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## CONSTITUTION.

### I. Title.

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

### II. Status.

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

### III. Object.

The Junior Council subscribes to the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

### IV. Methods.

1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and co-operates with the Society in sending speakers to colleges and schools and in collecting information on Trainings and Openings for women.
2. The Council enables young professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with young women already in business or practising.
3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

### V. Governing Body.

The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Treasurer, and an Hon. Secretary to conduct the current business of the Council.

### VI. Membership.

1. The Junior Council shall consist of men and women (a) who subscribe to its aims; (b) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (c) who have paid a minimum annual subscription of 2/6 to the London and National Society for Women's Service before the date of the annual meeting of the Junior Council.



2. A minimum annual subscription of 10/- shall entitle members to House Membership, with the right to use the Library, Restaurant and other facilities afforded by the Members' Centre.
3. Membership of the Junior Council shall be limited to a period of five years, but may be extended by the Executive Committee.
4. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.
5. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.

#### VII. **Officers.**

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Treasurer, and the Hon. Secretary.

#### VIII. **Executive Committee.**

1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members.
2. It shall at the first meeting after election elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.
5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

#### IX. **Nominations.**

1. Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

#### X. **Meetings.**

1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.

2. Special General Meetings of the Council (*a*) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (*b*) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

#### XI. **Resolutions.**

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

#### XII. **Alteration of Constitution.**

The Constitution shall not be altered except after agreement between the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society, and confirmation by a General Meeting of the Members of the Council. The nature of the proposed alterations must be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members. Any alteration to be carried must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.



## JUNIOR COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING.

MEMBERS' READING ROOM, 27th APRIL, 1932, 8.15 p.m.

Chairman: Ethel Watts.

### I. Appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.

Moved Mrs Henderson, seconded Mrs. George Burton, and passed that Miss C. G. Gatey should act as Returning Officer and Miss B. S. McFie and Miss G. Robinson as Tellers.

### II. Appointment of Auditor.

Moved Miss E. Douglas, seconded Miss A. E. Mackay, and passed that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

### III. Annual Report.

The Annual Report was then read by Miss Stoney. Moved Miss A. E. Mackay, seconded Mrs. R. W. Knollys, and passed "that the Report be adopted, printed and circulated."

In speaking to the Report, Miss Strachey said:—

"I have pleasure in speaking to the Annual Report, as I am glad to congratulate the Junior Council on their work. I have a fellow-feeling for the makers of Reports who are bound by the limits of their year, and not allowed to speak of interesting events which have happened since it ended. I realise on this occasion what a trial it must have been for the Secretaries that Shakespeare's birthday should fall twenty-three days after the close of the Junior Council year, three weeks too late to allow of mention in this Report of the opening of Elisabeth Scott's Theatre at Stratford-on Avon.

"There are two events mentioned in the Report to which I should like to refer. The first is the 'Suggestions and Complaints' party from which a suggestion was sent forward to the Executive Committee that the Reading Room should be opened on Saturdays and Sundays. I am asked by the Executive Committee of the Society to say that they heartily sympathise with the makers of the suggestion, but are unable to recommend its being carried into effect on account of the additional expense it would entail for heating, lighting and staffing. These additional facilities requested by members are really Club facilities, and we all know that the annual subscription for the membership of a London club is very much higher than our own annual subscription, and that club mem-

bers are, in addition required to pay an entrance fee. It is for that reason that clubs are able to offer greater facilities than our Members' Centre can provide.

"My other point is in connection with the April debate on the motion 'That it is better to be old than young.' Everybody knows the proverb 'si jeunesse savait, si vieillesse pouvait.' The Society is nearly seventy years of age, so may perhaps be considered to be old—though not, I hope, stick-in-the-mud old. The Junior Council is about five years of age, so may perhaps be considered to be young, though not, I hope callow young. I cannot help believing that these two together may be able to find a way of defeating the proverb and combining the 'savvy' of the old with the energies of the young. Looking back over these past five years, I think that no one can deny that the Junior Council has brought fresh strength into the Society, firstly, by advertising it and increasing the membership, and secondly, by generally cheering it up and giving friends good reason to act as benefactors.

