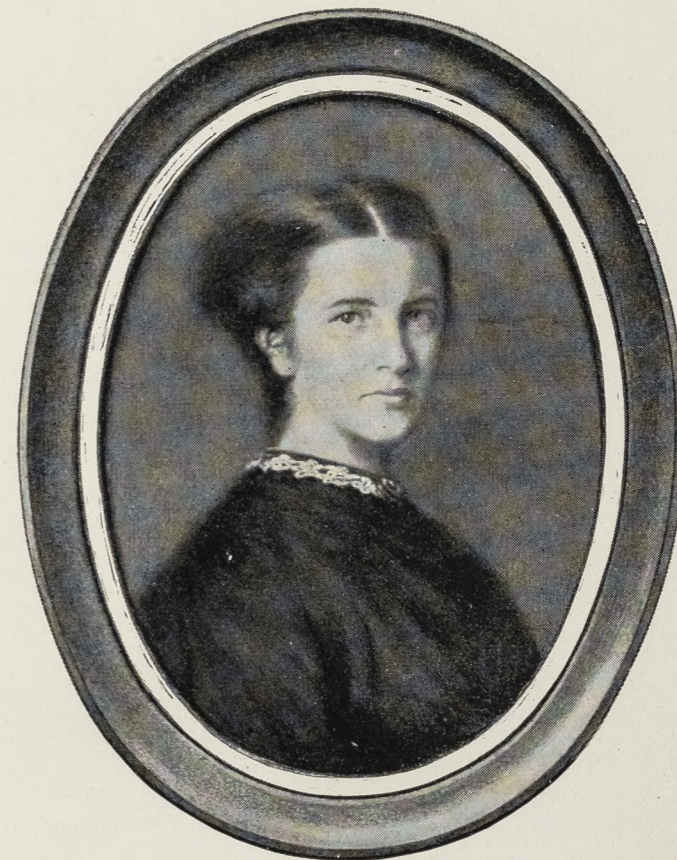

RULES.

Every donor of £21 in not more than two payments is a Governor of the Hospital for life.

Governors are empowered in each year to recommend ten out-patients to the Hospital, free of the entrance fee, provided that such recommendations are given *only to persons who are legitimate objects of medical charity.*

Annual Subscribers of two guineas and upwards are Annual Governors, and may, subject to the same limitation, recommend ten out-patients, and Subscribers of not less than one guinea may recommend five out-patients, free of the entrance fee, during each year of their subscription.

N.B.—*No further recommendation is needed to admit the Bearer of a Hospital Letter as an in-patient provided the nature of the case require that she be treated in the Hospital. Persons who are too ill to attend first as out-patients, or who live at a distance, should apply for admission by post, enclosing a medical certificate, to the SECRETARY at the HOSPITAL.*

The letter of recommendation for patient must be renewed every month, and no in-patient can remain in the house longer than two months, except by the sanction of the Managing Committee.

No infectious cases can be admitted as in-patients.

The Hospital is open for the relief of out-patients every day except Sundays, public holidays and certain other days, of which due notice is given beforehand. In-patients are admitted as vacancies occur.

All patients and their friends have the right to lay a complaint before the Managing Committee personally, by deputy, or in writing.

In-patients are required to contribute a small sum weekly towards the cost of their maintenance while in the Hospital. This sum is fixed by the Almoner with reference to the position in life, etc., of each patient, and ranges from 7s. 6d. upwards per week.

It is in the power of the Almoner to admit cases of serious illness without any payment, if, on enquiry, it appear desirable to do so.

There are three small separate wards. The terms of admission to these wards are £4 4s. per week. A ward with two beds, at a charge of £3 3s. each per week.

RULES FOR IN-PATIENTS.

Patients coming into the Hospital are required to bring a change of linen, soap, towel, comb and brush for their own use.

They are required to provide themselves with clean linen twice a week.

Every patient is required to pay a weekly sum according to her means. The money is to be paid in advance on entrance, and on each succeeding Friday during her stay.

Visitors to patients are allowed on Wednesdays and Sundays from 2.30 to 3.30.

No wine or spirit allowed to be brought into the Hospital by patients or their friends.

BY ORDER OF THE COMMITTEE.

RULES FOR OUT-PATIENTS.

Patients are admitted by payment of a fee of 1s. per attendance, or by a subscriber's letter, which must be renewed once a month.

Patients insured under the National Insurance Act are only seen at the written request of their Panel Doctor.

Sixpence towards medicine is charged every week.

Out-patients are admitted daily at the following hours:—

THE ELIZABETH GARRETT ANDERSON HOSPITAL.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

THE year 1922 has proved to be a most memorable one in the history of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital.

