RULES.

Every donor of £21 in not more than two payments is a Governor of the Hospital for life.

Governors are empowered in each year to recommend ten out-patients to the Hospital, free of the entrance fee, provided that such recommendations are given *only to persons who are legitimate objects of medical charity.*

Annual Subscribers of two guineas and upwards are Annual Governors, and may, subject to the same limitation, recommend ten out-patients, and Subscribers of not less than one guinea may recommend five out-patients, free of the entrance fee, during each year of their subscription.

N.B.—*No further recommendation is needed to admit the Bearer of a Hospital Letter as an in-patient provided the nature of the case require that she be treated in the Hospital. Persons who are too ill to attend first as out-patients, or who live at a distance, should apply for admission by post, enclosing a medical certificate, to the SECRETARY at the HOSPITAL.*

The letter of recommendation for patient must be renewed every month, and no in-patient can remain in the house longer than two months, except by the sanction of the Managing Committee.

No infectious cases can be admitted as in-patients.

The Hospital is open for the relief of out-patients every day except Sundays, public holidays and certain other days, of which due notice is given beforehand. In-patients are admitted as vacancies occur.

All patients and their friends have the right to lay a complaint before the Managing Committee personally, by deputy, or in writing.

In-patients are required to contribute a small sum weekly towards the cost of their maintenance while in the Hospital. This sum is fixed by the Almoner with reference to the position in life, etc., of each patient, and ranges from 7s. 6d. upwards per week.

It is in the power of the Almoner to admit cases of serious illness without any payment, if, on enquiry, it appear desirable to do so.

There are three small separate wards. The terms of admission to these wards are £4 4s. per week. A ward with two beds, at a charge of £3 3s. each per week.

RULES FOR IN-PATIENTS.

Patients coming into the Hospital are required to bring a change of linen, soap, towel, comb and brush for their own use.

They are required to provide themselves with clean linen twice a week.

Every patient is required to pay a weekly sum according to her means, and to provide her own butter and tea. Payments are to be paid in advance on entrance, and on each succeeding Friday during her stay.

Visitors to patients are allowed on Wednesdays and Sundays from 2.30 to 3.30.

No wine or spirit allowed to be brought into the Hospital by patients or their friends.

BY ORDER OF THE COMMITTEE.

RULES FOR OUT-PATIENTS.

Patients are admitted by payment of a fee of 1s. per attendance, or by a subscriber's letter, which must be renewed once a month.

Patients insured under the National Insurance Act are only seen at the written request of their Panel Doctor.

Sixpence towards medicine is charged every week.

Out-patients are admitted daily at the following hours:—

FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

Purchase of Freehold.—The outstanding event in the history of the Hospital for 1923 was, undoubtedly, the purchase of the freehold of the site upon which it is built. It will be remembered that in the Committee's Report for 1922 it was announced that negotiations for the purchase were proceeding, that, through Mr. Percival D. Griffiths, as Executor of the late Mrs. Lorillard, a sum of money sufficient to cover the purchase price had been received, and that the whole of the site of the Hospital and its annexes would shortly be acquired. The Committee are happy to report that the acquisition was accomplished, and is now commemorated in a marble tablet inscribed: "In grateful and ever-abiding memory of Mrs. Gertrude Lorillard of New York, U.S.A., whose munificent bequest to English Charity enabled the Committee of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital to purchase the Freehold of the site on which this Hospital is built." Thus the work of one woman is assisted and consolidated by the devotion of another, and becomes, in some sense, the memorial of both.

Extension Plans.—The work of the Hospital, characterised by continual and vigorous growth, has always been seriously hampered by inadequate accommodation. By the

acquisition of the freehold, the Committee were, at last, enabled to consider reasonable future extension, and a plan, to be criticised into ultimate shape, was drawn up by Sir Brumwell Thomas. It has been accepted, in principle, by the Board of Management and submitted to the King's Fund for their approval.

Much time and thought has been given to the problem of the utilisation of the site in such a manner as to provide the needed accommodation with the minimum of disturbance.

By the suggested plan it is proposed :

1. To increase the In-Patient accommodation, allowing of larger medical and surgical wards, a small Children's Ward, adequate Maternity and Isolation Wards.
2. To provide two new In-Patient theatres, with anæsthetising and sterilising rooms.
3. To provide a new Out-Patient Department arranged in two sections, with an Out-Patient theatre, anæsthetising and recovery rooms.
4. To enlarge the Waiting Room and Dispensary.
5. To provide much needed increased accommodation for the X-ray and Electrical work.