"That women should get equal chances with men is our common object, the bond which holds us all together. The Junior Council is helping indirectly all the time towards the attainment of our object, through the individual work of its members and it seems to me that the next step in the progress before us will be for the Junior Council to participate more directly in the work that the Society as a whole is doing. I hope that this evening their decisions will lead us further along that path. I have much pleasure in supporting the adoption of the Annual Report."

Miss Ethel Watts proposed from the Chair that a message of sympathy be sent from the Junior Council to Mrs. Kinnell on the death of her sister, Annie, Viscountess Cowdray, to whom the Society owes so much for her generous support.

### IV. Treasurer's Report.

Miss Gatey said: "Before I read the Report I think I should explain that the figures this year are got out on a different basis. Heat, light and salaries have always been paid by the Society, who retained all but first year Junior Council subscriptions. This year all expenses are put in the balance sheet. The balance now stands at £122 12s. There was no grant of £100 from the Society last year, and the Appeal launched to make up this loss to our income only realised £60."

The statement of accounts, which covered a period of twelve months, was then read by the Hon. Treasurer. Moved Mrs. George Burton, seconded Mrs. R. W. Knollys, and carried that the financial statement be adopted.



## V. Alteration of Rules.

*Rule VI. Membership.* Moved Miss K. I. Hancock, seconded Miss M. Melville and carried.

(a) That Rule VI paragraph 2 be amended as follows:—  
Line 1, delete the words "seven shillings and sixpence" and substitute the words "ten shillings" so that the paragraph then reads

"A minimum annual subscription of 10/- shall entitle members to House Membership, with the right to use the Library, Restaurant and other facilities afforded by the Members' Centre."

This amendment to come into operation on 1st June, 1932.

(b) "That a Resolution be placed on the Agenda of the next General Meeting of the Society for a corresponding alteration in Rule V."

Miss Hancock put forward two reasons for proposing the resolution; firstly, that the Junior Council does want to become self-supporting, and secondly, that the Society is offering more to members now that the new building is completed.

In seconding the Resolution, Miss Melville said that the proposal of raising House Membership subscription from 7/6 to 10/- was brought up at the "Suggestions and Complaints" party. The increased facilities offered by Women's Service House are a justifiable reason for raising the subscription, and those members who are not able to make use of the House can still remain in touch with the Society on the very low subscription of 2/6.

## VI. Resolutions Proposed by the Executive Committee.

(a) That owing to the increasing number of members in the Junior Council, special groups should be formed, to be limited at the outset to six in number, to come under the following headings:—

each with a President and Secretary.

Miss Stoney pointed out that the aims of the Junior Council depend upon the interchange of individual knowledge and experience between members, and that this has become difficult owing to the greatly increased membership and attendance at Junior Council functions, which results in new members failing to gain personal introductions, notwithstanding the efforts of the officers and hostesses. It is hoped that the formation of groups will cure this defect and provide even greater opportunity for the discussion of professional and

business life between members and particularly between those actively pursuing their career and students. The groups will function under the control of the Junior Council Committee and when public action is contemplated, under the Executive Committee of the Society.

Miss Hancock endorsed Miss Stoney's feeling that the formation of these groups would help to break down the existing barriers to the growth of intimacy among members of the Junior Council, due to the large numbers always present at the monthly functions.

Miss Venetia Stephenson suggested that the formation of groups may tend towards further segregation of the Junior Council members.

Miss Melville thereupon pointed out that members may join any group, not necessarily only that of their own profession.

The resolution was hereupon put to the meeting and carried.

(b) "That this meeting urges the Government to bring in legislation incorporating the recommendations of the Select Committee on Shop Assistants, appointed on Wednesday, 19th November, 1930, to consider and report upon proposals for limiting the hours of work of shop assistants and improving the conditions of their employment."

Mrs. Strachey said: "The best way to move this Resolution is for me to read you extracts from the report of the Select Committee on Shop Assistants. The present law allows a maximum working week of 74 hours, including meals. Of course, it is true that the best employers do not actually work their employes up to the limit, but there is a very large number of concerns, particularly in the country, working their assistants a great deal too long. The number of people concerned in the shop assistant world is very large. There are at present 1,764,390 people covered by the term 'shop assistant.' There is legislation with regard to closing hours of shops, but shop assistants are not limited to the hours in which the shops are closed. There is further difficulty also in that the work is seasonal.

