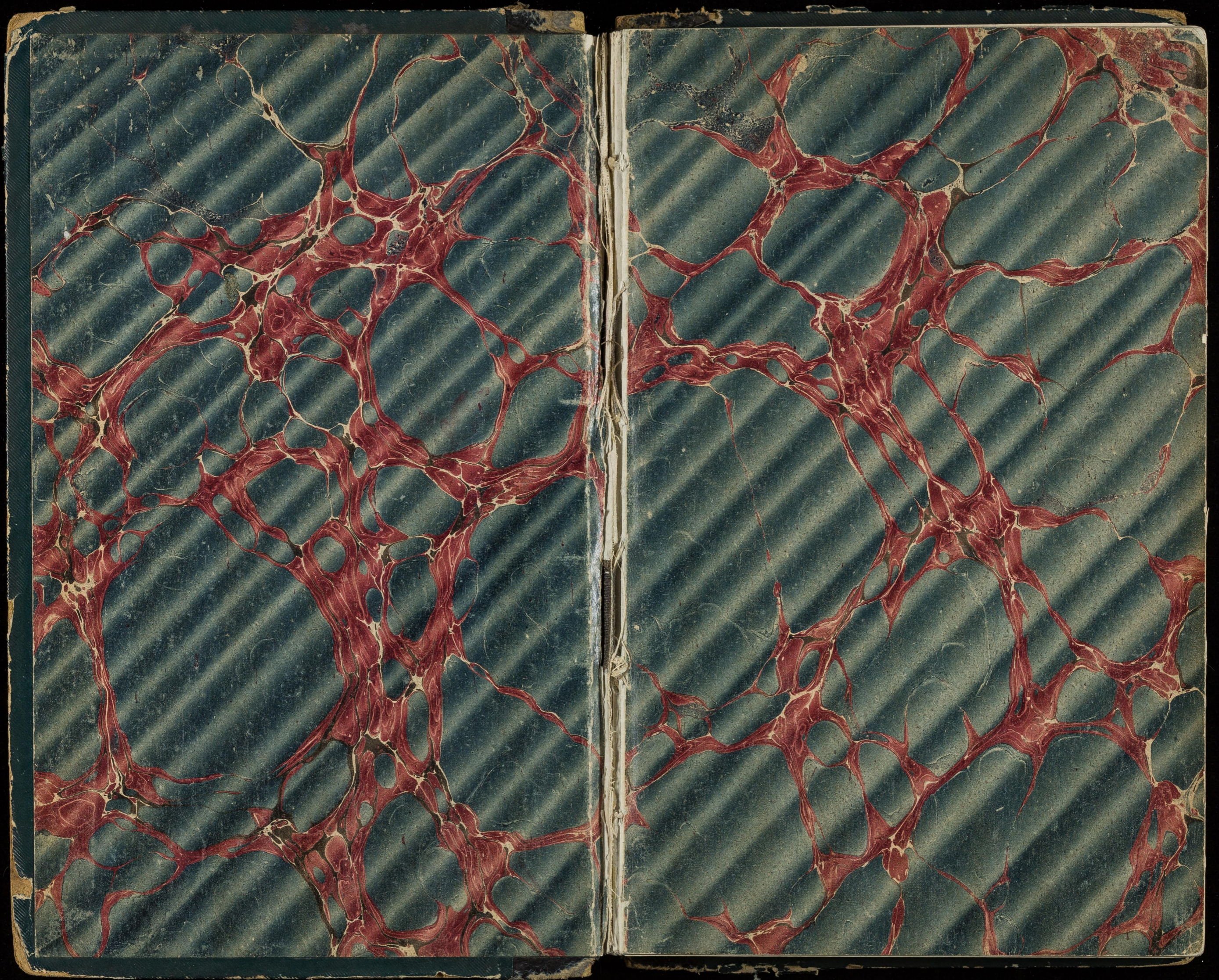


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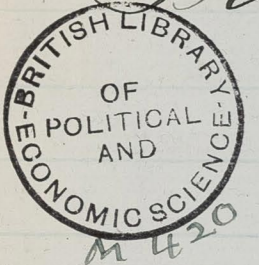

General Notes. This woman was passed to Stepney
from Poplar in June 1884. She said that she
carried on the shop in Carr St for 18 mths after her
husband's death, but could not manage as she
had a bad leg. She sold it for £20; paid debts £8 and
spent balance. For the past ⁽⁴⁾ years, she had been
in the S.A & W.H. chargeable to Poplar for the most
of her time. Shopkeeper in North St. says she lost
business thro drink. She is a great drunkard.
She passed again from Bow on Aug 30 '86. On Feb 21st '88
she applied for admission having been one night at her
sister's (Usher R^d) In April '88, she comes out to nurse
a friend; stays at Usher Road. When she applied for re-
admission she was referred to Poplar. She was transferred
to Stepney on March 22. 1889

