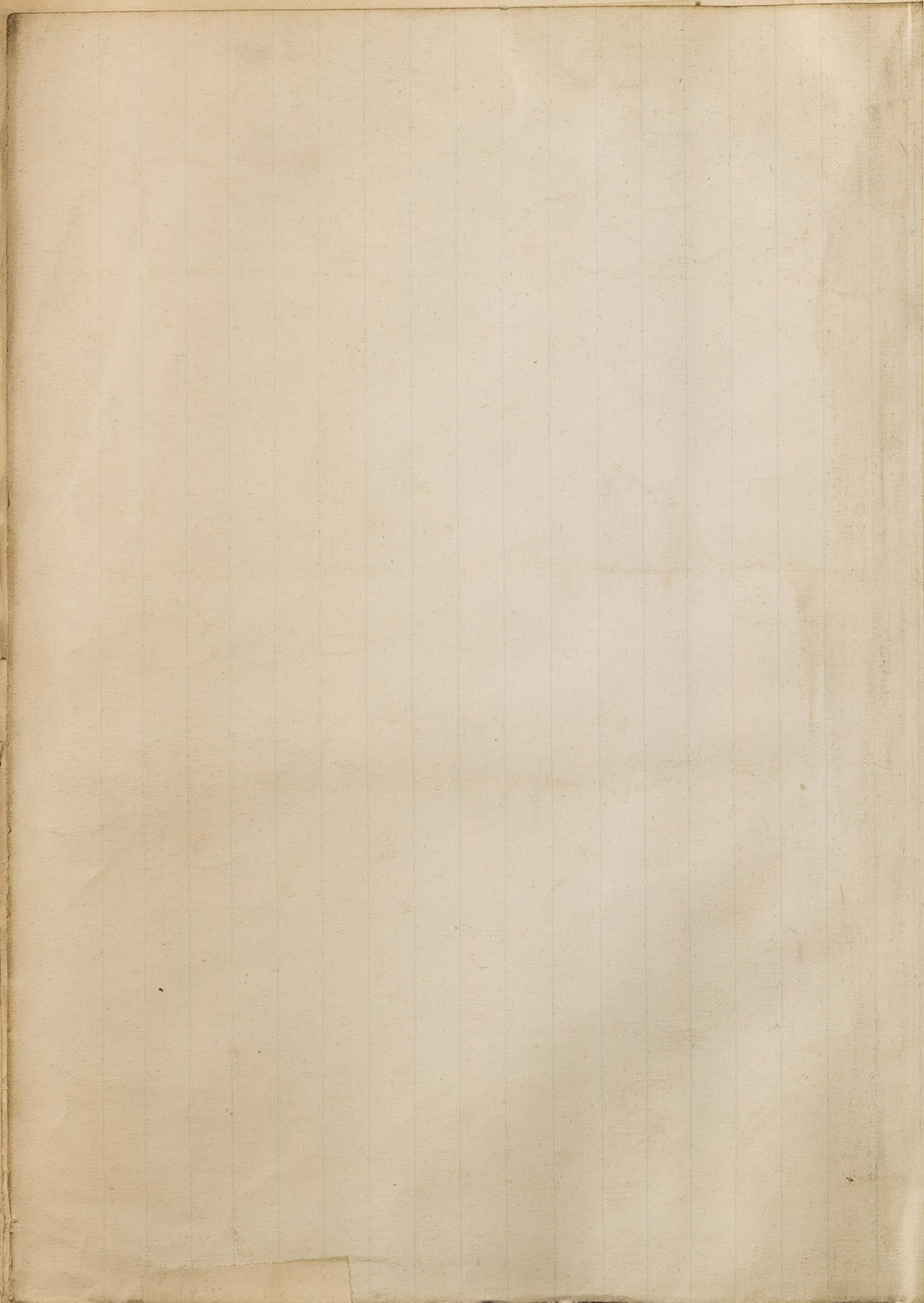