"With regard to conditions, the effect of strong lights is very tiring, and the assistants in many shops are not allowed by their employers to sit down, although by law shop assistants who serve behind counters must be provided with seats. Some of the best known and most famous stores in London have sub-basements in which employes are working. In the Report of the Select Committee, 1930-31, a statutory eight hour day is proposed, allowing overtime with overtime pay."



Mrs. Strachey read an extract from the evidence of the late Dr. Ethel Bentham before the Shop Assistants' Committee in 1930, which said: "In a word, they grow old early and they have the troubles of age twelve years before they ought."

Mrs. Strachey pointed out that this was a chance for the groups, as a body of young women interested in the work of women, to urge the Government to act upon the recommendations of the Committee.

Miss Venetia Stephenson formally moved the Resolution on behalf of the Junior Council and supported Mrs. Strachey in urging the Government to get the recommendations put into being as soon as possible.

Mrs. Arnold Glover suggested that the groups should read and understand reports on which they propose to take action, rather than rely on the knowledge of an expert.

Mrs. Burton, speaking from experience, said that an eight hour day is long enough, and that if employers want to secure trade up to 7 p.m. they should employ more than one shift of staff.

Mrs. Strachey said that many of the juvenile shop-assistants are in a virtually blind alley occupation, since shops employ more juveniles than they can absorb, and yet their working hours are too long to allow them to attend continuation classes at night and so prepare themselves for other work.

The resolution was thereupon put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

#### VII. Election of Executive Committee.

Miss Irene Stoney and Miss C. G. Gatey were returned unopposed as Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer, and seventeen nominations having been received, a ballot was held and thirteen other members subsequently elected. The result of the ballot was announced by the Returning Officer.

The names of members serving on the newly-elected Executive will be found on the first page of the Report.

## LONDON & NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR WOMEN'S SERVICE JUNIOR COUNCIL

### REPORT.

This is our sixth Annual Meeting and we are able to report a steady growth of membership, a widening of interests, an extension of activities which prove that the Junior Council fulfils yearly in greater measure the hopes of the original handful of members.

The great value of the new premises has been demonstrated at the crowded monthly parties which steadily increase in popularity, and have included in the past twelve months, a variety of subjects by distinguished speakers. The first party was, appropriately enough, dedicated to politics, and the title "What my party offers to the woman voter" with an exponent from each of the political parties, drew a large audience, eager to hear what Miss Jennie Lee, M.P. in the Labour Government, Miss Irene Ward, at that time Conservative candidate for the Wallsend Division of Northumberland, and Miss Aline MacKinnon, Liberal candidate for the Holderness Division of Yorkshire, had to say in support of their party's policy. Miss Irene Ward, who became a member of the Junior Council, successfully contested the Wallsend Constituency at the last General Election and her victory was celebrated by a dinner-party given by the Executive Committee of the Junior Council, when members of the Senior Executive joined in wishing Miss Ward a very successful Parliamentary career.

The important present-day problem of Housing, of such interest to all our members, and especially to those whose work brings them into contact with this question, such as architects, house property managers, was discussed very fully at a party held in July.

Miss Elisabeth Scott, A.R.I.B.A., took the chair. Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Chairman of the Kensington Housing Trust, spoke on the difficulties encountered in effecting slum clearance, and the need for building houses at a rental which the poorest members of the population could afford to pay. He was followed by Mr. Parker Morris, Town Clerk of Westminster, who emphasised the importance of subsequent good management and spoke highly of the valuable services of women as house-property managers and rent collectors.

Sir Lawrence Chubb, Secretary of the Commons, Open



Spaces and Footpaths Preservation Society, pleaded eloquently for the necessity of securing open places as playgrounds for children whenever new housing schemes are considered, and the evening terminated by an exhibition of the Housing Film belonging to the "Under Forty Club," which evoked great interest.

Miss Susan Lawrence, at that time Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health, was prevented at the last moment by Parliamentary duties from fulfilling the role of one of the principal speakers.

