 two months for one wound. I shall not  
 be able to see you again or write to you for

brush that of one as the same.  
Daddy like to that of my little  
Chappie. We have been exercising  
with Mr. Parkhurst. Have not  
seen her since she went to America  
& thought she looked better than I  
expected. At everyone she said she  
was not looking well. Thank you  
of Miss Crocker he have not  
seen Mrs. Roberts. It is the most  
extraordinary system - you feel more

like a little child out with its nurse  
you can't move without a wardress -  
I wish to feel yourself dangerous  
in time. The place looks more like  
one would imagine a lunatic asylum  
might look like. Have just seen  
Lily and Patti. Kept they are  
the last traitors shall see now for  
2 months after tomorrow.  
Give my love to Pauline & thank her  
so much for stopping and take  
a kiss and a blessing my dear