The original Hospital was built on a leasehold site, a fact which has been a source of serious thought to the Committee as time steadily diminished the tenure. The whole position was very carefully considered in the Autumn and the Committee agreed that an effort should be made to purchase the freehold of the ground on which the Hospital stands.

On the suggestion of the Chairman of the Hospital, our Treasurer asked Sir William Plender to approach the ground landlords—the Prudential Assurance Company, Limited—and as a result arrangements have been perfected for the acquisition of the freehold on favourable terms. About the same time the Hospital received, through Mr. Percival D. Griffiths, as Executor of the late Mrs. Gertrude Lorillard, a sum of money which will cover the purchase price.

A memorial tablet to Mrs. Lorillard to commemorate this great gift will be placed in a prominent position in the Hospital.

The lease of 132, Euston Road, the property presented to the Hospital by Sir Alan Anderson in May, 1919 expired in June last, and a short term agreement has been entered into

by which the former tenant of this house still occupies the lower part, while the two upper floors have been converted to the use of the Hospital.

At the end of the year Miss Aldrich-Blake executed a deed of gift by which she handed over to the Hospital 134, Euston Road, a property which she had allowed it to use rent free since early in 1919.

The whole site of the Hospital and its annexes will, before this Report is in print, have become the property of the Hospital for ever. To all who are interested in the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, not only as a Hospital, but also as the permanent memorial to the great woman who was its Founder, this will be a matter for great thankfulness. The Committee feel sure that all its friends will wish to be associated with the Hospital in acknowledging their debt of gratitude to Sir William Plender, Mr. Percival Griffiths, Miss Aldrich-Blake and Sir Alan Anderson for their separate shares in the achievement of this great result.

It is now possible to consider the future extension of the Hospital wisely, and a Committee has been elected by the Board to formulate a comprehensive scheme of future development. This will mean funds and funds are hard to come by. In the face of the great good fortune recorded, the Committee feels assured that when the time comes friends of the Hospital will not fail it.

The year has also been made memorable by the activities of the Combined Appeal inaugurated and organised on behalf of Hospitals by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, and by the initiation of the Hospital Saving Association. The E.G.A. Hospital, in common with others, co-operated in the Combined Appeal, and the Committee are glad of this opportunity of thanking the Authorities of the King's Fund for the vigorous way in which they undertook to raise

the "new money" required by the Voluntary Hospitals' Commission.

During the year a further £2,000 has been invested, on behalf of the Hospital, from the Memorial Appeal. The Girls' Public Day School Trust and Royal Holloway College have each completed the £500 to name their cots, the Women Writers and the Staff of the National Amalgamated Approved Society have achieved the £1,000 to name their beds. It will be remembered that in the Report for 1921 it was announced that the Viscountess Northcliffe had undertaken to finish the Women Writers' Bed. The final sum was raised by Lady Northcliffe, at a Sale held by her at the Hospital in October, and the Committee in acknowledging her generous help invited Lady Northcliffe to become a Vice-President of the Hospital, an invitation which they are glad to report she has accepted. A short statement concerning the Memorial Appeal will be found on page 20 of this Report.

In November the Staff of the Central Telegraph Office organised a Bazaar in aid of the London, St. Bartholomew's and the E.G.A. Hospitals. The Bazaar realised over £3,000 and early in December a cheque for £1,000 for the naming of a bed was handed over to our Hospital for investment. In announcing this munificent donation the Committee are glad to state that, in response to their invitation the Staff of the Central Telegraph Office has nominated Miss Ethel C. Bathurst to represent them, as an Honorary Life Governor of the Hospital.

Miss Beatrice Harraden has carried on her valuable work as Honorary Librarian, assisted by Miss Mellersh, Miss Evelyn Glover and Miss Flemming. The Library is a source of real pleasure to the patients and to such members of the Staff as are able to use it. In thanking Miss Harraden and her helpers for their kind services the Committee would again point out, that small sums of money for the purchase

suitable books and magazines are greatly appreciated by Miss Beatrice Harraden.

The Patients' League reports a very satisfactory year. It has increased its membership and usefulness. It is a source of great interest to the old patients, in addition to the financial help which it gives to the Hospital. Last year the League increased its Annual Subscription to the Hospital from £50 to £100, and it has given £200 towards the upkeep of patients at the Rosa Morison House, besides many other useful gifts, amounting altogether to over £400 in value.

The Guild of the Hospital and that of the Rosa Morison House have each added to their membership and have continued their excellent work. Last year the Guild of the Hospital made grants amounting in all to £154 5s. (including £70 for the upkeep of the Cot). It presented for use in the wards over 133 articles made up by the members and affiliated schools from materials supplied by it. After the usual Pound Day and Sale in October the Guild handed over to the Matron 420 pounds of groceries, soap, vegetables, etc., for the general stores. (For Guild Accounts see page 68.)

