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CONSTITUTION.

I. **Title.**

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

II. **Status.**

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

III. **Object.**

The Junior Council subscribes to the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

IV. **Methods.**

1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and co-operates with the Society in sending speakers to colleges and schools and in collecting information on Trainings and Openings for women.
2. The Council enables young professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with young women already in business or practising.
3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

V. **Governing Body.**

The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Treasurer, and an Hon. Secretary to conduct the current business of the Council.

VI. **Membership.**

1. The Junior Council shall consist of men and women (a) who subscribe to its aims; (b) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (c) who have paid a minimum annual subscription of 2/6 to the London and National Society for Women's Service before the date of the annual meeting of the Junior Council.

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2. A minimum annual subscription of 7/6 shall entitle members to House Membership, with the right to use the Library, Restaurant and other facilities afforded by the Members' Centre.
3. Membership of the Junior Council shall be limited to a period of five years, but may be extended by the Executive Committee.
4. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.
5. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.

#### VII. **Officers.**

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Treasurer, and the Hon. Secretary.

#### VIII. **Executive Committee.**

1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members.
2. It shall at the first meeting after election elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.
5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

#### IX. **Nominations.**

1. Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

#### X. **Meetings.**

1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.

2. Special General Meetings of the Council (a) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (b) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

#### XI. **Resolutions.**

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

#### XII. **Alteration of Constitution.**

The Constitution shall not be altered except after agreement between the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society, and confirmation by a General Meeting of the Members of the Council. The nature of the proposed alterations must be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members. Any alteration to be carried must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

MEMBERS' READING ROOM, 24th APRIL, 1931.

Chairman: Ethel Watts.

### PROCEEDINGS.

#### I. Chairman's Opening Remarks.

Miss Watts welcomed members from the Chair and pointed out that this is the fifth Annual Meeting of the Junior Council and the first to be held in the Members' Room in the new building of the Society just completed. Miss Watts said that an excellent year's work had been carried out by the Junior Council and the popularity of its social activities was proved by the large attendance of members and their friends who gathered to hear the varied and interesting subjects discussed. The Junior Council as a Society was probably unique in representing so many of the professions recently entered by women. As regards policy, the members were united in their determination to strive for equal pay for equal work. Miss Watts said that she thought the Junior Council should be proud of the excellent progress it has made in the last twelve months, of which a full account will be found in the Annual Report. Before calling on Miss Stoney to read the latter, Miss Watts proceeded with the appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.

#### II. Appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.

Miss Shewell Cooper proposed, seconded Miss M. L. Roughan, that Miss Nora G. Jones should act as Returning Officer and Miss E. Douglas and Miss Capon as Tellers. This was passed unanimously.

#### III. Annual Report.

The Annual Report was then read by Miss Stoney. On the motion of Miss E. R. Glover, seconded Miss K. I. Hancock, the Report was adopted for printing and circulating.

#### IV. Financial Statement.

The statement of accounts, which covered a period of twelve months, was read by the Hon. Treasurer. It was moved Miss G. Petersen, seconded Miss S. Lister, and carried, that the financial statement be adopted.

#### V. Appointment of Auditor.

It was moved Miss E. Douglas, seconded Miss G. Robinson, and carried, that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

#### VI. Discussion on Resolution to embark on work in connection with Local Government.

Resolution, moved Miss E. Watts, seconded Miss P. Strachey, and carried:—

“That the Junior Council should associate themselves with the Society's work in Local Government; and that they should have representatives who, by attending at Council meetings and in other ways, should make themselves conversant with the work of Local Authorities, in order to become thoroughly informed from the Society's point of view, concerning:—

1. Work affecting women.
2. Women staff.

With the object of:—

1. Making the best use of present legislation.
2. Rousing interest in Local Government.
3. Educating new women Councillors.”

In moving this Resolution, Miss Watts said that interest in Local Government is very small, in many cases being limited to the people serving on the Councils. Local Councils offer an open field to women where a certain proportion of the work obviously requires the administration of a woman, e.g., sanitary inspectors, librarians, etc. Clerical work in the offices of local Councils affords women an opportunity of taking an active interest in local government. Local Government in England is in a chaotic state, but local councillors are open to suggestion. Miss Watts suggested that Junior Council members should obtain information in their own districts on the local Council's work before any definite plan of campaign is launched by the Junior Council as a whole. She appealed to Junior Council members to make every effort in this direction and not to regard the work as a burden, realising that Junior Council members are busy women with little time to devote to subjects outside their own professions and occupations.

