CONSTITUTION.

I. **Title.**

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

II. **Status.**

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

III. **Object.**

The Junior Council subscribes to the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

IV. **Methods.**

1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and co-operates with the Society in sending speakers to colleges and schools and in collecting information on Trainings and Openings for women.
2. The Council enables young professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with young women already in business or practising.
3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

V. **Governing Body.**

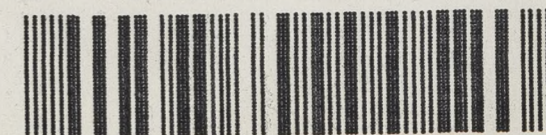
The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Treasurer, and an Hon. Secretary to conduct the current business of the Council.

VI. **Membership.**

1. The Junior Council shall consist of men and women (a) who subscribe to its aims; (b) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (c) who have paid a minimum annual subscription of 2/6 to the London and National Society for Women's Service before the date of the annual meeting of the Junior Council.

2. A minimum annual subscription of 7/6 shall entitle members to House Membership, with the right to use the Library, Restaurant and other facilities afforded by the Members' Centre.
3. Membership of the Junior Council shall be limited to a period of five years, but may be extended by the Executive Committee.
4. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.
5. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.

#### VII. **Officers.**

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Treasurer, and the Hon. Secretary.

#### VIII. **Executive Committee.**

1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members.
2. It shall at the first meeting after election elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.
5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

#### IX. **Nominations.**

1. Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

#### X. **Meetings.**

1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.

2. Special General Meetings of the Council (a) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (b) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

#### XI. **Resolutions.**

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

#### XII. **Alteration of Constitution.**

The Constitution shall not be altered except after agreement between the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society, and confirmation by a General Meeting of the Members of the Council. The nature of the proposed alterations must be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members. Any alteration to be carried must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

**ANNUAL MEETING.**  
**WOMEN'S SERVICE HALL, MAY 8th, 1930.**

Chairman: Ethel Watts.

PROCEEDINGS.

**I. Chairman's Opening Remarks.**

Miss Watts welcomed the members of the Junior Council to the Annual Meeting and expressed keen satisfaction at the number of new members who have joined during the year. She said that a full account of the year's work would be found in the Secretary's report. Before calling on Miss Stoney to read it, she wished to proceed with the second item on the Agenda.

**11. Appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.**

Miss Robinson proposed, seconded by Miss Gatey, that Miss Nora G. Jones should act as Returning Officer and Mrs. Simpson and Miss Capon as Tellers. This was passed unanimously.

**111. Annual Report.**

The Annual Report was then read by Miss Stoney. On the motion of Miss Collier, seconded by Miss Bachrach, the Report was adopted for printing and circulating.

**IV. Financial Statement.**

The statement of accounts which covered a period of thirteen months owing to the alteration in the date of the end of the financial year, was read by the Hon. Treasurer. It was moved Miss Bevington, seconded Miss Roughan and carried, that the financial statement be adopted.

**V. Appointment of Auditor.**

It was moved Miss Hancock, seconded Miss Key and carried, that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

**VI. Message from the Senior Executive Committee.**

Miss Strachey stated that she was deputed by the Senior Executive to convey their congratulations on the work of the year and best wishes for the year to come. She announced a further generous gift to the Society from Miss Clegg of the site of number 31, Marsham Street, which would effectively complete the property on the south side of the gateway. On this site would be built a large reading room connecting with the library and offices which would

be a source of revenue. Miss Strachey suggested that the only way in which members could testify to Miss Clegg real appreciation of her care for the Society was by endeavouring themselves to do their best to forward its work, and she asked for the help of the Junior Council to make a success of a new Employment Research Committee which was to be set up. It was hoped through this Committee to bring the Society's present Employment Committee into touch with members of the Society, both Senior and Junior, with a view to profiting by the wide experience they possess in different fields of employment. It was proposed to hold monthly meetings and that the main function of the Committee should be the collection of information. The Executive Committee were the more desirous of the support of members in this matter as the Society had been appointed to act as official Advisor, both to the Oxford and to the Cambridge University Women's Appointments Board. These bodies had recently been set up at the two Universities and it was felt to be very gratifying that the Society should have been selected for this responsible work by both.

These important announcements were received with enthusiastic applause and the following resolution was moved by the Hon. Secretary and carried unanimously:

"That the Junior Council in Annual Meeting assembled, desires to thank the Senior Executive very warmly for their message and resolves to send a personal message of appreciation and thanks to Miss Clegg for her magnificent gift."

