

REPORT.

THE Committee of the Nation's Fund for Nurses have pleasure in

submitting their Report for the year 1923.

Though it is not possible in so short a Report to go into full details, it will be seen from the summary given that much useful work has been accomplished. It is gratifying to the Committee that, during the year, they have been asked to take over the Church of England Nurses' Guild, in addition to the Organisations taken over last year, viz.: the Edith Cavell Homes of Rest for Nurses and the Queen Alexandra Relief Fund for War Nurses. The Committee much appreciate this further opportunity of co-ordinating and centralising assistance for Nurses.

As the Nation's Fund for Nurses becomes more generally known, greater numbers of applications from nurses are received, and the monetary demands upon the funds increase correspondingly. A considerable proportion of the applicants are permanently incapacitated from work, and the Committee feel bound to help them until such a time as a pension or annuity can be secured for them.

The British Women's Hospital Committee aimed at the accumulation of a capital sum of £100,000 for each of the two objects of the Nation's Fund for Nurses, viz.: The Endowment of the College of Nursing, Ltd.,

and The Tribute Fund for Nurses.

In connection with the former object reference should be made to the Annual Report of the College to be obtained on application to the Secretary, 7, Henrietta Street, W. 1. In connection with the latter the work of the Organisation has been almost entirely confined throughout the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1923, to the alleviation of distress amongst nurses, and a full Report of the work of the Tribute Fund Committee will be found on page 9.

Nurses' Collections

£16 17s. 2d. per the Nursing Mirror.

This Home of Rest, which was presented to the College of Nursing Bonchurch through the efforts of the Nation's Fund Committee, assisted by Sir John Home and Lady Martin Harvey, has been an invaluable auxiliary to the work of the Nation's Fund. The Home is not confined to Members of the College of Nursing but is open to all fully trained nurses, applications being made to the Secretary of the Nation's Fund for Nurses.

During the past year ninety-three nurses were accommodated and many expressions of pleasure and gratitude have been received. In many cases the stay of nurses has been extended to several weeks in order that

as complete a cure as possible might be effected.

On December 13th the fourth Annual Sale of Work was held at St. Andrew's Court House, Holborn, and the net proceeds amounted to £65 2s. 11d. The money has been expended on comfortable chairs, linen, plate, china, new bedding and chintzes, also sundry house repairs. Miss Wyatt and Miss Burgess, who organised the Sale, wish to tender their grateful thanks to the Rector of St. Andrew's and Mrs. Bedford for the use of the room, and to all friends who helped with gifts in money and kind and who attended the Sale and bought so liberally.

Miss Wyatt has now started a Building Fund for the additions to the Cottage for which the sum of £1,000 is required. These additions include a dining room and five bedrooms, which will then complete the Cottage and enable all the guests and staff to be housed under one roof.

Lady Martin Harvey continues to take a personal interest in the Home and has generously contributed the sum of £50 in order that, when necessary, guests may be accommodated free of charge. She has also defrayed the expense of a fence which has been built around the Annexe.

Once again special thanks are due to Miss Burgess, the Matron, whose unfailing sympathy and kindly thought have contributed so much

to the happiness of one and all.

The Committee also desire to record their grateful thanks to Dr. Bassano for his continued kindness to nurses requiring medical attention.

The Homes at Windermere, Haslemere, Adderley and West Norwood have been greatly appreciated during the past year. Thirty-six nurses can be accommodated; the Homes are practically always full and are a valuable adjunct to the work. A separate Report with Balance Sheet is published annually and can be obtained from the Hon. Secretary at 32, North Audley Street.

> The work of the Queen Alexandra Relief Fund has been carried on satisfactorily during the year. There are twelve pensioners under the Fund, each pension amounting to £26 per annum. These pensions are confined to ex-service nurses.

> In July, 1922, the Council was approached by the Charity Commissioners with a view to the administration of this Fund by the Council, and the disbursement to Church of England nurses of a small income derived from invested monies held by the Official Trustees. The suggestion was accepted and a scheme was drafted by the Commissioners and duly published.

> On May 14th, 1923, the banking account was opened at the Westminster Bank, Ltd., and the disbursement of the income was undertaken periodically by the Tribute Fund Committee.

TRIBUTE FUND.

The varied help given to nurses is with a view, wherever possible, to enable the recipients to resume their employment. In many cases, however, this is not practicable, and it is then necessary for much time and energy to be expended in the consideration of the best possible procedure for the future good of the applicants.

A certain number of nurses are found to have a direct claim on Government, or on one or other of the Army Funds available at the moment for ex-service nurses. The Committee are in close touch with these Funds, and give every support to applicants referred to such Organizations

The Committee held 20 meetings and dealt with 684 cases, of which Summary of 406 were already on the books and 278 were applications made for the Work first time. Of the new applications, 128 received monetary grants, 78 were referred to other Organisations, 61 were not within the scope of the Fund, and 11 withdrew their applications.

TYPICAL CASES ASSISTED.

- A. Aged 34. Suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis. Sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee allowed this nurse a small weekly grant whilst in Sanatorium. As there was no hope of a permanent cure, she returned home to live with her widowed mother. The Committee are making a weekly maintenance grant of 12/6 weekly whilst awaiting a bed in a Home for Incurables. This grant will continue after her admission to enable her to retain the bed.
- B. Aged 57. Suffering from nervous breakdown with recurrent loss of memory. Sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee allowed a grant of 10/- weekly for three months whilst undergoing a cure in a Home and then sent her to the seaside for six weeks, free of charge. She is now much better and back at work again.
- C. Aged 49. Suffering from thrombosis and varicose veins. Sole income 5/- weekly. In receipt of a grant from the Committee of 10/weekly to supplement small income.
- D. Aged 40. Amputation of the right arm owing to septicæmia. The Committee gave this nurse 25/- weekly for one month, 15/- weekly

for five months and convalescence for one month by the sea, after which she was obliged to return to hospital for a further operation. The Committee later sent her away for a further month's convalescence with fees, fares and a small weekly allowance.

- E. Aged 60. Operation for gastric ulcer. Savings spent and sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee made a grant of 30/- weekly for three months and are now making her a grant of 12/6 weekly to enable her to have sea air which was recommended by the Doctor.
- F. Aged 62. Operation for cancer of the right breast. Sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee gave this nurse one month's convalescence by the sea and later she was sent to an Edith Cavell Home for one more month. She is now receiving a grant of f1 weekly, 10/- of which is a Pension in the gift of the Committee.
- G. Aged 58. Suffering from cardiac trouble and almost blind from • small-pox. Only very small savings left and no income or pension. The Committee made a grant of £1 weekly for three months and a further grant of £1 weekly for six months.
- H. Aged 54. High blood pressure, old hæmorrhages in the choroid of both eyes and degeneration of the muscles of the heart. Not fit for hard work. No means and savings exhausted. The Committee made a grant of f.5 and f.1 weekly for three months. This nurse is now back at light work.
- I. Aged 43. Suffering from multiple abscesses of the abdominal wall and pyorrhea. The Committee made a grant of £1 weekly which was periodically extended throughout the year to enable this nurse to provide the necessary treatment and maintenance.
