### RULES.

Title.

1. The title shall be the "North Eastern Federation of Women's Suffrage Societies."

Area.

2. The area of the Federation shall be the counties of Northumberland and Durham, comprising the constituencies of:-

(County Divisions) Berwick, Hexham, Wansbeck, Tyneside, Jarrow, Chester-le-Street, Houghton-le-Spring, North West Durham, Mid-Durham, South East Durham, Bishop Auckland, Barnard Castle. (Boroughs) . . . Morpeth, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Tynemouth, Darlington, Durham,

Gateshead, Hartlepool, South

Shields, Stockton, Sunderland.

Object.

3. To obtain the Parliamentary franchise for women on the same terms as it is or may be granted to men.

Work.

4. To promote the formation of new Societies in its area.

To perfect existing organisation.

To arrange joint meetings, and generally to secure co-operation among Societies in its area.

Methods.

5. The methods of the Federation shall be constitutional.

Membership

6. Membership of the Federation is open to all Women's Suffrage Societies within its area which are affiliated to the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies.

Each Society shall pay to the Federation 12½% of its nett income. This sum to be paid quarterly, on May 1st, August 1st, November 1st and February 1st.

Federation

7. The Members of the Federation Committee shall be appointed annually by the Societies. Casual vacancies shall also be filled by the Societies. Each Society shall be entitled to appoint Federation Committee Members as follows:—

From 20 to 50 Members . I Committee Member.

51 to 100 ,, . 2 ,, 101 to 200 . 3 Above 200 . 4 as a maximum number.

Press Secretary, "Common Cause" Secretary and "Friends" Secretary, shall be ex-officio members of Committee.

Each Society shall also be entitled to send one of its Members as a proxy in the absence of any one of the Federation Committee Members appointed by it.

Financial Year.

8. The Financial Year shall end in April.

Committee Meetings.

9. The Federation Committee shall meet twice a year and more often if required. The travelling expenses of the Committee Members shall be pooled and divided among the Societies in proportion to the number of Committee Members in attendance. Notice of the time and place of meeting shall be sent to the Hon. Secretary of each Society at least three weeks before the meeting. Notice of business to be transacted at a meeting must be sent by the Hon. Secretaries of Societies to the Hon. Secretary of the Federation fourteen days before the meeting; the Hon. Secretary of the Federation shall make the Agenda and send it to the Members of the Committee ten days before the meeting. Business for which urgency is voted may also be considered.

Special Committee Meetings. By-Elections.

10. In the event of a By-Election occurring within the area, a Special Meeting of the Federation Committee may be summoned at twenty-four hours' notice by the Hon. Secretary, such meeting to be held, if possible, in the constituency concerned.

E.F.F. Work.

11. Before E.F.F. work is begun in favour of any political candidate, the situation shall be fully discussed at a Federation Committee Meeting, in order that all the Societies may be in touch with that work, and, where possible, co-operate in it. Further, in cases where such work is undertaken at short notice, an urgency meeting of the Federation Committee shall be called.

Special Committee Meetings.

12. Any other Special Committee Meeting may be summoned at the request of three members at three days' notice.

First Committee Meeting. 13. At the first meeting after the beginning of the financial year, the Treasurer shall submit a financial statement, the Committee shall elect its. Chairman, Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, an Hon. Financial Secretary, Press Secretary, "Common Cause" Secretary, and "Friends" Secretary, shall co-opt a member of the N.U. Executive Committee, and shall elect three of its members to serve as representatives on the Provincial Conference.

Quorum.

14. Five shall form a quorum for ordinary meetings of the Committee, three for special meetings. If less than a quorum be present only unopposed business may proceed.

Sub-Committees. 15. The Committee shall have power to appoint sub-committees when necessary. The out-of-pocket expenses of their members being chargeable to the Federation Fund.

Organisers.

16. The Federation Committee shall in general be responsible for directing the work and paying the expenses, board and lodging of the Organisers employed by the Federation, but while they are working on behalf of any affiliated Society, that Society shall be solely responsible for their working expenses, board and lodging.

Alteration of Rules.