The first autumn party was held on October 15th, when the Junior Council was fortunate enough to secure as the guest of the evening, Brig. General Hon. Charles Bruce, C.B., of Mount Everest fame, who gave a most interesting talk, illustrated by many delightful slides, on "The Indian Frontier and the Hindu Koosh." Among other distinguished guests on this evening, we numbered, Lt. Col. Sir Francis Young-husband, K.C.I.E., K.C.S.I., Lt. Gen. O'Dowda, C.B., C.M.G., C.S.I., and Mrs. O'Dowda, Sir William and Lady Foster, Mrs. Patrick Ness, the only representative of her sex on the Council of the Royal Geographical Society, and the Rev. Walter Weston, first Hon. Member of the Japanese Alpine Club, and Mrs. Weston.

November and December were specially ear-marked by the Debating Society for functions to which all members of the Junior Council were invited and of which a description occurs at a later stage of this Report.

In January we were honoured by a visit from Mr. Basil Blackwell, who came to speak to our members on "Some Aspects of the Book World." This proved a most popular evening. Mr. St. John Hornby took the Chair, and among those present connected with the world of books were Mr. and Mrs. Bertram Christian, Mrs. Gerald Duckworth, Mr. Langdon-Davies, Mr. Maurice Marston, Mr. Harold Raymond, Miss Marjorie Towers and Mr. G. S. Williams. In his address, Mr. Blackwell described the work of every department in a bookshop, and initiated an enthralled audience into the daily life of those who could individually contribute to or mar its prosperity. After the vote of thanks, Mr. St. John Hornby, in response to the request of many members of the audience, gave a short but very interesting account of how he came to start the Ashendene Press.

A "Newspaper" party was held in February, with Mr. Tom Clarke, Editor of the "News-Chronicle" as the principal guest, and Mr. Robert Lynd in the Chair. In a speech entitled "An Editor at Bay," Mr. Clarke replied to a series of questions prepared by the members of a special sub-committee. Mr. Hannen Swaffer joined prominently in the

general discussion which followed Mr. Clarke's speech. The success of this party was largely due to the excellent preparatory work undertaken by Miss G. Watts.

Among other distinguished guests, we had the honour of numbering Mr. Robert Bernays, M.P., and Mr. A. J. Cummings, of the "News-Chronicle," Mr. and Mrs. Beverley Baxter, Miss Anna Armstrong, Miss Elizabeth Craig, Mr. and Mrs. Horace Thorogood, Mr. and Mrs. Earle Welby, Miss Helen Williams and Mr. H. C. Purchase.

The last party of the Junior Council year was reserved for members only, who were asked to come armed with "Suggestions and Complaints" to be threshed out with the Executive Committee, prior to the Annual Meeting. Diffidence, or perhaps lack of either constructive or critical proposals, kept many members away, a fact to be regretted, as the Executive realises that no organisation of this nature can hope to be immune from criticism, and would welcome suggestions as to future policy and subjects for parties. However, those members who came were helpful and a certain number of written comments were received and considered in detail, so that the Committee felt that the evening had not been wasted, in spite of the small attendance.

Since the last Annual Meeting, the Debating Society has met on eight occasions, and may look back with satisfaction on a successful year. Miss Stella Lister, their able Chairman, was unfortunately obliged by her work as lecturer to the National Milk Publicity Council, to be absent at Liverpool for some months at the end of 1931, but her place was admirably filled by Miss Irene Shewell Cooper. A vote of thanks is due to Miss P. M. Blunt for acting as Treasurer. Miss Petersen was obliged to give up the secretaryship temporarily owing to stress of work, and Miss Wilcox generously stepped into the breach, and has acted as substitute for the past few months.

A discussion on the three following books:—"Conquest of Happiness," "San Michele," "Modern Germanies," was held on April 28th, with Miss Mackay, Miss Lister, and Miss Petersen as leaders, and although a small meeting, it proved very enjoyable.

The attendance at the Debating Society Annual Meeting held on June 11th was so bad that the Committee decided in future to hold annual meetings in the autumn, and it was agreed that the next should not take place till October, 1932.

Great interest was taken in an Open Discussion to which all members of the Junior Council were invited on the 19th June to hear Mr. Philip Noel Baker, M.P., propose "That it should be possible at the forthcoming Disarmament Conference to achieve a general limitation of armaments, which



will materially contribute to the greater security of nations." Some criticisms were offered by the Rt. Hon. Sir Rennell Rodd, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., M.P., and the Chair was taken by Dame Rachel Crowdy, D.B.E., whose work with the League of Nations is so well known. The general debate was of a high order of excellence.