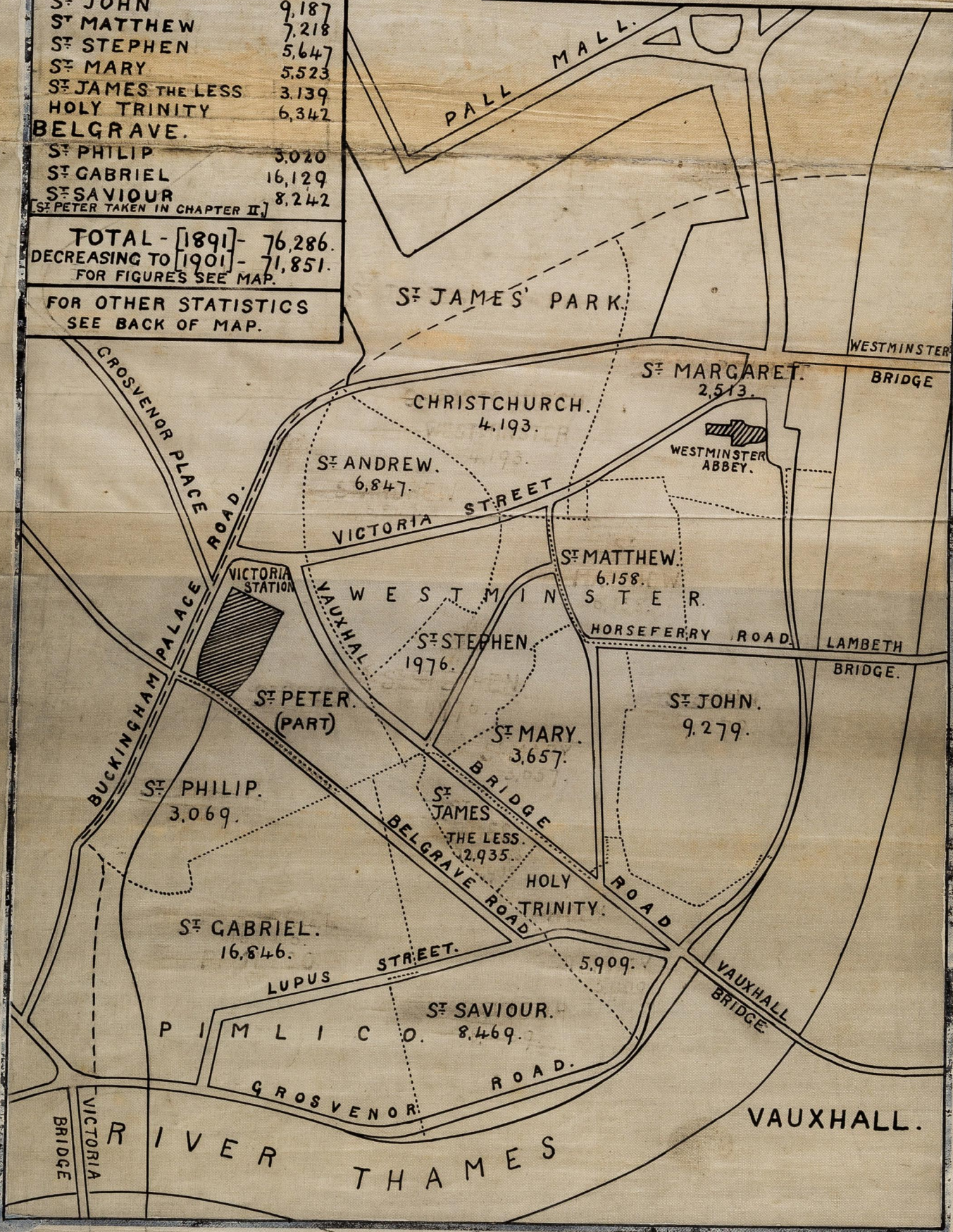