Estimated Cost of Extension.—It is estimated that, to carry out the above plan, a sum of over £50,000 will be required, and the Committee earnestly hope that all the friends of the Hospital, who have in the past so often given substantial evidence of their interest and devotion, will, upon this special occasion, make a united and sustained effort to accomplish the design.

Memorial Appeal Scheme.—Under the Memorial Scheme a further £1,000 has been invested, during the year, in 5 per cent. War Stock, on behalf of the Hospital, which is now in receipt of an income of £2,500, from investments accumulated under the Scheme.

Whitelands College Bed.—Whitelands College has completed the Fund for the College Bed, accomplishing the 46th endowment. The financial support which this admirable venture has achieved cannot be over-estimated, and the Committee gladly acknowledge the debt which the Hospital owes to Lady Hall, who initiated the Memorial Appeal Scheme and sustained its work.

Duchess of York Bed.—The Committee have the honour to report that in May last, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York graciously consented to allow a Bed in the Hospital to bear her name. Mrs. Lilian Abrahams acted as Treasurer of the Fund for its endowment. After a fruitful campaign of Appeal, she completed the necessary £1,000 with the proceeds of a Bridge Tournament held at the Hyde Park Hotel at the close of the year. The Committee welcome this opportunity of thanking Mrs. Abrahams for her able and generous work, and heartily congratulating her upon its signal success.

The Guilds.—The Guilds of the Hospital and House of Recovery have again rendered notable service. At the Combined Pound Day and Sale of the Hospital Guild on the 24th of October, 866lbs. of stores were collected and added to the Hospital supplies, £88 4s. 4d. was realised in cash. In addition to the usual grant of £70 for the upkeep of their cot, the Guild granted £30 for linen, £10 to provide balcony sun-screens, £10 for material for Out-Patient dressing gowns, £10 10s. to the Christmas Fund, and presented to the wards a large number of articles made by members of the Guild and affiliated Schools, from materials supplied.

The Guild of Rosa Morison House gave the usual Garden Sale in the grounds at Barnet early in June. The Sale realised over £270, and, at a subsequent Guild Committee, it was decided to invest £250 in War Loan, to be accumulated,

with the object of selling out eventually, to assist with the cost of any future extension at Barnet which may be necessitated by the Hospital extension. In addition to this admirable provision, the Guild was able to make a grant of £40 for linen, £10 to the Christmas Fund, and other valuable assistance to the Rosa Morison House, both monetary and material.

(Statements of accounts of both Guilds will be found on pages 68 and 69.)

The Patients' League.—The Patients' League continues on its way, quietly but prosperously.

In 1923 it was again able to make a donation of £200 towards the upkeep of the League Ward at the Rosa Morison House, and also gave £25 towards the ambulance besides the usual annual subscription of £100 to the Hospital.

The present aim and ambition of the League is to name a *third* Bed in the Hospital by contributing another £1,000. They hope it may be for the first bed in the new block when built, for none know so well as the patients themselves the need of more beds!

Christmas Festivities.—Both Guilds contributed largely to the success of the Christmas Festivities, which were carried through with the usual goodwill and satisfaction. In thanking the members of the Guilds most heartily, on behalf of the patients, the Committee would include all the ladies associated with them, both in London and at Barnet, and the members of the Patients' League with their President, Treasurer, and Dr. Macdonald. They also desire to thank Miss Dorothea Webb for an excellent concert, and Dr. Phear and the students of the London School of Medicine for singing carols in the wards at Christmas.

Annual Meeting.—The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Hospital was held on the 15th of March. The Chair was taken by Mrs. Percival D. Griffiths, and the

speakers included Professor Winifred Cullis and Mr. A. E. Ferns.

Death of Mrs. Westlake.—In August last the Hospital sustained the loss of its first Treasurer and old friend Mrs. Alice Westlake, who resigned the Treasurership in 1918, after having been connected with the Hospital since its foundation. The Committee in reporting, with sorrow, her death, desire to record their sincere gratitude for the personal service and ungrudging help which Mrs. Westlake gave to the Hospital, and the cause of medical women for over fifty years.

Another old and valued friend was lost to the Hospital during the year—Mr. Samuel Garrett—who had been a Governor, Subscriber, and staunch supporter for many years, and whose loss the Committee deeply deplore.