17. These Rules may be altered when required provided that any amendment be included in the written agenda.

# ANNUAL REPORT, 1914-15.

The record of the fifth year's work of the North Eastern Federation consists of two absolutely distinct parts. During the first three months (viz., May, June and July, 1914) the activities and methods of the last four years were in full swing; our Societies, for the first time, made a joint effort to obtain funds for the Federation by an Exhibition and Sale of Women's Work; the Active Service League, under the energetic leadership of Miss Beaver, carried on an active campaign in the country districts, and the reservation of a platform at the Miners' Gala, in Durham, gave evidence of our growing political influence. The only change in our staff of organisers had taken place in June, when the Committee received, with great regret, the resignation of Miss I. S. A. Beaver, who desired more responsibility than it was possible to give her under existing conditions. A new organiser, Miss Lawson, was appointed at once, to begin work in the autumn.

Then came the outbreak of the war, and the immediate response of all Societies to the message from the National Union Executive authorizing us to divert our energies to the "help of those who will be the sufferers from the economic and industrial dislocation caused by the war." The records of the individual Societies tell much of this work in detail: their problem was a comparatively simple one, for their workers, except in the case of Newcastle, were all volunteers, eager to help in the national crisis, and it only needed to point out the advantage to our Cause in undertaking responsibilities in their corporate capacity as Suffrage Societies for this idea to be acted upon. In the case of the Federation, however (and also in the Newcastle Society) the further question presented itself:—Should we continue to employ the band of highly skilled paid workers whom we had collected during the past four years? The answer, as shown by events, is significant, bringing out the fact that the women suffragists of our area regard their organisation, not only as a weapon for forcing their demand for the vote, but also as a means of fulfilling their special responsibilities as women to the nation.

At the first meeting of the Finance Committee, after the declaration of war. Miss Peile turned her loan of £220 to the Federation Fund into a gift, and this generous act relieved us of the immediate necessity of diminishing our staff; an appeal sent out to individuals and Societies, in October, brought in the further amount of £57, together with an anonymous gift of £25.

We were thus enabled to give Miss Lawson's services during the autumn to the Northumberland, Newcastle and Tyneside Belgian Refugee Committee, where a really competent whole time worker was urgently needed to act as Hon. Secretary to the Clothing Sub-Committee, and to the Investigation Sub-Committee, and as Assistant Hon. Secretary to the Newcastle Sub-Committee.

Miss Gordon was specially asked for to act as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer to the Northumberland County Women's Employment Committee, as soon as it was formed, under the presidency of Lady Allendale, and chairmanship of Lady Howick, and with the valuable assistance of Miss Constance Holmes as teacher, she started a workshop in North Shields for girls in the net-making trade who had been thrown out of work. She also initiated and carried out a scheme whereby individual women, who were in need owing to the war, in various parts of the county, were supplied with orders for sewing and knitting.

Miss Sheard, who returned from her belated summer holiday in October, was at once sent to Gateshead, where she is well known, to act as Hon. Secretary of the Gateshead Women Workers' Committee, and organised a Work for Women Office

and a Soldiers' Visitors' Welcome.

Miss Dring, whose work has always been in County Durham, began by collecting information about unemployment in that county, and with the proceeds (£14) of a Flower Sale at Consett, set up a workshop at Washington, where the pits had been working very badly, causing distress in the miners' families. This workroom gave employment to a varying number of girls for about five months, both machine and hand knitters; six or seven girls have become proficient. The machines were bought by special donations amounting to £23 10s. 0d.

Miss St. John was recalled from her holiday, in October, to take over the Hon. Secretaryship of the Women's Committee of the Newcastle and District Patriots' League of Honour. This organisation was formed for the purpose of providing occupation and amusement for soldiers and their relations, both men and women, with a view to coping with some of the difficulties necessarily arising from the presence of thousands of soldiers in

the city.

Thus, during the first six months of the war, the organisers of the North Eastern Federation were all actively engaged in various forms of national work, whose claim upon us could not be disregarded. But the months passed, and the terrible fact was gradually forced upon us that the war would probably be long continued, while it also became evident that, owing largely to the presence of armament works, the amount of distress in our area was relatively small and likely to remain so, at any rate until after the war. Under these circumstances, the urgent need