The Guild of the Rosa Morison House has assisted the Committee very materially in meeting the running expenses of the House of Recovery. The yearly Garden Sale, which was held in July, was even more successful than usual, although it was held on a day of intermittent heavy rain. The Countess of Strafford presided and Sir Alan Anderson made a short speech in support of the Combined Appeal for the Hospitals of London. The Sale realised a sum of £263 12s. 11d., the highest, so far, on record. From this sum a donation of £100 was given to the E.G.A. Hospital, a contribution of £75 to the Combined Appeal, £50 towards the expenses of annual cleaning and internal painting, and £42 for a new terrace awning. For the success of this special effort the Rosa

Morison House Guild is almost wholly indebted to its Barnet members. The Children's Branch of the Guild was once more successful in raising the £20 towards the upkeep of the Lyonsdown School Cot, its members were active in their help at the Garden Sale, and rendered much useful service in entertaining the patients in the wards throughout the year. The Board, in acknowledging the Hospital's debt of gratitude to the President, Officers and Members of the Patients' League, the Committees and Members of both Guilds also most warmly thank these kind little friends. They also tender their thanks to Bishop Lander, Vicar of Lyonsdown Church, New Barnet, for his ministrations to our patients at the House of Recovery throughout the year. (For Guild Accounts see page 69.)

By gifts and donations both Guilds again helped very materially in making Christmas a really happy time for the patients who spent it in Hospital. Miss Dorothea Webb, assisted by a party of gifted fellow-artists, gave her annual Concert, which is keenly appreciated by both Staff and patients. The students of the London School of Medicine for Women and of Bedford College organised parties for carol-singing in the wards. Entertainments were given throughout the Christmas season by the students of University College, Miss Wallis's School, and the Resident Medical and Nursing Staffs. Christmas trees for the wards and the Out-Patient Children's Party were presented by Lady Plender, Lady Hall and the Hon. Mrs. Fletcher-Moulton, and were greatly appreciated by the patients. The children, especially, were delighted with theirs, and also with the Conjuring Entertainment and excellent Tea provided for them. There were more than a hundred children present including babies in arms, and it was therefore a matter of congratulation to the Matron and the Out-Patient Sister that the party passed off to the

complete satisfaction of all concerned. At Rosa Morison House the patients were entertained by Mrs. Case, who, with Mrs. Perigal, organised a delightful Concert, which was supplemented by a repetition, by the Resident Medical Staff of the Hospital, of the Play they had given at the E.G.A. on December 22nd. It would be impossible for the Committee to mention, by name, the many other kind and generous friends who, by gifts of time, fruit, flowers and other bounties gave our patients such an enjoyable time, but they are heartily glad of the opportunity here afforded to thank them collectively for all they have done, and are doing, for the welfare of the Hospital.

The Governors of the Hospital held their Annual Meeting on the 8th of March. The Chair was taken by the Lord Mayor, Sir John Baddeley, who was supported by Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, D.Sc., Miss Beatrice Harraden and Sir Brumwell Thomas.

The Committee regret to record the death of Mr. G. Lawder-Eaton, who had served for many years upon the Board of Management. His membership dated from 1906, and was terminated by his resignation, for reasons of health, at the end of 1920.

The only change on the Medical Staff to be recorded has been occasioned by the retirement of Dr. Amy Sheppard. Dr. Sheppard had held the post of Ophthalmic Surgeon since 1906. The Committee are happy to report that she has accepted their cordial invitation to serve upon the Consulting Staff of the Hospital. Miss I. C. Mann, M.B., B.S., was appointed to the vacant post in June.

The need of a trained Almoner has long been greatly felt at the Hospital and the Committee, on the strong recommendation of the Medical Staff, has decided to create such a post.

Compliance with the syllabus of training laid down by the General Nursing Council necessitates the provision of

additional lectures to the Nursing Staff, and will entail expenditure. The Committee feel that the training of the Nurses is a very important feature of Hospital responsibility and that the necessary expenditure must be met.

During the year 1,507 in-patients were admitted, of these 1,023 were surgical, 351 medical, 17 special cases, and 61 maternity, while 55 infants were born in the Hospital; 628 patients were sent on to the Rosa Morison House of Recovery for the completion of their treatment. There were 9,919 new Out-Patients, including 190 at the Evening Clinics, and 591 ante-natal cases; the Out-Patient attendances registered were 46,905, of whom 3,074 were special and 4,440 were maternity cases. The number of maternity cases attended on the district maintained the increase shewn in 1921. 434 were attended last year, whereas 404 were dealt with in 1920, 261 in 1919 and 159 in 1918. It follows that a larger number of cases requiring In-Patient treatment occur throughout the year, and as the number of beds provided for such cases has not been proportionately increased, the pressure on the two available beds has become an acute problem and the work of the Department more seriously handicapped by lack of accommodation than ever. Twelve pupil Midwives have been prepared for the Examination of the Central Midwives Board during the year, of whom eleven passed. In addition, Miss Davies-Colley has had twelve outside pupils attending her lectures.