Miss Strachey, who said that she had been asked by the Executive Committee to second Miss Watts' resolution, gave an amusing and interesting description of the way in which her keen enthusiasm for local government work had been aroused. The Employment Committee set up in 1920 had done excellent work, particularly with regard to improving

salaries. Miss Strachey emphasised the importance of getting to know friendly women councillors and of supplying them with information, and pointed out that the work can better be accomplished through people living in the localities. The reputation of the Society had been built up on their adherence to facts, and Miss Strachey felt strongly that the Junior Council should keep up that reputation.

Miss Mackay then pointed out that if the Junior Council became interested in Local Government work, it would afford members an opportunity of getting to know each other better and also of joining in the work of the Society.

Miss Stoney endorsed Miss Melville's suggestion that a study circle should be formed and proposed that a series of lectures by some competent person should be given on local government, so that those who take up the work will have a solid backing of knowledge, and we should thus obtain helpers from among members who hitherto had no knowledge of the subject and who might, unless given this opportunity, be diffident of embarking on this class of work.

#### VII. Election of Executive Committee.

Twenty nominations having been received, a ballot was held and fifteen members were subsequently elected. The result of the ballot was announced by the Returning Officer before the members dispersed.

The names of members serving on the newly-elected Executive will be found on the first page of the report.

## LONDON & NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR WOMEN'S SERVICE. JUNIOR COUNCIL

### REPORT.

The activities of the Junior Council have increased very considerably during the past year, with the aid of the personal interest of members and the steady additions to their number. At this, our fifth Annual Meeting, the Junior Council numbers nearly six hundred members, every one of whom is engaged actively in, or studying for, some profession or business and it will thus be readily realised that, as a body, the Junior Council begins to be truly representative of the women of this age, who are most keenly interested in the progress and welfare of their sex, and who are prepared to see that the opportunities fought for by the Society in its earlier days are enjoyed and made use of to the full.

The gift of the Society's present freehold premises by Miss Sarah Clegg has undoubtedly vastly contributed to the rapid development of the Junior Council which, without such facilities, must have had to restrict the scope of its work; and it is a matter of great regret to us that her death should have robbed us of the opportunity of tendering to her at our fifth Annual Meeting our renewed thanks for both her magnificent gifts and constant personal encouragement.

The social activities of the Junior Council have extended in many directions during the year. At the monthly parties, at which special opportunities are afforded for members to meet each other and to discuss subjects of general interest, we have secured speakers on a wide variety of topics. In May, Lilian Baylis spoke on her work for the drama and opera. She took us back fifty years, to the commencement of her management of the "Old Vic," founded by her aunt, Miss Emma Cons, and brought us down to the present day, and spoke of her ardent hope, since realised, for the acquisition of the Sadler's Wells Theatre.

In July, 1930, Sir Samuel Hoare, G.B.E., C.M.G., M.P., spoke on "The Development of Civil Aviation and Women's Part in it" to a very large audience. Among distinguished guests on this occasion were Sir Sigmund Dannreuther, C.B.,

Deputy Secretary of the Air Ministry; Miss Forence Wood, lecturer at London University, who took a first place in a recent Air Ministry examination for the Class 2 Air Navigator's Certificate; Miss Sicele O'Brien and Miss Hilda Lyon (a member), Technical Officer at the Royal Airship Works, Cardington. Miss Lyon has since been awarded the "Mary Ewart" Travelling Scholarship from Newnham College, and left in August last, to spend a year in study and research at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

November, 1930, was dedicated to a party on "The Serious Uses of Broadcasting" at which Mr. J. C. Stobart, Education Director, British Broadcasting Corporation, and Miss Mary Somerville, Secretary to the National Council of School Broadcasting, gave an interesting insight into these special branches of Broadcasting.

One of the largest gatherings of the year was brought together by an invitation to hear Dame Ethel Smythe, D.B.E., and Mrs. Virginia Woolf speak on Music and Literature. Dame Ethel's witty description of the relentless and martial methods whereby she defeated the obstacles arising in the course of her musical career entirely won the hearts of her audience.

Virginia Woolf charmed them by her personality and account of her literary career, concluding with an expression of her admiration for the young women who had been the first to enter the many occupations hitherto confined exclusively to men.

