Talk with Inspector Police Constable Richard Machell of the Old Street subdivision of the G or Finsbury Division of the Metropolitan Police. at The Station in Old Street.

R. Machell is a man of about 37 years of age, rather above medium height, broad, florid face, drooping moustache, stout.

It rained so heavily & constantly that it was impossible to walk round the streets.

As to the changes in the neighbourhood, Machell said that warehouses had encroached upon dwellings to such an extent in the last 10 years that the poor working class who used to live in the district had been driven elsewhere - to Tottenham & Walthamstow. Some Model Dwellings had been put up but the class that came to them was different to

to that which had left. In the Princess Buildings
you had the quiet poor, in the other Buildings
a class of City workers who formerly lived at
a greater distance. Among the working class that
remain there is a considerable admixture of
criminals, principally pickpockets & house
breakers who worked in either in East the City or
West London. It is also a centre for Receivers
of stolen goods. This & Clerkenwell adjoining,
may be called the 'melting pot' of London. ^{Practically all}
silver or jewels that are stolen come here for
disposal & are either broken up & melted or
dismounted & reset. The house breaker or wast-
housebreaker is a higher class of man than
the pickpocket. Pickpockets do a little every
day but the house breaker is often a respectable
citizen for a month or two while he is making
his plans, & then ^{breaks out} has a large haul from some
house or warehouse. Rachel knows one who
keeps a grocer's shop. Some skill is needed in
housebreaking, knowledge of policeman's beats
& patrols & habits of inmates of the work
house.

warehouse or dwelling into which he means to
break: also a considerable amount of pluck.
If you are to have any chance of success in
recovering the goods stolen you must be on their
track at once. He has known things taken in
the west end to be on sale in his subdivision
within 3 hours of having been taken. Modern
silver is invariably melted & fetches $\frac{2}{3}$ a lb.
Old silver is rarely 'broken'. The difference in value
intact is worth the risk. 10/6 an oz is given for
old candlesticks. [this conversation had particular
reference to our own burglary. G.H.D.]

As to drink, the number of public houses ~~was~~ decreasing
in one block alone in the subdivision. Five had
been pulled down & replaced by warehouses.
The licenses were not granted anew elsewhere.
Among the remaining licensed houses - which
for the most part are small - the most
remarkable thing is the ~~very~~ elaborate way
in which they are being rebuilt & the high
prices that are given for them.
Drunkenness is also largely decreasing - both
among

