

THE NATION'S FUND FOR NURSES.

Under the name of the Nation's Fund for Nurses an Appeal was launched in 1917-18, with the following objects:

- 1. The Endowment of the College of Nursing, Ltd. (By Guarantee.)
- 2. The raising of a Capital Sum—The Tribute Fund -for the relief of sick nurses.

As the College of Nursing issues its own Report from its Headquarters, 7, Henrietta Street, W. 1, this Report of the Nation's Fund for Nurses is mainly concerned with the administration of the Tribute Fund and certain subsidiary Funds, the management of which has been entrusted to the Committee. These Funds are as follows:

> The Edith Cavell Homes of Rest for Nurses. The Queen Alexandra Relief Fund for War Nurses. The Church Nurses' Guild.

TRIBUTE FUND REPORT.

JANUARY IST-DECEMBER 31ST, 1924.

THE demands upon this Fund continue to increase and the Committee during the past year had considerable difficulty in keeping within the income at their disposal, owing to the amount of distress and the claims

consequently made for help.

As the Nation's Fund for Nurses becomes more generally known, greater numbers of applications from nurses are received, and the monetary demands upon the funds increase correspondingly. A considerable proportion of the applicants are permanently incapacitated from work, and the Committee have to do their best to help them until such time as a pension or annuity can be secured for them. Generally speaking the varied help given to nurses is with a view of enabling the recipients to resume their employment, but, unfortunately, in many cases this is not practicable, and it is then necessary to consider the best possible procedure for the future good of the applicants.

A certain number are found to have a direct claim on Government, or on one or other of the Army Funds available at the moment for ex-service nurses. The Committee are in close touch with the Ministry of Pensions, the United Services Fund for Nurses and other Organisations,

and give every support to the claims of applicants.

The Committee held 22 Meetings and dealt with 695 cases, of which 431 were already on the books and 264 were applications made for the first time. Of the new applications, 147 received monetary grants, 63 were referred to other Organisations, 49 were not within the scope of the Fund and 5 withdrew their applications.

Eight nurses who have received help from the Fund have now secured a permanent home in the John Howard Cottages, Brighton, and one nurse a vacancy in the Dresden Home, Hove, for which the Committee are allowing a special grant.

The Committee earnestly appeal for Votes for the Royal United Appeal for Kingdom Beneficent Association, the Streatham Home for Incurables Votes and and the Putney Home for Incurables. Also for Surgical Aid Letters Letters

and Subscribers Letters of admission to Convalescent Homes.

TYPICAL CASES ASSISTED.

- A. Aged 36. Suffering from lupus of right ear and cheek and not yielding to treatment. Doctor advised treatment at once in Copenhagen. The Committee made a grant of £1 weekly for three months with an extension for further three months, if necessary. This nurse returned home in four months' time cured and started work again at once.
- B. Aged 41. Suffering from neurasthenia and requiring hospital treatment. Only income National Health Insurance. The Committee paid for her treatment for seven weeks and allowed her a small grant for incidental expenses. She was then sent away for two months' convalescence and has made excellent progress towards a complete recovery.
- C. Aged 32. Suffering from thyroid trouble and early Graves' disease. Dependent on earnings and only income National Health Insurance. Obliged to help with home expenses. The doctor advised complete rest and sea air. The Committee sent this nurse away for eight weeks' convalescence by the sea and she returned home greatly benefited and fit for work again.
- D. Aged 66. Recovering from pneumonia and requiring convalescence. Dependent on earnings. The doctor advised convalescence in her native air in Scotland. The Committee made this nurse a grant for one month's convalescence from which she returned fully restored to health, and allowed an extra grant until work was secured.
- E. Aged 57. Suffering from osteo arthritis, affecting the lumbar vertebral articulations and the right knee joint. Unable to continue her nursing. Sole means National Health Insurance, 7/6 weekly. The Committee are allowing this nurse 10/- weekly to enable her to live with a nurse friend, who is able to look after her.
- F. Aged 34. Suffering from disseminated sclerosis. Quite unfit for nursing and sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee are allowing this nurse 10/- weekly to enable her to share expenses and live with a friend who looks after her.
- G. Aged 61. Suffering from very bad varicose veins and hernia, and recently underwent an operation for amputation of the right breast. Not fit for nursing. Sole income 7/6 weekly, National Health Insurance. The Committee allowed this nurse 10/- weekly until she secured a pension of £40 per annum. The case is to be reconsidered periodically should she require help for extras.
- H. Aged 41. Suffering from arterio sclerosis. Sole income 6/- weekly, National Health Insurance. Dependent on sisters who are earning their own living and who are contributing towards the upkeep of the home and aged mother of 80. The Committee sent this nurse to a convalescent home where they paid her fees for nine weeks and contributed towards her maintenance at home for a time, until other arrangements could be made.

- I. Aged 55. Suffering from myocarditis and threatened cerebral embolism and needing great care. Sole income £20 per annum. The Committee are allowing this nurse £1 weekly to enable her to live with a friend who looks after her.
- J. Aged 50. Suffering from debility. Widow with one son to support and dependent on earnings. Savings exhausted. The Committee made a special grant for immediate expenses and allowed £1 weekly for three months, when she was able to resume her work.

EXTRACTS FROM APPRECIATIVE LETTERS (1924).