Several questions were asked by members about the work of the Employment Research Committee, and a large number of those present volunteered to serve.

**VII. Alteration of Constitution.**

Resolution moved by Miss E. Russell-Smith, seconded by Miss A. E. Mackay, and carried unanimously:

(a) "That the Subscription for House Membership be raised from 5/- to 7/6 from 1st June, 1930."

(b) That Rule VI of the Junior Council Constitution be altered accordingly, and that a resolution be placed on the Agenda of the next General Meeting of the Society for a corresponding alteration in Rule V.

**VIII. Election of Executive Committee.**

Eighteen nominations having been received, a ballot was held and fifteen members were subsequently elected. The result of the ballot was announced by the Returning Officer before the members dispersed.

The names of members serving on the newly-elected Executive will be found on the first page of the Report.

JUNIOR COUNCIL

REPORT.

We have to record with sorrow the loss of our President, Dame Millicent Fawcett, on August 5th, 1929. At the Memorial Service held in her honour in Westminster Abbey, several members of the Junior Council acted as stewards.

This is the fourth Annual Report, and the first Junior Council Annual Meeting in the new Hall, of which the foundation-stone was laid by Dame Millicent Fawcett on 24th April, 1929.

The year has been crowded with activities demonstrating the growth of the Junior Council, and the membership has continued to increase steadily, a total of two hundred and twenty-two new members, representing many different occupations, having joined during the past twelve months. We welcome among other new members, a dispenser, a technical officer at the Cardington Royal Airship Works, a lecturer on law in the University of Hamburg, two surveyors, two veterinary surgeons, a metallurgical chemist, a dancer attached to the Margaret Morris School, a physical training instructor and a probation officer.

The General Election Campaign, in which women voted on equal terms with men for the first time, demonstrated the very real interest of our members in the economic position of women to-day. About 130 members volunteered to help in various ways. Members suggested the names of over 500 friends who were approached, and many of whom offered to collaborate. Of these, over fifty joined the Junior Council. Members wrote letters to candidates, and asked questions at meetings, at which nearly 9,000 leaflets were distributed. Nearly all the replies received from 126 candidates in fifty constituencies were in favourable terms. The question of publicity was fully discussed at a joint meeting of the Political Committee, the Publicity Committee and the Panel of Women Journalists, and valuable suggestions were made by Miss Isitt of the "Manchester Guardian," and Miss Edith Shackleton, who subsequently wrote an article in the

"Evening Standard." Mrs. Ashbey Fordham, one of our members, at the invitation of Miss Elizabeth Edwardes, a candidate for S.E. St. Pancras, made a canvassing tour of the constituency, and subsequently embodied her impressions in an article, which appeared in the "Observer." Correspondence in local newspapers was also arranged with excellent effect.

It would have been impossible to carry on the work without the very generous help of two members of the Senior Executive, Mrs. Glover and Miss Clegg, each of whom gave £25 towards expenses. In addition, several members of the Junior Council, who, through absence or stress of work, were unable to take an active part, sent monetary contributions.

On April 26th, 1929, in the midst of the political campaign, Sir Donald Maclean, K.B.E., M.P., came to a party and spoke on Electioneering and Parliamentary procedure from an M.P.'s point of view, and Miss Margaret Harvey, Secretary of the Women's National Liberal Federation, outlined the work of an election agent. Miss Mary Kennedy of "The Times," Miss Spender of "Country Life" and Miss Vera Brittain were present, and excellent accounts appeared in subsequent issues of "The Times" and the "Manchester Guardian."

In June, Mr. Seth-Smith, Curator of the Zoological Society, Regent's Park, addressed the members on "The work of curators at the Zoo," and exhibited some interesting lantern slides which were greatly enjoyed. He reluctantly confessed that openings for women workers in Zoological Societies were most infrequent, although two women hold the post of assistant curator at the London Zoo.

On the 10th July, the Junior Council gave an At Home to meet Miss Katherine Mayo, author of "Mother India," when it was necessary to hire an outside Hall owing to the large number of acceptances. Miss Eleanor Rathbone, M.P., snatched a few moments from her Parliamentary duties to join the gathering and many senior members of the Society were present.