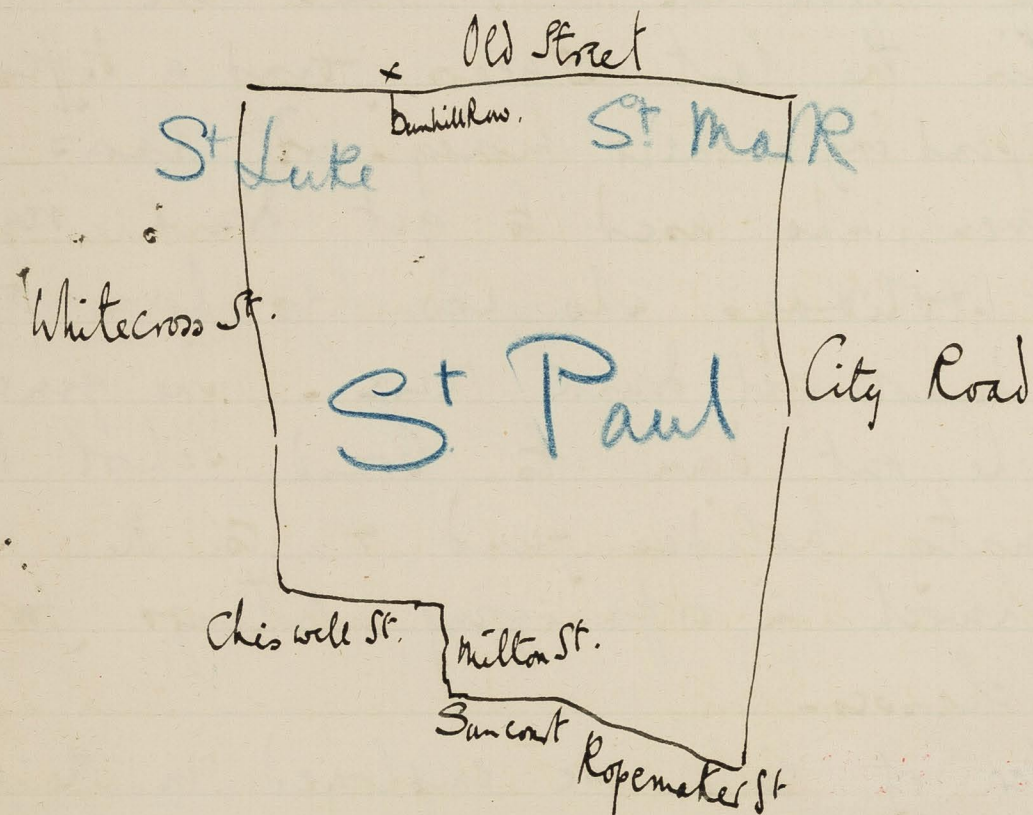

among men & women. There were 200 fewer charges
~~this~~ ^{in 1897} year than ^{in 1896} ~~last~~ ~~year~~. The reason that Machell
gave was & foremost that the rough ^{drinking} class
was being driven out & that those who remained
had within the last 5 years found a different
way of spending their money. He knows now
several men who used to get drunk regularly
on Bank Holidays who now go down to Southend
instead - 'I do not get drunk there'. The general
decrease he put down to Board School training,
to the country holiday fund & to the work
of the church in organizing meetings for the
working classes.

A large number of girls are employed in the district
in De la Rue's (stamp & envelope making),
in stay making & by Bouril & in box making.
The roughest of them are Bouril's employees.
They do not live in the district but come from
Islington & Stoxton.