for retaining our organisers diminished, and they were encouraged to look for other work, Miss Ella Westwood was much wanted at home, and resigned in August. Miss Edie Westwood, for whom no special opening had offered itself in the autumn, also left us in October, and has since been working under the Association of Infants Consultations and Schools for Mothers. The work of the Newcastle and District Patriots' League of Honour turned out to be rather different from what was originally contemplated, and the Committee withdrew Miss St. John in January. She at once found a post with the Patrol Committee, in Scotland. Miss Lawson received an excellent offer from America, in January, and her resignation from the work of the Northumberland, Newcastle and Tyneside Belgian Refugee Committee was tendered at the beginning of the year; the Committee under whom she had served passed a cordial vote of thanks to the North Eastern Federation for the excellent work she had done. Miss Sheard remained in Gateshead until Easter, when she had an opportunity of returning to her former position in the teaching profession. Miss Gordon's health unfortunately gave way at the close of the year, and she asked and obtained leave of absence for three months without salary. Miss Dring most kindly sprang into the breach, and carried on the work of the Northumberland County Women's Employment Committee, until she was summoned home, in March, by urgent family business. Miss Gordon, who had in the interval found congenial work under the Women's Patriotic Service League, in Edinburgh, resigned the post of Organising Secretary at the end of March, and Miss Dring, taking a long looked for opportunity of fitting herself to stand for the Registration Agent Examination, regretfully declined the offer of the Committee to return in June as sole organiser of the Federation.

The end of our financial year finds us, therefore, dispensing, for the time being, with the services of our whole staff of organisers, To them, one and all, we owe a debt of gratitude, but more especially to Miss Gordon, of whom it is literally true that "the Federation is the work of her hands," and to whom we can only say, in the words of the resolution which accepted her resignation, that "we are keenly cognisant of the very valuable work she has done for the Federation during the last five years, and hope that more peaceful times may see us all working

together again at a not very distant future."

At a Special Federation Committee Meeting (held on May 4th, but counting with the present year) called to consider the crisis in the National Union, it was decided to ask the Newcastle Society to allow their Organising Secretary, Miss Andrew, to work half time for the Federation, pending the appointment of a whole time organiser, and this arrangement has been carried out.

Your Committee have to record, with great regret, that

Miss Alice Robson is resigning the post of Hon. Financial Secretary. Since Miss Stevenson resigned, more than a year ago, Miss Robson has kindly undertaken all the duties of Treasurer to the Federation, and attended the Finance and Federation Committees regularly, in spite of the fatiguing journey from Whitby which this has involved. Our most grateful thanks are due to her for continuing her work for our Federation so long after her removal to Yorkshire.

Your Committee wish to record their thanks to those who have lightened our financial responsibility in providing hospitality for speakers and organisers, viz.: Mrs. Dunn (Gateshead), Mrs. Denham (Darlington), Miss Emley (Gateshead), Mrs. Haward (Darlington), Mrs. Moysey (Gateshead), Miss Stevenson (Newcastle), Miss Temperley (Gateshead), Mrs. J. C. P. Thompson (Newcastle), Mrs. Spence Watson (Gateshead), and to Dr. Williams and Miss Hardcastle, who have given continuous hospitality throughout the year, at one time having as many as three organisers together.

Your Committee desire also to record their thanks to the Honorary Auditor, Dr. Dunn, and to Mr. and Mrs. Graham Thompson, who have rendered valuable help in undertaking the entire duplicating of the Federation Minutes.

### Exhibition and Sale of Women's Handicrafts.

The objects of this Exhibition and Sale were two-fold; first, to raise money for the Federation Fund and, secondly, to arouse interest in the handicrafts and industries of women. The Exhibition was held in Newcastle, on May 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th, and resulted in the sum of £241 11s. 6d. being handed over to the Federation Fund. Not only was it a financial success but very beautiful exhibits were received from all over the country, showing the high standard of women's work which has been attained.

The Opening Ceremony on the first day was performed by Miss Cecile Barclay, who was playing at one of the local theatres, and very kindly came to the help of the Committee at very short notice. The chair was taken by Sir James Douglas. The opener on the second day was the Viscountess Howick, while Dr. Ethel Williams was in the chair.

The thanks of the Committee are due to all who helped to make the Exhibition a success, and especially to the Misses Ethel and Hetty Page, who undertook the entire arrangements for the excellent concerts which were given on three of the days; to Madam Steenberg who arranged a very successful "Grieg Evening"; to members of the Sunderland Society who gave a performance of "Press Cuttings," and organised a party of children who gave an exhibition of Old English

Country Dances; and to Miss Lily Clay for the admirable manner in which she carried out the whole of the arrangements of the Loan Collection; and to Lady Runciman who lent us the beautiful plants which decorated the platform.

### Active Service Campaign.

The Active Service League, under the leadership of Miss I. S. A. Beaver, carried on a vigorous campaign during the months of June and July. The object of the campaign was to ensure that before the General Election every village in the area should have heard a Suffrage speaker at least once. Over 2,000 copies of the "Common Cause" were sold, and more than 1,900 "Friends" Cards signed. Meetings were held in the following places.

### FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING.

HELD ON TUESDAY, JUNE 29TH.

The above Report was read and adopted. The Chairman, Dr. Ethel Williams, asked and received permission to send a message of deep sympathy to the relatives of Miss Lily Clay, who lost her life in the sinking of the Lusitania, on May 7th.

Chairman is also a member of the Durham County Relief Committee. Sewing meetings have been held and the "tea money" spent on giving employment, sewing and knitting, to workers who had been thrown out of employment by the war. A Flower Day was held in Consett, and resulted in a profit of £14, which was given to the Fund for starting a knitting industry at Washington. Several parcels of clothing have been sent to different War Fund Committees. Members of the Society are also helping in Red Cross and Hospital Work. The following meetings have been held:—

The Society also co-operated in the meetings of the Active Service Campaign, organised by the Federation, which were held in the neighbourhood, in July, Miss Lucas as speaker, and members in the distribution of literature and the sale of "Common Causes."

At the outbreak of war, the Society devoted its energies to the work of relieving distress. Several members were elected to the different Relief Committees, Coun. Lucas acting as Chairman of one of the Ward Committees. The Society inaugurated and ran a "Belgian Market," where food could be bought at current prices, and where many difficulties were smoothed away. The financial arrangements were in the capable hands of Mrs. Haward.

On Boxing Day, the "Market" entertained all the Belgians at Polam Hall, kindly lent by Mrs. Baynes; there was a Christmas tree, presents for all, supper and dancing. In addition to this, members have co-operated in a Maternity Centre, which has been opened under the Municipal Authorities, and in Red Cross Work.

Perhaps the most important work of the Durham Society since the outbreak of war is the organisation of a Maternity Centre. So far the scheme has been financed by voluntary subscriptions, but it is hoped to secure a grant from the Local Government Board in the near future. Weekly sewing meetings have been held, when model garments have been made and sent to the Maternity Centre. Individual members are also engaged in assisting at the Girls' Clubs, the Soldiers' Recreation Clubs, and visiting on behalf of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association.

The Society helped with the Exhibition, held on May 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th, 1914, in the Barras Bridge Assembly Rooms. It also held a Jumble Sale, on June 7th, and a Garden Meeting,

addressed by Miss Muriel Matters, was held in "The Willows," by kind permission of Mrs. G. B. Hunter.

At the outbreak of war, the services of the Suffrage organisation were accepted by the Lord Mayor. The Committee initiated the Newcastle Women Workers' Committee, which was composed of representatives of all Women's Organisations. This suspended its work only when an official Women's Employment Sub-Committee of the Lord Mayor's Relief Committee was formed, and all the members of the Women Workers' Committee were co-opted on to the new committee. The Society lent the services of its organiser to act as Hon. Secretary of this Committee, and to organise its employment schemes. These schemes include:

- I. A Toy Factory, which has been engaged principally in the making of teddy bears. A large order for a wholesale firm has been obtained for these, and the scheme is now almost self-supporting. Much expense has been saved, as Miss Merz lent "Hope House" as a factory for an indefinite period to the Committee.
- 2. A Domestic Training Scheme has been successfully worked by the Committee. Twenty young girls were taken from the "live register" of the Juvenile Labour Exchange, and given a three months' training for domestic work. During the period of training, the Lady Mayoress' Fund provided a maintenance wage, part of which the girls returned each week towards the cost of an outfit. The girls were taught by teachers provided by the Education Committee, to make their own outfit, and worked at this from 9—12 a m for five days a week for three months. During the same time they attended the Northern Counties School of Cookery, from 2 till 5 p.m. for instruction in cookery, laundry and housewifery. These girls have now been satisfactorily placed by the Juvenile Labour Exchange.
- 3. An Order Agency has been organised at 51, Blackett Street, lent by the National Political League. Miss Richardson, the Hon. Treasurer, has had complete charge of this. A large number of unemployed needlewomen and small firms who would otherwise have been unable to keep on their workers have been helped through this shop. Large orders for comforts for the troops have been undertaken. Fortunately, the condition of the employment of women in Newcastle is more satisfactory, and the numbers requiring assistance in this way have been greatly reduced.
- 4. A Lady Mayoress' Work Depôt for mending and renovating old clothes has been opened. All work done here has been distributed through the Soldiers' and Sailors' Association, which undertook to attend to civilian cases also. The women here were paid at the standard of the Queen's Workroom, in London.
