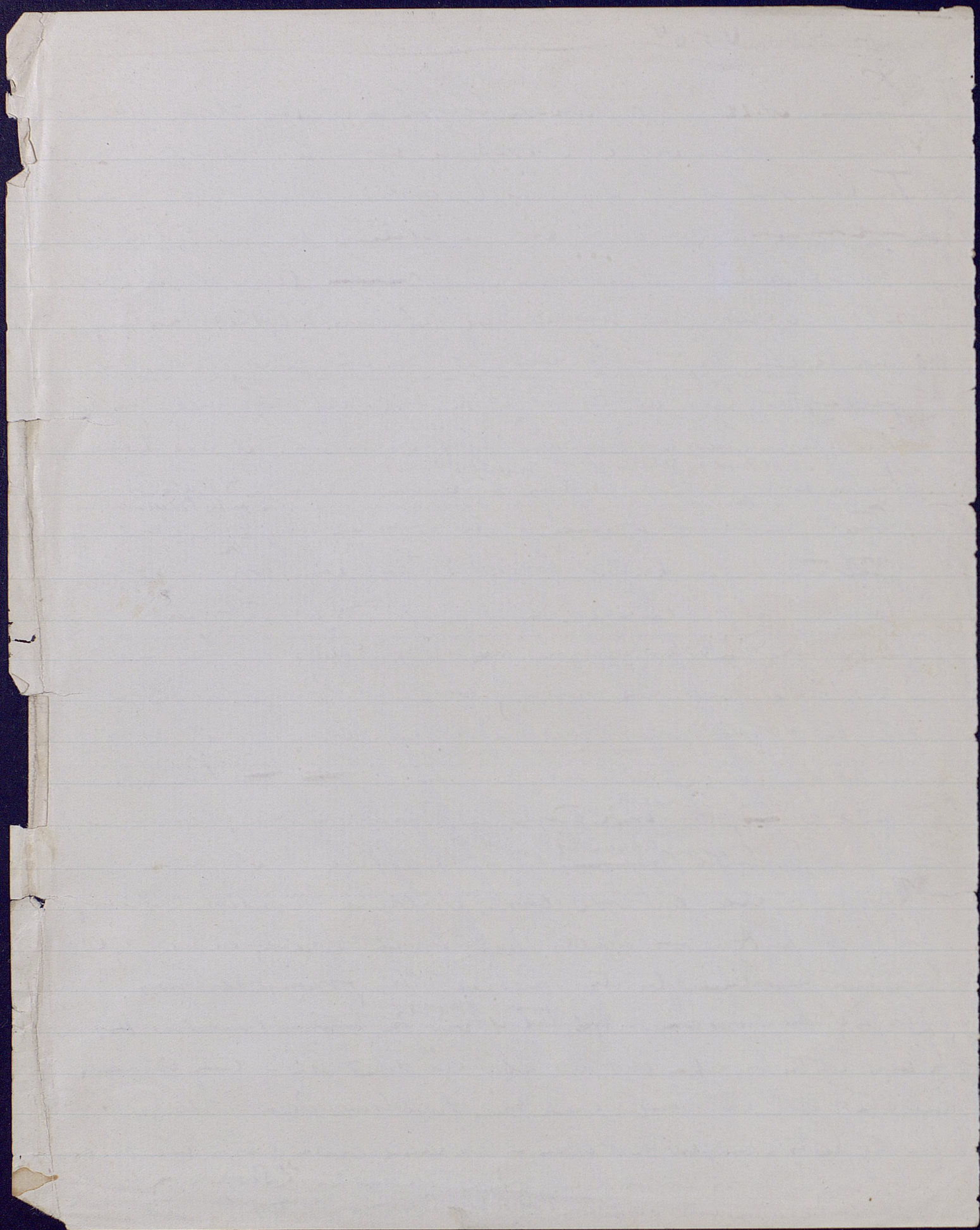

Extract from letter from Professor Karl Pearson, Oct. 9. 1930.

*(It arose out of H. P. sending me the two last volumes of his Studies in the History of Statistics - to which I wrote.....)*

"I have read with much interest your account of what you believe, perhaps it wants supplementing by a paper 'What I don't Believe'. You separate science from emotional faith, probably because you are not a scientist. The really great scientist is always a poet - a man of creative imagination - and therefore essentially emotional. He knows that he can never get to the bottom of things, and is only describing them as he feels them. No scientific theory is really true to the phenomena it attempts to describe, it is only an imaginative way of expressing the little one grasps of Nature. It is really something which satisfies the emotion as well as the reason, and as such it is religious in its pursuit of the unobtainable and in the practice which follows on what is exaggeratedly termed "knowledge". Hence I cannot agree to your distinction between science and religion; if you mean by prayer a personal examination which leads you to clearer notions of your relation to life around you, well and good. But if it leads you to link yourself to "an all prevailing spiritual force", you have plunged yourself into a sea of theological dogma, too storm driven for me to desire to swim after you!.....