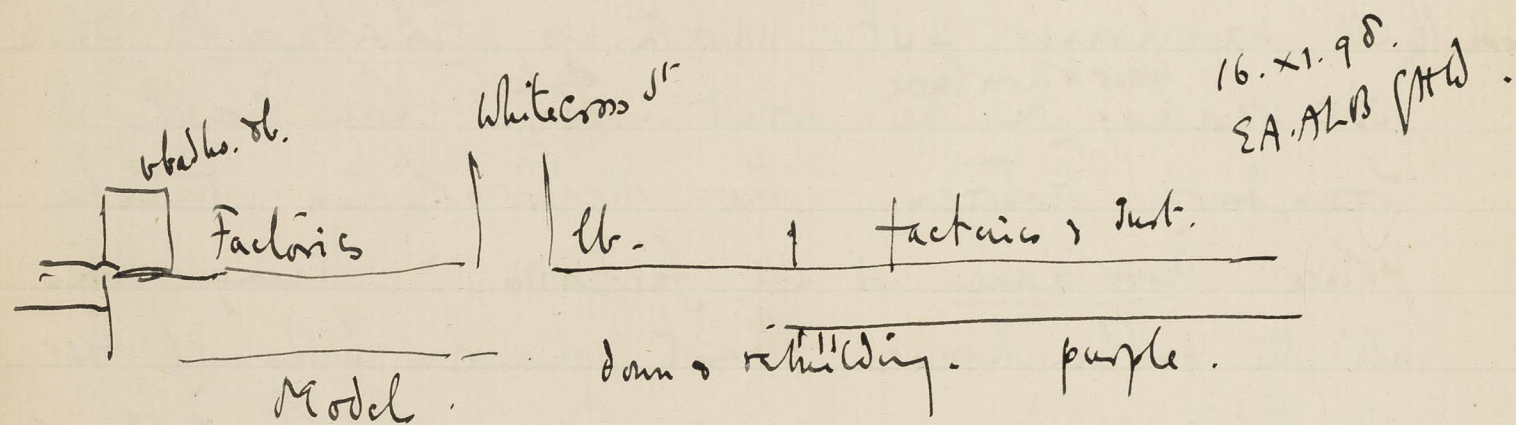

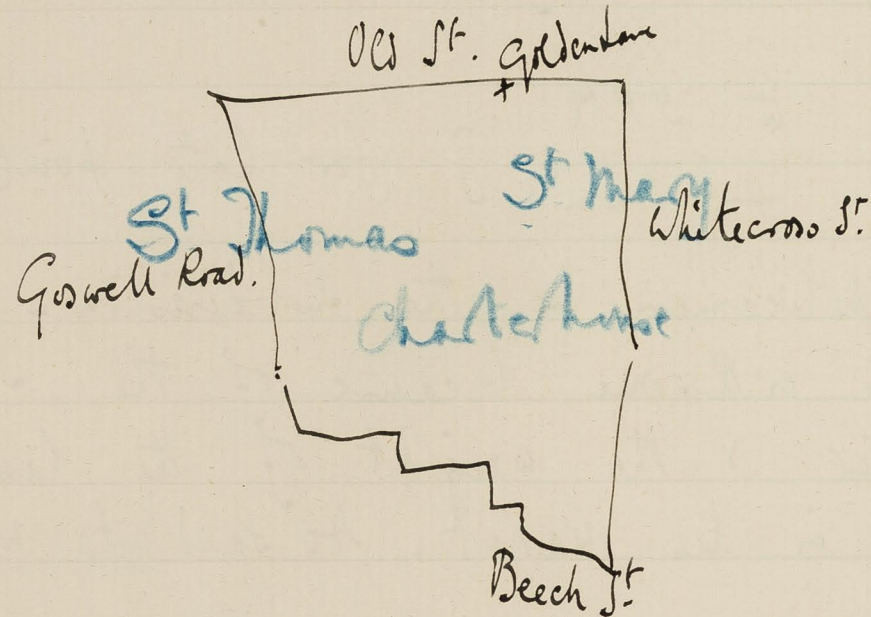
There are 168 policemen in the subdivision.

Machell himself was a book binder before he became a policeman. As police man he began at 23 years of age, he is now 35 1/2 yrs old, 12 1/2 years in this subdivision & never in any other. The limits of age for a police-man to enter the service are between 20 & 27.

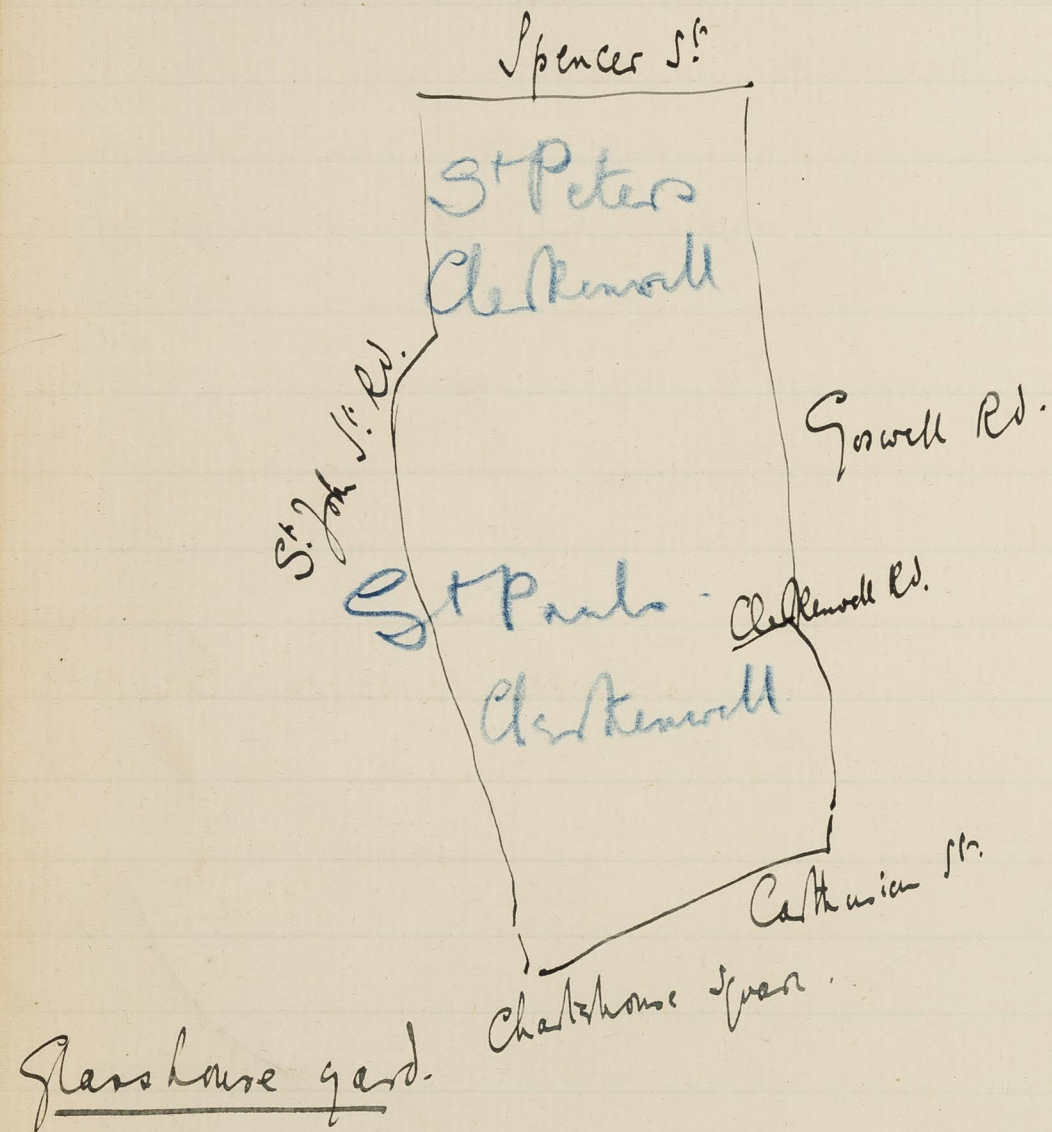
Clerkenwell, said Macbeth, is the home of the engineering, jewellery, & watch trades. It also harbours many thieves, both pickpockets & burglars. 'Tea-leaf' is the slang police word for a pickpocket but he does not know the origin of it: so is 'Buster' for the burglar. On the other hand thieves speak of the police as 'Rozzers': 'Copper' is the name given them by the respectable poor.