The Committee are happy to report that the financial position of the Hospital is more satisfactory. It has been possible to pay off the Bank overdraft of £3,000 announced last year, and to start 1923 with a much smaller list of sundry creditors than usual (*v.* Balance Sheet, page 40). Annual Subscriptions have slightly increased, being £1,239 3s. 8d. as against £1,225 12s. in 1921. Donations amounting to £1,720 13s. 6d. have been received, against £1,647 17s. 4d.

An effort has been made to increase the revenue to be drawn from collecting boxes, with the result that £131 12s. 3d. has been raised by this means against £37 12s. in 1921. The Committee cordially acknowledge the help given in this connection by the North London Amalgamated Hospital Society, who have carried out regular weekly box collections in aid of our funds, and who gave a street demonstration for us in May last, which brought in £98.

The Entertainments Committee were able to augment the Hospital Income by a sum of £332 15s. 6d. resulting from Dances, Concerts, Whist Drives and Lectures organised by them throughout the year. The Committee regret to report that pressure of work obliged Lady Hall to resign the Chairmanship of this Committee and they take this opportunity of thanking her very heartily for her valuable services in this connection. They would also offer their warm thanks, on behalf of the Hospital, to Mr. Walter de la Mare, Mr. Laurence Binyon and Mr. John Bailey, who each most kindly gave a lecture in aid of the Hospital at the invitation of the Entertainments Committee.

THE MEMORIAL APPEAL.

The Memorial Appeal, which was started in 1916 to endow 50 Beds in the E.G.A. Hospital in honour of the Founder—Dr. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson—is now nearly complete. The Committee feel that a short account of the financial position at the close of 1922 will be welcome to all who have so generously supported it.

Close of Appeal.

The Appeal was officially closed on the 31st May, 1920, as at that date the whole of the £50,000 had either been received, or definite promises had been given by individual collectors to make themselves responsible for the £1,000 to endow their bed. The fund was then duly audited, and to make a long story short, £47,600 has now been invested—£46,000 in War Stock, and the remainder in Midland Railway Stock.

Past History of Appeal.

Previous Annual Reports have shown from year to year how the work of the Appeal has prospered. The completion of the Beds for the Girls' Public Day School Trust and the Royal Holloway College are recorded in the current Report, and the Beds of the Women Writers and the Staff of the National Amalgamated Approved Society are now complete. The Women Writers' Bed was finished by Lady Northcliffe, who not only gave largely herself, but whose appeal on its

behalf to Women Authors and Women Journalists was handsomely responded to. Lady Northcliffe finally added to her generosity by holding a Sale at the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, which not only secured the £120 needed at that time to complete the Bed, but left a balance of £147 in aid of the Appeal.

Increase of Income.

In addition to the increase of income from investments arising out of the Appeal, which amounts to over £2,000 a year, the Hospital is benefited by £40 annually from the London County Secondary Schools, and a yearly collection averaging £50 is presented by Miss Buchanan, of the G.P.O. Savings' Bank, from the Women Clerks of that institution.

Response to the Appeal.

The response from Colleges and Schools, and groups of women during the early years of the Great War was remarkable. Through times of national danger and unprecedented depression in trade the appeal never wavered. Medical women, musicians, women artists, nurses, domestic servants, women landworkers, women secretaries and clerks, civil servants, actresses, women writers, all responded nobly to do honour to the great founder of the Hospital—Dr. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson. The small stained glass panels that run like jewelled bands across the windows of the Wards testify to the work and lend a great charm to the Hospital.

Support from Principals of Colleges.

In the initial stages of the Appeal, when it might easily have been doomed to failure by insufficient support, the messages that came from the Principals of Women's Colleges greatly strengthened the hands of the Chairman and the Committee and their value cannot be over-estimated. The good example was soon followed, and now there is scarcely any organised group of women that has not been represented. It is hoped that anyone who wishes to perpetuate the memory of a dearly loved friend or relative will endow one of the five new Beds by giving £1,000 and adding as a Memorial another stained glass window panel. The gratitude and thanks of the Committee of the Hospital have been again and again expressed to all who have helped with the Appeal now happily so near its completion. The women of to-day have worthily upheld the name and work of a great woman, by helping to build up the work that she began with so much faith and courage more than half a century ago.