General Notes. This man applied for his wife's admission to the S.A. on April 13th 1881. She had been suffering from dropsy 3 weeks & he could not supply the necessaries ordered by the doctor (Dispensary) R.O. visited and found them in one room at 31 London Street (since June 1878). ^{rent 1/9.} Woman was in bed; place looked very poor. C.O.S. had given 2/6 on previous day. The next day, man came & said that his wife died in the morning (3 a.m.) & he wished her buried. He would pay when he got work. He had done no work since 2 weeks before Christmas, he said when he applied for admission to W.H. on Jan 10. 1883. R.O. visited & found man at home; another man shared his room (Dennis Toomey) & paid him 9^d per week

for the accommodation. The man was admitted to P.W.H. He came out in Feb 7 & went hawking but not having a license he was afraid of being locked up. Re-admitted July 19/83. In Aug. 1883, he asks for a warrant, so that he may go hopping; this was granted & he went and did not return until Oct 10th 83 when he was re-admitted. In Feb '84 he came out for a day & slept at a C.L.H. in Poplar & was re-admitted from that parish. In the following May, he came out and went into the country selling firestone ornaments, returning to the Workhouse on July 15th 1884. The only other record is that he was passed to the Stepney Union from Poplar on Nov 10th 1886, since which date he has been in P.W.H.

General Notes. On Dec 4 '78, this woman applied for medical attendance. She was bad and had a fit; she had been working in the wet. Medical. Order was given. On Jan 14/79, Mary Willis came & said that Maria B. was taken bad on the previous day & could not leave the house. She was admitted to S.A. This woman had a room (rent 1/6) at 6 Regent Court; previously she had lived for 24 years at 144 Eastfield St. In June '83 she had medical attendance. She was working in Alibotto dust-yard & earned 5/ to 6/- per week. Medicines are also given in July 1884, Jan '85 and in April '85 she was admitted to S.A. Asst R.O. visited and says woman was in a "most wretched dirty state". The next application was on Sept 11. 1888. The woman had then been out of P.W.H. 5 days to attend the funeral of her son's wife and had stayed at her daughter's in Carr Street. She came out of S.A. in May '85 and lived with Mrs Hill at 19 Eastward St for a year. Afterwards in B.W.H. for 2 years & then after being a few days at Carr Street, she was sent back to P.W.H. She was re-admitted to P. W.H. and has remained there since. On June 5th '89, she asked for some clothes so that she might get work. Application refused.

On each occasion, she leaves the House, one day & is re-admitted the next. In Jan '88 she was in the S.A. & she has been out of P.W.H. twice since; the last occasion being on March 28/89. She has been allowed out occasionally for a day to seek work.

She left the W.H. in May '81 and acted as servant to her sister until March 22/82 when they had a quarrel & she left. She slept in Dr. E.C.T. Casual Ward on the following night & was sent to P.W.H. on March 23. In Aug '84 she asked for clothes to go hopping but was refused. She came to ask for re-admission while drunk and was refused. For 4 nights, she slept in casual wards and was then readmitted. In Aug, 85, she was out for a day. In June '86, she "came out for a change"; took too much drink, fell down & bruised her face, she was out about 4 days; slept the last night in a W.C. & was re-admitted to P.W.H. on June 16. 1886.

General Notes. This man applied on April 4 '85 for admission to P.W.H. He had been in St Pancras W.H. on and off for many years. (He came out in July 1885 to work for Mr Slawson, Three Colt Street. He paid him 12/- a week & rose him to 18/- a week) He left 11 weeks before because Mr S. would not give him more. He had applied at St Pancras but they sent him to Stepney. He had been lodging at 11 Desbites Rents. Mr Slawson gave him a good character, but says he was not strong enough. He was admitted to P.W.H. He came out in July '85 and went back to Mr S., who gave him 16/- a week. He poisoned his thumb in March 1887 & not being able to work for 3 weeks, he went back into P.W.H. He was discharged from the S.A. in May '87 & admitted to B.W.H.

His hand was crippled. He came out for a month in July and a fortnight in August '87 but could not work at his trade on account of his hand. In 1888, he comes out five times, but does no work: some bakers give him bread and he sleeps in various casual wards or walks the streets. He was last admitted on April 25th 1889.

His application was made on May 10th 1888. For 5 weeks previous, he had stayed at the Salvation Army shelter, paying 3^d for supper and bed. He was admitted to P.W.H. & has remained there since.

On Feb 4th, '78, this man applied for admission. He was staying at Phoenix Chambers & had not worked for several months; he had a bad leg. He had previously been in S.A. with a broken leg. He used to live at 16 Garden Place with Mrs Sullivan. He was admitted.