Very little call money is now paid. The riots of 1887 gave it a death blow. The publican as far as he knows pays nothing. They are too poor about here to be able to give away their money.

Two respectable looking men in the Spowell Road with black tail coats, bowler hats, good boots white shirts & collars, shaven except for a moustache he pointed out to me as well known 'busters'. The district was at one time more prosperous than it is now. The decline of the watch trade has made
some

some difference. But to judge from the small brass plates
on west doors there must be a good deal of
watch & jewelery work still done in Clerkenwell -
Street's way.

As to Prostitution - King's X Metropolitan Station is a meeting place for prostitutes & juvenile thieves. Zenhan thinks that the old & ugly women does a good business, as the younger & better looking. 'The old ones get hold of the young fellows from the country! Their earnings be put down at between 20s. & 1/2 per person - while for some a pot of beer or 1/2 of gin is sufficient.' The same women go on at the same job year after year. Speaking of the rough courts, Zenhan said 'we very rarely go into them' - at first he said 'we never go into them.'

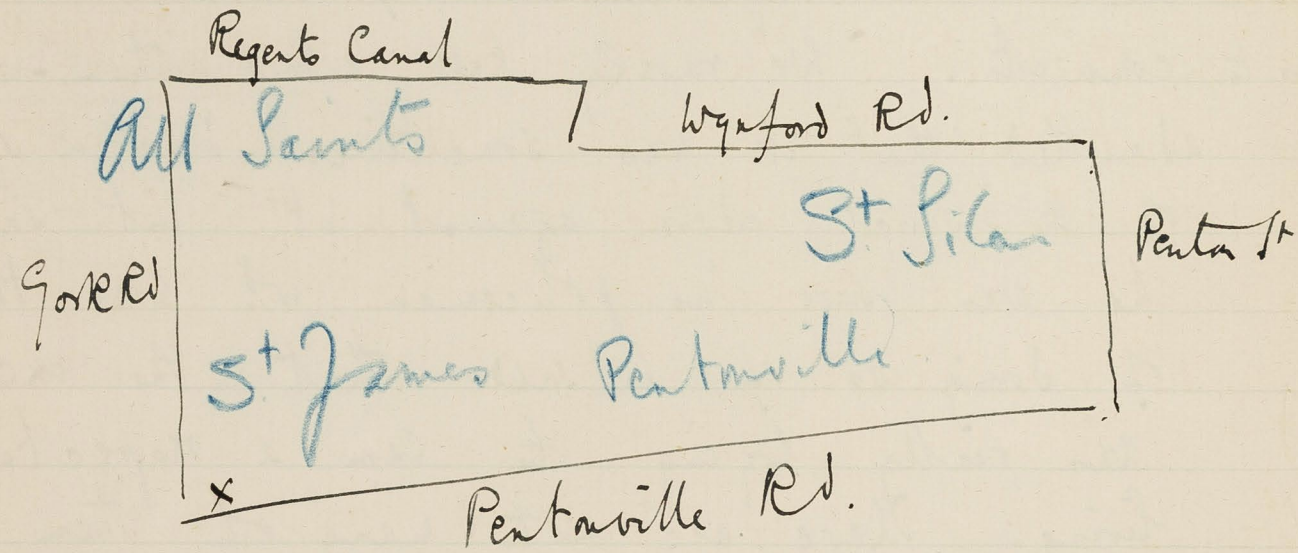

As to drink. The impression of both Col. Mansell & Mr. Hammond is that it is increasing amongst women & decreasing amongst men. In neither case said Mr. Hammond was the increase or decrease so marked as to attract his special attention. But it was sufficient to give