Medical Staff Changes.—The resignation of Mrs. Flemming, Senior Physician of the Hospital, was received in February with very great regret. Mrs. Flemming became a member of the Honorary Staff in 1899. Her valuable work for the Hospital during the whole period of her connection with it is so well known, that all will share the Committee's regret at the loss of her services, and be glad to know that she accepted the Board's invitation to become a member of the Consulting Staff. The Committee are happy to report that Mrs. Keith, L.R.C.S. & I.Ed., who acted as Anæsthetist to the Hospital in its earliest days, has also consented to serve upon it. Dr. Mabel Paine was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Flemming, Dr. Hamilton becoming Senior Physician and Dr. Cicely Peake Senior Assistant Physician. Miss Blandy, M.B., M.R.C.P., was appointed as an Assistant Physician, and Miss Yates, M.D., M.R.C.P., to fill the vacancy created upon the Staff of Physicians by the resignation of Dr. Esther Harding. Upon the Surgical Staff, Miss Sylk, M.B., B.S., was appointed in

place of Miss Hounsfield, who resigned in June. The Committee were sorry to lose both Miss Harding and Miss Hounsfield, and, in thanking them for their work for the Hospital, heartily wish them success in the new work they have chosen.

Almoner's Department.—Miss Ronaldson, the Almoner, appointed at the end of 1922, reports that her Department, opened at the end of January, 1923, undertook the assessment of payments for maintenance in the wards and the organisation of after-care for Hospital patients. The assessment and collection of payments had always been systematically carried out and has been continued on the same lines.

As regards the work of after-care a beginning has been made, but there is still much to be done. Owing to the large number of out-patients attending the Hospital it is not possible for the Almoner to make inquiry into the circumstances of every case. She has been compelled to limit complete enquiry and necessary after-care to the ward patients, the children's out-patient department, the V.D. department, and the medical out-patient department on two days of the week. She has of course undertaken any work from other departments especially referred by the Medical Staff.

The work comprises home visiting and after-care in co-operation with local agencies, the provision of all surgical appliances, including artificial teeth, arrangements for convalescent and Sanatorium treatment, and other forms of help too numerous to mention. A special effort has been made to keep in touch with all patients suffering from incurable diseases and to get them admitted to special Hospitals or Homes for the Dying, when necessary care and comfort cannot be provided in their own homes. Miss Johnstone, who kindly offered her services one day in the week, has been very helpful in visiting these especial cases.

(A statistical report of the work of the Almoner's Department will be found on page 35.)

Indian Nurses.—A pleasant development of the Hospital's service was shewn in its undertaking to train, as nurses, two Indian ladies, who have been sent to England by the Lady Reading Fund for the training of Indian women. Miss Maula Baksh and Miss Lavinia Mewa arrived at Christmas-time to enter upon a three years' training. They hope to secure not only a certificate from the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, but also, whilst in this country, to obtain that of the Central Midwives Board, for whose examination they will be trained at the Hospital.

Numbers of Patients.—In spite of the fact that in order to cope with the unduly long waiting list, the Committee, early in January, provided and equipped five new beds, the number of In-Patients admitted during the year shewed a decrease of 122. This is due to the fact that the Committee were obliged to close the Hospital entirely for a month, during the summer, in order to carry out various urgent repairs, and to undertake internal painting and decoration, which had not been done for more than ten years.

Of the 1,387 admitted 970 were surgical, 303 medical, 53 maternity, 46 infants and 15 special cases. 579 patients were sent to the Rosa Morison House of Recovery to complete their treatment. An increase was shewn in all the figures for the Out-Patient Department. There were 9,964 new Out-Patients as compared with 9,919 last year; of these 174 were special and 397 ante-natal cases.

Out-Patient attendances numbered 51,770 as compared with 46,905 in 1922; of these 3,142 attended the Evening Clinics and 3,322 were attendances on district maternity cases.

Maternity Department.—There were 617 applicants for treatment at the Maternity Department, of whom 220 were

consultation cases; 302 patients were attended. Thirteen pupil midwives received their training at the Hospital during 1923, of whom the ten who have, so far, sat for the Examination of the Central Midwives Board, have all been successful.

Dental Clinic.—A weekly Dental Clinic for Out-Patients was opened during the year.