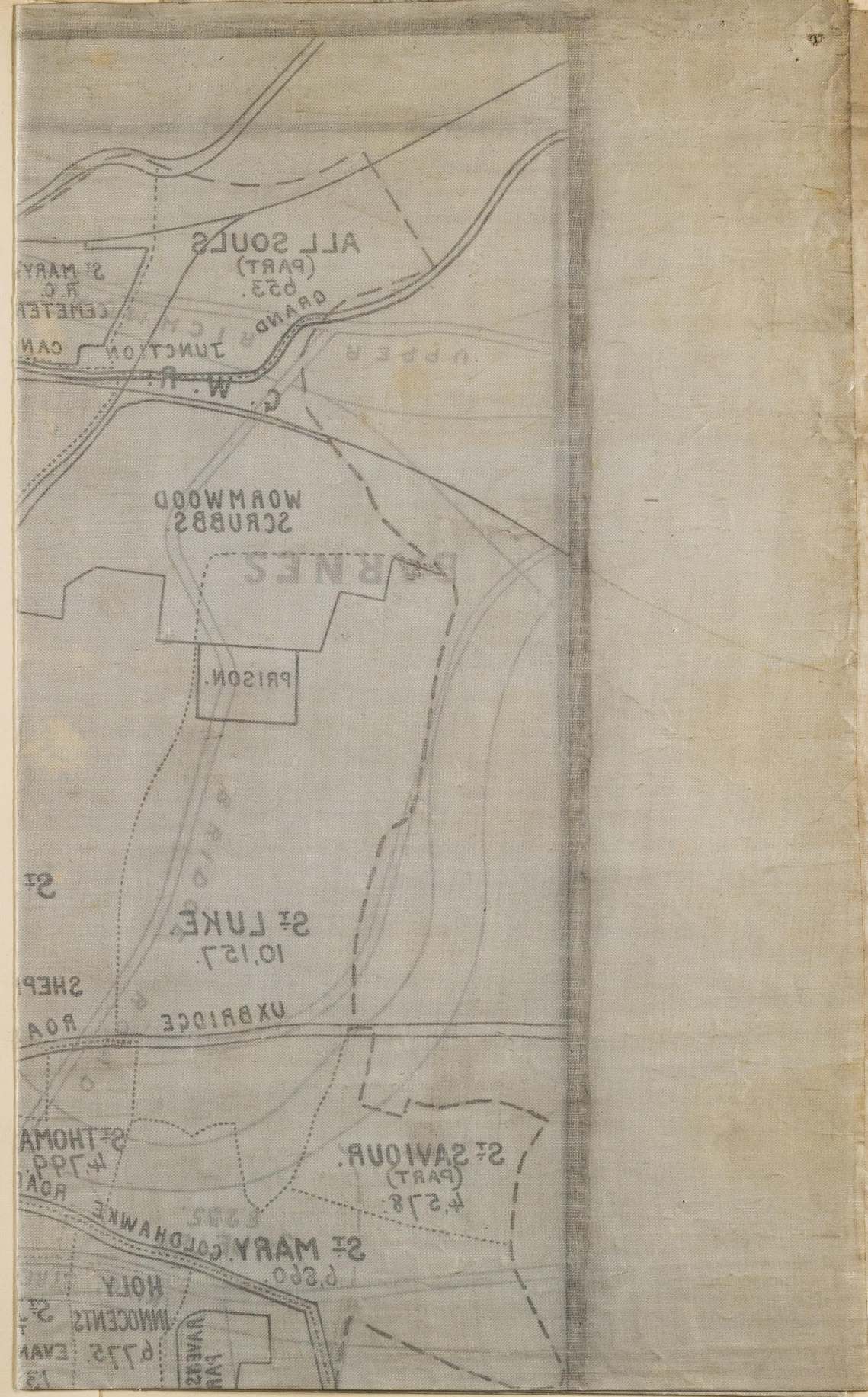
SKETCH MAP OF DISTRICT.