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give him the general impression stated above. Drunkenness amongst children is very rare, 'very rare indeed, most exceptional'. There is a sense of fatherhood or motherhood among ^{all} drunken parents even the most drunken that prevents their giving their children drink. 'Young people don't get drunk naturally' - Very rare that they ever do so under 15 years of age & then only at holiday times - when they think it 'the manly thing' to do.

If children were prohibited from fetching beer it wd not mean that they did not go into the public house. He does not think they come to any harm by it. 'Publicans really are careful about children'. He will not say that they don't occasionally serve children who are under ^{the prohibition} 13. He is sure they do. 'It is one of those laws that sound very well on paper but are practically a dead letter because it is impossible to enforce: policemen cannot always

always be in a public house to see that young people are not served. Disregard of the law leads to no serious harm. He thinks a law prohibiting children from fetching beer wd. also be disregarded.

Excess of drink is found more in good times than in bad. The fact is men don't know how to spend properly more than a certain amount of money. If they get more they spend it in drink or gambling. No doubt about gambling being on the increase. Does not see how it can be stopped. About 6 clubs in the district each with tape machines. You shut one up & it breaks out again in the same or in another place. Many cabmen taken in the Clermont Club. All he expects to do in this case is to prevent the same men from carrying it on. Same way with brothels. Thinks it almost better to know where they are than to shut one up & then be uncertain as to its whereabouts until it is firmly established in another place. Col.

Mr Morgan has been in the service over 16 years. He looks about 40 years of age. middle height, wiry, brown beard & hair close trimmed, bright small eyes & pleasant voice. He is head of the Detective Dept in this division & was recommended by Col Mansell as being one of the best men at his work in London.

Crime, he said, had been decreasing all over London in the last 10 years especially crime with violence. There has been a slight recrudescence this year which has taken the form of pistol gangs. Gangs of lads get together they insult one another lady loves & then comes trouble. The two most notorious are the Lemon Lane & the Margaret St.

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street gangs. Each connected with the tram
or omnibus companies. Wherever there is
a hill & extra horses are kept waiting
to pull up the vehicles you find a
rough set of boys who ride the horses

You can only get at them by complaints from householders & often householders will not complain. Then if you do shut one up it opens again elsewhere. There is the same difficulty about gambling clubs. Gambling is on the increase. As a first measure he wd have them all registered. He believes you can trace more crime to gambling than to anything else. They are more difficult of conviction than any other form of club. Most men have a bit on at one time or another & they never

Every form of crime is a specialty. 'Occasionally you get a good all-round man, a man who both picks pockets & burgles but only very occasionally. Picking pockets - Busting - Burgling, van-dragging & horse stealing are each distinct branches. A horse stealer is exclusively a horse stealer: but there are a few men who combine a little of two or 3 of the former trades. Another curious thing is that these men occupy well defined areas. Within these areas they move frequently but never outside them.

For instance you never find a horse stealer who does not come either from Bow, Stratford, Tottenham, the Wardsworth Road or Wyndham Rd. Clerkenwell. It wd be within the mark to say that Hoxton, Clerkenwell & Somerton include half the criminals not of London only but of the provinces. All the best thieves come from

'At times I have tried to find out about it from inspectors or constables, but they think I have been told by the Superintendent to find out on the sly' & they shut up at once. I said I thought it was pretty general though none wd admit it, that it could not be stopped & that within present limits it did not do much harm. Then he admitted it & agreed with 'but it wd be better if they took nothing'. Relations of police with working classes is friendly; friendly also with criminals 'if you take them fair & square'. 'They know it's your business to take them & don't blame you for it' but 'it's dangerous to take them in what they call an underhand manner'.

Copper's marks or copper's roses ie informers are plentiful but you must be careful how you use them.

