I beg to thank you for
your long letter. The prints you
make are quite satisfactory.
I also see you have marked
Miss Gore Bollen's statement
that "the old methods of
the strike are obsolete" in one of
the Records you sent to me.

I thank you particularly
for putting side by side,

with each Reform Bill,
 the legislative results ensuing
 from these Bills.

I doubt though if the results
 of the Reform Bill of 1884
 have much improved the
 conditions of the agricultural
 labourer. I know of one
 village near Littleport in
 Cambs: ~~where~~ there I should
 deem peculiar, namely
 because the rate payers refuse to
 provide a proper water supply - as
 they say it would be too expensive.
 And the one man who urged

(a relative of my own) but
treated exactly as I have
"Enemy of the people" on

occasion. You see, this is
bandaging from the wrong point,

made in Parliament for them.