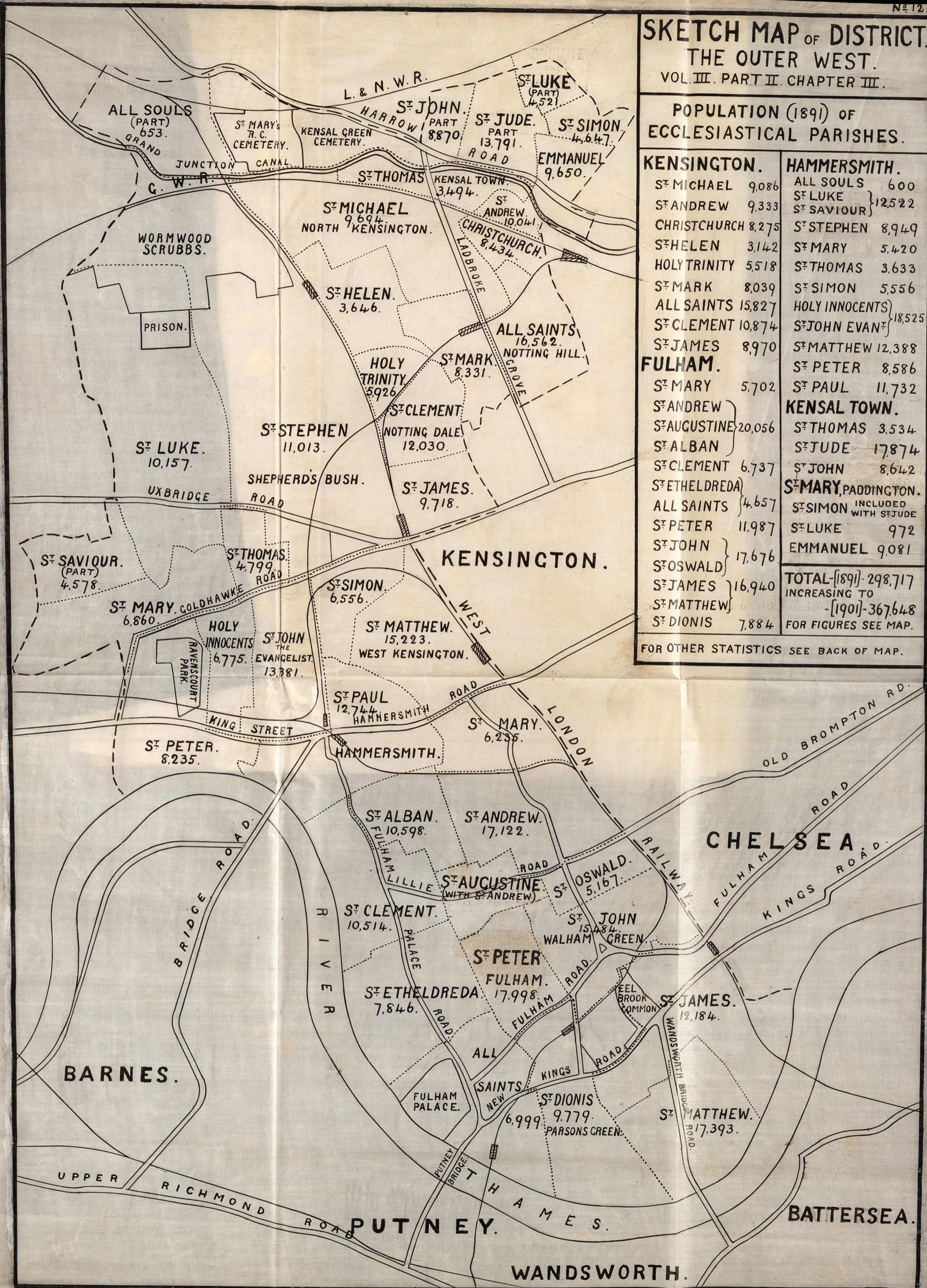
SKETCH MAP OF DISTRICT THE OUTER WEST.