He was a teetotaler but is now a moderate drinker. Almost forced to be by the custom of 'having a drink'. 'Say a tradesman helps you, you cant give him a shilling, you must say 'what'll you have' & go to the public house & drink.'

Drunkenness & police.

Very little drunkenness now among the police. It has become too dangerous either to offer or accept drinks from publicans. The class of men put into public houses as managers by Companies is better than there used to be under the untied system. 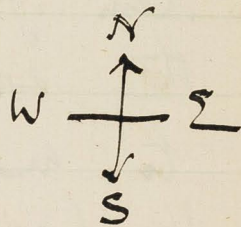
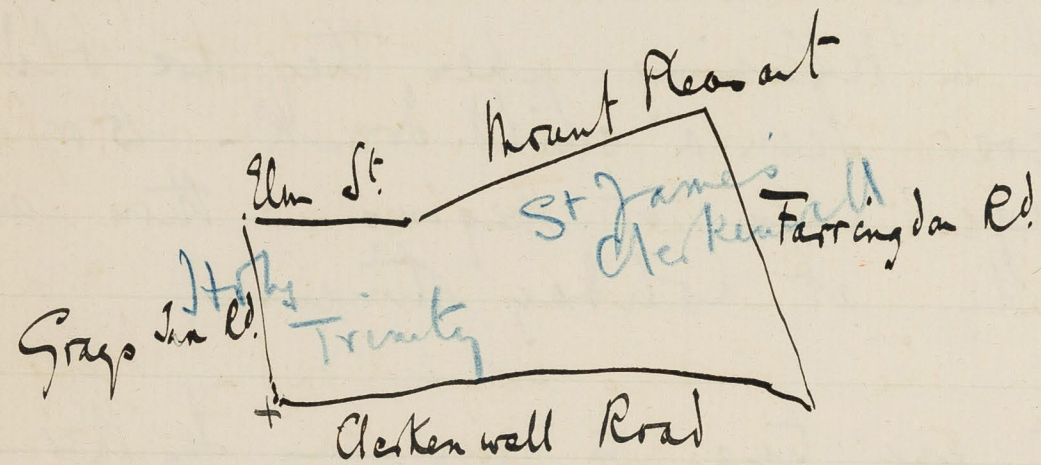

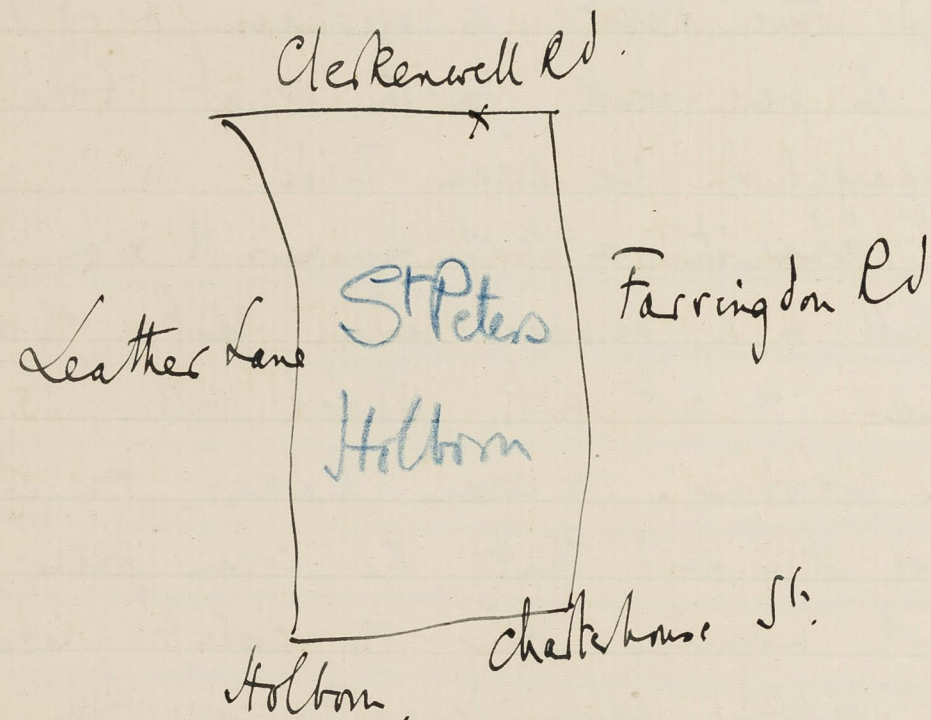