A direct answer to prayer and yet my faith was very weak. I was in the depth of despair. Now I can face the world again with fresh hope and courage. God bless all you kind people who are so good to the nurses. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart.
- improvement in health due to the splendid treatment, arranged for by you, at the Middlesex Hospital. I am now able to walk without the aid of a stick. I cannot find words to express my heartfelt gratitude to you and all concerned in helping me to get this treatment. My own doctor is very pleased with the improvement. I again take the opportunity of thanking you and the Committee for their very generous help in tiding me over these very difficult times.
- . . . I must thank the Committee and yourself for your great kindness to Nurse —. She is so grateful to you. The tears came into her eyes when she received the cheque. She is writing to you herself. May God bless you all for your kindness to her. All her life she has helped others.
- cheque. I really do not know how to thank you sufficiently. It will really be a Godsend to me and will most certainly be expended in a very useful way. I sincerely hope and trust that I may get extra work to do and that one day I may be able to repay you doubly for your assistance to me in time of need. I can only pray for all who have helped me and trust that they may never know he want of a friend.

more grateful than I can say to your Committee for their continued great kindness and generosity to me. I feel I really do not know how to express my thanks, it is more than good of them because I realise how very many they have to help and they have done so much for me. You, too, have been more than kind. I could not have stayed here had it not been for the wonderful help from the Committee, because, as I told you, I have lost by death all my nearest relations, those who would and could have helped me through these long trying years. I really have no one to whom I can turn and I have to fight for myself, but I keep on hoping I may, in time, pull round sufficiently to do something again.

I long to be at work but my doctor says it will even now be a long time before I can. Since my operation I suffer so much with neuritis and rheumatism which, some days, absolutely cripples me up. Doctor puts it down to intense weakness. I am glad to say I am getting over the attack of gastritis. Again thanking you and the Committee very much

bringing my need before your Committee. It has been a very hard winter but, thanks to your kindness and that of the Committee, I am now quite free from anxiety as well as having benefited greatly by my stay at the Convalescent Home. It is really not easy to express thanks, but please believe that I am most sincerely thankful. I can hardly realise all it means. My room is already warm and comfortable with a good fire.

A glance at some of the excerpts from letters received from nurses will show how the work of the Tribute Fund is appreciated. We hope and believe that public sympathy will permit us to continue and extend this work.

THE NATION'S TRIBUTE TO NURSES IN IRELAND.

Through the kindness of Lady Arnott, D.B.E., Chairman of the Executive Committee in Ireland, we are able to include a few particulars of the work achieved during the past year.

Forty-three nurses were helped and £508 disbursed in grants. We append two typical cases assisted:

A. Nurse, crippled with arthritis and receiving daily injections tried to continue work by doing night duty. She was finally obliged to go into hospital as she was threatened with tuberculosis. The Committee helped her for a whole year and she has now resumed work and is most grateful for the assistance given her.

B. An old nurse, past active work, was found to be entirely penniless, with neither bed nor bed clothing. The Committee have taken the case in hand and are helping her substantially.

THE EDITH CAVELL HOMES OF REST FOR NURSES.

A Summary of the work of these Homes is given here, but the full Report with Balance Sheet is published separately and can be obtained

from the Hon. Secretary, 32, North Audley Street, W. 1.

There are four Homes under the administration of the Council, containing thirty-six beds. These Homes are situated at Adderley, Shropshire; Haslemere, Surrey; West Norwood, London; and Windermere in the Lake District. It will thus be seen that they offer varied attractions to the practising trained women nurses and probationers for whose benefit they are carried on as a permanent tribute to the memory of Nurse Edith Cavell.

During the year 95 nurses visited Coombe Head, Haslemere; 149 The Crossways, Windermere; 132 The Hollies, West Norwood and 47 were received at Raven House, Adderley, the smallest of the Homes. The duration of visits averaged three weeks and the many expressions of gratitude received testify to the benefit and pleasure which nurses derive from them.

THE QUEEN ALEXANDRA RELIEF FUND FOR WAR NURSES.

The work of the Queen Alexandra Relief Fund has been carried on satisfactorily during the year. There are twelve pensioners under the Fund, each pension amounting to £26 per annum. These pensions are confined to ex-service nurses.

The Audited Accounts will be found on page 24.

THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND NURSES' GUILD.

The administration of this Fund is vested in the Council of the Nation's Fund for Nurses at the request of the Charity Commissioners and the disbursement of the small income derived from invested monies held by the Official Trustees is undertaken by the Tribute Fund Committee. During the past year, in accordance with the terms of the Trust, it has been used to provide a month's convalescence for one nurse. The Audited Accounts will be found on page 23.

SEASIDE COTTAGE, BONCHURCH.

This Home of Rest, which was presented to the College of Nursing through the efforts of the Nation's Fund Committee, assisted by Sir John and Lady Martin-Harvey, has been an invaluable auxiliary to the work of the Nation's Fund. The Home is not confined to Members of the College of Nursing but is open to all fully trained nurses, applications being made to the Secretary of the Nation's Fund for Nurses.

Lady Martin-Harvey continues to take a warm interest in the work of the Home and has recently generously provided a free holiday for

seven guests, at her own expense.

During the past year 97 nurses were received for visits averaging 21 days. Many of the guests arrived during the early stages of convalescence after serious illness and the Committee have once more to record their gratitude to Dr. Bassano for the attention which he so ungrudgingly gives to all who require his professional services, and to the Matron, Miss Burgess, for the unfailing kindness and sympathy which she extends to all who come under her beneficent care.

The Fifth Annual Sale of Work was held at St. Andrew's Rectory, Holborn, on December 4th and the sum of £80 was realised, which was spent on the re-decoration of the Home and in the purchase of new furniture, linen and other comforts. Thanks are gratefully tendered to Miss K. Wyatt and to Mr. and Mrs. Bedford who give their help so willingly each year in connection with this Sale, and to Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Dallen for a most acceptable gift of eight tons of coal for the Home and a cheque for £20 towards the Building Fund. This Fund, which is being raised to build extra bedrooms, now totals £367.