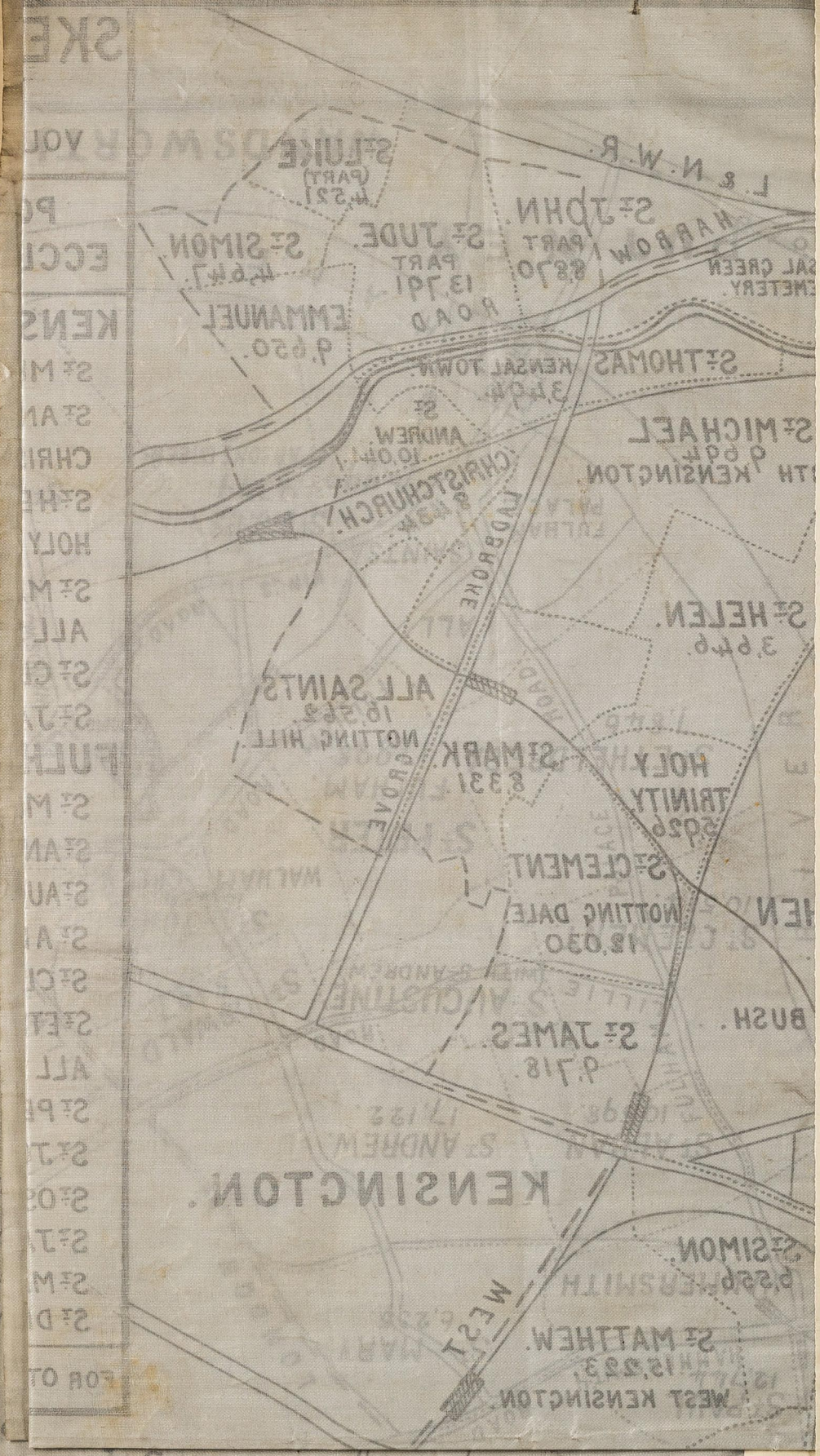