He applied again on Feb 7/81 - had not worked for 16 weeks - & was admitted to P.W.H. In Oct. he had med. relief and in Dec '81, he is sent to S.A, his leg being still bad. Had not worked for 4 months. He came out of the S.A. in June 1882 & returned to the Phoenix Chambers. In Jan '83, he applies again but was not admitted. On July 4, 83, he said that he got drunk at Driscoll's house on Thursday; he put down

Donovan. P. continued.

half a sovereign to pay for drink but Driscoll's would not give him any change but locked him up after having knocked him down. Driscoll did not appear so Donovan was discharged. He had not worked this week but earned 18/- in a day & a night, the week before. R.O. made enquiries at Driscoll's. He was told that the man spent a lot of money in drink and publican refused to serve him; he then became violent & abusive and a policeman had to be called to remove him. He was not locked up. Order given for Poplar. The man did use it but applied again on Aug. 3rd & was admitted to P.W.H. Neighbours had helped him: he had not worked for 10 days. He makes other applications on Dec 13 '83, April 24 '84, June 19, Aug 29, '84 having been out a few days on each occasion. On Jan 4 '86, the man was re-admitted; he had been supporting himself nine months. He came out for a few days in June '86 and he was in the S.A. later in the year; on being discharged from S.A. on Dec 9th '86 he was sent to P.W.H. where he remains. On Aug 30 '88, he asked for clothes so that he might leave the W.H. and his application was refused.

Mr Reaney had assisted them. He had only earned 7/- in a fortnight. Asst R.O. visited: They lived in an attic at 31 London St. rent 1/9; there was a bed on the floor, without any covering, very dirty. "Man a dirty looking fellow". Woman was sent to B.W.H. On Jan 13/85, the man asks to be admitted; he had the ague and had only earned 4/0 since Monday. Sent to P.W.H. The wife came out of B.W.H. on

over

March 30 & finding her husband was in P.W.H., she applied for re-admission and was sent to P.W.H. Her face was bruised & cut, when she applied - By a fall, she said. She came out again in April '85 but was readmitted the next day. On Oct 28 '86, the man applied for admission; he had only earned 2/6 for the last 6 weeks. Previously he had been earning 2/6 a week & board & lodging. His employer had gone to India. His wife would try & keep herself. He was admitted to P.W.H.

General Notes. This woman (R.C) applied for relief being destitute on Feb 26/79. Her husband, a rigger, died 10 years before and she had had relief from Stepney Union. It had been stopped however & her son Will^m admitted to the school. R.O., who had known her for years, notes that relief was stopped because the woman drank very much. Her mother, Mrs Purcell, is described as an abominable old drunkard. The people in whose house she lived used to lock her out because she was so bad & on one occasion she injured herself trying to get in by a ladder

Mrs Fin

She was sent to P.W.H. and in Feb/81, she and her boy James were sent to P.W.H. (the mother being ill), from No 55 Narrow St. This house was in very bad condition - none of the occupants paid rent. The boy made the applⁿ.

The son William being lame, appeared to have been apprenticed by the parochial authorities to a tailor in Brompton. He ran away in December 1882 & applied to R.O. four days later, when he was staying with his mother at 41 Cornwall St. ^{St George's.}

He said that his master told him to leave: his master said that the boy went because he was impertinent. The boy was lazy & insubordinate & had threatened to strike his wife. The boy returned to his place but twelve months after the master asks to have the indentures cancelled. "The boy swarmed with vermin & was very dirty." The guardians declined to do this. Nothing more is heard of this lad until March 1885, when his master told R.O. that the lad was sentenced to 6 months imprisonment for violent assault in Aug. 1884. Police corroborate this statement & say the lad was drunk when he was apprehended.

The mother, Julia Fin, has medical relief in

1883 & in 1884 (Jan), she and her son James are sent to Poplar W.H. From this time, her life is that of the pauper, varied with occasional hop-picking excursions and drunken bouts. In Sept. 1887, she applies for admission in a drunken state and breaks a window at the Relief Office. Between this date & March 1889, there are six re-admissions, usually within a few days of her discharge.

The son James after leaving P.W.H. seems to have taken to the Common-lodging-house life. He is admitted to Poplar W.H. twice; tramps to Hull & Yarmouth during summer of 1889. At the end of that year, he got a place as coal-dealer's lad & applied for clothes to the guardians but was referred to Poplar in which parish he was living. (36 Pennyfields)

He kept an house 20 Redmond's Row for 20 years.

She accepted his offer. The woman applies since for med. relief for her child Eliza & says that her husband has earned 12/- in 5 weeks.

A former landlady gives the woman a good character but describes the man as a "lazy scamp" altho' she cannot say he drinks to excess.

They were reconciled subsequently & the woman does not apply again until Nov 25/87 when she applied again saying that her husband had turned her out; he was drinking. Two days after, the man told R.O. that he had taken her back again.