"That Russia in Architecture as in other directions, is leading the World" was the motion chosen by Mr. Clough Williams-Ellis, M.C., F.R.I.B.A., for an open debate held in November, in which Mr. H. B. Creswell, F.R.I.B.A., whose book, "The Honeywood File," followed by a sequel entitled "The Honeywood Settlement" has been so widely read, was his opponent. Mr. Williams-Ellis had just returned from a visit to Russia with Mr. Julian Huxley, many of whose slides of photographs taken during his stay in the country were shown. The votes of the majority of a very large mixed audience, went to the opposer of the motion.

Among recent fixtures, one of the most successful ventures of the Debating Society was the staging of a Mock Murder Trial in December, when His Honour Judge Shewell Cooper presided. The prosecution of the accused, Miss D. B. Evelyn, was undertaken by the Law Students' Debating Society, and her defence by the Junior Council Debating Society. Counsel for the defence was Miss Venetia Stephenson. After only two rehearsals, the trial progressed without a hitch. The audience were told at the beginning of the evening that they were to consider themselves the jury, and responded wholeheartedly and unanimously to Judge Shewell Cooper's final direction in his summing up that if they had enjoyed themselves, they should declare the prisoner "Not Guilty." The credit for authorship of the plot and arrangements generally goes to Miss G. Petersen, who undertook the bulk of the work.

Debates with Westfield College and the 1919 Club were held in November and March respectively, that of the former at their own headquarters and the latter in the Members' Reading Room here, although the 1919 Club were actually the challengers this year.

There remains one further fixture to report, that of the debate held on February 12th, when the Junior Council challenged the senior members of the Society, who were given choice of subject, and put forward as their speakers Mrs. Oliver Strachey and the Hon. Mrs. Spencer Graves to propose the motion "That it is better to be old than young." Miss Hancock and Miss Melville did their best to persuade a delighted audience that this was not the case, but their arguments failed to convince, and the motion was carried by a large majority.

In spite of a cold, wet summer, the Swimming Club members met regularly and by the end of the season reached a total of sixty-three. It is satisfactory to report that the Second Class Swimming Bath, Great Smith St. (entrance by St. Ann St., behind the main entrance to the Baths) has again been secured for the sole use of members on Monday evenings from 8 till 9 p.m., starting on Monday, May 2nd, and it is hoped that many members will take advantage of this privilege, and that it will again be possible to challenge teams from other swimming clubs. Last year competitions were arranged with the New Oxford Swimming Club and the National Training College of Domestic Subjects, Buckingham Palace Road. Miss E. C. Ewing continues to act as Chairman of Committee, and Miss D. L. Irving and Miss D. M. Taylor as Secretary and Treasurer. Miss W. Mason and Miss J. Newman have been indefatigable in helping to coach members and the former gave a silver cup to be awarded to the member showing the greatest improvement in the course of the year, which was won by Miss J. Edwards and graciously presented by Mrs. Kinnell.

The Walkers' Club continues to plan expeditions in the Home Counties on Sundays at intervals of about three weeks, a member of the Club acting as leader each time. Full particulars of the method of organisation are available from the Hon. Secretary, Miss H. Roxburgh, or Chairman of Committee, Miss D. J. Ledebor.

The Amateur Dramatic Society has now been fully organised under the Chairmanship of Miss Birrel, and application for particulars of membership should be made to the Hon. Secretary, Miss Bowie.

The unremitting zeal of Miss Pattie Upton to whom we are most grateful, has resulted in the formation of a Junior Council Orchestra, which will make its first appearance on the occasion of an At Home to be given to the women Members of Parliament on the 29th April.

Thanks are due to Miss Hancock for her very capable services as our Press Secretary.

Our Annual Report draws to a close and it is a sad duty to have to incorporate mention of the loss of a true supporter. Members will long remember that the equipment of the Hall and other gifts are due to the generosity of Annie, Viscountess Cowdray, whose death deprives many members of a friend, but who in life permanently endowed the lives of innumerable women and their successors with great benefit.

If the enthusiasm of such women coupled with the work of the pioneers of the Suffrage movement, is sustained in the Junior Council, no limit can be placed upon the importance it may ultimately assume in the sphere of womens' work.