Accounts for Year.—Unfortunately the Income and Expenditure Account shews a slight adverse balance, and the expenditure a definite increase. This is partly due to the heavy expense incurred in the work of renovation and re-decoration which had to be undertaken in the summer, in which the Board gratefully report, however, that they were assisted by Lady Plender and the Hon. Mrs. Fletcher Moulton, who together defrayed the cost of purchasing and installing five new baths for the ward bathrooms. The increase is, in part, due to a reform which has been effected in the patients' dietary and the dietary of the Staff; in part to the steady growth of the work of the Hospital in all its departments.

Statistical Tables.—The increased weekly cost per patient shewn in the statistical tables is explained by the fact that the Hospital had to be entirely closed for a month during the summer, thereby reducing the number of patients resident daily upon which the calculation is based. On the other hand the cost per head at the House of Recovery is shewn as considerably lower than that at the parent Hospital, and if the two amounts be amalgamated the combined figures would give the actual weekly cost per head per patient. This is apparent when it is remembered that all the cases who complete their treatment at Barnet are maintained at the E.G.A. Hospital during their most expensive stage, *i.e.*, when they need constant medical and surgical supervision. The Committee are glad to report that this fact has now been recognised by King Edward's Hospital Fund, after an enquiry by them into the relationship

of Hospitals and Houses of Recovery as distinct from Convalescent Homes. The Fund has, indeed, adopted the principle of amalgamating the maintenance grants to recovery branches with the maintenance grant to parent hospitals, although it is still desired that the accounts of each branch be kept separately.

Annual subscriptions amounted to £1,295 14s. 2d.—£1,239 3s. 8d. in 1922—Donations, always a fluctuating figure, shewed as £714 17s. 6d. as against £1,720 13s. 6d. in 1922. Boxes have maintained their improvement, having collected £137 11s. 5d. The Committee are glad to record the work of the North London Amalgamated Hospital Society, in this connection, who in addition to their weekly box, made a street collection during November which brought in £30. Full statements of the accounts of the Hospital and House of Recovery will be found on pages 38-45 of the Report.

Legacies.—The legacies received amounted to £2,045, and in addition, the Committee gratefully acknowledge the following grants received for general purposes:

THE PATIENTS' LEAGUE.

Since the report of the work of the Patients' League issued in August, 1921, much progress has been made—Membership has steadily increased and the League has been able to give further help to the Hospital, as stated below.

The only sad note to record is the ill health of the President, Miss K. O. MACDONALD, which has prevented her attending most of the meetings, but she is keenly interested in the increase of the work which she commenced in 1910 and still, twice a year, gives her tea to all the Members, and this is much appreciated by those who are able to come.

In case there may be some who do not fully understand the meaning of the Patients' League, the following paragraph of explanation is repeated:

“The Patients' League was started in 1910 to give an opportunity to those women who, having derived benefit from the skill and kindness they have received in the Hospital, wish to show their gratitude by helping its work.”

What has been done since August, 1921.**1921.**

In November of this year a special donation of £50 was given for the upkeep of the Hospital and on December 1st the annual subscription of £50 was paid.

1922.

A New Year's Gift of £50 was made to meet the urgent need for funds.

A special request for help towards the Library for the patients was made in this spring by Miss BEATRICE HARRADEN which prompted the gift of £5 for that purpose.

In 1922 the League decided to have a League Flag with the Motto inscribed, for which special contributions were made as this was not felt to be any real benefit to the Hospital.

In this year a garden seat for Rosa Morison House was supplied and two oak benches for the Hospital front hall.

In 1922 it was agreed with the increase of Membership to increase the Annual subscription to the Hospital to £100. This was paid in addition to the above mentioned gifts and the £200 to the support of the League Ward at the Rosa Morison House, New Barnet.

1923.

In this year the League gave £25 towards the cost of the ambulance for taking patients down to the House of Recovery besides the £200 for upkeep of their Ward there and £100 the Annual subscription to the Hospital.

1923 brought the decision of the Leaguers to aim at collecting another £1,000 to name a Third League Bed, hoping it might be the first bed in the new block when built.

How it has been done.

The excellent result of the League from a monetary point of view is in a large measure due to the willing and generous donations of the Leaguers themselves, added to which is the Annual Sale held at the Hospital and the various smaller Sales, Whist Drives, etc., arranged by the Leaguers and other friends in their own neighbourhoods. Two small legacies have been received from Members who have left us.