The prospects for women in the commercial world was discussed at a party in February, 1931. Speeches were made on various branches of commerce by Miss Lovejoy, managing director of a large manufacturing firm, Miss Nettlefold, well-known as a partner in a big wholesale business, Miss Bowden, the manager of an old-established retail firm, and Miss Wallis Mills, who devotes herself to advertising. The speeches left the audience with the impression that openings for women were good and increasing in the manufacturing, retail and advertising branches, but that the prospects in the wholesale branch are not so encouraging.

A very interesting discussion took place on Friday evening, March 13th, the subject being "The Various Aspects of the Publication of Books." The chief speakers were Lady Kennard, a director of R. Cobden-Sanderson, Ltd.; Mr. B. N. Langdon-Davies, of Williams & Norgate; Mr. G. H. Bickers, of G. Bell & Sons, Ltd., publishers; and Miss Towers, of Richmond Towers, advertising agents.

This was the last party of the year under review, and one of the most popular and instructive, each speaker treating the subject from an entirely different but relevant angle.

Since the last Annual Meeting, a Swimming Club has been formed with over fifty members. The Club meets every Monday at Great Smith Street Baths. It has been fortunate enough to secure the help of Miss Mason and Miss Newman, two members who have taken an active part in the affairs of one of the foremost women's swimming clubs in London. They are indefatigable in coaching members of the Club and one has presented a cup for competition. It is hoped to train a team to compete against other clubs later in the year. Miss D. L. Irving acts as Secretary and Miss D. M. Taylor as Treasurer.

A Walkers' Club has been inaugurated and the walks organised on alternate Sundays, in different counties, have been very popular. Fascinating maps have been drawn by Miss Ledeboer, an architectural student, and displayed on the Junior Council notice board. She and Miss Roxburgh have been responsible for the major portion of the work of organisation.

The Debating Society Committee very regretfully parted with their first Chairman, Miss Enid Russell-Smith, on her Civil Service appointment as private secretary to Sir Arthur Robinson at the Ministry of Health. Her place has been admirably filled by Miss Stella Lister. Several debates of special interest have been held during the past twelve months, among them challenge debates with outside bodies, such as The University of London Union, when the motion that "A standard of mediocrity is the aim of the wisest teacher," was proposed by the Union and opposed by the Junior Council.

"That the historian should have no ethical purpose" was chosen as the subject for an open debate in April, 1930, at which Captain Alfred Dewar, R.N., of the Historical Section, Naval Staff, supported the motion, and was opposed by Mr. Chrymes, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge.

A large gathering assembled on 23rd October, 1930, to hear the Hon. Sir James Parr, K.C.M.G. (lately High Commissioner for New Zealand), propose the motion that "The policy of Empire Free Trade, as advocated by Lord Beaverbrook, is a sound remedy for the industrial ills of England and the Empire." He was opposed by Major H. E. Crawford. This debate was marked by a particularly high standard of speeches from the House, which included many supporters of both speakers.

The students of Westfield College, on 28th January, 1931, proposed the motion "That the school leaving age should be raised," and were opposed by members of our own Debating Society.

The Sylvan Debating Society challenged the Junior Council Debating Society, on 23rd February, 1931, to a debate

on the motion that "The primary need of this country at the moment is a dictator." This debate was specially noteworthy owing to the fact that the membership of the Sylvan Debating Society is limited to men, several of whom later expressed a desire to join the Junior Council Debating Society.

This year the 1919 Club challenged the Debating Society to a debate in which they supported the motion that "It is against the best interests of women to form Associations for women only."

The Junior Council Annual Ball was held on January 8th last and the profits handed to the Society.

The last month of the year 1930 was chosen by Lady Astor to give a Dinner Party and an At Home in honour of the Junior Council. Prominent among the members of a very distinguished gathering of women of notable achievements in many fields was Amy Johnson, whose flight to Australia had roused so much enthusiasm. The India Round Table Conference was represented by Mrs. Subburayan and by Lady Shafi, wife of one of the delegates, who was accompanied by her daughter, the Begum Shah Nawaz.

During the past year the Westminster City Council has shown itself a pioneer among London Authorities by appointing Miss Marian Cooper, a member of the Junior Council, as woman Property Manager to the Grosvenor Housing Estate, Millbank.

Miss Clegg's death has meant a severe financial loss to the Society; and the Junior Council has foregone for a period of three years, the yearly grant of £100 hitherto received from the Society and has issued an appeal to all Junior Council members to assist with such contributions as they can individually afford. The outgoing Committee hopes that those who have not yet contributed will do so when they read the Annual Report, and forward a donation without further delay.