A general desire having been expressed by members to learn something of the work of insurance, Miss Edith Beesley, West End Manager of The Southern Life Association came on October 24th, 1929, to speak on present day openings for women in this sphere of work.

At the November party, Miss Lilian Barker, Governor of His Majesty's Borstal Institution for Girls, was the guest of the evening, and gave an interesting and entertaining description of her experiences. She described what is done for the girls during their stay in the Institution, and the system of after-care for those who had left. During the

evening, Miss Mary Stopford also spoke on the life of a probation officer.

On January 13th, 1930, the Junior Council held its first dance in the new Hall. One hundred and fifty members and friends were present. The Variety interludes organised by Irene Stoney were very popular, and the floor was found to be excellent. A donation of £30 was handed to the Senior Executive out of the proceeds.

In February, 1930, a party was given at which Miss J. M. Harvey, Secretary to the Film Society, spoke on the Film Industry, with particular regard to the employment of women.

During this month, a second subscription dance was held and many congratulations were received on a very successful evening. Miss Purvis gave several charming exhibition dances.

An At Home was held on March 4th, attended by about two hundred guests, to meet the Secretaries to the Delegates to the Naval Disarmament Conference. France, America, Italy, and Britain, were represented. Lady Sprigge welcomed the guests on behalf of the Society, and a representative of each Delegation replied to her speech, and offered a cordial welcome to members of the Junior Council visiting their respective countries.

The Debating Society has gained much in strength, and the following debates have been held:—

March, 1929. Motion—"That patriotism is a vice rather than a virtue." Proposer, Major V. T. Hamilton; Seconder, Mrs. Fordham. Opposer, Rear Admiral Taylor, C.M.G., C.V.O.; Seconder, Mr. Lewis Lloyd.

December, 1929. Motion—"That experiment is more important than tradition in the development of literature." Proposer, Mrs. Blanco-White; Opposer, Miss Theodora Bosanquet.

January, 1930. Motion—"That our present civilisation is inimical to the production of great literature." Proposer, Miss Russell-Smith; Opposer, Miss K. Duff.

February, 1930. Motion—"That we should return to a belief in the devil to avoid shipwreck." Proposer, Miss M. H. Barralet; Opposer, Miss K. Johnston, Secretary to the British Federation of University Women.

March, 1930. Debate with the 1919 Club on the motion—"That this House would welcome a United States of Europe." Miss Sybil Campbell occupied the Chair on this occasion and four speakers took up the cudgels on each side of the House.

The Speakers' Classes proved so popular that a further course of six classes is now being conducted by Mrs. Blainey, which eleven members are attending.

The Executive Committees of the London and National Society for Women's Service and the Junior Council have

held two Joint At Homes in Women's Service Hall, one on March 19th, when the Chair was taken by Ethel Watts, and Mrs. Oliver Strachey spoke on the Society and the Royal Commission on the Civil Service; and the other on "The Degree of Co-operation at present possible between men and women in the same occupations," on April 2nd, when Lady Sprigge took the Chair and members of the Junior Council spoke on Accountancy, Political and Journalistic Work, Medicine, Law, Industry, Architecture, Agriculture, the Film Industry, and Veterinary Surgery.

A member of the Junior Council, Isobel Goddard, acted as one of the British delegates to the Congress of the International Alliance of Women for Suffrage and Equal Citizenship in Berlin in June, and at the preliminary meeting which led to the formation of the Open Door International Council.

A meeting to make known to students the aims of the Junior Council was held at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford, in March, 1930. During the same month a representative of the Junior Council accompanied Miss Dalglish, head of the Women's Service Advisory Bureau, to Bedford College to speak to the students; and Miss D. J. Collier, M.B., B.Ch., accompanied by Miss Russell-Smith, attended a meeting of medical students at the London School of Medicine for Women.

At the Annual Conference of the National Council of Women, held in Manchester in October, 1929, E. Russell-Smith, was one of the principal speakers at a Young People's meeting.

In April, 1929, Ethel Watts accepted an invitation from the 1918 Club, Liverpool, to attend a luncheon at which about seventy members of the Club were present, to speak on the work, and in particular, the Parliamentary activities of the Junior Council.

Our thanks are due to the Publicity Committee for revising and bringing up to date the Press Statement, which has been widely circulated.

The work of the Junior Council is expanding in interest every year in consequence of the increasing variety of occupations represented by the membership, and the personal interest manifested in its activities by individual members.
